

# JOURNAL OF THE SENATE.

MONDAY, November 27, 1848,

Which being the day fixed by the Constitution of this State for the meeting of the General Assembly, at 12 o'clock, M., Mr. Chas. W. Downing, Secretary of the last Senate, called the Senate to order, and proceeded to call the roll by Districts, when the following Senators appeared and took their seats:

From the 4th District, Thomas M. White.  
" " 5th " Daniel J. Smith.  
" " 6th " Robert J. Floyd.  
" " 7th " Joseph Austin.  
" " 8th " James H. T. Lorimer.  
" " 9th " J. L. Crawford.

On motion of Mr. Austin, Mr. Sanderson assumed the Chair, *pro tem.*

On motion of Mr. Austin, ordered that the Senate be opened by prayer.

Rev. Dr. Todd officiated.

On motion of Mr. White, the roll was called, and the Senators from the Fourth, Fifth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Fifteenth, Seventeenth and Eighteenth Districts, having presented certificates of their election, were sworn, according to the Constitution of this State, by William M. Gibson, Justice of the Peace for Leon County.

Mr. Austin moved to adjourn until to-morrow, 10 o'clock.

On which, the yeas and nays being called for by Messrs. Forward and Floyd, were as follows:

Yeas—Messrs. White, D. J. Smith, Austin, Lorimer, Crawford, Moseley, Watts, Sanderson—8.

Nays—Messrs. Floyd, Aldrich, Brown—4.

The Senate adjourned until to-morrow, 10 o'clock.
