Whereas, the question of the boundary line between the States of Georgia and Florida cannot be finally agreed upon by the said States—Therefore,

*Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Florida in General Assembly convened, That the State of Georgia is respectfully invited to join the State of Florida in an invitation to the States of Alabama and South Carolina to appoint a Commissioner from each of said States, and the whole question touching the boundary line between the States of Georgia and Florida shall be submitted to said Commissioners from Alabama and South Carolina, and the decision of said Commissioners shall be final and binding upon the States of Georgia and Florida, and the last mentioned States shall pay the expenses of said commission.*

The yeas and nays having been called for by Messrs. Holland and Hopkins on the adoption of the amendment,
