 Your committee to whom was referred Senate Bill No. 53, to be entitled An Act to authorize Augustus M. Cox to erect a Toll Bridge and Dam across the Santa Fe river for milling purposes, ask leave to report that they have examined the same, and recommend that it do pass.

The rule was waived, and Mr. Purman offered the following petition :

To the Honorable the Members of the Senate and Assembly of the State of Florida :

The petition of A. B. Hawkins of the county of Leon, State of Florida, respectfully showeth,

That in the year 1860, he was holder and owner of Comptroller's certificates of indebtedness, issued under An Act to provide for the payment of the volunteer company of Capt. Hansford D. Dyches, and other companies, approved January 5, 1869, to the amount of four thousand and fifteen dollars and six cents, and that he acquired a property in such certificates by a *bona fide* purchase for value.

Your petitioner further showeth that these certificates represent an authorized and acknowledged liability of the State contracted prior to the rebellion; that they have always been deemed fair, and as incurred in every respect properly. Your petitioner further showeth that in 1861, what was called a convention of the people of the State passed an ordinance authorizing an issue of the bonds by the State, and authorized the Treasurer of the State to pay these bonds to the creditors of the State, and that the Treasurer of the State under and by virtue of this authority exchanged bonds for the certificates aforesaid.

Your petitioner further showeth that under the provisions of section fourth, Article XV. of the Constitution, all bonds of this State, without regard to the purposes to which they were applied, issued between January 1861, and October 1865, are declared null and void, and the Legislature is prohibited from paying the same, and that in the opinion of the Attorney-General of the State, the bonds now held by your petitioner cannot be recognized as a legal indebtedness of the State. But your petitioner showeth that under and by virtue of the provisions of the same section and Article of the Constitution, it is required that the preceding declaration and prohibition to the Legislature, shall not be so construed as to invalidate any authorized liability of the State contracted prior to the 10th of January, A. D. 1861, and your petitioner represents that if the bonds which he received are repudiated, and at the same time the State should retain a valid claim recognized and existing anterior to the rebellion, which your petitioner surrendered for the bonds, that such a course would operate to invalidate a recognized liability anterior to 1861, and would be an act of the most manifestly gross injustice and wrong.

Your petitioner further showeth that all of these facts are

readily ascertained, and he prays such action on the part of your honorable bodies as will secure him his rights and do him simple justice in the premises.

His prayer being granted he will ever pray, &c.
