

Mr. McCaskill moved that the report of the Judiciary Committee be read;

Which was agreed to.

Senate Bill No. 12:

To be entitled An act to change the name of Brown's Theological Institute,

Was read first time.

Mr. Pearce moved that the rules be suspended and the bill put upon its second reading.

The rule was unanimously waived and the bill ordered upon its second reading.

Mr. Pearce asked that the rules be waived and the bill be put upon its third reading.

Mr. Oliveros objecting, the yeas and nays were called for with the following result:

Senate Bill No. 13:

To be entitled An act to incorporate the Moccasin Creek Navigation Company,

Was taken up.

Mr. Henderson moved that the rule be waived and the bill read by its title and referred to Committee on Commerce and Navigation;

Which was unanimously agreed to.

So the bill was read by its title and referred to the Committee on Commerce and Navigation.

Assembly Bill No. 13:

An act to protect all citizens of the State of Florida in their civil rights,

Was taken up.

Mr. Jenkins asked that the rules be waived and the bill read by its title;

Which was agreed to.

Mr. Knight moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Judiciary;

Which was agreed to.

An Executive message was received from the Governor.

Mr. Meacham moved that the Senate go into Executive session;

Which was agreed to.

Doors were opened.

Mr. Pearce moved that Senate Bill No. 12, to be entitled An act to change the name of Brown's Theological Seminary, be transmitted to the Assembly immediately;

Which was agreed to.

Mr. Locke moved that the Senate adjourn until Monday at 12 o'clock.

Jonathan C. Gibbs, to be Superintendent of Public Instruction, vice Charles Beecher, term expired.

John Varnum, to be Adjutant-General, reappointed.

Mr. McCaskill moved to adjourn until 12 o'clock to-morrow.

Which was placed among the orders of the day.

Mr. Pope asked leave to introduce Senate Bill No. 17:

Mr. McCaskill asked to have his resolution in relation to Federal office-holders taken from the table.

ORDERS OF THE DAY.

Assembly Bill No. 13 :

A bill to be entitled An act to Protect all Citizens of the State of Florida in their Civil Rights and to Furnish the Means for their Vindication,

Was read second time.

Mr. Knight offered the following amendment to the first section of the bill :

And be it further provided, That nothing in this act shall be so construed as to hinder inn-keepers, common carriers, owners, managers, or lessees of theatres, or other places of public amusement; commanders of boats, superintendents of railroads, trustees, superintendents, teachers of schools or seminaries of learning, based upon private or corporated capital, from forming such rules and regulations for the benefit of such corporation or institution as will tend to their best interest; and in no case shall the rights of private citizens be interfered with.

The yeas and nays were called for with the following result: Those voting in the affirmative were—

Messrs. Crawford, Fortner, Ginn, Henderson, Knight, McAuley, McCaskill, Oliveros, and Smith—9.

Those voting in the negative were—

Messrs. Billings, Dennis, Eagan, Hill, Jenkins, Johnson, Locke, Long, McKinnon, Meacham, Pearce, Pope, Potter, and Sturtevant—14.

So the amendment was lost.

Mr. Knight offered the following amendment to section 2 of the bill :

SEC. 2. After the words "or inciting thereto" strike out the following: "Shall for every such offense forfeit and pay the sum of one hundred dollars to the person aggrieved thereby."

The amendment was withdrawn.

Mr. Potter moved that the rules be waived and the bill put on its third reading.

Objected to, and the yeas and nays were called for with the following result :

Those voting in the affirmative were—

Messrs. Billings, Dennis, Eagan, Hill, Jenkins, Johnson, Locke, Long, Meacham, Pearce, Pope, Potter, and Sturtevant—13.

Those voting in the negative were—

Messrs. Crawford, Fortner, Ginn, Henderson, Knight, McAuley, McCaskill, McKinnon, Oliveros, and Smith—10.

A two-thirds vote being necessary to suspend the rule, the motion was lost.

Mr. Meacham moved that the bill be made the special order of to-morrow at half-past ten o'clock;

Which was agreed to.

Mr. Henderson moved that the Senate adjourn until 10 o'clock to-morrow.

The yeas and nays were called for with the following result :
