Mr. Johnson moved the printing of fifty copies of the Standing Committees of the Senate for the use of the members;

Which was agreed to.

Mr. McKinnon offered the following resolution:

Which was adopted.

Mr. Oliveros offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee on Privileges and Elections be requested to take into consideration the contested seat now occupied by Mr. Sturtevant as Senator from the Twenty-first District, and that the committee notify all parties interested, and that they report their progress as early as convenient;

Which was adopted.

On motion of Mr. McKinnon, the Senate then adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 19, 1875.

Which was adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Corporations. Under a suspension of the rules, Mr. McKinnon was allowed to introduce Senate Bill No. 4: A bill to be entitled An act in Relation to Evidence; Which was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.
