HIS EXCELLENCY GEORGE F. DREW,
Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR: I have the honor to submit for your consideration the following report of the condition of the State militia under the acts of militia laws August 6, 1868. The State militia is divided into two divisions and five brigades, and fully organized, as will be shown by the annexed tables.

In my report of December 31, 1878, we had 26 volunteer companies, 14 of which were armed with best improved arms. Within the past two years I have organized one artillery company, armed with two 12-pound howitzers and side-arms; four cavalry companies, three of which are armed with sabres and improved revolvers, and twelve infantry companies, five of them armed, well drilled, and handsomely uniformed. We have several volunteer companies, so admirably drilled, they are second to no similar organization in any of our sister States.

As there has been no appropriation made in the past five years for defraying the expenses of the militia, I would respectfully ask that your Excellency recommend that a small appropriation be made for the purchase of about two hundred tents, blank books, and copies of military tactics, that each company may have a copy. The United States Ordnance Department does not issue tents to the militia. We wish occasionally to order out the military to have encampment; this cannot be carried out for want of tents.

The roster of officers is appended to this report. (Tables Nos. 1 and 2.) Table No. 3 shows returns of the enrolled militia of each county in the State. Total, 25,903.

It will appear by the report of the volunteer and enrolled militia that our available force is 28, 579.

Tables Nos. 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, contain a statement of the ordnance owned by the State.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

It is necessary, during each year, to make repairs for the protection and use of the capitol. There are several offices in the basement in bad condition, and should be repaired at once.

The interior of the building needs painting and white-washing. The Senate Chamber has been furnished with handsome walnut desks, and I would recommend that the Legislature make appropriation to furnish the same for the Assembly Hall; those now in use are of little service, needing repair every year.

The grounds around the capitol have been improved and kept in good order. They are now enclosed by a neat, substantial fence, built of the best material—on each side a desirable walk—which adds greatly to the appearance of the place. The amount of appropriation for repairs of the capitol was not sufficient to defray all the expenses of this work. Annexed is a table (A) showing the amounts paid out in repairs and furnishing the capitol and grounds.

The Chairman of the Military Committee directed me to purchase a State Flag, which I have done, at a cost of seventy-five dollars. No appropriation was made for the payment, so the amount was paid out of the appropriation for the repairs, &c., of the capitol.

STATE ASYLUM FOR THE INSANE.

The last Legislature made an appropriation of two thousand dollars for the repairs and buildings. By your Excellency's directions I made the following repairs, and put up new buildings, buying the material, hiring the labor by the day, and superintending it in person, in order to make the best investment, and accomplish as much work as could possibly be done with the limited amount appropriated. Your Excellency and the Board of State Institutions have approved the work.

The building known as the work-shop was repaired, and twelve large double rooms comfortably fitted up for the colored

females. This building has a superior cistern built for their special use. The grounds are enclosed by a substantial fence, separating them from all other inmates.

The building known as the U. S. Barracks, three stories high, has been thoroughly repaired and improved, contains about fifty-six large rooms, several of them double rooms, all nicely finished. A small brick building was added for a cook-room, connecting with the pantry and dining-room. Near by is a large cistern, with pipes to convey the water into each room. The windows were all furnished with sash and glass, also iron grates. This building is occupied by the white male patients.

In the grounds enclosed for the special use of the white females we put up a building 30x50 feet, one and a half stories high, divided off into comfortable sleeping apartments. It is constructed entirely of wood. The other buildings are all brick. The grounds are spacious, and inclosed with a strong picket fence. With a little improvement they could be made very beautiful, having every desirable natural advantage.

The colored males now occupy the building formerly used by the white males. The grounds are enclosed with a picket fence, separating them from other inmates. The water-closets are all built on the outside of the walls.

Tables (B.) and (C.), under heading of Material Furnished for Building and Repairs of State Asylum, show the cost of same. All vouchers filed in Comptroller's office. Total amount \$2,655.86.

Dr. Foreman, Physician in charge, reports that the buildings are all filled with the exception of a few rooms in the white male department.

There is a large building known as the Arsenal enclosed by a brick wall. There is sufficient quantity of brick in the building and wall to put up a large addition to the female department. This is much needed, and the building as it now stands is of no use to the State.

STATE CONVICTS.

Tables Nos. 1 to 42, under the above heading, show a statement of all convicts received from the commencement of the State Prison in 1868 to present date.

The number in camp December 31, 1880, is 125.

I have the honor to report to your Excellency that within the past two years there has been a great improvement in the management of the convicts. Some of the prisoners were in a most wretched condition when received, having been confined in jails for a long time. We have lost men that never did a day's work after they were received. For the past two years they have been employed in a very healthy business, making turpentine, and show a decided improvement in every respect.

On the 9th of November, 1880, your Excellency directed me to advertise the convicts for hire, for one year, from January 1, 1881; sealed proposals to be sent in until 12 M., December 18. The East Florida Railway Company made the best bid, and was accepted. They pay all expense of transportation, &c., and \$15 per head for all on hand, and all that shall be received this and next year, paying the same for the term of two years, to be delivered to them on the first of January, 1881.

The contractors paid me, in cash, \$1,950, signing a strong contract and giving a good bond for the faithful performance of said obligations. This contract will be a net income to the State of at least \$3,000 yearly.

During the administration of State affairs from 1868 to 1877, the expenses of the State Prison was about \$33,500 a year. Under your Excellency's administration there has been an annual saving to the State of \$26,500. At the same time the prisoners are better cared for and are in a healthier condition.

By the strict enforcement of the criminal laws under your Excellency's administration, and through a judicious selection of the judiciary of the State, it will be seen that crimes are greatly on the decrease. Such will be our experience while good government is maintained, and every officer in the State discharges his duty.

CLOTHING.

I would recommend that each convict be supplied with four suits of clothing a year—two suits in the winter, of stout, woollen goods, and two suits in the summer, with two pair of shoes and hats.

Each convict should have a mattress, with two or more blankets, as the season demands.

FOOD

To be such as directed by your Excellency and Board of Commissioners of State Institutions.

In conclusion, I desire to tender your Excellency my thanks for your confidence and cordial support in my management of all official duties incumbent on me.
