MADISON DISTURBANCE.

In obedience to an order from your Excellency, received on the 8th day of February, 1881, I issued an order to Captain A. Moseley, commanding the Governor's Guards, Captain S. Pasco, commanding the Jefferson Rifles, and Captain A. E. Willard, commanding the Madison Guards, to report with their respective companies at Madison, and report to the sheriff of the county to assist in preserving the peace. These companies, fully officered, armed and equipped, responded with alacrity, and reported for duty without delay at the point designated, where they remained on duty four days, when they were re-

lieved by the Jacksonville Light Infantry, commanded by Captain W B Young, and the Columbia Light Infantry, commanded by Captain S. F. Baya. The entire force ordered out was immediately under the command of Brigadier-General W. C. Bird, Brigadier-General of Second Brigade of the First Division. Too much cannot be said in praise of the very competent and faithful discharge of duty, both of officers and men, on this occasion. Fortunately all serious disturbance was averted, and peace and quiet soon restored. tioned contract relieved of all costs and expenses after sentence, the contractor receiving the convicts at the county jails of the several counties. As showing the successful operation of the acts of the Legislature of 1877 authorizing the hiring of convicts sentenced to the State Prison, I submit the following comparative statement:

From this statement it is seen that there is a clear gain in this department in 1881 over 1876 of \$23,491, and in 1882 of \$24,606 25.

Before leaving this subject I would respectfully suggest an amendment of the existing law prescribing the duties of sheriffs in the delivery of convicts sentenced to the State Prison. As the law now stands the sheriff delivers the convict, together with the commitment, to the keeper of the State Prison, or the substitute therefor, while the Adjutant-General who is charged by law with the supervision of all such convicts, and whose duty it is to keep a complete record of such convicts, has no official notice of the sentence or delivery of such convicts, except such as he may gather from the report of the keeper of the prison or the substitute, who under the system adopted for several years has been the contractor. I would suggest that it be made the duty of the sheriff to transmit in every instance a duplicate commitment to the office of the Adjutant-General, together with a duplicate receipt for all convicts so delivered.

On the 30th day of December, 1882, the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions, after advertising for proposals for the hire of the convicts for two years after the 1st of January, 1883, concluded a contract with Henry M. Wood, similar in its provisions to the contract of 1881 and 1882, the contractor paying for all convicts sentenced to the State prison during the years 1883 and 1884, as well as for those on hand, the sum of \$4,600 per annum. Under this contract I have this day delivered to said contractor 138 convicts, and he has made to the Treasurer the first semi-annual payment of \$2,300.

I herewith append the report of the Physician of the State Prison:

LIVE OAK, FLORIDA, December 19, 1882.

General J. E. Yonge, Tallahassee, Florida:

I have the honor to submit for your consideration the sanitary condition and vital statistical report of the State convicts quartered near Live Oak, Florida, and under the supervision of Colonel H. E. Drane, commencing from February 6th and ending December 18th, 1882. During this time there have occurred 10 deaths, some of which resulted from chronic diseases contracted before entering the penitentiary. The mortality, however, taking into consideration the large admissions into the hospital of the sick during the months of September, October and November, will compare favorably in connection with the vital statistics as regards the number of the sick that were under medical treatment and the number of discharges from the hospital during those months. The types of fevers that seemed to be most prevalent among the convicts were dengue, intermittent, remittent fevers, influenza, &c. The convicts were not the only sufferers from these malarial types of fevers, but the community at large suffered more or less from the ravages of these fevers. The hospital, together with the sleeping apartments, have been kept clean and free from all stench of any kind, that no local cause for infection or disease could be assigned for any sickness that the convicts have suffered from this year. The present condition and appearances of the prisoners are favorable. They look as though they have been well treated, fed and clothed. Colonel H. E. Drane's disciplinary plan of management, which has been enforced and diligently pursued with the convicts, is not only an improvement on convict labor, but has also been productive of rendering a certain degree of cheerfulness among the convicts that is not common in a prison life.

In concluding this report allow me to say that the convicts have been judiciously managed and kindly treated.
