There has been \$12,618.79 received and paid into the State Treasury on account of redemption of lands since January 1st, 1882, viz:

The table of assessments hereto attached shows a gratifying increase in the taxable resources of the State, and is an evidence of the steady advancement of the material prosperity of the people. From \$31,157,846 in 1880, the taxable property of the State has grown to \$55,249,311 in 1883; and it will be safe to estimate that it will exceed \$60,000,000 for the year 1884. A portion of this increase (amounting to \$4,735,699) is due to the fact that *all* railroad property now goes upon the tax books, and becomes an additional source of revenue. Since the last report from this office, the question so long in doubt, of the liability of certain railroads to taxation, has been settled by the courts of last resort, and they are now required to contribute their part to the support of the government.

## RATE OF TAXATION.

It will be remembered that at the last session of the Legislature it was suggested by this department, and recommended in the Message of your Excellency, that the rate of taxation for State purposes be fixed at four mills for 1883 and 1884. Notwithstanding the increase in the appropriations, which were deemed to be proper by the Legislature, and a subsequent slight decrease in the income from the occupation tax, the finan-

cial condition of the State is such as to justify a further reduction in the rate of taxation for the year 1884, and as your Excellency has wisely directed, it is provided that a levy of only three mills be made the present year to meet the appropriations, including the interest on the public debt.

## BONDED DEBT.

Recurring to the bonded debt statement, it will be seen that more than half of our indebtedness (by about \$100,000) is held in the several funds of the State, leaving in outside hands only \$587,500. And it may be observed that this amount would be even less than it is were it not that the high price these securities bear, and their scarcity in market, render it difficult to procure them at all, and making it necessary for the Treasurer to seek investments in the bonds of other States, as will be seen by reference to his report. This additional evidence of the healthy financial condition of the State must be gratifying to every citizen within its borders.

## COLLECTION OF TAXES.

The revenue for the year 1882 has been collected with unusual promptness, and it is a pleasure to speak of the efficiency with which the Collectors have generally discharged the delicate duties of their office, and the readiness of the people in responding to the demands upon them for the support of their government. In this connection it is well to state that much of the past due taxes, represented by tax sale certificates held for redemption, has been paid, amounting, as is shown by the table, to the sum of \$12,618.79 for the years 1882 and 1883.

## ASSESSING TAXES.

As a correct and efficient assessment of the property subject to taxation is the foundation of our revenue, and consequently the support of the machinery of the government, it is of the first importance that those who are entrusted with the exercise of this responsible duty should be of sound judgment and good business qualifications. There is no more important office in the State than that of Assessor of Taxes. And the difficulties which they have to meet in the discharge of their duties are fully recognized in this department. A majority of the present incumbents have done their work in a creditable and satisfactory manner; and it is hoped that those who have been less successful will make greater efforts to come up to the requirements of the law, and the demands of the responsible positions held by them.
