Resolved, That the friends of Mr. Chase be and are hereby most cordially invited to visit Florida, and assure for them a most cordial welcome on the part of the citizens of this Commonwealth; and

Resolved, It is the opinion of this body that much good will result from such a visit to our State; and

Resolved, A copy of these preambles and resolutions be transmitted through Mr. Chase to his friends, distinguished sanitarians of our sister States;

A bill to be entitled an act to create and establish a State Board of Health, with the following amendments thereto :

Amend section 2 by striking out the words "or for any neglect of duty," at the end of section ;

Add to section 4 the following : "And until after the investigation shall have been made by the State Health Officer, as provided for by section 9 of this act, each practicing or licensed physician shall be, and he is hereby required, to so isolate such case or cases, and adopt and enforce such other measures as to him may seem effectual for preventing the spread of any such infectious diseases ;"

Amend section 5, in line 23, by inserting after the word "President," the words : "or to isolate ;"

Strike out section 6 and insert the words "any person or persons who shall falsely or maliciously disseminate or spread rumors or reports concerning the existence of any infectious or contagious disease, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished as provided by section 5 of this act ;"

Amend section 12, in lines 7 and 9, by striking out all of the words beginning with the word "and," in line 7, down to and including the word "same," in line 9 ;

Amend section 12 as follows : After the word "freeholder," in line 13, insert the word "one ;" after the word "officer," in line 15, insert the words "one to be selected by the owner of the property, or his agent, and the third to be selected by the two freeholders already selected ;"

Amend section 12, line 11, after "towns," insert the words "or other points where two or more railroads meet ;"

After the word "shall," in line 23, section 13, strike out all to the word "and ;" in line 5 insert "have the same published in such place and such manner as they may deem best to give greatest publicity to the same ;"

Amend section 16 by inserting between the words "his" and "traveling," in 29th line, the word "actual ;"

Strike out "\$15," in line 33, of section 17, and insert "\$10 ;"
Amend section 17, line 27 : insert after the word "employed" the words "when necessary ;"

Amend by striking out "temporary absence," in line 17, after "sickness," section 17 ;

Add to section 18, "and if said bond should be forfeited, all such amounts collected from such prosecution shall be placed to the credit of the before named health fund by the said President of the Board ;

Amend section 19, line 27, by striking out the word "and," and inserting "in a clear and concise statement, together with any special observations, recommendations or facts that he may present, that would be conducive to the health and sanitary conditions of the State, and such annual statements shall finally be submitted by the Governor to the State Legislature when in regular session convened, and shall be published like other reports of State officers, and the President of said Board ;"

Also strike out in line 15 the words "the same," and insert the words "such expenditures ;"
