ACTS, RESOLUTIONS AND MEMORIALS.

The following acts, resolutions and memorials were passed during the session of the Legislature A. D. 1899, duly signed by the Governor and filed by the Secretary of State. A few measures passed remain unacted upon by the Governor at the time of printing this Journal.

An act affecting the government, jurisdiction, powers and duties of the municipality of Jacksonville.

An act to repeal Chapter 4217 of the Laws of Florida, entitled an act to organize and establish a county court in and for Alachua County, and to provide for the appointment of a prosecuting attorney for said county court, approved May 24, A. D. 1893.

An act for the relief of John R. Scott, ex-Treasurer of Sumter County, Florida, and for the relief of his bondsmen.

An act to incorporate the Camp Phosphate Company.

An act to enlarge the corporate powers of the City of St. Augustine, in the State of Florida.

An act to amend Sections 2, 40 and 41, of an act entitled an act to abolish the present municipal government of the town of Madison, Florida, and to provide a town government therefor, being Chapter 4313, approved June 2, 1893, to abolish the office of trustee of water works bonds, and to grant additional powers to said municipality.

An act authorizing the construction of bridges for private use by persons or corporations across the Withlacoochee and Wekiva Rivers.

An act to extend the time for completing the Carrabelle, Tallahassee and Georgia Railroad, and to preserve and continue the grant of lands heretofore made to aid in its construction.

An act to amend Sections 2 and 5, of Chapter 4557, of the Laws of the State of Florida, entitled an act to regulate the catching or taking of fish in the waters of the State of Florida, approved May 29, 1897.

An act for the relief of John E. King, ex-Tax Collector of Citrus County.

An act to provide for working, repairing and maintaining the public roads and bridges in Levy County by contracts, and to provide penalties for failure thereof.

An act to amend Section 591 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Florida, defining the purposes for and prescribing and regulating the manner in which county bonds may issue.

An act to cause to be audited and paid the account of James C. Porter, proprietor and manager of the Ocala Evening Star, a newspaper published in the City of Ocala, Florida, his charges for publishing the tax sale list of 1896 of real estate, once each week for four consecutive weeks, of Marion County, State of Florida, for the year A. D. 1896, based on warrant of assessment made under the provisions of Chapter 4322, Laws of Florida, for the year 1896.

An act authorizing the town of Marianna, by ordinance, to require residents of said town to perform labor upon the streets, alleys and other public highways in said town.

An act to amend Sections 2 and 46 of Chapter 4635, Laws of Florida, entitled an act to provide for the municipal officers of the City of Key West, a municipal corporation existing in the County of Monroe, Florida, to prescribe their terms of office, provide for their election and appointment, and to regulate their compensation; and to repeal Sections 2 and 3 of Chapter 3966, Laws of Florida, and amendments thereto.

An act to incorporate the Lake City Electric and Water Company.

An act to regulate the burning of woods, forests and prairie lands in Osceola County, Florida.

An act to authorize and empower cities and towns to issue negotiable coupon bonds for the refunding or payment in whole or in part of existing bonded indebtedness.

An act making additional appropriations to cover deficiencies in the appropriations made by the Legislature of 1897 for the payment of jurors and witnesses.

An act to legalize the election held on March 28, 1899, in the City of St. Augustine, etc.

An act to amend the city charter of the City of Tampa.

An act for the relief of Minnie E. Kehoe, for services as stenographer in Circuit Court, Jackson County.

An act for the relief of George W. Reynolds, ex-Tax Collector for the County of Monroe, State of Florida;

Senate Joint Resolution No. 44, proposing an amendment to Section 5, Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Florida.

Memorial to Congress asking that the County of Levy, State of Florida, be changed from the Northern Federal Judicial District to the Southern Federal Judicial District.

A memorial to our Senators and Representatives in Congress in reference to a duty on Egyptian, or long staple cotton, or the importation thereof.

A memorial to the Congress of the United States asking for additional powers to be conferred on the Interstate Commerce Commission.

A memorial to the Congress of the United States requesting an appropriation for the construction of a lighthouse at or near Hillsborough Inlet, on the east coast of Florida.

An act to amend and revise an act entitled an act to provide for the regulation of railroad schedules, freights, express, sleeping car and passenger tariffs and building of freight and passenger depots in this State, to prevent unjust discrimination in the rates charged for the transportation of passengers and freight, and to prohibit railroad companies, corporations, persons and all common carriers in this State from charging other than just and reasonable rates, and to enforce the same and to prescribe a mode of procedure and rules of evidence in relation thereto, and to provide for the appointment and election of commissioners and to prescribe their duties and powers, and to authorize said commissioners to regulate, supervise and control the use and the charges for the use of and the admission to passenger terminals and union depots, and to vest said commissioners with judicial powers and to provide remedies for the enforcement of the provisions of this act.

An act to amend Section 3, Chapter 4403, Laws of Florida, approved May 27th, 1895, relating to forfeiture and collection of bail bonds.

An act to prohibit the catching and taking of fish from the fresh water streams and lakes of Calhoun County, State of Florida, in the months of April and May of each year.

An act to amend Section 1478 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Florida, relating to residence required in order to obtain a divorce.

An act to abolish the present municipal government of Lakeland, in the county of Polk, State of Florida, and to establish, organize and constitute a municipality to be known and designated as Lakeland, and to define its territorial boundary and to provide for its jurisdiction, powers and privileges.

An act to repeal all fence laws in township fifty-one (51), range twenty-five (25), and township fifty-one (51) and fifty-two (52) in range twenty-six (26), south and east in the County of Lee, State of Florida.

An act in relation to the sale of garden, melon and other vegetable seed in the State of Florida.

An act providing for the sanitary inspection of hotels and boarding houses by the State Board of Health, and prescribing a penalty for failure to place and keep said buildings in sanitary condition.

An act to legalize the incorporation of the town of Arcadia, in DeSoto county, and to declare the incorporation and ordinances of the town of Arcadia valid and of full force and effect.

An act to legalize the assessment and levies of taxes for the years 1888, 1889, 1890, 1891, 1892, 1893, 1894, 1895, 1896, 1897 and 1898 by the city of Tampa, and to legalize the tax certificates and lists of certified lands held by the city of Tampa for taxes assessed in 1888, 1889, 1890, 1891, 1892, 1893, 1894, 1895, 1896 and 1897, and to prescribe the mode of collecting the same.

An act to incorporate the Grand Lodge Knights of Pythias of Florida.

An act to require in the discretion of the trial court, the injured party in litigated personal damage cases to submit to a physical examination relative to his or her condition before or at the time of trial and the nature and extent of the injuries sued for, and to provide for the appointment by the court of an examining physician and the fixing of his compensation and its taxation as a part of the costs of the case.

An act to prohibit the publication of libelous articles and anonymous communications, and to prescribe penalties for its violation.

An act to prohibit the manufacture or sale of cigarettes or cigarette paper in the State of Florida, and to provide penalties for its violation.

An act to incorporate the Florida Inland Navigation Company.

An act regulating descent of homesteads and the widow's interest therein.

An act to extend the time for commencing work on the Western Peninsular Railroad Company.

An act to prevent unauthorized persons from giving signals to railroad trains or engines.

An act making judgments and decrees of the Circuit Courts of this State, and certified copies thereof, admissible as prima facie evidence of the entry and validity of such judgments and decrees.

An act for the better protection of passengers on railway trains in the State of Florida.

An act to amend Section 1615 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Florida, relating to the transfer of causes in cer-

tain causes from courts of county Judges and Justices of the Peace.

An act to fix a penalty for the larceny of hogs, sheep and goats.

An act to extend the time for commencing the work of construction of the DeSoto, Lee and Gulf Railroad Company, Chapter 4467, No. 146, Laws of Florida, approved May 30, 1895.

An act to continue the powers, rights, privileges and grants of the Atlantic and Gulf Railway Company.

An act to prevent unauthorized persons from removing or otherwise interfering with signals connected with railroads or trains.

An act to prevent persons from beating their way on railroad trains in this State.

An act relating to the taking of depositions by commission, and prescribing the compensation of commissioners.

An act in relation to the granting of and setting apart certain lands for the use and benefit of the Seminole Indians of Florida.

Joint Resolution relative to election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people.

House concurrent resolution and memorial to the Congress of the United States, asking for amendments to the Interstate Commerce commission law.

A memorial to the Commissioner of Agriculture of the United States, asking that certain experiments required in the interest of cattle owners in certain districts in this State receive attention by the Department of Agriculture of the United States.

A memorial to the Senators and Representatives from the State of Florida in the Congress of the United States.

An act to provide that common carriers shall designate, and provide with certificates of authority, agents authorized to sell tickets, and prohibit all others from selling tickets or evidences of transportation; to provide for the redemption of the whole or any unused part of a ticket or evidence of transportation, and prohibit the forging or counterfeiting, or aiding in forging or counterfeiting or altering of any genuine ticket or other evidence of transportation, and to provide punishment for the violation of any of the sections herein contained.

An act to amend Section 2 of an act approved June 3, 1897, and entitled an act regulating the means and methods of capturing food fishes in the waters of the New Smyrna Inlet, Hillsborough River, Mosquito Lagoon, Halifax River, Spruce, Tomoko, Bulow and Smith Creeks, and the bays and tributary waters thereof on the East Coast of Florida, and providing for the punishment of persons violating the same, and appointing a fish warden and providing for the escheat of property and appliances and disposing of the proceeds of same.

An act to amend Section 2 of Chapter 4558, Laws of Florida, being an act for the protection and preservation of food fishes in the fresh water rivers, creeks, bayous and streams in the State of Florida, and to prevent the hauling or dragging of seines or nets therein.

An act to amend Section 1 of Chapter 4390, Acts of 1895, Laws of Florida, in reference to the care of convicts.

and the six per cent. bonds issued under an act of the Legislature approved February 21, 1873, and the manuscript bonds issued under an act of the Legislature approved February 16, 1885.

An act to authorize E. H. Miller, J. J. McCullagh, J. J. McCaskill and R. E. L. McCaskill, partners doing business as the E. H. Miller Boom Company, to construct and maintain booms in the Choctawhatchee river and arms thereof.

An act to require the Clerk of the Supreme Court to furnish the reports of the decisions of said Court for the use of the United States District Judges in Florida.

An act to amend Chapter 4563, Laws of Florida, entitled an act for the appointment of fish and game wardens in the various counties of the State of Florida, approved June 5, 1897.

An act to provide for an investigation of the tax sale certificates and certified lists of land now held by the State of Florida, making a list of the same by counties; also a separate list of those that are defective for any cause; making a summary, and requiring a complete permanent record of same.

An act to prohibit obstructing wagon roads and breaking fences by careless or malicious felling of trees.

An act to incorporate the Florida and Georgia Railway.

committee to investigate the status of lands belonging to the estate of John F. Dunn, deceased.

Memorial to Congress of the United States, asking that pension be granted to the survivors of the Indian wars in Florida from 1842 to 1858, and the widows of those who have died.

Memorial to Congress asking an appropriation for the establishment of a light house at what is known as the Blind Beacon, north of the White Point light house in Black Water Bay.

An act to increase the criminal jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace.

An act permitting parties to suits, or their attorneys, to examine jurors on their voir dire.

An act to repeal Chapter 4548 of the Laws of Florida, Acts of 1897, entitled an act to require the official phosphate sampler of each port of this State from which phosphates are shipped, to inspect each and every car of phosphate arriving at such port for shipment and to issue certificates for the same, and to provide his compensation therefor.

An act to appropriate \$20,000 to be used for the payment for the buildings, fumigating plants, wharves and other property, including boats, of the Escambia County Board of Health, and to have title to the same confirmed in the State of Florida for the use of the State Board of Health.

An act to authorize suits to recover damages for death of minors caused by the wrongful act, negligence, carelessness or default of individuals, private associations of persons or corporations.

An act to amend Section 4 of Chapter 4298 of the Laws of Florida, being an act to establish a municipal government for the town of Plant City, Florida.

An act to legalize the marriages and offspring of persons of African descent.

An act relating to bills in equity for the quieting of and removing clouds from titles to real estate.

An act to amend Section 24 of Chapter 4322 of the Laws of Florida, the same being an act entitled an act for the assessment and collection of revenue, approved June 1, 1895.

An act to amend Section Six (6) of an act entitled an act to provide for the recovery of lost timber and lumber, to provide for the appointment of a public custodian of the same, and to prescribe his powers, duties and compensation, approved June 8th, 1891, being Chapter 4044, Revised Statutes, Laws of Florida.
