Senate Resolution No. 21:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Senate be required to prepare a calendar of bills, resolutions, etc., for the use of the Senate as early as practicable.

Mr. Zim moved the adoption of the resolution.

Senate Resolution No. 22:

Resolved, That hereafter the reading of the Journal

daily shall be dispensed with, unless a Senator shall call for the reading of the same.

Senate Resolution No. 23:

Resolved, That the Committees on State Boundaries, Canals and Telegraphs, Militia, and Indian Affairs, be allowed to employ a clerk to serve said committees.

Mr. Harris introduced the following:

Senate Resolution No. 24:

Be it Resolved, That the Committee on Appropriations report to the Senate by May 1, 1905, a bill making the necessary appropriations for the Legislative, Judicial and Executive Departments of the State for the ensuing two years.

Mr. Blount introduced the following:

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 6:

Be it Resolved by the Senate, the House concurring, That a committee of five, to consist of two Senators and three Representatives, shall be appointed by the President and Speaker respectively to consider and report upon the practicability of the acceptance of the invitation of the Chamber of Commerce of Pensacola, to the Governor, State House officials and Legislature to visit that city during the stay of the United States fleet of naval vessels in that port.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Blount moved that the rules be waived and that the resolution be read a second time.

Which was agreed to by a two-thirds vote.

And Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 6 was read a second time.

Mr. Blount moved the adoption of the resolution.

Which was agreed to.

Mr. Crane introduced the following:

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 7:

Be it Resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring, That a committee, to be composed of one on the part of the Senate and two from the House of Representatives, be appointed to visit the St. Petersburg Nor-

mal and Industrial School, to examine into and investigate the present condition of the School, ascertain what improvements may be deemed necessary, and report with as little delay as possible their findings to this Legislature, to the end that it may be advisable to provide for the same.

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 8:

Be it Resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring, That the joint committee appointed to visit the Deaf, Dumb and Blind Institute at St. Augustine be, and is hereby, directed to visit and inspect the laboratory of the State Board of Health at Jacksonville, and report its present condition and necessities.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

By Mr. Trammell:
Senate Bill No. 32:

A bill to be entitled an act prescribing that when there is a total loss of property insured and the company fails to pay the full amount covered by policy, there shall be returned to the insured the unearned premium for the excess over the amount paid in settlement.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Mr. Trammell:
Senate Bill No. 33:

A bill to be entitled an act providing for and requiring the teaching of the elementary principles of agriculture, and the elements of civil government, in all the common schools of the State of Florida; to provide a penalty in case any county board of education fails to provide for the teaching of the same, and requiring all teachers to stand a satisfactory examination upon said subjects.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Mr. Trammell:
Senate Bill No. 34:

A bill to be entitled an act making an appropriation for the construction of an academic building, and to equip the same, for the South Florida Military College.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

By Mr. Massey:

Senate Bill No. 35:

A bill to be entitled an act to amend Sections 2434, 2435, 2436 and 2437 of the Revised Statutes of 1892, relating to breaking and entering a dwelling house, other building, ship, vessel, or railroad car, and entering without breaking a dwelling house, other building, ship or vessel.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Mr. Massey:

Senate Bill No. 36:

A bill to be entitled an act to provide for the purchase, safekeeping and maintenance of bloodhounds for use in the pursuit of criminals.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

By Mr. Massey:

Senate Bill No. 37:

A bill to be entitled an act to prohibit the shooting of live pigeons, fowl or other birds for amusement or as a test of skill in marksmanship.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Game.

By Mr. Crane:

Senate Joint Resolution No. 38:

A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Article V of the Constitution of the State of Florida, relative to the judiciary department.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

By Mr. Crane:

Senate Bill No. 39:

A bill to be entitled an act for the relief of T. J. Caruthers.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Mr. Crane:

Senate Bill No. 40:

A bill to be entitled an act to regulate and control the practice of veterinary medicine and surgery, within the State of Florida.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Mr. Crews:

Senate Bill No. 41:

A bill to be entitled an act to amend Section 1, Chapter 5204, Laws of Florida, the same being an act to provide

for the certification of teachers, and to prescribe requirements for the various grades of certificates.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Mr. Crews:

Senate Bill No. 42:

A bill to be entitled an act to prohibit the issuing by any one of checks or orders upon banks or other persons, when the makers of such orders or checks have not sufficient funds on deposit with the drawee to pay such orders; to prescribe a rule of evidence therein, and to provide punishment therefor.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Mr. Harris:

Senate Bill No. 43:

A bill to be entitled an act to amend Section 2809 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Florida, relating to foreman of grand jury.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Mr. Harris:

Senate Bill No. 44:

A bill to be entitled an act to provide for an additional public building for the use of the State officers at the capital.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

By Mr. Harris:

Senate Bill No. 45:

A bill to be entitled an act to authorize the county of Monroe to issue bonds for the purpose of paying for sites, and erecting buildings for school purposes thereon.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on City and County Organization.

By Mr. McCreary:

Senate Bill No. 46:

A bill to be entitled an act to amend Section 36 of an

act entitled "An Act imposing license and other taxes, providing for the payment thereof, and prescribing penalties for doing business without a license, or other failure to comply with the provisions thereof," being Chapter 5106, Laws of Florida, approved June 9, 1903.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Finance and Taxation.

Senate Bill No. 47:

A bill to be entitled an act to limit the amount of bonds that may be issued by any city or town for municipal purposes.

Senate Bill No. 48:

A bill to be entitled an act to validate the contracts of persons under twenty-one years old in cases where entered into through the misrepresentation of the infant as to his age.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Mr. Raney:

Senate Bill No. 49:

A bill to be entitled an act to appropriate monies for the Florida State College at Tallahassee.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

By Mr. Brown:

Senate Bill No. 50:

A bill to be entitled an act for the relief of Marion County.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Mr. Brown.

Senate Bill No. 51:

A bill to be entitled an act regulating the width of tires of certain kinds of vehicles used to haul wood or other heavy loads over paved, hard or other improved roads in counties now having or that may hereafter have paved, hard or improved roads, and prescribing the time and mode of procedure in which this act is to go into effect, and providing a penalty for its violation.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Public Roads and Highways.

Senate Bill No. 52:

A bill to be entitled an act authorizing the county of Marion to issue County Warrants for the purpose of remodeling the Court House of Marion county.

Senate Bill No. 53.

A bill to be entitled an act to amend Section 3, of Chapter 4196, Laws of Florida.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Education.

Senate Bill No. 54:

A bill to be entitled an act to grant to riparian owners standing and growing trees between the lands of such owners and the channel of navigable streams and waters.

Senate Bill No. 55.

A bill to be entitled an act prohibiting the exaction or the acceptance of a reward, compensation or remuneration by public officers or appointees for the performance, non-performance or subversion of any act, rule or regulation that may be incumbent upon them to administer, perform, execute or have executed.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 56:
