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the name of the attorney employed and all other information relating in any manner to the employment of special counsel in or about any business of any department of the government of the State of Florida.

Resolved further, That in case any special counsel are now in the employ of the present administration, either representing the executive department, the board of trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund or the Railroad Commission, that such department furnish to the Senate a detailed statement showing the persons so employed, for what purpose employed, what fees have been paid them for such services and what fees have been promised them for future services.

Resolved further, That a copy of this resolution immediately upon its passage be furnished, one to the Governor, one to the Board of Trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund, and one to the Railroad Commission.

Mr. Trammell (Mr. West in the chair) offered the following amendment to Senate Bill No. 89, and requested it be read for information:

After Section 1 strike out the figure "2" and insert in lieu thereof the following: "3."

And add as Section 2, following Section one (1), the following:

Section 2. Any person purchasing any fertilizer from any manufacturer or vendor in this State for his own use, such person being a citizen of this State, may submit fair samples of said fertilizer to the Commissioner of Agriculture for analysis. But in order to protect the manufacturer or vendor from the submission of analysis of spurious samples, the person selecting the same shall do so in the presence of two or more disinterested persons, which samples shall be taken from one or more packages and bottled, corked and sealed in the presence of said witnesses, and this sample package or bottle placed in the hands of a disinterested person, who shall forward the same, at the expense of the purchaser, to the Commissioner of Agriculture when the person so desires; and upon the receipt by him of any such sample package the Commissioner of Agriculture is hereby authorized to require the State Chemist to analyze the same, and he shall return to such purchaser or purchasers a certificate or certificates of analysis. The certificate shall in all cases set forth the component parts of said fertilizers, with their respective qualities, date of analysis and name or names of persons submitting the samples, and to be signed by the State Chemist who is hereby required to keep an accurate account of the same, and the said certificate or record, when verified by the affidavit of the State Chemist,

shall be competent evidence in any court of law or equity in this State.

Mr. Faulkner offered the following amendment to Senate Bill No. 89:

Add to the end of section 1—"Provided that nothing herein contained shall apply to any vendor, who is not a manufacturer who shall sell any fertilizer on its merits as is shown by the analysis of the State Chemist.

Mr. Faulkner moved the adoption of the amendment.

Mr. Faulkner withdrew the amendment.

Mr. Adams offered the following amendment to Senate Bill No. 89:

Strike out the words "person or corporation" in line 1, Section 1, printed bill and insert in lieu thereof the following:—"Manufacturer."

Mr. Adams moved the adoption of the amendment.

Mr. Zim offered the following amendment to the amendment to Senate Bill No. 89:

In line one, section 1 (printed bill) insert:

That any manufacturer or manufacturers and person or persons, who shall sell, (etc.) and in line 5, after the word "shall" insert the word "jointly."

Mr. Zim moved the adoption of the amendment to the amendment.
