Prayer by the Chaplain.

The reading of the Journal of April 7 was dispensed with.

The Journal of April 7 was corrected and approved.

Mr. Wilson moved that the Journals of April 4, 5 and 6 be approved as corrected.

Which was agreed to.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The following bills were reported favorably by the committees to whom they had been referred:

Senate Bill No. 8:

A Bill to be entitled An Act regulating the trial of minors, not married, in all courts, including municipal courts of this State.

Senate Bill No. 10:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to extend the jurisdiction of the process of the Mayor's or Municipal Courts and of city and town marshals and deputy marshals of the municipalities of the State of Florida.

Senate Bill No. 27:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to make mandatory at least one High School in each county of this State.

Senate Bill No. 31:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to amend Sections 1293 and 1295 of the General Statutes of the State of Florida, relating to the powers and duties of Pilot Commissioners.

Senate Bill No. 33:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to prevent the pollution of the streams and natural bodies of water of the State of Florida, and to prevent making any deposit of any substance therein which shall be destructive to the life of fish, or which shall effect the depth or navigability thereof.

Senate Bill No. 57:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to amend Sections 365 and 367 of the General Statutes of the State of Florida, relating to the certification of teachers' third grade certificates and first grade certificates.

Senate Bill No. 58:

A Bill to be entitled An Act requiring teachers' summer training schools and making appropriations therefor.

The following bills were reported unfavorably by the committees to whom they had been referred:

Senate Bill No. 39:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 378 of the General Statutes of the State of Florida, relating to pay of Grading Committee.

The following bill was reported back without recommendation by the committee to whom it had been referred:

Senate Bill No. 49:

A Bill to be entitled An Act designating the Flag Day for the State of Florida and to provide for and require United States flags to be displayed over the public schools of the State of Florida, and provide funds for same.

The following bills were reported favorable with amendments by the Committees to whom they had been referred:

Senate Bill No. 5:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to provide for the acquisition of a site and the erection, building and furnishing of a building thereon for the use of the Supreme Court of the State of Florida, the Railroad Commission of the State of Florida and for a library, and making appropriations for the same and other purposes appertaining thereto.

Committee Amendment: Strike out in fourth line of Section 4 the word "deemed," and insert in lieu thereof the word "seemed."

Senate Bill No. 41:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to secure better attendance upon the public schools of the counties of this State.

Committee amendment to same, to-wit:

First Amendment: Strike the word "seven" in line three of Section 1 and insert in lieu thereof the word "nine."

Second Amendment: Strike out the words "compulsory attendance upon the schools of" and insert in lieu thereof the words, to-wit: "the provisions of this Act."

Senate Bill No. 52:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 370 of General Statutes of the State of Florida relating to State certificates.

Amend that the words, to-wit: "four years" before the word "Latin" be stricken.

Senate Bill No. 53:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 1 of Chapter 5920, Laws of Florida, entitled "An Act prescribing punishment of misdemeanors in this State when not otherwise provided by statute."

Amendment:

1. Strike out of lines 7 and 8 of Section One the words "two hundred" and insert in lieu thereof the words "five hundred."

2. Strike out of line 8 of Section One the words "ninety days" and insert in lieu thereof the words "six months."

Senate Resolution No. 11:

Resolved by the Senate, That Rule 20 of Senate Rules be amended by striking the paragraph following the list of committees and insert in lieu thereof the following:

Each of these committees shall consist of five members except the two Judiciary Committees. There shall be twelve members of Committee on Judiciary A and eleven members of the Committee on Judiciary B.

The President appointed Mr. Henderson as a member of Judiciary Committee A.

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 7:

Whereas, Many defects and imperfections are apparent, and many changes needed in our present Constitution; and,

Whereas, The onward march of civilization, and the unprecedented development of our State require a modern Constitution; and,

Whereas, The rapidly increasing population and progressive tendencies toward development of our State are, in a degree, retarded by our present Constitution; therefore,

Be it resolved, the House of Representatives concurring, That pursuant to Section 2 of Article XVII of the Constitution of the State of Florida, it is the sense of this body that a revision of our State Constitution is necessary; that the officers of this State be required to take such steps as the Constitution directs to secure the vote of the people on this question.

Which was read the first time and was referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

Resolved, That a committee of eleven be appointed by the chair to which shall be referred all bills relating to the division of the State into Judicial Circuits or bills for the creation of new circuits, and to report to the Senate by bill or otherwise

Mr. Dayton offered the following resolution—
Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 8:

Resolved, The House of Representatives concurring,

inspect the other lands on which an option is held by the
State for said Penitentiary, investigating the same, and
report back to the Legislature such recommendations as

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

By Mr. Stokes—

Senate Bill No. 59:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to precribe the maximum passenger rate in this State on certain steam railroads, and to provide that the Railroad Commission may prescribe maximum passenger rates on steam railroads in this State not in conflict with the provisions of this Act, and to provide for the use of certain evidence in cases arising under this Act, and to provide a penalty for the violation of this Act.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary A.

By Mr. Stokes—

Senate Bill No. 60:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to authorize any person not the agent or representative of the lender to charge compensation for negotiating a loan of money and the doing of act incident thereto, in certain cases, and to limit such compensation in certain cases, and to provide a penalty for the violation of this Act.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary A.

By Mr. Stokes—

Senate Bill No. 61:

A Bill to be entitled An Act fixing the amount of credit to be allowed county convicts on fines and costs.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary A.

By Mr. Stokes—

Senate Bill No. 62:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to provide for the formation and disbursement of a public school teachers' pension and retirement fund.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Mr. Stokes—

Senate Bill No. 63:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 1627 of the General Statutes of Florida relating to claims by third persons to property levied upon under execution.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary A.

By Mr. McLeod—

Senate Bill No. 64:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to repeal the license now required of dealers in green groceries and fresh fruits and nuts, where such dealer has taken out license as a merchant.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary A.

By Mr. McMullen—

Senate Bill No. 65:

A Bill to be entitled An Act appropriating the sum of thirty thousand dollars for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of Chapter 5734 of the Laws of Florida, approved May 31, 1907, appropriating thirty thousand dollars to the Florida State Mid-Winter Association to pay premiums at fair to be held in Tampa, Fla., commencing November 1, 1907, and November 1, 1908, respectively.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

By Mr. Stokes—

Senate Bill No.66:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to provide for the issuing of teachers' first grade certificates, also State certificates, to persons holding a diploma from the normal department of the University of Florida, or from the normal department of the Florida State College for Women, and other chartered institutions of Florida.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Mr. Massey—

Senate Bill No. 67:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 1 of An Act entitled "An Act to provide for the assessment and collection of the taxes for the City of Orlando, and for the collection of the back taxes and tax sale certificates of said city," approved April 30th, 1903.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Municipalities.

By Mr. Hudson—

Senate Bill No. 68:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to regulate child labor in the State of Florida, and to make provision of such Act effective, creating the office of State Labor Inspector and defining duties and compensation of such officer.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Organized Labor.

By Mr. Sloan—

Senate Bill No. 69:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to prevent any person, persons, firm or corporation from shipping or carrying intoxicating liquors into any county or precinct voting against the sale of the same except for private use, and to prescribe a penalty therefor.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Temperance.

By Mr. Sloan—

Senate Bill No. 70:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to provide for the extension of the territorial limit of incorporated cities and towns in the State of Florida.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Municipalities.

By Mr. Sloan—

Senate Bill No. 71:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to incorporate the town of Winterhaven, in Polk County, Florida, to establish a municipal government for said town, and to prescribe its jurisdiction and powers.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Municipalities.

By Mr. McCreary—

Senate Bill No. 72:

A Bill to be entitled An Act amending Section 874, Chapter 11 of the General Statutes of the State of Florida, relating to the division of counties into road districts.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Roads and Highways.

By Mr. McCreary—

Senate Bill No. 73:

A Bill to be entitled An Act requiring butchers of beeves and hogs to submit the same for inspection.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary B.

By Mr. McCreary—

Senate Bill No. 74:

A Bill to be entitled An Act prohibiting the use of log carts upon any of the public roads within the State of Florida, with certain exceptions thereto, and providing penalties for the violation thereof.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Roads and Highways.

By Mr. Perkins—

Senate Bill No. 75:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to more effectively protect the people against combinations, conspiracies and agreements between insurers, whereby rates of insurance are raised or fixed.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary A.

By Mr. Perkins—

Senate Bill No. 76:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to license automobiles and other motor-driven vehicles used on the public roads or highways in the State of Florida, either for hire or otherwise.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Finance and Taxation.

By Mr. Henderson—

Senate Bill No. 77:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 3627 (2684) of the General Statutes of the State of Florida relating to furnishing weapons to minors, etc.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary A.

By Mr. Henderson—

Senate Bill No. 78:

A Bill to be entitled An Act for the relief of George Lewis, trustee for the estates of B. C. Lewis, William Bailey, John McDougall and P. B. Brokaw.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Claims.

By Mr. Henderson—

Senate Bill No. 79:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 1900 (1448) of the General Statutes of the State of Florida, relating to the signing and recording of decrees in equity.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary A.

By Mr. Malone—

Senate Bill No. 80:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to protect the secret work of fraternal orders, and to punish the publication, selling or circulation of any work purporting to be the secret work of any fraternal order, or which is claimed or represented to be such work.

By Mr. Malone—

Senate Bill No. 81:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to amend Chapter 5695 of the Laws of 1907 of the Laws of Florida, being An Act amending Section 775 of the General Statutes of the State of Florida, in relation to the compensation of County Commissioners.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary B.

By Mr. Adkins—

Senate Bill No. 82:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 3299 of the General Statutes of the State of Florida relative to horse and cattle stealing.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary A.

By Mr. Adkins—

Senate Bill No. 83:

A Bill to be entitled An Act creating a State Board of Pensions; defining who shall receive pensions; who shall not receive pensions; who shall be retained as pensioners; how applications shall be made; how pensions shall be paid; duty of County Commissioners in regard to pensions; providing for the levy of pension tax, and authorizing the State Board of Pensions to make regulations to carry into effect the provisions of this Act.

A Bill to be entitled An Act to provide permanently for reprinting the Reports of the Supreme Court.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Printing.

By Mr. Dayton—

Senate Bill No. 85:

A Bill to be entitled An Act making an appropriation for the relief of Jim Henry.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Claims.

By Mr. Dayton—

Senate Bill No. 86:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 172 of the General Statutes of the State of Florida relating to General Elections.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections.

By Mr. Dayton—

Senate Bill No. 87:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to prohibit the inducing, enticing or procuring women or girls for immoral purposes and prescribing a penalty therefor.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary A.

Senate Bill No. 88:

A Bill to be entitled An Act to prohibit the keeping, maintaining or patronizing houses of ill fame and other disorderly houses and the renting of premises for use for such purposes and prescribing a penalty therefor.

A Bill to be entitled An Act to prohibit pools, trusts, monopolies and conspiracies to control business and prices of articles; to prevent the formation or operation of pools, trusts, monopolies and combinations of charters of corporations that violates the terms of this Aca and to authorize the institution of prosecutions of suis herefor.

Which was read the first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary B.

The following communciation was received and read:

To the President of the Senate and to the members thereof:

This is to certify that at the primary election held in the State of Florida and in each and every county thereof, on the 31st day of January, A. D. 1911, for the purpose of nominating a candidate for the office of United States Senator to succeed the Hon. James P. Taliaferro, as shown by the returns of said election canvassed by the State Democratic Executitve Committee at Jacksonville, Florida, on the 8th day of February, A. D. 1911, the following vote was cast:

W. A. Blount for said office received 19,381 votes.

Nathan P. Bryan for said office received 19,991 votes.

That thereupon the State Democratic Executive Committee declared that Hon. N. P. Bryan, having received a majority of the votes cast at said primary, was Democratic nominee for said office of United States Senator.

Mr. Hudson moved to adopt the resolution.

Which was agreed to.

The motion made by Mr. Henderson on Friday, April 7, to reconsider the vote by which the rules governing the Senate, and particularly Rule 27 of the same, was adopted, was taken up.

Upon the motion to reconsider the same the yeas and nays were called for and the vote was as follows:

Yeas—Senators Adkins, Calkins, Carney, Cook, Dayton, Finlayson, Henderson, Hilburn, Hosford, Malone, McCreary, Perkins, Wilson—13.

Nays—Mr. President, Senators Baker, Broome, Culpepper, Hudson, Massey, McLeod, McMullen, Miller, Sloan, Stokes, Williams, Withers, Zim.—14.

Mr. Adkins moved to adjourn to 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Which was agreed to.

Whereupon the Senate stood adjourned to 10:00 o'clock a. m. Tuesday, April 11, 1911.
