The veterinarians employed by this Board are assigned

a territory, consisting of several counties. They are subject to call from any point of same, or by special order are sent out of their official territory, as in case of emergency.

Dr. C. M. Pollard, who is stationed at Jacksonville, besides being engaged in the work of hog cholera control, is inspector for all shipments coming into this State through that point.

During the two-year period of this report, the maximum number of inspectors employed on the tick eradication force was forty-six. These inspectors each are assigned a county in which to work, and they have supervision not only of the actual dipping of cattle, but the cleaning, charging and testing of vats. The inspectors are appointed upon the recommendation of at least three of the County Commissioners and three leading citizens of the county in which they make application to work.

In the past two years the State Live Stock Sanitary Board has paid to cattle owners for animals condemned on account of tuberculosis the sum of \$11,014.62, and has received from the sale of same \$2,322.17.

The work of tuberculosis eradication has met with approval in all sections of the State, the reasons for same being evident.

It is noted in the financial statement of the Board for the past two years that only one reimbursement was made for glanders, same being to the amount of \$50.00.

"An Act to repeal Chapter 7641 of the Laws of Florida relating to the impounding and sale of certain domestic animals in the city of DeFuniak Springs, Walton County, Florida."

My objections to this bill are as follows:

1st. Being a resident of the City of DeFuniak Springs, Florida, in former years the Governor knows it was the custom to impose extraordinary and heavy fines upon the poor farming people who live beyond the corporate limits of said town, and whose cattle, sheep or hogs wandered inside of said corporate limits, and the Act of the Legislature of 1917, known as Chapter 7641 (No. 383) provides a safe, sound and reasonable amount of money to be charged by the City Marshal of the City of DeFuniak Springs for the care of said animals when impounded within said corporate limits.

2nd. This bill, which is a local one, does not show that it has been advertised in any county paper, or has had any notice put up in front of the Court House door of said county.

For the above reasons the Governor withholds his approval to the above bill.
