Senate Concurrent Resolutions Nos. 2 and 11, contained in the above message, were referred to the Committee on Enrolled Bills.

On motion of Mr. Taylor (11th Dist.), the Committee on Education was authorized to employ a clerk.

Mr. Taylor (11th Dist.), moved to waive the rules and the Senate do now take up and consider Senate Bill No. 176.

Which had been informally passed over.

Which was agreed to by a two-thirds vote.

Senate Bill No. 176 :

A bill to be entitled An Act validating the issuance, sale and delivery of certain bonds of the City of Largo, Pinellas County, Florida, and all acts and proceedings in connection therewith; authorizing and validating the assessment of the cost of municipal improvement; validating the tax levies and assessments for the years 1925 and 1926; validating the resolutions, ordinances, contracts and other proceedings of the City Commission of said city.

Was taken up and placed before the Senate.

Mr. Taylor (11th Dist.), moved that the rules be waived and that Senate Bill No. 176 be read the second time by its title only.

Which was agreed to by a two-thirds vote.

And Senate Bill No. 176, with title above stated, was read the second time by its title only.

Mr. Taylor (11th Dist.), moved that the rules be further waived and that Senate Bill No. 176 be read the third time in full and put upon its passage.

Which was agreed to by a two-thirds vote.

And Senate Bill No. 176, with title above stated, was read the third time in full.

Upon call of the roll on the passage of the bill the vote was:

So the bill passed, title as stated.

And the same was ordered to be certified to the House of Representatives under the rule.

Mr. Etheredge moved that the Senate do now adjourn.
Which was agreed to.
