REPORTS OF JOINT COMMITTEE ON ENROLLED BILLS

Senator Turner, Chairman of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills on the Part of the Senate, submitted the following report:

Your Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, to whom was referred:

(Senate Bill No. 32-XX):
An Act relating to the levy and collection of inheritance and estate taxes and providing for certain exemptions from said tax.

Also—
(Senate Bill No. 11-XX):
An Act to provide for the levy of an inheritance and estate tax in the State of Florida on the estates of decedents dying during the times when the so-called twenty-five per cent and eighty per cent credit or recapture clauses in the Federal estate tax laws were in operation and effect and not within the operation of the inheritance and estate tax laws enacted at the Regular 1931 Session of the Legislature of this State; providing for the manner of payment of such tax and providing for the method of computing and collecting same and for the enforcement thereof and for the disposition of the revenues therefrom.

(Senate Bill No. 14-XX):
An Act to amend Section 757 of the Revised General Statutes of Florida 1920, the same being Section 970 of the Compiled Laws of Florida of 1927, as amended by Section 4 of Chapter 14572, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1929, relating to the requirement that a copy of the advertisement of tax sale be filed with a Clerk of the Circuit Court; Collector's fees; time of sale; form of notice.

(Senate Bill No. 33-XX):
An Act to amend "An Act to provide for the levy of inheritance and estate taxes in the State of Florida, prescribing the rates of such taxes, and the method of computing and collecting same, providing for the enforcement thereof and for the disposition of revenues therefrom, and imposing penalties for the violation of this Act."

(Senate Bill No. 127-XX):
An Act to amend Sections One, Six and Eight of Chapter 14677, Acts of 1931, Laws of Florida, approved May 28th, 1931, the same being: "An Act requiring corporations authorized to do business in the State of Florida, both foreign and domestic, annually to file with the Secretary of State certain reports and

to pay a certain tax in the nature of filing fee thereon, to prescribe certain duties for the Secretary of State with reference thereto and to authorize him to make reasonable regulations in regard to the form of reports herein provided and to provide reasonable regulations for the enforcement of the provisions of this Act."

(House Bill No. 241-XX):
An Act to authorize counties, cities, towns and other municipalities, special road and bridge districts, special tax school districts, and other taxing districts in the State of Florida to issue refunding bonds, and providing how said bonds may be sold and/or exchanged, and providing for the payment of said bonds, and making provisions for carrying out the purpose of this Act, provided, however, the provisions of this Act shall not apply to any drainage district where there is pending at this time a suit contesting either the validity of the bonds issued by such district, or the assessment levied or any suit involving, directly or indirectly the validity of such drainage district, or the validity of the bonds issued by such district or the validity of the assessment levied in such district, and to repeal all of Chapter 14841, being Senate Bill No. 228, Acts of 1931 Regular Session, Legislature of the State of Florida, and all of Chapter 14842, being Senate Bill No. 714, Acts of 1931 Regular Session, Legislature of the State of Florida; and providing, however, the provisions of this Act shall not apply to any drainage district where suit is pending in any Federal Court involving in anywise the said drainage district or the bonds issued by such district or the collection thereof and where a receiver or trustee has heretofore been appointed in said suit.

(House Bill No. 230-XX):
An Act to amend Section 2 of Article XI, Section 3, of Article XI, Section 19 of Article XI, Section 13 of Article IV, of an Act passed by the Legislature in the Regular Session of 1927 and signed by the Governor June 1st, 1927 and entitled: "An Act to abolish the municipality created by Chapter 11519 of the Acts of the Legislature of the State of Florida approved November 25, 1925 and designated the City of Hollywood, County of Broward, State of Florida, and to create and establish a municipal corporation to be known as the City of Hollywood; to provide a charter for said city; to define its territorial limits; to provide for its government; and to prescribe its jurisdiction."

An Act to abandon that portion of State Road No. 26 beginning at or near Lake Annie in Highlands County, Florida, and running South through Glades County via Moore Haven in Glades County, Florida, to Clewiston in Hendry County, Florida.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

By Senator Knabb—

Senate Memorial No. 3-XX:

A memorial to the Federal Farm Board of the United States praying its cooperation with, and assistance to, turpentine gum farmers of this State, and like farmers in other states of the Union who are engaged in the business of producing turpentine gum from pine trees, to enable them to permanently establish and maintain an orderly system of marketing their products.

WHEREAS, there are many citizens of this State engaged in the business of turpentine gum farming of pine trees and the selling of the products thereof and, due to a world-wide economic and industrial depression, the lack of buying power of consumers of these commodities, in America, and in foreign countries which normally take about one-half of the American crop of gum turpentine and gum rosin, and to conditions which have brought about an inordinate crop, and the lack of adequate marketing facilities, a calamitous and alarming condition exists throughout the whole area where these commodities are produced, and a collapse of the industry is threatened, and

WHEREAS, the cost to the farmers of producing gum turpentine and gum rosin so far exceeds the price which they are realizing for their products (the market price of which is the lowest in thirty years) as to make it imperative in this emergency that the Federal Farm Board come to the relief of these farmers and formulate a comprehensive and adequate system which will enable gum turpentine farmers who produce these commodities to match the size of their crops to the ability of the world to buy and pay living prices therefor, and

WHEREAS, the prevailing market price under existing conditions is disastrous not only to farmers engaged in the business but also to thousands of employees (whose training in the craft prevents their getting employment in other work) and their dependents, as well as banking institutions and other lines of businesses within the area, and

WHEREAS, the limited area of production and the number of farmers engaged in the industry make it easily possible for such farmers to maintain a cooperative marketing association, the plan and scope of which should be formulated by and the direction of same intrusted to the Federal Farm Board. Now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Legislature of the State of Florida, now in extraordinary session, by this joint resolution does hereby memorialize said Federal Farm Board, and prays that it may lend its immediate assistance and guidance to the citizens of this State engaged in turpentine gum farming of pine trees, and to the citizens of other states engaged in a like occupation, to enable them to permanently establish and maintain an orderly system of marketing their products.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the President of the United States, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Governor of the State of Florida, the Senators and Members of the House of Congress representing the State of Florida, Governors and Senators and Members of the House of Representatives and Members of Congress of and representing those States whose citizens are engaged in turpentine gum farming be and they are hereby earnestly requested to urge upon the Federal Farm Board the immediate need that it interpose itself and grant its aid and assistance in the existing emergency.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this memorial be sent to the Federal Farm Board at Washington D. C., the President of the United States, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Governor of the State of Florida, the Senators and Members of the House of Congress representing the State of Florida, Governors and Senators and Members of the House of Representatives and Members of Congress of and representing those states whose citizens are engaged in turpentine gum farming.

NOTE A—Emergency Appropriation provided for the Plant Board in accordance with Chapter 12291, Acts of 1927, Laws of Florida, and other Acts granting powers to The State Plant Board, in the sum of \$50,000.00 annually from July 1, 1931, shall not be expended except when such an emergency has been determined by the Governor and the State Plant Board and only in such sums as are approved by the Governor and the said Board.

NOTE B—The Board of Commissioners of State Institutions are authorized to enlarge the uses for which the "General Inspection Fund" is collected and paid so as to include the acquirement of equipment when approved by the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions so as to more economically and promptly execute the agricultural fertilizer analysis and General Inspection Laws and specifically to include the distribution of hog cholera serum when so authorized by the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions, but nothing in this item to mean the levying of any ad valorem tax.

Section 3. Any unexpended balance in any of the items of appropriation contained in this Act for any office or Department, institution or board, if not required for the purpose for which specifically appropriated, may, with the approval of the Budget Commission, be applied to other necessary and regular expenses of the office or department, institution or board for which appropriated.

Section 4. That at the end of the period for which the appropriations contained in this Act were made any funds appropriated by this Act not expended or contracted for during the period shall revert to the fund out of which it is to be paid.

Section 5. Whenever Federal Funds have been appropriated to be used in connection with State Funds appropriated by this Act, such Federal Funds in so far as they may be necessary to meet the purposes for which made available, are hereby re-appropriated to be expended for the lawful purposes for which same were appropriated by Congress.

Section 6. All laws or parts of laws in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 7. This Act shall take effect August 1, 1931.

REPORT OF JOINT COMMITTEE ON ENROLLED BILLS

Senator Turner, Chairman of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills on the Part of the Senate, submitted the following report:

President of the Senate.

Sir:

Your Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, to whom was referred:

(House Bill No. 202-XX):

An Act providing for the calling of elections in the special tax school districts in all of the counties of the State having a population of not less than 55,000 and not more than 70,000; providing for the calling of said election within thirty days from the time this Act becomes a law; providing for the giving of notice of said elections; providing that the question of millage to be levied for the two fiscal years from July 1st, 1931 to June 30th, 1933 be submitted to the electors, and the millage determined by such election shall control the levy for said fiscal years, and providing that elections so called shall be controlled in other respects by existing laws.

Also—

(House Bill No. 216-XX):

An Act fixing the compensation of the members of the boards of county commissioners in all counties in the State of Florida having a population of not less than 23,150 and not more than 23,175.

Also—

(House Bill No. 141-XX):

An Act relating to the registration of electors of all counties within the State of Florida having a population of not less than 10,325 and not more than 10,375, according to the Federal census of 1930; and providing for the defraying of the expenses of same.

Have carefully examined same, and find same correctly enrolled and herewith present the same for the signatures of the President and Secretary of the Senate.

NOTE A—Emergency Appropriation provided for the Plant Board in accordance with Chapter 12291, Acts of 1927, Laws of Florida, and other Acts granting powers to The State Plant Board, in the sum of \$50,000.00 annually from July 1, 1931, shall not be expended except when such an emergency has been determined by the Governor and the State Plant Board and only in such sums as are approved by the Governor and the said Board.

NOTE B—The Board of Commissioners of State Institutions are authorized to enlarge the uses for which the "General Inspection Fund" is collected and paid so as to include the acquirement of equipment when approved by the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions so as to more economically and promptly execute the agricultural fertilizer analysis and General Inspection Laws and specifically to include the distribution of hog cholera serum when so authorized by the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions, but nothing in this item to mean the levying of any ad valorem tax.

Section 3. Any unexpended balance in any of the items of appropriation contained in this Act for any office or Department, institution or board, if not required for the purpose for which specifically appropriated, may, with the approval of the Budget Commission, be applied to other necessary and regular expenses of the office or department, institution or board for which appropriated.

Section 4. That at the end of the period for which the appropriations contained in this Act were made any funds appropriated by this Act not expended or contracted for during the period shall revert to the fund out of which it is to be paid.

Section 5. Whenever Federal Funds have been appropriated to be used in connection with State Funds appropriated by this Act, such Federal Funds in so far as they may be necessary to meet the purposes for which made available, are hereby re-appropriated to be expended for the lawful purposes for which same were appropriated by Congress.

Section 6. All laws or parts of laws in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 7. This Act shall take effect August 1, 1931.

A bill to be entitled An Act for the assessment and collection of revenue and relating to the assessment and collection of taxes on tangible and intangible personal property, and requiring a documentary stamp evidencing the payment of taxes to be affixed to mortgages, deeds of trust and other similar liens as a prerequisite to recording or enforcement.

A bill to be entitled An Act defining and classifying Intangible Personal Property for the purpose of taxation and providing for the assessment and valuation of Intangible Personal Property for the purpose of taxation, and the levy and collection of taxes upon such Intangible Personal Property, providing rates of taxation on the different classes thereof under Section 1, Article 9 of the Constitution of the State of Florida, and providing for making returns by persons owning Intangible Personal Property and providing the duties of the Tax Collector and Boards of County Commissioners in connection therewith, and providing a penalty for failure to make such returns, and other provisions relating to Intangible Personal Property.

Section 1. This Act may be cited or referred to as "Intangible Personal Property Taxation Act of 1931."

Section 2. "Intangible Personal Property" is hereby defined as all personal property which is not in itself intrinsically valuable but which derives its chief value from that which it represents.

Section 3. For the purpose of taxation Intangible Personal Property is hereby divided into three (3) classes to be known as Class A, B and C, Intangible Personal Property.

(1) Class A Intangible Personal Property is hereby defined as being all stocks, or shares of incorporated or unincorporated companies, all bonds except such bonds or governmental bonds as may be exempt from taxation under the Constitution or laws of the United States or the State of Florida.

(2) Class B Intangible Personal Property shall include all notes, bonds and other obligations for the payment of money which are secured by mortgage, deed of trust, or other leases or liens upon real or personal estates situated in Florida, provided that only that part of the value of the mortgage, deed of trust, lease or other lien, the property of which is located both within and without the State shall bear to the whole value of the property described in said obligation, shall be classified and known as Class B Intangible Personal Property.

(3) Class C Intangible Personal Property shall include all other intangible personal property not embraced in Class A and B Intangible Personal Property, provided that intangible personal property belonging to the State of Florida, or any political sub-division thereof, and/or any Religious, Charitable, Benevolent or Educational Association shall be exempt from taxation. Provided however that nothing herein contained shall apply to franchises.

Section 4. "Taxpayers" shall mean a person, firm or corporation, who or which shall be liable to taxes under this Act for Intangible Personal Property.

Section 5. COMPTROLLER TO MAKE RULES AND PRESCRIBE FORMS. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller and he shall have the power to make such rules and regula-

tions as may be necessary to carry out and execute the intent of this Act.

Section 6. ASSESSMENT OF INTANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY. Intangible Personal Property shall be assessed by the tax assessor of each and every County in the State of Florida on a separate tax roll, which shall be designated the Intangible Personal Property Tax Roll, the form of which shall be prescribed by the Comptroller. Such tax roll shall distinctly show the name and address of the taxpayer and the amount of the valuation for tax purposes of intangible personal property, assessed against such taxpayers on said tax roll.

Section 7. BASIS OF ASSESSMENT. The taxable value of all intangible personal property which is assessed on said tax roll shall be on the same basis of valuation as is used for the assessment for taxation of real or personal property.

Section 8. RETURNS OF INTANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY FOR TAXATION. It is hereby made the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning or having the control, management or custody of intangible personal property in this State which is subject to taxation under the laws of Florida, including trustees, executors, administrators, receivers and all other fiduciaries, to return the same for taxation to the County Assessor of taxes in the proper county on or before the first day of April of each and every year, giving the character and description of such intangible personal property. Provided that intangible personal property tax returns shall not be open to inspection except by the officers of the State and County whose duties require their examination thereof or under an order of a court of competent jurisdiction requiring the same as relevant evidence. No officer examining such returns shall divulge their contents, other than the total value and tax thereon, or make or permit to be made any copy or list therefrom. When any intangible personal property tax or assessment shall have been paid, it shall be the duty of the tax assessor to return and deliver to the taxpayer, at his request, the original intangible personal property tax return or returns of the taxpayers upon or in connection with which such intangible personal property taxes shall have been assessed and levied. If a taxpayer shall not request the surrender of his intangible personal property tax return after having paid his intangible personal property tax, it shall be the duty of the tax assessor to destroy all intangible personal property tax returns filed with him within six (6) months after the same shall have been paid.

Section 9. WHERE TAX RETURNS SHALL BE FILED. Intangible personal property shall be assessed in the county where the tax payer resides or has his usual domicile. In case of corporations such intangible personal property tax returns shall be assessed and levied in the county in which the corporation has its principal office, or place of business.

Section 10. ASSESSOR MAY FIX VALUATIONS; NOTICE IN CASE OF INCREASE; APPEALS. In the event any person, firm or corporation shall make or file a return as required by this Act, the true and just value of the intangible personal property owned by him shall be presumptively considered to be that shown in the tax return, unless the tax assessor shall, upon his knowledge or after investigation find that the taxpayer has intangible property subject to taxation which is not described in such return or that the valuation of that which is described in such return is greater than the valuation shown by such return, in which event the tax assessor shall give notice by mail to the person filing the return. The taxpayer shall have the right to appeal from the decision of any tax assessor made under this section to the Board of County Commissioners sitting as a Board of Equalization, whose decision after a hearing shall be deemed and held to be final.

Section 11. EFFECT OF RETURN. Regardless of any return which may be filed by any taxpayer, the valuation of any item or items of property shown in the return shall in no case prevent the county assessor of taxes from determining and assessing the true taxable value according to his information and best judgment, or from determining and entering upon the return of the taxpayer any item or items of intangible personal property which the county assessor may find has been omitted therefrom, subject to the restrictions and limitations mentioned in this Act.

Section 12. There is hereby annually levied and assessed on all Class A intangible personal property to be apportioned to the State for State purposes, a tax of two (2) mills on the dollar of the taxable value of such Class A intangible personal property, to be assessed and collected as other taxes are assessed and collected for State purposes, and to be paid into the General Revenue Fund of the State of Florida.

(a) There is hereby annually levied and assessed on all Class B intangible personal property to be apportioned to the State for State purposes, a tax of two (2) mills on the dollar of the taxable value of such Class B intangible personal property, to be assessed and collected as other taxes are assessed and collected for State purposes, and to be paid into the General Revenue Fund of the State of Florida.

(b) There is hereby annually levied and assessed on all Class C intangible personal property to be apportioned to the State for State purposes, a tax of one-tenth (1/10) of one (1) mill on the dollar of the taxable value of such Class C intangible personal property, to be assessed and collected as other taxes are assessed and collected for State purposes, and to be paid into the General Revenue Fund of the State of Florida.

Section 13. POWERS AND DUTIES OF BOARD OF EQUALIZATION.—At the meeting of the Board of County Commissioners as a board of equalization, for the purpose of hearing complaints and receiving testimony and for reviewing, revising and equalizing the intangible personal property tax roll, the board may make such change in valuations and assessments of intangible personal property, as shown on the intangible personal property tax roll submitted by the tax assessor, and may make such additions of taxable intangible personal property thereto which have been omitted therefrom. If, however, the board shall increase the assessment appearing on such intangible personal property tax assessment roll, it shall publish or post in the manner prescribed by law, notice that the Board has increased the assessments of certain persons (whose names need not be stated) and will sit as a board of equalization on the date to be stated in such notice for the purpose of hearing complaints and testimony, if any, in respect to such increased or added assessments. On the date specified in such notice, the Board shall sit as a board of equalization and then and there equalize and determine the true and just amount of such assessments in the same manner as provided for the equalization of personal property.

Section 14. EFFECT OF ASSESSMENT AFTER EQUALIZATION. Where no complaint shall have been made as to any assessment or any valuation as shown on the intangible personal property assessment roll, the assessment and the valuation thereof, shall be deemed and held to be fair, just and equal and validly made according to the laws of the State of Florida.

Section 15. FORM OF INTANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX RECEIPTS. All tax collectors of the State of Florida shall be required when issuing receipts for taxes collected by them to show separately on the tax receipts the assessment and valuation of intangible personal property as made under this Act.

Section 16. WHEN INTANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY TAXES DUE AND PAYABLE. All taxes on intangible personal property shall be due and payable on the first day of November of each year, or as soon thereafter as the personal property assessment roll shall come into the hands of the tax collector.

Section 17. DISCOUNTS. Taxpayers paying intangible personal property taxes, shall be entitled to the same discounts as may be allowed by law for the payment of taxes on real or personal property.

Section 18. WHEN TAX DEEMED DELINQUENT. Taxes on intangible personal property including poll taxes assessed therewith, shall be deemed delinquent on the first day of April of the year following that for which the assessment was made.

Section 19. TAX UPON INTANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY SHALL BE A LIEN ON REAL OR PERSONAL PROPERTY BELONGING TO TAXPAYER. All intangible personal property taxes shall be a lien on all the real or personal property of the taxpayer in the County in which they are assessed, or any other County in the State of Florida, from the time the tax upon intangible personal property becomes due.

Section 20. DISPOSITION OF INTANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY TAXES. All intangible personal property taxes levied, assessed and collected by the tax collector under and pursuant to this Act shall be promptly remitted by the tax collector to the Comptroller of the State of Florida, and shall by him be paid into the Treasury of the State and become a part of the general revenue funds of the State of Florida.

Section 21. PUNISHMENT FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ACT. Any taxpayer, public officer or other person wilfully failing or refusing to comply with this Act, or violating any of the provisions hereof shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00), or be confined in the County jail for not more than six (6) months, or both, in the discretion of the Court.

Section 22. EFFECT OF UNCONSTITUTIONALITY OF ANY PART OF THIS ACT. If any section, sentence, clause or provision of this Act shall be held to be unconstitutional the remaining parts of this Act shall not be impaired or affected thereby, but shall remain as a complete expression of the Legislative intent.

Section 23. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Act shall take effect January 1st, 1932.

House Bill No. 253-XX:

The introduction of which was agreed to by a two-thirds vote of the members of the House of Representatives.

A bill to be entitled An Act relating to the City of West Palm Beach, in Palm Beach County, Florida, and to amend Sections 25, 109, 112 and 117 of Chapter 9945, Acts of Florida, 1923, entitled: "An Act to abolish the present municipality of the City of West Palm Beach in Palm Beach County, Florida: To create and establish a new municipality to be known as City of West Palm Beach, in Palm Beach County, Florida; to legalize and validate the ordinances of said City of West Palm Beach and official acts thereunder, and to adopt the same as the ordinances of said City of West Palm Beach; to prescribe the time within which suits can be brought against said city and for notice thereof; and to fix and provide the territorial limits, jurisdiction and powers of said City of West Palm Beach, in Palm Beach County, Florida, and the jurisdiction and powers of its officers" as the same was amended by Chapter 11310, Laws of Florida, 1925; to create additional powers to the City of West Palm Beach in Palm Beach County, Florida; and for other purposes.

In Section 7, line 1, strike out the words "This Act shall become effective immediately upon its becoming a law" and insert in lieu thereof the following: "This Act shall not become effective until approved by a majority of the registered and qualified electors of the City of West Palm Beach, Florida, voting at an election to be held as follows: Immediately after this Act becomes a law the City Commission of the City of West Palm Beach shall call an election to be held not more than thirty days after the passage of this Act. Only qualified and registered electors of said city shall be entitled to vote at said election. Notice of said election shall be given by publication in some newspaper published in said City by at least one publication prior to said election. Said election shall be for the purpose of approving or disapproving this Act, and the ballots shall be so arranged that each elector may register his approval or disapproval of this Act. There shall be at least one polling place in each of the three boroughs of said city. At the first regular meeting of the City Commission after said election the said City Commission shall canvass the returns and declare the result of said election.

"Section 8. Subject to the provisions of the referendum herein provided this Act shall become effective upon its approval by the Governor or upon its becoming a law without such approval."
