REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Senator Hinely, Chairman of the Committee on Engrossed Bills, submitted the following report:

President of the Senate.

Sir:

Your Committee on Engrossed Bills, to whom was referred (with amendments) after 3rd reading:

Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 26:

A bill to be entitled An Act to amend Sections 11 and 12 of Chapter 17808, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1937 entitled "An Act to promote the planting and production, within the State of Florida, of Sea Island cotton; in the exercise of the reserve powers of the State of Florida to provide protection for growers and producers of such cotton against hybridization and reduction in value thereof; to that end providing for creation of cotton production control districts; prohibiting the production, in said districts, of any type of cotton other than Sea Island cotton; also prohibiting the planting therein of any type of cotton seed or plants other than Sea Island cotton seed or plants; providing for the administration and enforcement of the provisions hereof; making an annual appropriation for the purpose of carrying out the provisions hereof; providing penalties and punishment for violation of the provisions hereof" so as to clarify the provision of Section 11 as to the territorial scope of the Act and increasing the annual appropriation provided for in Section 12 of the Act.

Have carefully examined same, and find same correctly engrossed, and return same herewith.

Your Committee on Engrossed Bills, to whom was referred (with amendments), after third reading—

Senate Bill No. 152:

A bill to be entitled An Act to amend Chapter 6337, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1911, being An Act entitled "An Act relating to the Incorporation of the Town of Crescent City, fixing its boundaries, conferring on said town all the powers and privileges incident thereto under the laws of the State of Florida, validating all ordinances heretofore passed by said town, validating all acts of said town and its officers, providing for the assessment of taxes and collection of revenue, providing for paving and improving streets and sidewalks, providing for

and authorizing the issue and sale of bonds, providing for a Town Council and other officials for said town, providing methods for the government of said town and conferring other powers and privileges of said town," as said Chapter 6337, Laws of Florida, Act of 1911, is amended by Chapter 8928, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1921, this act providing for the abolishment of the elective offices in said town of Town Treasurer, Town Tax Collector, Town Clerk, and Town Tax Assessor, and providing for a Town Manager.

Senator Holland, Chairman of the Committee on Finance and Taxation, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bill and recommends that it does not pass—

Senate Bill No. 180:

A bill to be entitled An Act creating an emergency revenue Commission, providing for the appointment of the members thereof; providing for the operation of automatic coin-operated devices under state ownership and the purchase of such machines; providing for limitation of the number of machines which may be operated in the State of Florida; providing to whom, where and the number of machines that may be located; providing regulations for the operation of such machines and all other coin-operated devices; providing for the employment of agents and servants by the commission; limiting the expense of carrying the provisions of this Act into effect and making appropriation therefor; imposing penalties for violations of the terms of this Act. The main purpose of this Act is to acquire land or real estate and erect a suitable home for which the state is in desperate need for delinquent girls and women of this state, and contribute funds to and for relief of old people and fatherless children and the blind.

And Senate Bill No. 180, contained in the above report, was laid on the table.

Senate Chamber, April 20, 1939.

Senator Kanner, Chairman of the Committee on Rules and Calendar, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following memorial and recommends that it does pass—

House Memorial No. 3:

Memorial to Congress requesting that the Congress of the United States by some appropriate method give relief to the several counties of the State of Florida for the loss of taxes sustained by counties of Florida in which federal agencies have acquired lands, thereby striking same from the tax rolls of said respective counties.

And House Memorial No. 3, contained in the above report, was placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senator Whitaker, Chairman of the Committee on Judiciary "B", reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bill and recommends that it does pass—

Senate Bill No. 97:

A bill to be entitled An Act relating to the compensation of the Clerk of the Supreme Court of Florida, the fees required to be collected by him, and to provide for their disposition.

And Senate Bill No. 97, contained in the above report, was placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senate Chamber, April 20, 1939.

Senator Whitaker, Chairman of the Committee on Judiciary "B," reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bills and recommends that they do not pass.

Senate Bill No. 12:

A bill to be entitled An Act permitting a sentence for any shorter period of time when the maximum period is five years.

Senate Bill No. 8:

A bill to be entitled An Act providing for the suspension of imposition of sentence and placing of defendant upon probation, the revocation or modification of probation, probation officers and their duties as such, and the powers of the Courts of original jurisdiction in criminal actions relating thereto.

And Senate Bills Nos. 12 and 8, contained in the above report, were laid on the table.

A bill to be entitled An Act for the relief of Bert M. Thomas of Wakulla County, Florida, and providing for refund by the Comptroller of the State of Florida and the Board of County Commissioners for Wakulla County, Florida, of State and County taxes erroneously assessed and collected from him, and making appropriation therefor, and

Senate Bill No. 153:

A bill to be entitled An Act granting a pension to Annie Lee Jackson, of Marion County, Florida, and

Senate Bill No. 154:

A bill to be entitled An Act granting a pension to Mrs. Kate Dodson, of Marion County, Florida, and

Senate Bill No. 264:

A bill to be entitled An Act for the relief of Juanita Hughes of Jasper, Hamilton County, Florida.

House Bill No. 37:

A bill to be entitled An Act for the relief of Glades County, Florida, and to cancel that certain debt due the State of Florida by the said Glades County for a loan executed under the Chapter 11,842, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1927, and

House Bill No. 205:

A bill to be entitled An Act for the relief of M. E. Decker, and

House Bill No. 207:

A bill to be entitled An Act for the relief of Oscar Osteen and Edgar R. Brown.

And Senate Bills Nos. 283, 284, 290, 153, 154, 264, and House Bills Nos. 37, 205 and 207, contained in the above report, were placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senator McKenzie, Chairman of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, on the part of the Senate, reported that the Committee had this day submitted to the Governor for his approval one Resolution listed in Report No. 2 of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, being—

Senator McKenzie, Chairman of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, on the part of the Senate, reported that the committee had this day submitted to the Governor for his approval one bill listed in Report No. 3 of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, being—

Senate Bill No. 82.

Senate Chamber, April 21, 1939.

Senator Dye, Chairman of the Committee on Cities and Towns, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bills and recommends that they do not pass.

Senate Bill No. 184:

A bill to be entitled An Act amending Section 5 of Chapter 18011 of the Laws of Florida, Acts of 1937, entitled "An Act relating to license taxes, repealing Chapter 14491, and Chapter 14528, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1929; repealing parts of Chap-

ter 2 of Title VI, of Division 1 of the Revised General Statutes of Florida of 1920; repealing Chapter 16801 and Chapter 17167, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1935; imposing certain license taxes and providing for the payment and collection thereof, and providing that license taxes shall be a lien on the property of the person liable therefor, under certain circumstances."

Senate Bill No. 186:

A bill to be entitled, An Act authorizing cities and villages to levy and collect licenses and excise taxes upon privileges, businesses, occupations and professions carried on therein, and upon sales and transactions made or affecting property therein; and to revoke licenses under certain conditions.

And Senate Bills Nos. 184 and 186, contained in the above report, were laid on the table.

Senate Chamber, April 21, 1939.

Senator Parrish, Chairman of the Committee on Citrus Fruits, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bills and recommends that they do pass.

Senate Bill No. 181:

A bill to be entitled An Act relating to citrus fruit damaged by freezing; providing for the determination of the extent of damage occurring to citrus fruit from freezing temperatures; prescribing conditions under which citrus fruit damaged by freezing shall be deemed unfit for human consumption; providing for issuance of rules and regulations by the Florida Citrus Commission under the provisions of this Act; providing for an embargo on citrus fruit under certain conditions; and providing penalties for violation of the provisions of this Act.

And

Senate Bill No. 165:

A bill to be entitled An Act to provide for, regulate and control, the use of soaps, oils, waxes, gases, gas forming materials, and other similar compositions and the component parts thereof, on or in the processing of citrus fruits, and fixing penalties for the violation thereof.

And

Senate Bill No. 167:

A bill to be entitled An Act to define farm vehicles and farm trailers operated in connection therewith; to provide that such farm vehicles and farm trailers shall be exempt from the requirement of registration and the purchase of tags under the Motor Vehicle Laws of this State, when such farm vehicles and/or trailers are operated on farms, groves and orchards and in going to or from headquarters to such farms, groves and orchards.

And

Senate Bill No. 169:

A bill to be entitled An Act to provide for, regulate, and control, the artificial coloring of certain citrus fruits by the addition of artificial color to the peel thereof, and fixing penalties for the violation thereof.

And

Senate Bill No. 164:

A bill to be entitled An Act to prohibit canning of any citrus fruit that is immature or otherwise unfit for canning purposes; to provide for the enforcement thereof; and to provide penalties for the violation thereof.

And Senate Bills Nos. 181, 165, 167, 169 and 164, contained in the above report, were placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senate Chamber, April 21, 1939.

Senator Parrish, Chairman of the Committee on Citrus Fruit, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bill and recommends that the same do pass, with the following amendment:

Senate Bill No. 163:

A bill to be entitled An Act to prohibit the canning in the State of Florida of citrus fruit that is unwholesome or decomposed so that it is unfit for canning purposes; and providing the powers and duties of the Florida Citrus Commission with reference thereto; providing for the enforcement of this Act and penalties for the violation thereof.

Amendment No. 1:

In Section 3, line 2, (typewritten bill) after the word "can"

insert the following "buy for canning purposes, or sell for canning purposes."

And Senate Bill No. 163, together with Committee Amendment thereto, contained in the above report, was placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senate Chamber, April 21, 1939.

Senator Parrish, Chairman of the Committee on Citrus Fruit, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bill and recommends that the same do pass, with the following amendment:

Senate Bill No. 168:

A bill to be entitled An Act relating to the purchase, handling, sale and accounting of sales of citrus fruit grown in the State of Florida; to prevent fraud and deception therein; to provide for the licensing and bonding of citrus fruit dealers; to prescribe certain powers and duties of the Citrus Commission and the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Florida in the administration and enforcement of this Act; and to prescribe penalties for the violations of the provisions of this Act.

Amendment No. 1:

In Section 3, line 12, (typewritten bill) strike out the words and figures "Two Thousand (\$2,000) Dollars" and insert lieu thereof the following: "Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars."

And Senate Bill No. 168, together with Committee Amendment thereto, contained in the above report, was placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senate Chamber, April 21, 1939.

Senator Parrish, Chairman of the Committee on Citrus Fruit, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bill and recommends that the same do pass.

Senate Bill No. 170:

A bill to be entitled An Act to prohibit the sale or offering for sale, the transportation, and the preparation, receipt or delivery for transportation or market of any citrus fruit that is immature or otherwise unfit for human consumption; to provide for the enforcement thereof; and to provide penalties for the violation thereof.

And Senate Bill No. 170, contained in the above report, was placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senate Chamber, April 21, 1939.

Senator Parrish, Chairman of the Committee on Citrus Fruit, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bill and recommends that the same do pass.

Senate Bill No. 194:

A bill to be entitled An Act providing for and prescribing certain additional powers, duties, and authority of the Florida Citrus Commission; providing for the application of other provisions of law to rules and regulations promulgated under the provisions of this Act; providing the manner in which the provisions of this Act shall be construed. Have had the same under consideration and recommend that Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 194 entitled "An Act providing for and prescribing certain additional powers, duties and authority of the Florida Citrus Commission in connection with the processing, packing and marketing of citrus fruit; providing for the promulgation by said Commission of regulations to regulate and control methods and practices used in the preparation and processing of citrus fruit for market; providing for the application of other provisions of law to rules and regulations promulgated hereunder; providing penalties for the violation of this Act and rules and regulations promulgated hereunder; and providing the manner in which the provisions of this Act shall be construed." Be substituted for said Senate Bill 194 and that said Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 194 do pass.

And Senate Bill No. 194, contained in the above report, was placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senate Chamber, April 20, 1939.

Senator Rose, Chairman of the Committee on Insurance, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bills and recommends that they do pass

Senate Bill No. 61:

A bill to be entitled "An Act amending Section 4339 of the Revised General Statutes of Florida, 1920, as amended by Chapter 12321, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1927, relating to the

requirements to do business in the state, of surety companies.

Senate Bill No. 309:

A bill to be entitled "An Act, requiring State Treasurer or Insurance Commissioner to inspect insurance companies as often as once in every three years, giving said State Treasurer authority to inspect said companies oftener if he deem prudent, and providing for examination of insurance companies by said State Treasurer as Insurance Commissioner upon the request of five or more stockholders, creditors, policy-holders or persons pecuniarily interested, when said stockholder or persons pecuniarily interested shall make affidavit of their belief with specifications of their reasons therefor, that such company is in an unsound condition; giving State Treasurer authority to have insurance companies examined by competent persons making available for examination all records, books and papers of insurance companies, and permitting State Treasurer as Insurance Commissioner to examine all officers, directors, agents and trustees of an insurance company, and for expense incurred in examination of insurance companies; and providing a penalty for refusal to give evidence or obstruction of examination."

And Senate Bills Nos. 61 and 309, contained in the above report, were placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senate Chamber, April 20, 1939.

Senator Rose, Chairman of the Committee on Insurance, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bills and recommends that they do pass—

Senate Bill No. 214:

A bill to be entitled "An Act permitting companies and corporations authorized and qualified to do an insurance business under the laws relating to sick and funeral benefit insurance who have paid up capital of fifty thousand (\$50,000.00) dollars to issue or assume on any one life or risk, policies, contracts or agreements, wherein the death benefits may equal but not exceed five hundred (\$500.00) dollars."

Senate Bill No. 218:

A bill to be entitled "An Act requiring companies and corporations doing an insurance business under the sick and funeral benefit laws, to set aside and maintain for the protection of policies issued after the passage of this Act, the same reserve required of life insurance companies for the protection of similar policies, and requiring said companies and corporations to set aside and maintain reserve at the rate of not less than twenty per cent per year until full reserve is set aside to protect policies which are in force at the time this Act takes effect, and providing for annual valuation of policies by insurance commissioner."

Senate Bill No. 219:

A bill to be entitled "An Act, defining companies and corporations engaged in the business of issuing life or annuity contracts, including combined life, health and accident contracts, which hold reserves for the fulfillment of its contracts of more than fifty per centum of its total reserve fund or such other reserve as may be required under any law or regulation of the United States of America now or hereafter in force to be life insurance companies."

Senate Bill No. 260:

A bill to be entitled "An Act relating to the disposition of property of subordinate fraternal lodges on dissolution."

And Senate Bills Nos. 214, 218, 219 and 260, contained in the above report, were placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senate Chamber, April 20, 1939.

Senator Rose, Chairman of the Committee on Insurance, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bill and recommends that it do pass.

Senate Bill No. 187:

"An Act to amend An Act entitled 'An Act to provide for the incorporation of benevolent mutual benefit associations or societies on the assessment plan organized for the purpose of benefiting and protecting members in the case of dismemberment, and to the end of benefiting widows, orphans, heirs, devisees and estates of deceased members thereof; providing for the method of incorporation of such associations and the regulation and control of such associations as may be incorporated under the terms of this Act, and requiring those as-

sociations or organizations doing a similar business in the State of Florida to be incorporated under the terms of this Act, and providing a penalty for failure so to do; authorizing the State Treasurer to examine into the solvency and operation of such associations incorporated or reincorporated under the terms of this Act; providing for a valuation of certificates and providing for a reserve fund, providing for the payment of all benefits in cash only; providing for general State supervision and control of benevolent mutual benefit associations or societies that may be hereafter operated in the State of Florida, subject to the terms of this Act, on the assessment Plan, being Chapter 15885, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1933, by amending Section 5 thereof; and by repealing Section 2 of Chapter 16802, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1935, Being an amendment of said Section 5, of Chapter 15885, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1933, and repealing conflicting laws."

And Senate Bill No. 187, contained in the above report, was placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senate Chamber, April 20, 1939.

Senator Holland, Chairman of the Committee on Finance and Taxation, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bill and recommends that it do not pass.

House Bill No. 259:

A bill to be entitled An Act amending Section 5 of Chapter 18011 of the Laws of Florida, Acts of 1937, entitled "An Act relating to the license taxes, repealing Chapter 14491, and Chapter 14,528, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1929; repealing parts of Chapter 2 of Title VI, of Division 1 of the Revised General Statutes of Florida of 1920; repealing Chapter 16801 and Chapter 17167, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1935; imposing certain license taxes and providing for the payment and collection thereof, and providing that license taxes shall be a lien on the property of the person liable therefor, under certain circumstances."

And House Bill No. 259, contained in the above report, was laid on the table.

Senate Chamber, April 21, 1939.

Senator Holland, Chairman of the Committee on Finance and Taxation, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bill and recommends that the same do pass.

Senate Bill No. 195:

A bill to be entitled An Act to provide for raising revenue sufficient to defray the expenses of the State for each of the fiscal years 1939 and 1940.

And Senate Bill No. 195, contained in the above report, was placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senate Chamber, April 21, 1939.

Senator Holland, Chairman of the Committee on Finance and Taxation, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bill and recommend that the same do pass.

Senate Bill No. 43:

A bill to be entitled An Act to repeal Subdivision B of Section 4, of Chapter 16848, Laws of Florida, 1935, and to repeal all portions of said Chapter 16848, Acts of 1935, pertaining to or providing for the assessment, levying, enforcement or collection of gross receipt taxes, or fee or tax based solely on the gross receipts from all sales as defined in said Act, and as provided for in Subdivision B of Section 4, of Chapter 16848, Laws of Florida, 1935, and repealing all laws in conflict herewith.

And Senate Bill No. 43, contained in the above report, was placed on the Calendar of Bills on second reading.

Senate Chamber, April 21, 1939.

Senator Holland, Chairman of the Committee on Finance and Taxation, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bill and recommends that it do not pass.

Senate Bill No. 44:

A bill to be entitled An Act assessing, levying and imposing an annual license tax upon every person, firm, copartnership, joint venture, joint stock company, association, corporation, estate, business trust, trust, receiver, syndicate, fiduciary, or any other association of persons conducting, engaging in or carrying on the business of a retailer in this State, and operating an independent store or one or more chain stores

within this State; and to classify such stores for the purpose of such license taxes and of graduating the license tax in accordance with the number of chain stores operated under a single ownership, management, or control, one or more of which chain stores is located in this State; said tax upon chain stores located in this State to be based on the number of such chain stores included under the same general management, supervision, ownership or control, whether located in this State or not; defining "independent store" and "chain store" and "chain stores" and other words used in this Act; to provide for the administration and enforcement of this Act and for the promulgation and enforcement of rules and regulations to facilitate such enforcement; to provide for the creation and enforcement of a lien upon the property of persons and association of persons liable for the payment of such license tax; to provide penalties for the violation of this Act and of rules and regulations lawfully made under the authority hereof; to provide for the filing of sworn reports by the person or association of persons, on which such license tax is imposed; and also assessing, levying, and imposing an independent, separate and additional annual license tax upon every person, firm, copartnership, joint adventure, joint stock company, association, corporation, estate, business trust, trust, receiver, syndicate, fiduciary, or any other association of persons conducting, engaging in or carrying on the business of operating a department store in this State, as defined in this Act, whether such department store be an independent store, or chain store; and to classify such department stores for the purpose of such independent, separate and additional license tax, and of graduating the license tax in accordance with the number of department stores operated under a single ownership, management, or control, one or more of which department stores is located in this State; said license tax upon department stores that are chain stores to be based on the number of such department stores included under the same general management, supervision, ownership or control, whether operated in this State or not; defining a department store; and to repeal conflicting laws, expressly but on condition, including certain parts and sections of Chapter 16848, Laws of Florida, 1935; and to appropriate the revenues derived hereunder.

And Senate Bill No. 44, contained in the above report, was laid on the table.

Senate Chamber, April 20, 1939.

Senator Hodges, Chairman of the Committee on Public Utilities, reported that the Committee had carefully considered the following bill and recommend that the same do pass with the following amendments:

Senate Bill No. 2:

A bill to be entitled An Act to require any railroad company or railroad corporation operating or doing business in the State of Florida to grant to any regular or part time employee who shall be elected or appointed to any Federal, State, County or Municipal office or position, a leave of absence for such period of time that such employee holds or occupies such office or position, without loss of, impairment or prejudice to the seniority rank of such employee; to provide for actions for damages by any such employee against such railroad company or railroad corporation for salaries or wages lost by refusal to reinstate such employee upon the termination of such service or Federal, State, County or Municipal office or position; and to provide penalties for the violation thereof.

Amendment No. 1:

Strike out Section 2, and in lieu thereof substitute the following. Section 2. Upon the expiration or termination of any such term of office or appointment to any Federal, State, County or Municipal office or position, any such regular or part time employee, upon giving of a written notice to such railroad company or railroad corporation, and upon passing such physical and mental examinations as is customarily required, shall be entitled forthwith to reinstatement to the position or employment held by him at the time of such election or appointment, and upon failure or refusal of any railroad company or railroad corporation to immediately reinstate said employee, he shall have and may maintain a civil action for damages against such railroad company or railroad corporation for any salaries or wages which would have been due him from the date of such notice, and the passing of such examination had he been reemployed as required hereby; in such action, should the plaintiff recover he shall also be entitled to recover a reasonable attorney's fee as compensation for his attorney.

Amendment No. 2:

Strike out entire Section 3.

WHEREAS, the damage so wrought under the direction and regulations of the Federal Government was for the primary purpose of protecting the health of citizens of the United States and in order to prevent the invasion of other States by this destructive pest, and thereby benefited other States and the United States by an incalculable amount far in excess of the damages sustained by the property owners of Florida, and

WHEREAS, the citrus growers of Florida, and the business interests and people of Florida who are dependent directly or indirectly upon the income of citrus growers, have, during the present season, experienced great losses due to low prices of citrus fruits, and

WHEREAS, there has already been many years delay in laying before the Congress, for final determination, the claims of the said property owners, Therefore

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF FLORIDA:

SECTION 1. That the attention of the President of the United States and the Congress be drawn to the facts hereinbefore set forth, and that they be urgently requested to consider the claims of the property owners who suffered damages incident to the eradication of the Mediterranean fruit fly, and to provide the necessary appropriations to pay said claims at the earliest possible moment.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of State shall provide copies of this Resolution, suitably prepared as a memorial, and to respectfully present such copies to the President of the United States, the President of the Senate of the United States, the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States, and to each of the Senators and Representatives in Congress from the State of Florida.

A bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 4 of Chapter 3699 of the Acts of 1887, the same being Section 1980 of the Compiled General Laws of Florida of 1927, by requiring all public printing, including ruling and binding designated as "Class B" printing to be done within the State of Florida, and requiring bidders for such ruling and binding and "Class B" printing to submit an affidavit under oath with each such bid, price or proposal, stating that such job or contract shall be performed within the State of Florida and providing exceptions therefrom and prohibiting such jobs or such contracts or any part thereof from being sublet to other printers, and requiring vendors of such ruling, binding and printing jobs or contracts to file affidavits under oath with each invoice submitted for work done on such contracts or jobs, except in certain instances stating that all work covered by such contracts or jobs was done by such vendor within the State of Florida, and providing exceptions therefrom and requiring all bidders for such contracts or jobs to file an annual bond with the Comptroller of the State of Florida conditioned on their requirements with said requirements, and providing for the enforcement of said bond.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Labor and Industry.

By the Committee on Forestry and Parks—
Senate Bill No. 336:

A bill to be entitled An Act authorizing the Florida Board of Forestry to cooperate with the Herty Foundation of Georgia in conducting pulp and paper research and demonstration work applicable to the industrial utilization of softwood and hardwood timber produced in Florida; making an appropriation for such cooperation; and providing for the appointment of a member of the board of directors of said foundation.

pendages of any visual, muscular, neurological of anatomic anomalies of the human eyes and their appendages; prohibiting the unethical or unprofessional practice and sale of eye-glasses, spectacles and lenses; and prohibiting unethical or unprofessional conduct and prescribing the manner of enforcing the provisions of this Act, and fixing the penalties for the violation of the terms and provisions thereof.
