REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Your Committee on Appropriations, to whom was referred—

S. B. No. 3—A Bill to be entitled an Act to consolidate Section 585.43, Florida Statutes' 1941, as amended by Chapter 21741, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1943, with Section 585.32, Florida Statutes 1941, as amended by Chapter 21638, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1943, and to amend said sections as consolidated; relating to the State Live Stock Sanitary Board, and prescribing certain powers and duties of said board with respect to preventing, combating and extirpating certain contagious, infectious and communicable diseases of Live Stock; providing for the purchase, distribution and administration of anti-hog cholera serum and hog cholera virus and the appropriation therefor; and to provide further for the purchase, distribution and administration of Brucellosis (Bang's disease) vaccine, and the appropriation therefor.

Be it Resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives Concurring:

That the American Legion Auxiliary to the Claude L. Sauls Post No. 13 located at Tallahassee, Florida, be and is hereby granted permission to operate a cold drink stand and other concessions incidental thereto, for the uses and purposes of their organization during the 1945 session as well as any special session which may be called prior to the convening of the 1947 session of the Legislature.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

By Senator MacArthur—

Senate Resolution No. 1:

WHEREAS, The Special Joint Economy and Efficiency Committee of the Florida Legislature composed of Representatives: Jerry Collins, Thomas B. Dowda, James L. Hardin and L. C. Leedy of the House; and Senators: Harrison E. Barringer, W. Turner Davis and Amos Lewis representing the Senate, was created by the 1943 Legislature and its work was made possible by the cooperation of former Governor Spessard L. Holland and Governor Millard Caldwell, and by cooperating departments, and

WHEREAS, the said Committee has by extensive research and devotion to duty completed a very valuable analysis and report on the questions of the government of Florida at an exceedingly small expenditure of funds, and

WHEREAS, The report is of necessity lengthy and bulky; thereby making it impractical for each member to be expected to study the said report in complete detail in the short time available,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the State of Florida:

1. That the Senate does hereby extend its thanks and appreciation to the Committee, to former Governor Holland and Governor Caldwell and to cooperating departments for this valuable report; and

2. That the President of the Senate appoint a committee of twelve members of the Senate including the members above named to receive and study the said report and recommend action to the Senate; and

3. That the House of Representatives be and it is hereby invited to provide a committee of fifteen, including the House members of said committee, to work jointly with the said committee of the Senate.

Which was read the first time in full.

The question was put on the adoption of the Resolution.

Which was agreed to and Senate Resolution No. 1 was adopted.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

By Senator Sheldon—

S. J. R. No. 33—A Joint Resolution Proposing an Amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida relative to Assessment of Property for Taxes and the Collection of Taxes, by Amending Sections 11 and 12 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida as Adopted at the General Election of November, 1944, said Amendment to Provide for the Re-Numbering of Sections 11 and 12 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida as Adopted at the General Election in November, 1944, and to Amend Section 11 and 12 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida, and to provide that in the County of Hillsborough, State of Florida, the County Tax Assessor shall Assess the Property of the County for the Purpose of Levying State, County, Schools and Municipalities in the County of Hillsborough Except the City of Plant City, Florida, which Shall be Exempt from the Provisions of this Amendment, Taxes Levied by the State, County, County School Board, School District, Special Tax School Districts and the Municipalities of the County Except the City of Plant City, Florida.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF FLORIDA:

That the following Amendment of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida relative to the Assessment and Collection of all taxes in the County of Hillsborough, State of Florida, by re-numbering Section 11 as adopted at the General Election of 1944 so as to make it read Section 12 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida, and by Amending Section 12 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida as adopted at the General Election in November, of 1944, so as to make it read Section 13 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida, and to exclude the City of Plant City from said Amendment; Be and the same is hereby agreed to and shall be submitted to the Electors of the State of Florida for Ratification or Rejection at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1946;

Section 12. 1. From and after January 1, 1948, the County Tax Assessor of Hillsborough County shall assess all property for all State, County, School and Municipal Taxes to be levied in Hillsborough County by the State, County, County School Board, School Districts, Special Tax School Districts and Municipalities except in the City of Plant City, Florida, which city shall be exempt from the provisions of this Section.

2. The Legislature shall, at the Legislative Session in 1947 and from time to time thereafter, enact laws specifying the powers, functions, duties and compensation of the County Tax Assessor designated in Paragraph 1 of Section 12, and shall likewise provide by law for the extension of the Assessment Roll of the County Tax Assessor of all taxes levied by the State, County, County School Board, School Districts, Special Tax School Districts and Municipalities located in the County of Hillsborough, State of Florida, with the exception of the City of Plant City, which is hereby exempt from the provisions of this Amendment.

Section 13. 1. From and after January 1, 1948, the County Tax Collector in the County of Hillsborough, State of Florida, shall collect all taxes levied in the County by the State, County, County School Board, School Districts, Special Tax School Districts and Municipalities of Hillsborough County, Florida,

except in the City of Plant City, it being exempt from the provisions of this Amendment.

2. The Legislature shall at the Legislative Session of 1947 and from time to time thereafter, enact laws specifying the powers, functions, duties and compensation of County Tax Collector designated in Paragraph 1 of Section 13, and shall likewise provide for the collection, care, custody, reporting and disbursement of all taxes collected by the County Tax Collector.

Which was read the first time in full and referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

By Senator Sheldon—

S. B. No. 34—A bill to be entitled An Act amending Section 919.23 of the Florida Statutes 1941 relating to recommendations by juries in criminal trials.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "B".

By Senator Sheldon—

S. B. No. 35—A bill to be entitled An Act amending Section 918.10 of the Florida Statutes 1941 relating to instructions by the court to the juries in criminal trials.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "B".

By Senator Sheldon—

S. B. No. 36—A bill to be entitled An Act amending Section 1 of Chapter 20675, Laws of Florida, Acts 1941 Legislature, being Section 409.16 Florida Statutes 1941, entitled: "An Act to amend Section 17, Chapter 18285, Laws of Florida, 1937, as amended, same being entitled: "An Act creating a State Welfare Board and District Welfare Boards and providing for their appointment, qualifications, powers and duties: providing that said State Board shall be the agent for the United States, State, County and Municipal government in the administration of funds for the relief of unfortunates; and authorizing the said Board to act as agent in the administration of any funds for investigation, social welfare work, or any other work incident to the public welfare of the United States, State, County and Municipal Governments; authorizing the State Welfare Board to formulate rules and regulations necessary to carry out the intent and purposes of this Act; providing for the supervision of State and Local institutions for destitute or dependent children and providing for the disposition, care, protection, support and maintenance of dependent children; authorizing the State Welfare Board to establish minimum standard of care for all local public and private institutions or agencies, creating the office of State Welfare Commissioner and providing for his appointment, providing that this Act shall not affect the enforcement of Chapter 9274, Acts of 1923, of Chapter 11834 and 13384, Acts of 1927, of Chapter 13620, Acts of 1929, and Acts amendatory thereof; repealing all other laws or parts of laws in conflict herewith; and making appropriations to carry out the purposes of said Act; and fixing the qualifications of persons entitled to monetary benefits or assistance under this Act. "By raising the maximum monthly old age assistance benefits payable under said Act from forty (\$40.00) dollars, to fifty (\$50.00) dollars per month; repealing all laws in conflict therewith; and providing for an effective date." By providing that for the duration of the present war, persons eligible to receive monthly old age assistance may engage in certain agricultural pursuits without prejudice to enjoyment of the benefits of such assistance and providing minimum property allowances and limiting administrative costs.

By Senators Ausley and Clark—

S. B. No. 37—A bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 652.06 of Florida Statutes, 1941, relating to banks and the capital stock thereof.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Banking and Building and Loans.

By Senators Ausley and Clark—

S. B. No. 38—A bill to be entitled An Act relating to checks or drafts received for collection or deposits by solvent drawee or payor banks, defining the acts or event constituting payment or acceptance of such items.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Banking and Building and Loans.

By Senators Ausley and Clarke—

S. B. No. 39—A bill to be entitled An Act relating to moneys deposited in any bank or trust company in this state in the name of a minor not under guardianship and the withdrawal thereof.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Banking and Building and Loans.

By Senators Ausley and Clark—

S. B. No. 40—A bill to be entitled An Act relative to the recordation of an instrument which affects title or interest in civil aircraft (based on the Civil Aeronautics Act, Section 503, 49 U. S. C. Section 523).

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "C".

By Senator Ausley—

S. B. No. 41—A bill entitled An Act to supplement the salary of each circuit judge of the State of Florida residing in and a citizen of a county having a population of more than 31,600 inhabitants, and in which there is an incorporated city or town with a population of more than 16,000 inhabitants, and whose circuit is composed of six counties, and in which said resident county there is neither established a criminal court of record, a court of record, a county court, a civil court of record, nor a court of crimes, and in which said resident county three regular terms of circuit court are designated by law to be held each year, and directing said counties to make such supplementation and making the same a county purpose.

Which was read the first time by title only.

Senator Ausley moved that the rules be waived and Senate Bill No. 41 be read the second time by title only.

Which was agreed to by a two-thirds vote.

And Senate Bill No. 41 was read the second time by title only.

Senator Ausley moved that the rules be further waived and Senate Bill No. 41 be read the third time in full and put upon its passage.

Which was agreed to by a two-thirds vote.

And Senate Bill No. 41 was read the third time in full.

S. B. No. 42—A bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 632.07, Florida Statutes 1941, relating to conditions precedent to license being granted domestic mutual fire insurance associations.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Insurance.

By Senator Shands—

S. B. No. 43—A bill to be entitled An Act to amend Section 1, of Chapter 17862, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1937, being entitled: "An Act to fix the compensation and the basis thereof of county superintendents of public instruction of the counties of the State of Florida".

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Senator Sheldon—

S. B. No. 44—A bill to be entitled An Act relating to Marriage Licenses; requiring certificates of Physician as precedent to issuance of marriage licenses; Requiring premarital serological test for discovery of syphilis; Providing manner in which physician's certificate and laboratory report are to be made; defining standard serological tests and approved laboratory: providing exemption from physician's certificate because of pregnancy; providing free blood test and limiting fees of physicians for making examination and issuing certificate; providing for method of filing physician's certificates, laboratory reports and court proceedings; authorizing use of laboratory report information by the State Board of Health for the protection of the public health; requiring that information on physicians' certificates, laboratory reports and court proceedings be kept confidential; invalidating marriages contracted in attempted evasion of this act: Providing an annual appropriation to carry out the purposes of this act: And providing for the effective date of this Act.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Public Health.

By Senator Sheldon—

S. B. No. 45—A bill to be entitled An Act to prevent the occurrence of congenital syphilis: requiring a serological test for discovery of syphilis in pregnant women; designating standard serological tests and approved laboratories: provided for statement regarding tests to be made on birth or stillbirth certificates; providing manner in which laboratory reports are to be made; providing tests shall be made free of charge; authorizing use of reports for protection of the public health; and providing an annual appropriation to carry out purposes of this Act.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Public Health.

By Senator Carroll—

S. B. No. 46—A bill to be entitled An Act amending Section 284.07, Florida Statutes 1941, relating to the State Fire Insurance Fund and particularly with respect to the employment by the State Treasurer of certain persons, and providing for salaries of such persons, and other expenses, in connection with the administration of such fund.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Insurance.

By Senator Carroll—

S. B. No. 47—A bill to be entitled An Act to regulate the making and applying of rates for fire and all other kinds of insurance which Fire Insurance Companies are authorized to write in this state, to provide for the licensing of rating organizations, to provide for the supervision of such rating organizations by the Insurance Commissioner, to prohibit discrimination between risks of the same class and hazard, to provide for the filing of rates with the Insurance Commissioner, the approval or the disapproval by the Insurance Commissioner of all rating systems, to make provision for a hearing thereon at the instance of any interested person with the right of appeal to the Circuit Court of Leon County, Florida, to make the willful violation of the provisions of this Act a misdemeanor as provided therein and for all other purposes.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Insurance.

By Senator Carroll—

S. B. No. 48—A bill to be entitled An Act to Regulate the Making, Filing and Use of Rates for Certain Casualty Insurance and for Fidelity, Guaranty and Surety Bonds; to Regulate Rating Organizations; to Provide Fees and to Provide Penalties for the Violation of this Act; and to Repeal All Laws or Parts of Laws in Conflict with this Act.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Insurance.

By Senator Gray—

S. B. No. 49—A bill to be entitled An Act amending Sections 561.02, 561.11, 561.12, 561.47 and 561.54, Florida Statutes, 1941; providing for creation of State Beverage Department and

defining its duties; appropriating money for expenses of State Beverage Department; appropriating profits and taxes realized from State Beverage Law; providing for stamps evidencing payment of excise tax on alcoholic beverages and prescribing rules for their issuance; levying a floor tax against certain alcoholic beverages as of midnight, September 30th, 1945; prescribing regulations for transportation of alcoholic beverages in the State of Florida; prohibiting the sale of more than one gallon of alcoholic beverage containing fourteen per cent, or more of alcohol by weight except wines regardless of alcoholic content and providing punishment for violation; providing an effective date of this Act; repealing all laws and parts of laws in conflict herewith.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Finance and Taxation.

S. B. No. 50—A bill to be entitled An Act providing for a seventy-two hour work week for firemen, and repealing Chapters 167.62 and 167.63, Florida Statutes 1941, and any and all other laws or parts of laws in conflict therewith.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Labor and Industry.

S. B. No. 51—A bill to be entitled An Act creating the Florida State Advertising Commission; defining its powers and duties; and providing an appropriation for its operation and for advertising purposes.

Which was read the first time by title only and referred to the Committee on Publicity and Advertising.

CONSIDERATION OF OTHER RESOLUTIONS

House Concurrent Resolution No. 1—

WHEREAS, this brutal war in Europe is nearing an end, and the conflict against the enemy in the Pacific is being speeded to an inevitable victory, and

WHEREAS, the greatest sacrifices of this most terrible and destructive of all wars are being made by the men in the armed forces of our country, and

WHEREAS, the highest motive of these men in action is to insure not only for themselves but their countrymen, and for their children, and ours, too, and for all of our children's children, a permanent and enduring peace, and

WHEREAS, a great conference of all the Allies and associated nations is being held in San Francisco beginning April 25, 1945, to formulate plans for an organization to insure this future peace, and

WHEREAS, there is no direct representative of the enlisted men in the American delegation as at present constituted; Now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF FLORIDA, THE SENATE CONCURRING:—

Section 1. That in our considered judgment a fitting representative or representatives from among those who have shared the hardships and suffering of battle with the common fighting men of our country should be appointed to serve on the American delegation to the San Francisco conference on permanent world organization, and that such a representative or representatives should also serve on the American delegation at the final peace conference.

SECTION 2. That the representative or representatives should be selected by the Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces of the United States, and should not be above the rank of sergeant if from the Army or Marine Corps, or not above the rank of Chief Petty Officer if from the naval forces, and

SECTION 3. That a copy of this Resolution, under the great seal of Florida, be transmitted by the Secretary of State to the Honorable Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States.

Was taken up in its order and read the second time in full. The question was put on the adoption of the Resolution.

SENATE BILLS ON SECOND READING.
