SB 948—A bill to be entitled An act relating to dentistry, dental hygiene and dental laboratories, regulations; amending sections 466.05(3), 466.25(1),(4), 466.27(2),(5) and 466.35(1), Florida Statutes; defining proprietor; providing for procedure for notice, hearing and review of accusations; regulating professional signs and announcements; regulating solicitation or advertisements by unlicensed persons; providing a penalty; providing an effective date.

SB 949—A bill to be entitled An act amending and supplementing chapter 22219, laws of Florida, special acts of 1943, as amended, being the charter of the city of Bradenton, Florida, by providing for the construction, acquisition, improvement, extension and operation of water systems, sewer systems, gas systems, public parking systems and the issuance of revenue bonds to finance the cost of such systems and other revenue producing undertakings; providing for the issuance of excise tax bonds payable from utilities services taxes, cigarette taxes, franchise taxes, occupational license taxes, or other excise taxes; providing for the issuance of assessment bonds payable

from the proceeds of special assessments levied against benefited lands and real estate; providing for the pledge of additional security for said revenue bonds, including a pledge of the full faith and credit and taxing power of said city; providing for the rights, security and remedies of the holders of such revenue bonds, excise tax bonds or assessment bonds and for the sale thereof; and providing when this act shall take effect.

SB 950—A bill to be entitled An act relating to modification of support decrees or agreements, attorney's fee; amending section 65.15, Florida Statutes; providing for costs and attorney's fee in a successful petition by a mother for an increase in support payments for minor children in her custody; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "A".

By Senators Haverfield, Hollahan and Whitaker—

SB 951—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the permissive establishment of a downtown development authority to prevent further deterioration in the central business district and correct existing conditions in any municipality of the state having a population in excess of two hundred and fifty thousand (250,000) inhabitants according to the last official census; defining terms; prescribing the method of creation; providing for a board appointed by the governing body of the city; prescribing the membership; terms of office and duties of the board; prescribing the powers of the authority; authorizing the levy and collection of an ad valorem tax not exceeding one-half mill in the district for the purpose of this authority; providing for the staff and budget of the authority; assessing handling charges for use of the general fund; prohibiting conflicts of interest; declaring public policy; providing a rule of construction, a savings clause, and an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and placed on the Local Calendar.

SB 952—A bill to be entitled An act relating to salt water fisheries and conservation; adding section 370.04, Florida Statutes, providing that the state board of conservation shall make or provide for making of biological surveys and studies required pursuant to chapter 253, Florida Statutes, and collect the cost and expenses of making the same from the requestor; appropriating moneys collected for payment of cost and expenses of survey and study; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Salt Water Conservation.

By Senator Hollahan—

SB 953—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the state

road department relocation payments; authorizing the department to make relocation payments to certain persons in connection with federal aid highway projects; providing for rules and regulations; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Public Roads and Highways; and Appropriations.

By Senator Stratton—

SB 954—A bill to be entitled An act for the relief of Mrs. Lewis Benjamin Argo, Nassau county, for moneys paid into the retirement fund by her husband; providing an appropriation; providing an effective date.

By Senators Cross and Ryan—

SCR 955—A concurrent resolution directing the legislative council to make a study and evaluation of existing water and sewer regulatory laws of the state, and to make recommendations to the 1967 session of the legislature concerning the advisability of revising such laws and providing a uniform state law; authorizing the establishment of a study committee; providing for the appointment of members; authorizing the establishment of an advisory committee.

WHEREAS, there is presently no uniformity of regulation in the state of water and sewer services, and

WHEREAS, conflicting legislation, both of local and of general application, is continually being introduced, and

WHEREAS, the continued growth and development of the state require a strong water and sewer industry capable of meeting the needs for services in areas where they cannot be provided in any other way, and

WHEREAS, the health and welfare of the citizens of Florida require the expansion of sewer and water service to as much of the population as possible to prevent pollution of our water resources, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida, the House of Representatives Concurring:

Section 1. The legislative council shall make a study and evaluation of existing water and sewer regulatory laws of the state and shall report to the 1967 session of the legislature its recommendations regarding the revision of such laws.

Section 2. The legislative council is authorized and directed to establish a study committee pursuant to section 11.21(3), Florida Statutes, to conduct the study authorized by this resolution; provided, however, that the committee shall have the authority to appoint an advisory committee to assist in this study as provided by section 11.285, Florida Statutes.

Was read the first time in full and referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Memorials.

By Senator Mathews—

SB 956—A bill to be entitled An act relating to all counties having a population in excess of four hundred fifty thousand (450,000), according to the last official decennial census, not having home rule under the constitution; authorizing the board of county commissioners of said counties to determine the compensation of any clerks and inspectors serving at the precincts during any election held in said counties and for attending official schools pertaining to their duties as election officials; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title. On motions of Senator Mathews, the rules were waived by two-thirds vote and SB 956 was read the second time by title, the third time in full and passed, title as stated. The vote was: Yeas—44. Nays—None.

Appropriations made in items 129 to 143, 166 to 185, and 191 to 216, to the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions and in items 977a to 1078 to the Board of Regents may be transferred notwithstanding the provisions of Section 282.061, F. S., to another institution within the same division or between institutions of higher learning with the approval of the Budget Commission upon its determination that such transfers are necessary because of transfers of inmates or patients from one institution to another, because of shifts in the number of full time equivalent students budgeted at each institution, or for other justifiable reasons, in order to adequately provide the necessary services at each institution which the Budget Commission determines to be in the best interest of the state; provided, however, the total annual appropriation in this section to any such institution may not be increased or decreased by more than twenty per cent as a result of such transfers.

Appropriations made in items 166 to 185 to the board of commissioners of state institutions may be transferred notwithstanding the provisions of Section 282.061, F. S., to be used for community mental health programs authorized by the 1965 legislature upon recommendation of the division director and with the approval of the budget commission, upon its determination that such transfers are in the best interest of the

state; provided, however, the total amount which may be transferred pursuant to this provision shall not exceed ten per cent of the total appropriations in items 166 to 185. Appropriations made in items 191 to 216 to the board of commissioners of state institutions may be transferred notwithstanding the provisions of Section 282.061, F. S., to be used for community mental retardation programs authorized by the 1965 legislature, upon recommendation of the division director and with the approval of the budget commission, upon its determination that such transfers are in the best interest of the state; provided, however, the total amount which may be transferred pursuant to this provision shall not exceed ten per cent of the total appropriations in items 191 to 216. Appropriations made in items 321 to 325 to the board of conservation may be transferred notwithstanding the provisions of Section 282.061, F. S., within themselves with the approval of not less than five members of the budget commission, upon its determination that such transfers are necessary and in the best interest of the state.

Section 5. Notwithstanding the provisions of Sections 215.18 and 215.32, F. S., an amount up to but not to exceed twenty-nine million (\$29,000,000) dollars is appropriated from the working capital fund during the 1965-67 biennium for transfer to the general revenue fund. Transfers of this appropriation shall be made only after the budget commission determines upon the affirmative vote of five members of said commission that insufficient moneys are available in the general revenue fund to meet the appropriations from said fund during the 1965-67 biennium.

Section 6. (a) The following judicial officers shall be paid by the state the following salaries:

Justices of the Supreme Court \$24,000.00 per annum.

Judges of the District Courts of Appeal \$23,000.00 per annum.

Judges of the Circuit Courts \$19,000.00 per annum.

(b) Provided that no judge of a district court of appeal, while drawing the foregoing salary, shall receive from any county or municipality any supplemental salary which shall make his total salaries exceed \$23,000.00, and no judge of a circuit court shall, while drawing the foregoing salary, receive from any county or municipality any supplemental salary which shall make his total salaries exceed \$22,000.00, but should the state salary of a judge of a district court of appeal fall below \$23,000.00 or the state salary of a judge of a circuit court fall below \$22,000.00, then any local or special law to the extent otherwise applicable shall be effective to provide a total compensation for such judges up to but not to exceed \$23,000.00 for a judge of a district court of appeal and \$22,000.00 for a judge of a circuit court; provided, however, any supplement now provided by local or special acts, to the extent it does not conflict with the maximum salary herein fixed, shall not be affected or repealed by this provision.

Section 7. (a) The salaries of the State Attorneys shall be \$14,500.00 each per annum and the salaries of assistant State

Attorneys shall be \$9,500.00 each per annum; provided nothing herein shall be construed to reduce the salary of any State Attorney or assistant State Attorney, and provided further, that except as hereinafter provided, no State Attorney or assistant State Attorney, while drawing the foregoing state salary, shall receive from any county or municipality any supplemental salary which shall make his total salary in excess of \$18,500.00 per annum for the State Attorney and \$10,500.00 per annum for the assistant State Attorney; and, provided further, that except as hereinafter provided, if the state salary of any State Attorney or assistant State Attorney is reduced below the above figures, then any local or special law to the extent applicable shall be effective to provide up to but not to exceed the total compensation for the State Attorney of \$18,500.00 per annum and assistant State Attorney of \$10,500.00 per annum; provided, however, any supplement now provided by local or special act to the extent it does not conflict with the maximum salary herein fixed, shall not be affected or repealed by this provision.

(b) The State Attorneys and assistant State Attorneys serving in the Second, Fourth, Sixth, Eleventh, and Thirteenth Judicial Circuits of the State of Florida and the first assistant State Attorney serving in the Eighth Judicial Circuit of the State of Florida, who is serving full time, may be paid a supplement by the counties in which they are elected or appointed, such supplement to be in addition to the highest salary authorized herein.

Section 8. The salaries of the Public Defenders and the assistant Public Defenders shall be as appropriated in items 762 through 842 and as provided in Section 282.051, F. S.; provided nothing herein shall be construed to reduce the salary of any Public Defender or assistant Public Defender.

Section 9. No state moneys appropriated in this act to the State Board of Health or to the State Department of Public Welfare shall be used to pay travel expenses or out-of-state tuition of individuals receiving educational leaves, grants, or scholarships. Provided, however, out-of-state tuition may be paid in those instances in which authorized courses are not offered in the state university system,

Section 10. If, upon the enactment into law by the Congress of 1965 of amendments to the social security act, the budget commission determines that the best interests of the state would be served by transferring amounts appropriated for the division of mental health or the state tuberculosis board to the state department of public welfare, then, notwithstanding the provisions of Section 282.061, F. S., any amounts appropriated to those agencies may be transferred to the state department of public welfare to pay for treatment of psychotic or tubercular patients.

It is the intent of the legislature that, if through this procedure any additional funds can be obtained for the care of psychotic or tubercular patients, then such funds shall be used to improve the care or treatment of those patients.

Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 965.08(3), F. S., any funds received by the institutions in the division of mental health for the treatment or care of patients may be deposited into a trust fund for the operation of the respective institutions with the approval of the budget commission.

Section 11. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 282-061, Florida Statutes, the Board of Regents, with the approval of the Budget Commission, is authorized to transfer any funds included in this act for the operation of Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University Law School to Florida State University.

Section 12. The moneys appropriated in this act for salaries to the division of child training schools, division of mental health, division of sunland training centers and the division of corrections shall be used first to provide at least a one step merit increase each year for those employees earning less than \$400 per month who are not at the top of the pay range for their classification.

Section 13. Any section of this act, or any item herein contained, if found to be invalid or vetoed by the Governor without overriding action of the Legislature shall in no way affect other sections or other items contained in this act.

Section 14. This act shall take effect on July 1, 1965.

HJR 892—A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Subsections (1) and (2) of Section 5 of Article V of the Florida Constitution relative to district courts of appeal; prescribing the number of appellate districts within the state, the number of judges to serve in each district, and the composition of the court; declaring an emergency under Section 3 of Article XVII of the State Constitution; providing for a special election.

On motion of Senator Cleveland, the rules were waived by two-thirds vote and HJR 892 was read the second time in full.

Senator McCarty also offered the following amendment:

In the Whereas Section, page 1, strike: "Whereas, the Legislature of the State of Florida has determined that an emergency requiring an early decision by the electors of the state does exist, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the state of Florida: That the following proposed amendment of subsections 1 and 2 of Section 5 of Article V of the Constitution of Florida is agreed to and shall be submitted to the electors of the state for approval or rejection at a special called election as provided by Section 3 of Article XVII of the Florida Constitution:" and insert the following: Whereas the Legislature of the State of Florida has determined that additional District Courts of Appeal are needed, Now Therefore:

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

A motion of Senator Dressler, that the hour of adjournment be extended until completion of final action on HJR 892, failed.

Pending consideration of the foregoing amendment, on motion of Senator Ryan, the Senate adjourned at 12:57 P.M. until 9:30 A.M., May 13, 1965.
