SB 1319—A bill to be entitled An act relating to juvenile and domestic relations court, additional judge, in all counties of the state having a population of over nine hundred thousand (900,000), according to the latest official decennial census, in which there has been established a juvenile and domestic relations court; providing for the term of such judge; providing for interim appointment by the governor for such additional judge; providing for the election of judges of the juvenile and domestic relations court; providing for the salary of judges; providing for the administration of such court by such judges; providing for the election of present judges of such court; repealing all conflicting laws; providing an effective date.

On motion by Senator Stone, the rules were waived and SB 1319 was read the second time by title.

The Committee on Judiciary "B" offered the following amendment which was adopted on motion by Senator Stone:

In Section 2, lines 17-24, page 2, strike: all of lines 17 through 24 and insert the following: shall run in four (4) separate groups, and each group shall be voted upon separately. Candidates for the office now held by the present judges, the incumbents, and successors thereof, shall be grouped in divisions one (1), two (2) and three (3), and candidates for the office for the additional judge of such court herein created, and successors thereof, shall be grouped in division four (4).

On motion by Senator Stone, the rules were waived and SB 1319 as amended was read the third time in full and passed. The vote was: Yeas—48 Nays—None

INTRODUCTION

SB 1604 failed to receive the required Constitutional two-thirds vote of the Senate for admission for introduction and consideration.

By the required Constitutional two-thirds vote of the Senate the following bills were admitted for introduction and consideration:

By Senator Hollahan—

SB 1605—A bill to be entitled An act relating to liens; amending chapter 85, Florida Statutes, by adding section 85.191; relating to abandoned motor vehicles in parking lots; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "B".

By Senator Hollahan—

SB 1606—A bill to be entitled An act relating to false pretenses; amending chapter 817, Florida Statutes, by adding section 817.57; relating to leaving parking lots without paying rental fee; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "B".

By Senators Hollahan and Stone—

SCR 1607—A concurrent resolution providing for a special session of the Legislature for the consideration and adoption of a State Constitution.

WHEREAS, the present Constitution of the State of Florida was adopted eighty-three (83) years ago in the year 1885 and has been amended some one hundred (100) times since adoption, and

WHEREAS, the State of Florida is now the ninth (9th) largest state in the United States and growing rapidly in population, and

WHEREAS, for over a decade the people of Florida have been promised a new Constitution by an overwhelming number of elected officials in the Legislature and in the executive branch of government, and

WHEREAS, those who have pledged to provide the people with a new Constitution have a moral obligation to do so with all dispatch in order to keep faith with the people of this state, and

WHEREAS, the great challenge of our times and the challenges of the years ahead demand a Constitution which will enable the state government of Florida to properly serve its people and provide for orderly and sound progress, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida, the House of Representatives Concurring:

That the current elected Legislature of Florida will meet in special session upon sine die of the present extended regular session of the Florida Legislature to consider and adopt a new Constitution for the State of Florida to be submitted to the electors of the State for their approval in a special general election to be held on the first Tuesday in November of 1967.

Was read the first time in full. On motion by Senator Hollahan, the rules were waived and SCR 1607 was placed on the Calendar.

Unanimous consent was granted Senator Hollahan to take up SCR 1607 out of order.

On motion by Senator Hollahan, the rules were waived and SCR 1607 was read the second time by title, adopted, with Senator Henderson voting "Nay," and certified to the House.

By Senators Pope, Slade, Stockton, Fisher and Mathews—

SB 1608—A bill to be entitled An act relating to all counties having a population of not less than four hundred fifty thousand (450,000) or more than nine hundred thousand (900,000) according to the latest official decennial census; dividing the civil service into the classified and non-classified service and defining each; amending section 3, chapter 22263, as amended by chapter 57-1270, as amended by chapter 61-2099, by providing that the chief of detectives, the chief jail warden, the chief of the Duval county road patrol, and the chief administrative deputy of the office of the sheriff of Duval county shall be in the unclassified service except persons holding said offices on the effective date; providing that temporary appointees to said offices shall retain their classified status; providing an effective date and repealing all laws in conflict.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

By Senator Barron—

SB 1609—A bill to be entitled An act amending chapter 627, Florida Statutes, by adding part XVI of chapter 627, Florida Statutes, to provide for the regulation by the insurance commissioner of group self-insurers operating as employers under the workmen's compensation act; providing an appropriation for the administration of this act; repealing section 440.57, Florida Statutes; and providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Insurance and Judiciary "B".

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida:

That the Legislature of the State of Florida commends and expresses its appreciation to the selective professional staff from Marymount College and Florida Atlantic University and all others who so generously contributed to the success of the Marymount Self-Help Project of 1966.

SB 1613—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the town of Mayo, Lafayette county; abolishing present town charter and establishing new charter; providing for transition of certain assets, debts and powers from former town to new town; prescribing town boundaries; establishing a town government; providing an elected town council; prescribing powers of the municipality; providing for issuance of bonds; providing for levy and collection of taxes and for expenditures; providing for adoption of charter by a referendum election.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

By Senators Pope, Friday and Mathews—

SCR 1614—A concurrent resolution providing for appointment of a committee to study the needs and opportunities of the blind, mute and/or deaf students of the new area vocational technical center; providing for an appropriation.

Was read the first time in full and referred to the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

By Senators Friday and Thomas—

SM 1615—A memorial to the Florida congressional delegation requesting support for and expression of congressional

and Florida legislative intent relating to the exclusive jurisdiction and control to be exercised by the state of Florida in the management of its freshwater resources.

WHEREAS, the legislature of the state of Florida, meeting in regular session at Tallahassee, Florida, desires to bring to the attention of the Florida congressional delegation the need for prompt and effective enunciation of the state's right and responsibility to manage and allocate its own freshwater resources, and

WHEREAS, certain agencies of the federal government have claimed and continue to claim rights to fresh water which is captured, stored and managed within the geographical purview of the central and southern Florida flood control project, and

WHEREAS, these claims purport to be based upon the congressional documents authorizing the central and southern Florida flood control project, and

WHEREAS, there appears to be no legislative history whatsoever to support these claims, and

WHEREAS, the assurances of local cooperation furnished by the state of Florida, its political subdivisions and its citizens were not undertaken with any intent to convey authority to any federal agency to allocate the fresh water in the state of Florida, and

WHEREAS, the legislative and executive branches of the state of Florida are aware of and responsive to the need for providing a balanced program of water resources management and development in Florida, and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the legislature of the state of Florida that the state and its agencies continue progressive and positive water resources management programs administered at the state level which give due consideration to all phases and needs for water use,

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

That the Florida congressional delegation be requested to advise all federal agencies which have any responsibility for water resources development that the state of Florida claims complete jurisdiction over, and shall continue to assert all rights to, the management, diversion, storage, and use of its freshwater resources, and that any other agency trying to create other such rights or the authority to allocate stored waters within the state be urged to discontinue these efforts.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Florida congressional delegation be requested to express its desire that federal participation in the area of water resources development be executed in accordance with the will of the Congress of the United States as expressed in congressional documents authorizing the various federal-state projects and in strict accord with the intent of the original authorizing state legislation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be dispatched to the President of the United States, to the President of the United States Senate, to the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and to each member of the Florida delegation to the United States Congress.

Was read the first time in full. On motion by Senator Friday, the rules were waived and SM 1615 was placed on the Calendar.

Unanimous consent was granted Senator Friday to take up SM 1615 out of order.

On motion by Senator Friday, the rules were waived and SM 1615 was read the second time by title, adopted and certified to the House.

By Senators Mathews, Pope, Fisher, Stockton and Slade—

SB 1616—A bill to be entitled An act amending section 1, 2(f), 3(5), 3(8), 3(9), 10, 11, and 12 of chapter 63-1447, Laws of Florida, and repealing section 4 of chapter 63-1447, Laws of Florida, providing for the appointment of the members of the Jacksonville port authority, further providing for their term of office and the appointment of their successors, defining of the word "project" to include facilities for the construction, manufacture, repair, or maintenance of ships and other facilities directly or indirectly related to the promotion and development of waterborne commerce and further to include shipping and airport facilities of all kinds; providing that the authority shall have jurisdiction, power, and duties

necessary to enter into all contracts and arrangements and to do any and all things necessary for the operation of an airport and related facilities, including the solicitation and promotion of commerce through the airport and port of Jacksonville; providing for the transfer of the municipal airports of the city of Jacksonville, including any and all related facilities and providing for the payment of any bonds issued by the city of Jacksonville for the use of such municipal airports; providing for the protection of the rights of employees of the municipal airports who shall become employees of said authority; providing that the authority shall submit its budget to the council of the consolidated government of the city of Jacksonville; providing for an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

MESSAGES FROM THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

The following message was read:

Sir:

I am directed to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives has passed, with amendment—

By Senator Askew—

SB 900—A bill to be entitled An act making appropriations; providing moneys for the annual periods beginning July 1, 1967, and July 1, 1968, to pay salaries, and other expenses, capital outlay—buildings and improvements, and for other specified purposes of the various agencies of state government; providing an effective date.

Which amendment reads as follows:

On page 1, strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the following:

Section 1. The moneys in the following items are appropriated from the named funds for the indicated fiscal years of the biennium to the state agency indicated, as the amounts to be used to pay the salaries and other expenditures of the named agencies, and are in lieu of all moneys appropriated for these purposes in the indicated sections of the Florida Statutes, except that if additional moneys are needed to meet the requirements of a continuing appropriation of a trust fund and additional moneys are available in the named trust fund, the Budget Commission, upon affirmative vote of five members of said commission, is authorized to approve the expenditure of additional, available moneys in such trust fund in such amount(s) as may be necessary to meet such deficiency. The funds appropriated for the positions specifically indicated in an item are the only appropriation of moneys to be used to pay the total salary of each position in such items as provided in Article III, Section 27 of the State Constitution, and in Section 282.051, F. S. Appropriations made in items 205 to 222, 259 to 282, and 289 to 326, to the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions and in items 986 to 1118 to the Board of Regents may be transferred notwithstanding the provisions of Section 282.061, F. S., to another institution within the same division or between institutions of higher learning with the approval of the Budget Commission upon its determination that such transfers are necessary because of transfers of inmates or patients from one institution to another, because of shifts in the number of full time equivalent students budgeted at each institution, or for other justifiable reasons, in order to adequately provide the necessary services at each institution which the Budget Commission determines to be in the best interest of the state; provided, however, the total annual appropriation in this section to any such institution may not be increased or decreased by more than twenty per cent as a result of such transfers.

Appropriations made in items 259 to 282 to the board of commissioners of state institutions may be transferred notwithstanding the provisions of Section 282.061, F. S., to be used for community mental health programs authorized by the 1965 legislature upon recommendation of the division director and with the approval of the budget commission, upon its determination that such transfers are in the best interest of the state; provided, however, the total amount which may be transferred pursuant to this provision shall not exceed ten per cent of the total appropriations in items 259 to 282. Appropriations made in items 289 to 326 to the board of commissioners of state institutions may be transferred notwithstanding the provisions of Section 282.061, F. S., to be used for community mental retardation programs authorized by the 1965 legislature, upon recommendation of the division director and with the approval of the budget commission, upon its determination that such transfers are in the best interest of the state; provided, however, the total amount which may be transferred pursuant to this provision shall not exceed ten per cent of the total appropriations in items 289 to 326.

Section 6. Notwithstanding the provisions of Sections 215.18 and 215.32, F. S., an amount up to but not to exceed fifty million (\$50,000,000) dollars is appropriated from the working capital fund during the 1967-69 biennium for transfer to the general revenue fund. Transfers of this appropriations shall be made only after the budget commission determines upon the affirmative vote of five members of said commission that insufficient moneys are available in the general revenue fund to meet the appropriations from said fund during the 1967-69 biennium.

Section 7. (a) The following judicial officers shall be paid by the state the following salaries in the indicated fiscal year:

(b) Provided that no judge of a district court of appeal, while drawing the foregoing salary, shall receive from any county or municipality any supplemental salary which shall make his total salaries exceed \$26,000 in the 1967-68 fiscal year and \$28,000 in the 1968-69 fiscal year, and no judge of a circuit court shall, while drawing the foregoing salary, receive from any county or municipality any supplemental salary which shall make his total salaries exceed \$23,000 in the 1967-68 fiscal year and \$24,000 in the 1968-69 fiscal year, but should the state salary of a judge of a district court of appeal fall below \$26,000 in the 1967-68 fiscal year and \$28,000 in the 1968-69 fiscal year or the state salary of a judge of a circuit court fall below \$23,000 in the 1967-68 fiscal year and \$24,000 in the 1968-69 fiscal year, then any local or special law to the extent otherwise applicable shall be effective to provide a total compensation for such judges up to but not to exceed \$26,000 in the 1967-68 fiscal year and \$28,000 in the 1968-69 fiscal year for a judge of a district court of appeal and \$23,000 in the 1967-68 fiscal year and \$24,000 in the 1968-69 fiscal year for a judge of a circuit court; provided, however, any supplement now provided by local or special acts, to the extent it does not conflict with the maximum salary herein fixed, shall not be affected or repealed by this provision.

Section 8. (a) The salaries of the state attorneys to be paid by the state shall be \$15,000 each per annum; provided nothing herein shall be construed to reduce the salary of any state attorney; provided, further, any supplement now provided by local or special act shall not be affected or repealed by this provision.

(b) The salaries of the assistant state attorneys to be paid by the state shall be \$10,000 each per annum; provided nothing herein shall be construed to reduce the salary of any assistant state attorney; provided, further, any supplement now provided by local or special act shall not be affected or repealed by this provision.

Section 9. The salaries of the public defenders shall be as appropriated in items 764a through 812a and as provided in Section 282.051, F. S., provided nothing herein shall be construed to reduce the salary of any public defender.

Section 10. No state moneys appropriated in this act to the state board of health or to the state department of public welfare shall be used to pay travel expenses or out-of-state tuition of individuals receiving educational leaves, grants, or scholarships. Provided, however, out-of-state tuition may be paid in those instances in which authorized courses are not offered in the state university system.

Section 11. If the budget commission determines that the best interests of the state would be served by transferring amounts appropriated for the division of mental health or the state tuberculosis board to the state department of public welfare, then, notwithstanding the provisions of Section 282.061, F. S., any amounts appropriated to those agencies may be transferred to the state department of public welfare to pay for treatment of psychotic or tubercular patients.

Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 965.08 (3), F. S., any funds received by the institutions in the division of mental health for the treatment or care of patients may be deposited into a trust fund for the operation of the division of mental health with the approval of the budget commission.

Section 12. Where a state agency for which an appropriation is made in this act is jointly financed from the General Revenue Fund and from a Trust Fund, then, notwithstanding the provisions of Section 282.061, F. S., General Revenue Fund appropriations for salaries may be transferred to a Trust Fund appropriation for salaries for the purpose of processing centralized payrolls.

Section 13. Where any reorganization of state agencies has been authorized by the 1967 legislature and the necessary adjustments of appropriations have not been provided for in this act, then, notwithstanding the provisions of Section 282.061, F. S., the budget commission may approve the necessary transfers of appropriations to accomplish the purposes of such reorganization.

Section 14. The moneys appropriated in item 610a. of Section 1 of this act are contingent upon implementing legislation becoming law.

Section 15. It is the intent of the Legislature that the salary of each non-elected agency head for the fiscal years 1967-68 and 1968-69 shall be as recommended by the budget commission in its 1967 report to the legislature.

Section 16. Any section of this act, or any item herein contained, if found to be invalid or vetoed by the Governor without overriding action of the legislature shall in no way affect other sections or other items contained in this act.

Section 17. This act shall take effect on July 1, 1967.

EXPLANATION OF VOTE

By voting for SB 900, I feel that I have compounded fiscal irresponsibility that had its origin in the Governor's veto of the appropriations bill previously passed by the Senate.

I fully realize that the Governor has his job to do and that I have a job to do in representing the people of my district and in working to provide for the true needs of my constituents and the people of Florida.

I had agreed to support the Democratic majority in voting for the bill with the understanding that a supplemental bill providing for Florida's needs will be forthcoming.

The bill has many deficiencies: It does not provide adequately for education. It provides no help at all for relief from property taxes, and will force higher taxes at the county level. It virtually eliminates state support for the school lunch program and is tremendously lacking in providing for the needs of Florida agriculture.

My vote for this bill is predicated on the hope that the Governor will be man enough to realize that this is not a responsible appropriation of funds and that he will reject the bill with his veto so that we can proceed with re-establishing fiscal integrity in Florida government by passing a new bill.

SB 167—A bill to be entitled An act relating to chemical tests as to intoxication of persons operating a motor vehicle within this state; providing for implied consent; adding new sections 322.261 and 322.262, Florida Statutes; providing for suspension of drivers' licenses of persons refusing to submit to such tests; and providing an effective date.

and has receded from House amendment, has adopted Conference Committee amendment—

Conference Committee Amendment:

Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the following in lieu thereof:

Section 1. Chapter 322, Florida Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to read:

322.261 Suspension of license; chemical test for intoxication.—

(1)(a) Any person who shall accept the privilege extended by the laws of this state of operating a motor vehicle within this state shall by so operating such vehicle be deemed to have given his consent to submit to an approved chemical test of his breath, urine, or saliva for the purpose of determining the alcoholic content of his blood if lawfully arrested for any offense allegedly committed while the person was driving a motor vehicle under the influence of alcoholic beverages. The test shall be incidental to a lawful arrest and administered at the direction of a peace officer having reasonable cause to believe such person was driving a motor vehicle within this state while under the influence of alcoholic beverages. Such person shall be told that his failure to submit to such a chemical test will result in the suspension of his privilege to operate a motor vehicle for a period of six months.

(b) Any such person who is incapable of refusal by reason of unconsciousness or other mental or physical condition shall be deemed not to have withdrawn his consent to any such test. Any such person whose consent is implied as hereinabove provided and who, during the period within which a test prescribed herein can be reasonably administered, or who, being admitted to a hospital as a result of his involvement as a driver in a motor vehicle accident, is so incapacitated as to render impractical or impossible the administration of any of the aforesaid tests of breath, urine, or saliva, shall be deemed to have consented also to an approved blood test given as provided for herein and shall be deemed not to have withdrawn his consent therefor. Under the foregoing circumstances of this subsection, such tests, inclusive of said blood test, may be administered whether or not such person is told that his failure to submit to such blood test will result in the suspension of his privilege to operate a motor vehicle upon the public highways of this state.

(c) If any such person refuses the officer's request to submit to a chemical test herein provided, the department, upon receipt of the officer's sworn statement that he had reasonable cause to believe such person had been driving a motor vehicle within this state while under the influence of alcoholic beverages and that the person had refused to submit to the test after being requested by the officer, shall suspend his privilege to operate a motor vehicle for a period of six months. No such suspension shall become effective until ten days after

the giving of written notice thereof, as provided for in paragraph (d).

(d) The department shall immediately notify such person in writing of the action taken and of his right to petition for hearing as hereinafter provided and of his right to be represented at such hearing by legal counsel. Upon his petition in writing filed within ten (10) days from the date of receipt of such notice directed to the court having trial jurisdiction of the criminal offense for which he shall stand charged such person shall be afforded an opportunity for a hearing at a time to be set by the court which hearing date shall be within twenty (20) days of the filing of such petition with said court. For the purposes of this section, the question of whether such person lawfully refused to take a chemical test as provided for by this law and the issues determinative shall be:

(1) Whether the arresting peace officer had reasonable cause to believe the person had been driving a motor vehicle in this state while under the influence of alcoholic beverage;

(2) Whether the person was placed under lawful arrest;

(3) Whether he refused to submit to the test after being requested by a peace officer; and

(4) Whether, except for the person described in subparagraph (b) above, he had been told that his driving privilege would be suspended if he refused to submit to such test.

(e) A petition for a hearing provided in subsection 1 (d) filed by the affected person within ten (10) days of receiving notice of the department's action shall operate to stay the suspension of the department for the period provided for the said hearing. If the trial court fails to afford said hearing within the time herein prescribed, the suspension shall not take place until such time as the person has been granted such hearing. If within the said prescribed hearing period the person affected requests a continuance of the hearing to a date beyond the expiration of the said prescribed hearing period, the suspension shall become effective on the day immediately following the said prescribed period, or immediately upon receipt of the court's notice that said request for continuance has been granted, whichever is the later. In every event the court shall forthwith rule on the question herein prescribed.

(f) If such court determines upon such hearing that the suspension herein provided is according to law and should be sustained, such person's driving privileges shall forthwith be suspended by order of such court and his license shall forthwith be delivered to the court or to the department of public safety.

(g) Any person arrested for any offense allegedly committed while the person was driving a motor vehicle under the influence of alcoholic beverages may request the arresting officer to have a chemical test made of the arrested person's breath, blood, saliva, or urine for the purpose of determining the alcoholic content of such person's blood, and, if so requested, the arresting officer shall have the test performed.

(h) Warning of the consent provision of this section shall be printed above the signature line on each new or renewed driver's license issued after the effective date of this act.

(i) By applying for a driver's license and by accepting and using a driver's license, the person holding the driver's license shall be deemed to have expressed his consent to the provisions of this section.

(j) A nonresident or any other person driving in a status exempt from the requirements of the driver's license law shall by his act of driving in such exempt status be deemed to have expressed his consent to the provisions of this section.

(2) (a) The test determining the weight of alcohol in the defendant's blood shall be administered at the direction of the arresting officer in accordance with rules and regulations which shall have been adopted by the department. Such rules and regulations shall have been adopted after public hearing, and shall specify precisely the test or tests which are approved by said department for reliability of result and facility of administration and shall provide an approved method of administration which shall be followed in all tests given under this section.

(b) Only a physician, registered nurse, or duly licensed clinical laboratory technologist or clinical laboratory techni-

cian acting at the request of a peace officer may withdraw blood for the purpose of determining the alcoholic content therein. Such withdrawal of blood shall be performed only at a hospital, clinic, or other medical facility. This limitation shall not apply to the taking of breath, urine, or saliva specimens.

(c) The person tested may, at his own expense, have a physician, registered nurse, duly licensed clinical laboratory technologist or clinical laboratory technician or any other person of his own choosing administer a test, in addition to that administered at the direction of a peace officer, for the purpose of determining the amount of alcohol in his blood at the time alleged as shown by chemical analysis of his blood, breath, or urine. The failure or inability to obtain an additional test by a person shall not preclude the admissibility in evidence of the test taken at the direction of a peace officer.

(d) Upon the request of the person tested, full information concerning the test taken at the direction of the peace officer shall be made available to him or his attorney.

(e) No physician, registered nurse, or duly licensed clinical laboratory technologist or clinical laboratory technician shall incur any civil or criminal liability as a result of the proper administering of a blood test when requested in writing by a peace officer to administer such a test.

(f) If the test given under subsection (1) is a chemical test of urine, the person tested shall be given such privacy in the taking of the urine specimen as will insure the accuracy of the specimen and, at the same time, maintain the dignity of the individual involved.

Section 2. Chapter 322, Florida Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to read:

322.262 Presumption of intoxication; testing methods.—

(1) It is unlawful and punishable as provided in this chapter and in section 317.201, Florida Statutes, for any person who is under the influence of alcoholic beverages when affected to the extent that his normal faculties are impaired to drive or be in actual physical control of any motor vehicle within this state.

(2) Upon the trial of any civil or criminal action or proceeding arising out of acts alleged to have been committed by any person while driving or in actual physical control of a vehicle while under the influence of alcoholic beverages when affected to the extent that his normal faculties were impaired, the results of any test administered in accordance with this act shall be admissible into evidence where otherwise admissible, and the amount of alcohol in the person's blood at the time alleged as shown by chemical analysis of the person's blood, urine, breath, or other bodily substance shall give rise to the following presumptions:

(a) If there was at that time 0.05 per cent or less by weight of alcohol in the person's blood, it shall be presumed that the person was not under the influence of alcoholic beverages to the extent that his normal faculties were impaired.

(b) If there was at that time in excess of 0.05 per cent but less than 0.10 per cent by weight of alcohol in the person's blood, such fact shall not give rise to any presumption that the person was or was not under the influence of alcoholic beverages to the extent that his normal faculties were impaired, but such fact may be considered with other competent evidence in determining whether the person was under the influence of alcoholic beverages to the extent that his normal faculties were impaired.

(c) If there was at that time more than 0.10 per cent by weight of alcohol in the person's blood, it shall be prima facie evidence that the person was under the influence of alcoholic beverages to the extent that his normal faculties were impaired.

(d) Per cent by weight of alcohol in the blood shall be based upon milligrams of alcohol per one hundred cubic centimeters of blood.

(e) The foregoing provisions of this subsection shall not be construed as limiting the introduction of any other competent evidence bearing upon the question whether the person was under the influence of alcoholic beverages to the extent that his normal faculties were impaired.

(3) Chemical analyses of the person's blood, urine, breath, or other bodily substance to be considered valid under the provisions of this section shall have been performed according to methods approved by the state board of health and by an individual possessing a valid permit issued by the state board of health for this purpose. The state board of health is authorized to approve satisfactory techniques or methods, to ascertain the qualifications and competence of individuals to conduct such analyses, and to issue permits which shall be subject to termination or revocation at the discretion of the state board of health.

Section 3. Any person charged with driving while under the influence of alcoholic beverages to the extent that his normal faculties were impaired shall be entitled to trial by jury according to the Florida Rules of Criminal Procedure.

Section 4. The provisions of this act shall be severable, and if any of the provisions hereof shall be held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such determination shall not affect the constitutionality or validity of any of the remaining provisions of this act.

Section 5. This act shall take effect July 1, 1968.

Notice shall include a copy of the resolution, together with the time, date and place at which a public hearing will be held, giving the affected property owner or owners opportunity to present to the board of county commissioners his or their objection to the making effective of the said resolution. The public hearing shall be held not less than ten (10) days after receipt by the affected property owner or owners of the notice provided herein. At the public hearing the board of county commissioners shall determine whether the affected property is one or more of the hazards as set forth in said section 2, giving due consideration to all evidence presented in regard thereto. Should said board determine that the affected property is not a hazard, it shall rescind the resolution, or portion thereof pertaining to said property. Should said board find that the affected property is one or more of the hazards set forth in section 2, said resolution shall be made effective by a confirmation of said resolution by the board. Thereafter, demand shall be sent by said board, in writing, to the owner or owners of the affected property, requiring him or them to clear said property in accordance with the confirmed resolution, and that if demand be not complied with within fifteen (15) days from the date of receipt of such notice, said property will be cleared by the county and the costs thereof will constitute a lien against said property.
