INTRODUCTION

By Senator Weber—

SB 502—A bill to be entitled An act to protect policemen and other officials against false and irresponsible charges and proceedings, and to defend them at public expense; declaring public policy; providing for indemnification, hearing, and non-liability of agency under certain circumstances; and amending chapter 116, relating to powers and duties of officers.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "A".

By Senator Weber—

SB 503—A bill to be entitled An act to promote hunter safety; regulating the issuance of hunting licenses to persons under the age of eighteen (18) years; providing for giving instruction in the safe handling and use of firearms and bow and arrow to such persons; providing for adult responsibility; and fixing effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Water Conservation, Salt Water and Natural Resources.

By Senator Weber—

SB 504—A bill to be entitled An act to promote public and private defense, tourism, recreation, and public safety; providing for a safe public shooting range in each county, and adequate zoning; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Reorganization.

By Senator Weber—

SB 505—A bill to be entitled An act relating to defamation and to protect the civil rights of peace officers accused of "police brutality" and the rights of all persons accused of civil rights violations; declaring public policy for law and order; requiring written statement; providing discovery, penalty, and remedies; and amending chapter 836, Florida Statutes; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Anti-Crime and Judiciary "B".

By Senator Weber—

SB 506—A bill to be entitled An act amending chapter 552, Florida Statutes, to exclude supplies for sporting and target handloading from certain license procedures of the state treasurer; and providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "A".

By Senator Weber—

SB 507—A bill to be entitled An act to promote firearms safety and lawful use; amending chapter 790, Florida Statutes;

providing for the instruction of law-abiding residents of Florida in the safe and lawful use of firearms by law enforcement officers, and the use of public property; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "A".

By Senator Weber—

SB 508—A bill to be entitled An act to encourage citizen crime prevention and cooperation with the police; declaring public policy; requiring reports of weapons used to resist crime; and designating public records; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Anti-Crime and Judiciary "A".

By Senator Weber—

SB 509—A bill to be entitled An act to promote the careful use of weapons; and extending the definition of malicious mischief; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Anti-Crime and Judiciary "A".

By Senator Weber—

SB 510—A bill to be entitled An act to provide added penalties for certain armed crimes; providing for mandatory punishment, successive sentences, and mitigating circumstances; and protecting the civil rights of citizens in the lawful use of firearms; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Anti-Crime.

By Senators Henderson, Horne and Weissenborn—

SB 511—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the levy of ad valorem taxes; amending section 193.31, Florida Statutes, to require the minutes of county commissioners to designate taxes levied for each fund, together with rates certified to be levied for the use of the county and all taxing authorities in the county; requiring the tax assessor to designate and identify such rates of taxation on the tax roll; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Finance and Taxation.

By Senators Henderson, Horne and Weissenborn—

SB 512—A bill to be entitled An act relating to notice for payment of ad valorem taxes; amending section 193.45, Florida Statutes, to require that tax notices clearly designate and identify the rate of taxation to be levied for the county, special taxing district, board, agency or other taxing unit, together with the purpose for which such levy is made; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Finance and Taxation.

By Senators Henderson and Horne—

SB 513—A bill to be entitled An act relating to taxation procedure; amending section 237.18, Florida Statutes, to provide that the county school board shall certify budget to assessor rather than to board of county commissioners; and providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary "A"; and Finance and Taxation.

By Senators Saylor, Deeb, Wilson, Knopke, McClain, de la Parte and Young—

SB 514—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the division of mental retardation; authorizing the establishment of a regional community center for the mentally retarded in Pinellas county; stating the purposes of said center; providing for administration by the board of commissioners of state institutions; providing for transfer of persons between centers; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Mental Health, Retardation and State Institutions; and Appropriations.

By Senators Wilson, Deeb and Saylor—

SB 515—A bill to be entitled An act relating to firearms; amending section 790.15, Florida Statutes; prohibiting the discharge of firearms within three hundred (300) yards of any occupied premises without permission of occupants.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "A".

By Senators Griffin and Chiles—

SB 516—A bill to be entitled An act relating to game and fresh water fish commission; authorizing said commission to sell certain lands in Polk county to which it holds title; requiring the proceeds of sale of said lands to be deposited in the state game trust fund; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Game and Fish; and Judiciary "B".

By Senators Stone and Weissenborn—

SB 517—A bill to be entitled An act relating to compensation of judges of separate juvenile courts, providing for a uniform compensation based on population, fixing the compensation of judges of the separate juvenile courts of the state who are now or may be in the future prohibited by statute from practicing law, providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary "A" and Appropriations.

By Senators Slade, Young and Saylor—

SB 518—A bill to be entitled An act relating to intangible personal property taxation; providing for the repeal of Chapter 199, Florida Statutes, providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Retirement and Claims; Urban Affairs and Local Government; and Finance and Taxation.

By Senators Deeb, Young, Saylor and Wilson—

SCR 519—A concurrent resolution making a public record of the life and achievements of the late Charles Christopher Beauchamp II, a 17-year-old scholar-athlete at Boca Ciega High School, St. Petersburg, Florida.

Was read the first time in full and referred to the Committee on Apportionment, Resolutions and Memorials.

On motion by Senator Deeb, by two-thirds vote, SCR 519 was withdrawn from the Committee on Apportionment, Resolutions and Memorials and placed on the Calendar.

Unanimous consent was granted Senator Deeb to take up out of order—

SCR 519—A concurrent resolution making a public record of the life and achievements of the late Charles Christopher Beauchamp II, a 17-year-old scholar-athlete at Boca Ciega High School, St. Petersburg, Florida.

WHEREAS, Our Almighty God recognized Charles as a conscientious leader, deciding He needed him to help with the Great Work, tapped Charles on the shoulder, saying, "You're on My team," and

WHEREAS, Charles was Pinellas County's first athletic fatality in the county's public high school program, and

WHEREAS, Charles excelled in sports, being outstanding in football and baseball, having won five letters in less than three years and being captain of the football team in his senior year; outstanding to the extent that he was affectionately referred to as "Coach" by his coaches and teammates, and

WHEREAS, he also was an academic leader in the upper fifth of his class, thus enabling him to be selected for the National Honor Society, and

WHEREAS, not being satisfied with his scholastic and athletic achievements, Charles successfully pursued the musical arts, and

WHEREAS, even though Charles was very active in secular endeavors, he did not neglect his religious obligations, serving as a member of the Methodist Youth Fellowship Organization, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida, the House of Representatives Concurring:

That on behalf of the people of the State of Florida this legislature does pause to pay tribute to the memory of Charles Christopher Beauchamp II and does by this resolution express to his family its deep and earnest sense of regret for this great loss.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be spread upon the respective Journals and a copy sent to his family by the Secretary of State under the Great Seal of the State.

SB 520—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the control, regulation and prohibition of the pollution of the environment of this state; amending chapter 381 of the Florida Statutes by redesignating the state board of health as the board of health and environment; relating to the powers, duties and responsibilities of the board; expanding the membership of the board to nine; providing qualifications of the members; redesignating the state health officer as the commissioner of health and environment; establishing and assigning duties to a division of health and a division of environment control within the board; authorizing a deputy commissioner for health and a deputy commissioner for environmental control; providing for the classification of the air, water and land of this state for the purpose of pollution control; repealing chapter 403 of the Florida Statutes.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Health and Welfare; Governmental Reorganization; and Water Conservation, Salt Water and Natural Resources.

By Senators Thomas, Pope and Henderson—

SB 521—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the practice of nursing and nursing education; amending sections 464.071(3), 464.121(1) and (3), 464.151(1)(a), (b) and (d), Florida Statutes, providing for license fee increase for applicants; providing annual renewal of licenses; providing for relicensing fee increase for licensee who allows license to lapse; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Health and Welfare; and Finance and Taxation.

By Senators Thomas and Johnson—

SB 522—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the animal industry technical committee; amending subsections (1) and (2) of section 570.38, Florida Statutes; to provide two additional members for the animal industry technical committee; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Agriculture and Livestock.

By Senator Thomas—

SB 523—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public schools, minimum age; repealing chapter 65-398, Laws of Florida, amending section 232.01, Florida Statutes, which law will become effective July 1, 1972; fixing the minimum age for admission to the first grade; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education—Public Schools and Junior Colleges.

By Senators Thomas and Bafalis—

SB 524—A bill to be entitled An act to standardize and regulate the fiscal support of instruction and research in state universities in Florida by providing for equitable and standard fiscal support based on teaching productivity; setting maximum levels of enrollment which can receive fiscal support on any single campus for all institutions of higher learning; authorizing each university to establish and administer enrollment limitations; establishing maximum admission requirements for junior college transfer students; authorizing and requiring productivity ratios to justify resident instruction positions; providing limits for the percentage of professors and associate

professors in the total faculty of any state university; providing for the establishment of a common scale of faculty salaries; authorizing and requiring productivity ratios for research positions; providing for the creation of divisions of sponsored research at each university; authorizing and requiring productivity ratios to generate positions for academic counselors, professional services, nonresident instruction positions, academic administrators, graduate assistants, and student assistants; authorizing and requiring productivity ratios to generate funds for graduate fellowships, consultants and other personal services; providing for productivity ratios to develop operating expense and capital outlay funds; providing for special support of new programs; authorizing the board of regents to adopt, promulgate and repeal rules to implement the provisions and carry out the purposes of this act; providing for the repeal of all existing laws and parts of laws which conflict with this act; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Education—Higher Learning; Education—Public Schools and Junior Colleges; and Appropriations.

By Senator Friday—

SB 525—A bill to be entitled An act relating to rights of riparian owners; revising, amending and consolidating chapter 271, Florida Statutes, to eliminate inoperative and obsolete provisions by repealing sections 271.02 through 271.08; renumbering section 271.09 as section 271.011 and adding subsection (5) relating to ownership of lands above mean high water; renumbering section 271.10 as section 271.021 and repealing subsection (3) thereof, such subsection relating specifically to section 271.01, which was repealed by chapter 57-362; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Water Conservation, Salt Water and Natural Resources.

By Senator Friday—

SB 526—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the division of water resources and conservation of the state board of conservation; amending section 373.051, Florida Statutes, providing for payment for the plugging of artesian wells, providing for an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary "B"; and Water Conservation, Salt Water and Natural Resources.

By Senator Edwards—

SB 527—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the private use of the Diagnostic Disease Laboratory of the Department of Agriculture amending section 585.65, Florida Statutes; to provide that laboratory records of services extended to private individuals may be kept confidential.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Agriculture and Livestock.

By Senator Gibson—

SB 528—A bill to be entitled An act relating to game and fresh water fish; amending section 372.001(1), Florida Statutes, by redefining "resident" to include members of the armed forces stationed in Florida.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Game and Fish; and Appropriations.

By Senators Poston and Weissenborn—

SB 529—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the second gas tax; providing that the county general fund or road and bridge fund be reimbursed up to an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars from the second gas tax funds accruing to any county wherein the county engineer furnishes professional engineering on interstate, primary or secondary highway programs; requiring the county so compensated to employ registered professional engineers meeting the qualifications of chapter 471, Florida Statutes; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Public Roads and Highways; and Appropriations.

By Senators Hollahan, Fincher and Shevin—

SB 530—A bill to be entitled An act authorizing cities and towns in counties of over three hundred thousand (300,000)

population according to the last official census to impose, levy, and collect a municipal resort tax not to exceed two per cent (2%) of certain rentals, and sale of food and beverage; providing exemptions and limitations; providing for the collection of such tax; providing for the appointment of a resort tax authority to be appointed by the governing legislative body of such cities, fixing the number of its members, their qualifications, tenure of office, their power and authority in the supervision and expenditure of the funds collected from such tax; repealing all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this act; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Urban Affairs and Local Government; Governmental Reorganization; and Finance and Taxation.

By Senator Lane—

SB 531—A bill to be entitled An act relating to libraries; creating a legislative committee to appraise the quality of library service available throughout Florida, to review existing library laws and to recommend changes; providing effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Governmental Reorganization and Appropriations.

By Senators Gong and Weissenborn—

SB 532—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public defenders and assistant public defenders; amending sections 27.51, 27.54, 27.55 and 27.57, adding subsections (3) and (4) to section 27.53 and creating section 27.59, all Florida Statutes; prescribing additional duties of public defenders and their assistants; providing for appointment of a member of the Florida Bar to represent the accused in certain trials; providing for expenditures for offices in newly created circuit; requiring reports of public defenders be filed with the judicial administrative commission instead of presiding judge and the attorney general; providing access to prisoners; repealing section 27.56, Florida Statutes.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary "B" and Appropriations.

By Senator Poston—

SB 533—A bill to be entitled An act relating to mobile homes; establishing a uniform standards code for the installation of plumbing, heating and electrical systems in mobile homes; amending chapter 320, Florida statutes, by adding additional sections thereto; requiring compliance with the uniform standards code as a condition precedent to the issuance of a license by the director of the department of motor vehicles; requiring all mobile homes to bear a seal certifying compliance with the code; providing for reciprocity; providing for inspection; providing for fees; providing for enforcement and penalties; providing for severability; and providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Transportation and Safety; and Finance and Taxation.

By Senators Horne and Weissenborn—

SB 534—A bill to be entitled An act relating to eminent domain proceedings; amending subsection (3) of section 73.071, Florida Statutes; providing for damages to an established business; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "B".

By Senator Horne—

SB 535—A bill to be entitled An act relating to eminent domain proceedings; amending section 74.061, Florida Statutes, with respect to the allowance of interest; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "B".

By Senator Horne—

SB 536—A bill to be entitled An act relating to eminent domain proceedings; amending section 74.051, Florida Statutes, with respect to the amount of deposit to be made on an order of taking; repealing section 74.05, Florida Statutes; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "B".

By Senator Johnson—

SB 537—A bill to be entitled An act relating to unemployment compensation; amending section 443.15(1)(b), Florida Statutes, to provide a penalty for delinquent reports of \$10.00 for each 30 days or fraction thereof; and providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Insurance and Judiciary "B".

By Senator Johnson—

SB 538—A bill to be entitled An act relating to unemployment compensation; amending section 443.08(3)(f), Florida Statutes, to provide that "annual payroll" shall, for tax rate computation purposes, include only wages timely reported; and providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Insurance.

By Senators Johnson, Askew, Elrod and Broxson—

SB 539—A bill to be entitled An act relating to elections; amending section 104.381, Florida Statutes, by adding special elections to dates upon which there shall be no sale of alcoholic beverages.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "B".

By Senators Johnson, Elrod, Gong, Bafalis, Griffin, Broxson, Plante and Reuter—

SB 540—A bill to be entitled An act to amend section 200.08(1), Florida Statutes, by changing the date for filing of returns for tangible personal property taxes; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Finance and Taxation.

By Senators Johnson and Horne—

SB 541—A bill to be entitled An act relating to unemployment compensation; amending section 443.08(3)(g), Florida Statutes, to provide for automatic transfer of employment records for experience rating purposes in total successions; and providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Insurance.

By Senators Griffin, Edwards, Poston, Stone and Barrow—

SB 542—A bill to be entitled An act increasing the present rate of sales, use and other privilege taxes so as to provide funds for the reduction of ad valorem taxes levied for county, school and district purposes; amending Sections 212.03(1), (3); 212.04(1); the introductory paragraph of Section 212.05 and subsections (1), (2), (3), and (4) thereof; 212.06(1); 212.08(3)(a), (b), and (c) and 212.12(1), Florida Statutes, relating to sales, use and other privilege taxes so as to accomplish the above purposes; providing for the distribution and appropriation of funds collected thereunder to the General Revenue Fund and the several counties; and for the procedure to be followed in reducing county ad valorem taxes and budgets; providing duties of the State Revenue Commission, Budget Commissions and Boards, the Treasurer, Comptroller and other state and county officers and departments and agencies thereof; and providing an effective date of July 1, 1967.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Urban Affairs and Local Government; and Finance and Taxation.

SB 543—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Florida development commission, state planning; amending sections 288.01 and 288.05, Florida Statutes; amending chapter 288, Florida Statutes, by adding new sections 288.051 through 288.058; establishing a division of state planning; providing for the powers, duties and functions of the division; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Governmental Reorganization; and Finance and Taxation.

By Senators Plante and McClain—

SB 544—A bill to be entitled An act relating to workmen's compensation; amending section 440.34(1), Florida Statutes; providing a formula for attorneys' fees in cases settled by joint petition; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Insurance.

By Senators Plante and McClain—

SB 545—A bill to be entitled An act relating to workmen's compensation; amending section 440.25(3)(c), Florida Statutes; prescribing the contents of compensation orders; and providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "B".

By Senators Plante and McClain—

SB 546—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Caldwell Building in Tallahassee, Florida; authorizing the Florida Industrial Commission to use special administration trust funds to repay monies loaned by the Internal Improvement Fund as part of the cost of constructing an addition to the Caldwell Building; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary "B" and Appropriations.

By Senators Horne and Weissenborn—

SB 547—A bill to be entitled An act relating to milk and milk products; repealing sections 502.01, 502.011, 502.02—502.35, Florida Statutes; revising and amending chapter 502, Florida Statutes; providing definitions; permits; labeling; inspection of dairy farms and milk plants; examination of milk and milk products; standards for milk and milk products; building, equipment and sanitary standards for the production, processing and packaging of milk and milk products; animal health; prohibiting sale of filled milk; regulating the sale of imitation milk; providing purpose; rules; penalties and injunction; and effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Agriculture and Livestock; Health and Welfare; and Judiciary "B".

SB 548—A bill to be entitled An act relating to education; creating section 231.60, Florida Statutes, recognizing the right of professional employees to meet, confer, negotiate and reach agreements with boards of public instruction; providing required negotiations for professional employees under certain conditions relative to salaries and other terms of professional employment; providing for a board of review where serious disagreements arise; providing for the protection of the legislative authority vested in boards of public instruction; amending section 230.22(1), Florida Statutes, deleting provision authorizing county boards of public instruction to negotiate with members of teaching profession relating to policy matters; and compensation and providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Education—Public Schools and Junior Colleges; mittee on Judiciary "A".

SB 549—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the mechanics' lien law; amending sections 84.022 and 84.051, Florida Statutes; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary "A".

WHEREAS, the constitutional convention of 1787 adopted the electoral college as a means to facilitate the election of the president of the United States in an era of primitive education, transportation and communication and to designate intelligent citizens acting as free agents who would then independently select the chief executive, and

WHEREAS, the convention adopted this system prior to the development of political parties, which by their nature and practical function render the electoral college system outdated and unnecessary, and

WHEREAS, the present electoral college system assigns all presidential electors on a "winner-take-all" basis to the party in each state which receives a plurality of votes, thus depriving the voters of any other party of any voice whatsoever in the selection of the president, and

WHEREAS, the present electoral system makes it possible for the candidate who receives a majority of the popular vote of the people to fail to be elected chief executive, and

WHEREAS, the present system artificially and unnecessarily removes the people from the direct selection of their chief executive and thus frustrates their true wishes, and

WHEREAS, the electoral college system tends to discourage presidential candidates from campaigning in many states because of the "all-or-nothing" method of tabulating electoral college votes, thus giving the desires and needs of residents in the smaller states less attention proportionately in national politics than the few large states, and

WHEREAS, the present system is archaic in the context of the founding fathers' original intent due to the development of modern transportation and communication techniques, and a more knowledgeable and literate society, and

WHEREAS, the United States supreme court would not consider the case, *Delaware v. New York*, to apply the "one-man-one-vote" interpretation to the electoral college and thus insure the same protection under the law as provided voters in the court's previous decisions, and

WHEREAS, the legislature of the state of Florida expressing the sentiments of its constituents, is vitally concerned with the inequities of the present electoral college, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

That the legislature of the state of Florida publicly acknowledge the anachronistic and inequitable nature of the electoral college, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said legislature hereby petitions the congress of the United States, through the duly elected senators and representatives of this state, that this anachronism should be given expedient and appropriate congressional review towards the end of alleviating the aforementioned inequities of the electoral college by providing for the election of the president by a direct vote of the people, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that congress following deliberate and exhaustive public hearings be requested to act upon the results of these hearings towards the formulation of a constitutional amendment which would provide the best method of electing directly the chief executive of the United States, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this amendment then be submitted at the earliest possible date to the various states for ratification as an amendment to the constitution of the United States upon the approval of three-fourths of the states.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be dispatched to the president of the United States, to the president of the United States senate, to the speaker of the United States house of representatives and to each member of the Florida delegation to the United States congress.

(2)(a) The maximum speed limits for automobiles and other vehicles equipped with pneumatic tires and designed for carrying passengers, on all highways except those which are part of the national system of interstate highways, shall be:

1. Thirty miles per hour in business or residence districts.
2. Sixty-five miles per hour during the daytime at other locations on the highway.
3. Fifty-five miles per hour during the nighttime at other locations on the highway.
4. On highways having not less than four traffic lanes, divided by a median strip of not less than twenty feet wide, not in business or residence districts, sixty-five miles per hour during the daytime, and sixty miles per hour during the nighttime.

(b) The maximum speed limit for all other vehicles on all highways except those which are part of the national system of interstate highways, shall be:

1. Thirty miles per hour in business or residence districts.
2. Sixty miles per hour from one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset.
3. Fifty miles per hour during the nighttime at other locations on the highway.
4. On highways having not less than four traffic lanes, divided by a median strip not less than twenty feet wide, not in business or residence districts, sixty miles per hour during the daytime and fifty miles per hour during the nighttime.
