Senator Horne presented the following point of inquiry:

Mr. President:

Assuming that a subcommittee reports a bill unfavorably to its parent standing committee, state the parliamentary law responding to the following points:

A. What is the posture of the bill before such standing committee?

B. What motion or motions are available to members of a standing committee which might present such a measure for consideration by it?

Will a motion to reconsider be in order?

C. Should the subcommittee file its report directly with the Secretary of the Senate?

The President responded with the following answers to point of inquiry:

A. Rule 2.14, in providing the alternative available to a standing subcommittee in reporting to its parent standing committee, clearly self-executes a bill to the table from the moment the standing committee considers the unfavorable report of such subcommittee. No action on the part of the standing committee is necessary to preclude consideration of the measure thus laid upon the table.

B. The motion available to a member of a standing committee receiving an unfavorable report from its standing subcommittee is stated as follows: "Mr. Chairman, I move that SB___ be considered, the unfavorable report of the subcommittee to the contrary notwithstanding." Rule 2.14 provides for this motion and that it requires a two-thirds vote of the members present for its adoption. A motion to reconsider is not in order for its very nature and definition presuppose a prior consideration by the identical forum or body. The measure having never been considered by the standing committee, cannot be reconsidered.

C. A standing subcommittee never communicates with or reports directly to the Senate. Rule 2.14 establishes the duty of a standing subcommittee to report "all measures referred to them directly to the parent standing committee." The substance of the reports required of a standing subcommittee equips the standing committee to report directly to the Senate as required by Rule 2.12.

SB 625—A bill to be entitled An act relating to pari-mutuel plants; providing that the racing commission may grant an additional day of pari-mutuel operation to any pari-mutuel plant located in any county in the state having a population of not less than fifty-four thousand, nine hundred (54,900) nor more than fifty-six thousand (56,000) according to the latest official decennial census, authorizing a charity day for the Valencia Junior College, one (1) additional day for a charity day for the benefit of Rollins College, and one (1) additional day for the benefit of Florida Technological University; providing an effective date.

SB 626—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the municipal police officers' retirement trust fund; amending subsection (1) of section 185.07, Florida Statutes; amending subsections (1) and (2) of section 185.08, Florida Statutes, to increase from one per cent to two per cent the tax which may be imposed by municipalities upon casualty insurance companies, casualty insurance associations, or other casualty insurers; providing an effective date.

cent from one per cent to one and twenty hundredths per cent; amending subsection (5) of section 175.191, Florida Statutes, to increase computation formula for retirement income benefits for firemen who retire because of disability from one and sixty-seven hundredths per cent to two per cent per year and to increase such formula for those contributing less than three per cent from one per cent to one and twenty hundredths per cent; providing an effective date.

SB 628—A bill to be entitled An act authorizing the issuance and sale by any county, municipality, special district, or other local governmental body of revenue bonds to finance or refinance the cost of capital projects for industrial or manufacturing plants; providing that such revenue bonds shall be payable solely from revenue derived from the sale, operation, or lease of the projects; providing for the terms, security, and payment of such bonds; vesting powers in such local governmental bodies respecting such projects; exempting from taxation certain property, income, and bonds of such local governmental bodies; providing an effective date.

SB 635—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the method of qualifying as county depositories for the deposit of funds of county commissioners and other public bodies, officers and boards; amending subsection (1) of section 136.02, Florida Statutes; designating the various boards, officials and other public bodies whose funds will be secured by the deposit of security in connection with such qualification; providing for pro rata deposits among qualified county depositories and providing procedures for deposits in case no bank within a county qualifies as a county depository; defining the expression "pro rata share of the deposits"; providing for revocation of certificates of qualification of county depositories; specifying special procedures for the deposit of funds of boards of public instruction in counties in which the number of qualified depositories exceeds thirty-two; and providing an effective date.

SB 637—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Uniform Principal and Income Law; specifying methods of valuing bonds and other obligations for the payment of money comprising any part of the principal and designating the impact of loss or gain realized thereon; amending section 690.07, Florida Statutes; defining the increment in value of discount bonds to be income and providing for the distribution thereof; and providing an effective date.

SB 638—A bill to be entitled An act relating to Florida State Library; amending sections 257.04(1) and (2), 257.06, 257.16, 257.17, 257.22, and 257.23, Florida Statutes, specifying the type of publications to be deposited and maintained in the library and the various libraries and agencies to receive assistance from said libraries; requiring an annual report by said library to the governor; changing the date for the submission of financial reports by library units; prescribing county eligibility requirement for obtaining operating grants; changing date for submission of certification by said state board of amounts to be allocated to various counties; prescribing the requirements of applications by counties for grants; repealing sections 257.18 and 257.19, Florida Statutes, relating to equalization and establishment grants; providing an effective date.

SB 639—A bill to be entitled An act relating to county free public libraries; amending sections 150.01, 150.03, 150.06, 150.071, and 150.08, Florida Statutes; requiring the establishment, maintenance, and operation of free public libraries in the several counties of Florida by boards of county commissioners; providing for the governance and administration of such libraries; requiring the appointment of a county library board; limiting the authority of county commissioners to contract for library services to contracts with municipalities and other counties; placing the entire responsibility for conducting county library financial transactions on the county commissioners;

repealing section 150.04, Florida Statutes, relating to the organization and employees of library board; providing an effective date.

SB 640—A bill to be entitled An act relating to depositories of public moneys and the security required for deposits of public moneys and for the performance of duties as financial agents; amending subsection (2) of section 659.24, Florida Statutes, to provide that security for deposits of public funds of every kind of the state and any political subdivision or municipality or commission or board or body shall not be required to the extent the same are insured by federal deposit insurance; amending said section 659.24, Florida Statutes, by adding thereto a new subsection (3) defining the securities or other collateral acceptable as satisfactory security for the deposit of public funds and the performance of duties as financial agents; and providing an effective date.

SB 641—A bill to be entitled An act removing the disabilities of nonage of minors who are between the ages of sixteen years and twenty-one years for the purpose of borrowing money for their own higher educational purposes; authorizing any person between said ages to make and execute promissory notes and other instruments necessary for borrowing money for his own higher educational purposes; causing promissory notes and other instruments entered into pursuant to the provisions of this act to have the same force and effect as though they were the obligations of persons not minors; limiting the rate of interest on any such obligation; amending section 743.05, Florida Statutes, to change the maximum interest rate on such obligations; and providing an effective date.

SB 642—A bill to be entitled An act relating to investment of the funds of industrial savings banks; amending paragraph (f) of subsection (2) of section 656.24, Florida Statutes, to remove the limitation on investment of the funds of industrial savings banks in federal intermediate credit bank consolidated trust debentures, federal home loan bank consolidated notes, central bank for cooperatives, and federal land bank bonds; and providing an effective date.

SB 643—A bill to be entitled An act requiring that insurance proceeds shall inure exclusively to the benefit of the beneficiaries designated in the policy and that the proceeds shall be exempt from the claims of creditors of the insured unless otherwise provided in the policy or a valid assignment thereof; providing for the disposition of insurance proceeds when payable to the estate of or to the insured, his executors, administrators, or assigns; providing that payments as directed in this act shall discharge the insurer from further liability under the policy; and providing an effective date.

SB 644—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the municipal police officers' retirement trust fund; amending subsection (2) of section 185.16, Florida Statutes, to increase pension benefits for normal retirement from one and sixty-seven hundredths per cent per year to two per cent per year; amending subsection (5) of section 185.18, Florida Statutes, to increase pension benefits

for disability retirement from one per cent per year to one and twenty hundredths per cent per year; providing an effective date.

In Section 4, line 18, page 5, insert the following after "ordered.": Provided however, that when any vehicle is inspected subsequent to the time required by this chapter, an additional delinquent fee of one dollar (\$1.00) shall be paid. The delinquent fee shall be forwarded to the Department of Public Safety. Delinquent fees collected in counties operating inspection stations pursuant to section 325.27 shall be credited against the 40c remittance required herein. All other delinquent fees shall be deposited in the general revenue fund.

Senator Pope also offered the following amendment which failed:

Strike all of Section 5 and insert the following: Section 5. Section 325.28, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

325.28 Inspection stickers of other states and carriers certificated by the Interstate Commerce Commission or Florida Public Service Commission. Every law enforcement officer of this state shall recognize any current official inspection sticker affixed to any motor vehicle from another state. Vehicles operating under Certificate of the Interstate Commerce Commission or Florida Public Service Commission subject to United States Department of Transportation safety regulations are exempt from displaying a Florida official inspection sticker; provided they have attached or display valid certificate number issued by the Interstate Commerce Commission or Florida Public Service Commission.

Section 6. This act shall be effective immediately upon becoming a law.

Title, line 7, page 1, strike "and" and after "325.24(1)," insert and 325.28,

Senators Young and Bafalis offered the following amendment which was moved by Senator Young:

In Section 5, line 11, page 6, add: Section 5. Section 325.32 Florida Statutes is repealed.
