SJR 841—A joint resolution proposing a revision of Article V of the State Constitution relating to the judicial department of the government.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments and Revision.

By Senator Weissenborn—

SB 842—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the regulation of utilities; repealing Section 30 of Article XVI of the Constitution of 1885, as amended, which was made statutory law by the operation of Section 10 of Article XII of the Constitution as amended in 1968; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Transportation and Judiciary.

By Senator Weissenborn—

SB 843—A bill to be entitled An act relating to migrant labor camps; amending Chapter 381, Florida Statutes, by adding section 381.483; providing standards for migrant labor camp living quarters; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Health, Welfare, and Institutions and Judiciary.

By Senator Weissenborn—

SB 844—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the state board of health and the county boards of health; amending section 381.422, 381.432, 381.442, 381.452, 381.462, 381.472, and 381.482, Florida Statutes, amending chapter 381, Florida Statutes; by adding section 381.473 and 381.474; outlining responsibility of the state board of health and county health units in licensing migrant labor camps; providing for the enforcement of regulations; prohibiting the granting of vari-

ances; providing for review of regulations; providing for review of enforcement; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Health, Welfare, and Institutions and Judiciary.

By Senator Gong—

SJR 845—A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Section 6 of Article IV of the State Constitution by adding subsection (c) relating to executive departments; providing whenever membership of any state agency is designed to afford geographic representation through use of districts, such districts shall be as nearly equal in population according to the latest official decennial census as practicable.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments and Revision.

By Senator Horne—

SB 846—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the state board of osteopathic medical examiners; amending sections 459.06(6) and (8), 459.14(1)(a) and (i), the introductory paragraph of 459.18, 459.19(2)(a) and (3)(b), and 459.20(2)(b), all Florida Statutes; increasing educational requirements of applicants; increasing examination and license fees and prohibiting return to applicant; broadening definition of "felony"; providing for determination of mental or physical fitness of licensed practitioners by the board; increasing penalties for certain violations and providing for imprisonment; increasing refresher training time; allowing increase of license renewal fee; increasing reinstatement fee; amending chapter 459, Florida Statutes, by adding paragraphs (l) and (m) to subsection (1) of section 459.14, and adding subsection (7) to section 459.19, providing for suspension on basis of immoral conduct and for temporary suspension of licensee who is institutionalized; excusing refresher training and renewal fees in certain cases; repealing section 459.06(7), Florida Statutes, and chapter 67-497, Laws of Florida; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Health, Welfare, and Institutions and Ways and Means.

SB 847—A bill to be entitled An act amending section 27.06, Florida Statutes, relating to habeas corpus and preliminary hearings and to the duties of state attorneys with respect thereto; and prescribing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Horne—

SB 848—A bill to be entitled An act providing that in a prosecution for the unlawful possession of a narcotic drug, as defined in chapter 398, Florida Statutes, or of a barbiturate, central nervous system stimulant or hallucinogenic drug, as defined in chapter 404, Florida Statutes, proof of possession thereof by the defendant shall be prima facie evidence that he knew that he had such possession and that he knew the nature of the narcotic drug, barbiturate, central nervous system stimulant or hallucinogenic drug so possessed and knew that in fact it was a narcotic drug, barbiturate, central nervous system stimulant or hallucinogenic drug, as the case may be; and prescribing an effective date.

SB 849—A bill to be entitled An act relating to and defining aggravated battery; providing criminal penalties therefor; and prescribing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Horne—

SB 850—A bill to be entitled An act repealing sections 317.121, 317.131, 317.141, 317.151, 317.161, 317.171, 317.181, and 317.191, Florida Statutes, relating to and provid-

ing for reports of vehicular accidents, and requiring their exclusion from evidence in civil and criminal cases; and prescribing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Horne—

SB 851—A bill to be entitled An act authorizing the state to appeal from an order discharging a defendant from the crime charged against him or from a ruling that he cannot be further prosecuted for such crime, when such order or ruling is based upon the theory that the defendant has been denied his constitutional right to a speedy trial; and prescribing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Horne—

SB 852—A bill to be entitled An act relating to state attorneys and assistant state attorneys; authorizing each county to expend moneys for additional salaries for the state attorney and assistant state attorneys of the judicial circuit in which it is situated, and for the salaries and expenses of their investigators, secretaries and other clerical help, and for other necessary expenses of equipping, maintaining and operating their offices; providing that all such expenditures shall be considered to be for a valid public purpose; and prescribing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary and Ways and Means.

By Senator Horne—

SB 853—A bill to be entitled An act amending section 932.05, Florida Statutes, relating to limitations upon the time for the commencement of criminal prosecutions, so as to provide that, save as otherwise provided in said section, prosecutions for felonies not punishable with death shall be commenced within five (5) years after the same shall have been committed; and prescribing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Horne—

SB 854—A bill to be entitled An act for the protection of state prisoners who have testified in behalf of the state against other state prisoners; requiring prosecuting attorneys and employees of the Division of Corrections to notify the Director of the Division of Corrections in prescribed instances that a state prisoner has so testified against another state prisoner, and requiring said Director to thereafter cause such prisoners to be kept confined in separate penal institutions; and prescribing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Horne—

SB 855—A bill to be entitled An act relating to witnesses, compulsory self-incrimination and immunity; amending section 932.29, Florida Statutes, so as to authorize requiring a witness to testify or produce documentary evidence against himself with respect to any felony and immunizing him from prosecution when he does so; making it clear that said statute shall not apply unless the witness gives such incriminating testimony or produces such incriminating documents upon the demand of a prosecuting attorney with jurisdiction to prosecute for the felony under inquiry; and prescribing an effective date.

SB 856—A bill to be entitled An act relating to state parks; providing an appropriation for St. Joseph state park; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

SB 857—A bill to be entitled An act repealing chapter 67-816, Laws of Florida; repealing salary supplements; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

SB 858—A bill to be entitled An act relating to racing and jai alai operations; limiting the number of charity days; providing an effective date.

SB 859—A bill to be entitled An act relating to dog racing; amending subsection (1) of section 550.083, Florida Statutes, by providing that dog racing meetings may be held during the year rather than the calendar year; providing an effective date.

SB 861—A bill to be entitled An act relating to game and fresh water fish; repealing section 372.57(4)(a) and (18), Florida Statutes, removing license exemption for resident of the state fishing with poles in county of his residence and persons fishing in fish management area.

SB 862—A bill to be entitled An act relating to state textbook committees; amending section 233.07(1), Florida Statutes, prescribing eligibility requirements for members; amending section 233.09(4), Florida Statutes, defining the duties of committees in the evaluation of textbooks; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Senator Myers—

SB 863—A bill to be entitled An act relating to taxation; providing for legislative auditor to make studies of level of assessment in all counties; providing for certification of results; providing for reliance on these studies by board of education and state railroad assessment officer; providing for consultation with assessors prior to certification; providing for method of challenging certification; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

By Senator Karl—

SB 864—A bill to be entitled An act relating to scholarships; amending section 239.44, Florida Statutes, providing deferred repayment of a teacher loan for peace corps service; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Senators Sayler and Horne—

SB 865—A bill to be entitled An act relating to insurance; amending section 624.0227, Florida Statutes, by designating subsection (1) as (1)(a) and adding paragraph (b) to provide that applications for individual life insurance policies must be taken in a face to face interview; providing certain exceptions; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Insurance.

SB 866—A bill to be entitled An act relating to voting machine ballots; amending section 101.27(1), Florida Statutes; prescribing the order of items on voting machine ballot; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senators Friday and Thomas—

SB 867—A bill to be entitled An act relating to circuit courts and judges, state attorneys and assistant state attorneys; amending sections 26.13 and 26.33, F. S.; adding sections 26.165 and 26.365, F. S.; removing from the twelfth judicial circuit Charlotte, Collier, Glades, Hendry and Lee Counties and creating a new judicial circuit consisting of said counties; providing for terms of court for the twelfth judicial circuit and the new judicial circuit; amending section 27.19, F. S.; providing for assistant state attorneys and public defenders; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary and Ways and Means.

SB 868—A bill to be entitled An act relating to motorboats, title certificates; amending chapter 371, Florida Statutes, by adding section 371.791, requiring dealers selling boats in the state to furnish a manufacturer's certificate of origin to the purchaser; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Natural Resources and Conservation.

By Senator Friday—

SB 869—A bill to be entitled An act relating to motorboats, title certificates; amending chapter 371, Florida Statutes, by adding section 371.792, designating tax collectors as agents for the board of conservation in the issuance of certificates of title; providing a service charge; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Natural Resources and Conservation.

By Senator Friday—

SB 870—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the regulation of motorboats; amending section 371.76, Florida Statutes, by adding subsection (5), providing for automatic transfer of registration certificate when certificate of title is transferred; providing for transfer fee; repealing section 371.051(6), Florida Statutes; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Natural Resources and Conservation and Ways and Means.

By Senator Haverfield—

SB 871—A bill to be entitled An act relating to schools, certification to teach in public school system; amending section 231.17(1)(g), Florida Statutes; providing for the eligibility of handicapped persons unless a condition of mind or body interferes with teaching capability; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Senator Reuter—

SB 872—A bill to be entitled An act relating to conservation; requiring a permit to use blue crab traps requiring the permit

number to be displayed on any can, drum and similar device used for taking or attempting to take blue crabs; providing that the application for the permit shall be as prescribed by the director; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Natural Resources and Conservation.

By Senators McClain, Saunders and Weissenborn—

SB 873—A bill to be entitled An act relating to education, amending chapter 236, Florida Statutes, by adding section 236.75, Florida Statutes; providing a method for distribution of state funds for public school lunches for needy students; providing an appropriation; providing an effective date.

Was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Education and Ways and Means.

By Senators Poston and Beaufort—

SB 874—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the preparation, adoption, execution and amendment of the budget of the state road department; amending section 334.21, Florida statutes; providing an effective date.

SB 875—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the state road department; amending section 335.04(1), F. S., to require the state road department to reclassify all state roads into not more than nine categories; providing an effective date.

SB 876—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the state road department, expenditures in excess of sums budgeted; amending paragraph 334.21 (8)(a), F. S.; providing for legislative approval of such expenditures; providing an effective date.

SB 877—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the state road department, amending subsection 337.25(1), F. S., to provide for a two year advance lead time on the purchase of rights of way for proposed primary highways; providing an effective date.

SB 878—A bill to be entitled An act amending Chapter 711, Florida Statutes, Condominium Act; amending Section 711.13 by providing a time limitation on maintenance contracts and control of the association; amending Section 711.19 concerning homestead exemption of condominiums; adding a section requiring full disclosure prior to the sale of condominiums; adding a section concerning advance deposits on condominiums; providing an effective date.

I am directed to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives has adopted—

By the Committee on Higher Education—

HCR 1289—A concurrent resolution commending the students of Florida State University.

WHEREAS, historic Westcott Building at Florida State University housing key administrative offices, the registrar and admission offices, and other important facilities of the university was substantially damaged by fire early on the evening of April 27, 1969, and

WHEREAS, several hundred students spontaneously responded to the emergency and at the risk of personal injury helped to man fire hoses and to carry out valuable records and equipment from the blazing building, and

WHEREAS, as a result of their heroic efforts valuable art treasures, irreplaceable records and expensive equipment in the building were preserved, and

WHEREAS, by their actions the students saved the University and the State of Florida thousands of dollars and untold efforts in replacing records dating back more than fifty years, and

WHEREAS, by their action these concerned students set an example for responsible behavior which has brought state and national commendation in contrast to irresponsible actions on campuses in other states, NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED that the House of Representatives of the State of Florida, the Senate concurring:

That the Legislature expresses its pride in the student body of Florida State University and commend these students for their actions which were carried out in the highest tradition of that institution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the president of Florida State University, the Florida Board of Regents, and the State Board of Education of the State of Florida.

—and requests the concurrence of the Senate therein.
