

JOURNAL OF THE FLORIDA SENATE

Monday, April 23, 1973

The Senate was called to order by the President Pro Tempore for the purpose of conducting the order of business of introduction and reference of resolutions, memorials, bills and joint resolutions pursuant to Rule 4.3.

INTRODUCTION

By Senator Horne—

SR 751—A resolution abolishing the senate select committee, created by Senate Resolution No. 564, 1972, to study flood insurance.

—was read the first time and referred to the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

By Senator Saunders—

SB 752—A bill to be entitled An act relating to securities in which specified funds may be invested; amending §§18.112, 518.01(5), and 625.313(7), Florida Statutes, to include notes, bonds, debentures or similar obligations, consolidated or otherwise, issued by farm credit institutions pursuant to the farm credit act of 1971, Public Law 92-181, as authorized securities for the deposit of public funds, the investment of fiduciary funds, and the investment of insurance funds; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

By Senator Henderson—

SB 753—A bill to be entitled An act relating to spearfishing; amending §370.172, Florida Statutes; defining "spearfishing"; determining areas where spearfishing may be permitted or prohibited; providing other limitations; providing a penalty; repealing and prohibiting special laws or general laws of local application insofar as they apply to spearfishing in salt waters and saltwater tributaries; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Natural Resources and Conservation.

By Senator Sykes—

SB 754—A bill to be entitled An act relating to outdoor advertising; amending §479.07(1), (3) and (4), Florida Statutes; providing for permanent permit tags; providing for annual payment of fees; providing for cancellation of permits; establishing size and type of permanent tags; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Consumer Affairs.

By Senator Firestone—

SB 755—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Florida retirement system; amending §§121.071(1) and 121.091(1)(a), Florida Statutes; providing an increase in contributions and the retirement benefit for special risk members; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

By Senator Firestone—

SCR 756—A concurrent resolution recognizing the manual on protocol for state occasions compiled by the Secretary of State.

—was read the first time and referred to the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

By Senator Lewis—

SB 757—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the division of Florida land sales, amending §478.041 (5), Florida Statutes, adding paragraph (d) thereto, to provide a restriction on the deposit of escrow accounts; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Consumer Affairs.

By Senator Wilson—

SB 758—A bill to be entitled An act relating to fire prevention and safety; amending §235.06(2), Florida Statutes, 1972 Supplement, to except fire safety regulations from regulations to be prescribed by the state board of education; amending §633.01, Florida Statutes, adding subsection (8) to add school fire safety regulations to provisions to be enforced by the state fire marshal; amending §633.05, Florida Statutes, adding subsection (8), providing that the state fire marshal promulgate rules and regulations to provide fire safety standards for all public and private schools in the state; amending §633.081, Florida Statutes, providing that the state fire marshal make annual inspections of all school buildings in the state and requiring that deficiencies be corrected within the time limit specified; providing an effective date.

SB 759—A bill to be entitled An act relating to district school boards; amending §145.041(9) and (10), Florida Statutes, 1971; increasing the salaries of school board members in certain larger counties; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Education and Ways and Means.

By Senator Gordon—

SB 760—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public schools; repealing §232.26(2), Florida Statutes, 1972 Supplement, which requires the automatic expulsion of any pupil who is adjudicated guilty of a felony for the unlawful possession or sale of any narcotic drug, central nervous system stimulant, hallucinogenic drug or barbiturate; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 761—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the fitting and selling of hearing aids; amending section 468.133, Florida Statutes, transferring review of orders from the circuit courts to the district courts of appeal; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 762—A bill to be entitled An act relating to department of health and rehabilitative services, division of health; amending section 500.351, Florida Statutes, transferring fees paid to the division of health to the state treasurer for deposit in the general revenue fund; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 763—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public health; amending section 381.031 (1)(g) 3, Florida Statutes, providing for the duties and powers of the division of health to include general protection and safety of the public health; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

By Senator Peterson—

SB 764—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Florida retirement system; amending §121.021(24), Florida Statutes, 1972 Supplement, to change the definition of "average final compensation"; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

By Senator Peterson—

SB 765—A bill to be entitled An act relating to laundries and dry cleaners; amending §715.03, Florida Statutes, to provide for disposition of articles abandoned in said establishments after a ninety day period; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Peterson—

SB 766—A bill to be entitled An act relating to community colleges; amending §230.760, Florida Statutes, 1972 Supplement; deleting requirement for certification of persons employed in an administrative or instructional position; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Senator Pettigrew—

SB 767—A bill to be entitled AN ACT relating to the department of community affairs; amending subsection (2) of section 20.18, Florida statutes to provide for the designation of a division of human development and the redesignation of the division of technical assistance as the division of local government services; transferring the division of economic opportunity and the division of migrant labor to the division of human development; transferring the division of training and professional development to the division of local government services; amending subsection (4)(a) of section 20.18 to include the director of the division of local government services as a member of the intergovernmental coordinating council on community services; providing a severability clause; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

By Senator Gordon—

SB 768—A bill to be entitled An act relating to purchasing; amending subsections (1) and (3) of section 287.062, Florida Statutes, providing for competitive bids; providing for exceptions; and providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 769—A bill to be entitled An act relating to county public health units; amending sections 154.01, 154.03, 154.04, and 154.06, Florida Statutes; providing for health care delivery programs; providing authority by the division of health to carry on health care programs; providing for control of pre-

ventable diseases; providing the schedule of fees be approved by the division of health, providing for transmittal of funds; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Health and Rehabilitative Services.

By Senator Gallen (By request)—

SB 770—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the size of individual wine containers under the beverage law; amending §564.05, Florida Statutes, to allow the sale of wine in certain individual containers heretofore prohibited; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Commerce.

By Senator Sykes—

SB 771—A bill to be entitled An act relating to career service; amending section 110.051, Florida Statutes, by adding a new paragraph (m) to subsection (2) to exempt certain positions within the public service commission from the provisions of the chapter; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

By Senator Gillespie—

SB 772—A bill to be entitled An act relating to employment opportunities; amending §413.08(3), Florida Statutes, 1971, to provide for equal employment opportunities for the blind, the visually handicapped, and the physically disabled; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Saunders—

SB 773—A bill to be entitled An Act to amend Chapter 17, F.S., relating to state warrants; amending section 17.26, F.S., to provide that the state comptroller may issue a new warrant to replace a canceled warrant within three (3) years from date of issue of the original; providing that in the event a warrant is not presented for payment within three (3) years from date of issue, the obligation shall become unenforceable and no warrant shall be issued thereafter; providing a "saving clause" to afford a remedy to any person whose legal rights may be adversely affected; providing for return of funds to fund of original issue; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 774—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public health, vesting certain powers of control and supervision in the department of health and rehabilitative services over public water supplies in the state providing certain criteria as to which water supplies will have their flouride content adjusted; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Health and Rehabilitative Services.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 775—A bill to be entitled An act relating to court commitments of persons to the department of health and rehabilitative services; providing that all court commitments of persons to state institutions will be in the form of commitments to the department of health and rehabilitative services, with a designation of the legal justification for the commitment; authorizing the department of health and rehabilitative services to transfer committed persons to any of its divisional facilities which are not of a more intense confinement status than that justified by the reasons for the original commitment and which afford services needed by such individual;

authorizing the department to pass regulations pertaining to this act; amending chapter 402, Florida Statutes, so as to add new §402.23, Florida Statutes; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Health and Rehabilitative Services.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 776—A bill to be entitled An act relating to miscellaneous crimes; amending section 877.07(4), Florida Statutes, deleting the authority of the various county boards of health; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Health and Rehabilitative Services.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 777—A bill to be entitled An act relating to environmental control; amending section 403.081, Florida Statutes, eliminating the department of pollution control's direct authority over the division of health; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

By Senator Gallen (By request)—

SB 778—A bill to be entitled An act relating to liquor salesmen; amending chapter 561, Florida Statutes, by creating a new section to provide that liquor salesmen be licensed by the division of beverage of the department of business regulation; providing a license fee; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Commerce.

By Senator Gallen (By request)—

SB 779—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the sale of mixed drinks by certain vendors; creating §564.07, Florida Statutes, to prohibit vendors licensed under §564.02(1)(a) and (b), Florida Statutes, from selling prepared mixed drinks; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Commerce.

By Senator Gillespie—

SB 780—A bill to be entitled An act relating to weapons and firearms; providing that confiscated or forfeited weapons and firearms and parts thereof, capable of being concealed on the person, not be sold nor given to the public; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Ware—

SB 781—A bill to be entitled An act relating to district school boards; amending §232.43, Florida Statutes, authorizing district school boards to use state and local tax funds for the purpose of insuring certain students; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Senator de la Parte—

SB 782—A bill to be entitled An act for the relief of Mr. W. M. Canty, Tampa, Florida, to compensate him for damages suffered as a result of negligence by the department of transportation; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

By Senator Gordon—

SB 783—A bill to be entitled An act relating to elections; amending §104.372, Florida Statutes, 1972 Supplement, as amended by §1, chapter 72-106, Laws of Florida, to provide that rates for political advertising or broadcasts be no higher than the lowest rates otherwise charged; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 784—A bill to be entitled An act relating to registration of felons; amending §775.13(5), Florida Statutes, adding paragraph (f) thereto; exempting from registration first offenders convicted of nonviolent crimes; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Criminal Justice.

By Senator Brantley—

SB 785—A bill to be entitled An act relating to fire prevention and control; creating §633.082, Florida Statutes; providing that certain public and private buildings and all schools be equipped with automatic sprinkler systems; providing standards for installation; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Commerce.

By Senators Sayler and Horne—

SB 786—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the state highway and county road system; providing legislative intent; prohibiting the construction of any road in the state highway system or the county road system within a wilderness area, a state-owned wildlife management area, an outdoor recreational or park area, or a water conservation area under control of the central and southern Florida floor control district or upon land the development right of which has been conveyed; providing that existing rights-of-way in those areas on which no construction has begun be conveyed to the specific authority having control over the contiguous area; providing liberal construction of this act; providing severability; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Transportation.

By Senator Lewis—

SB 787—A bill to be entitled An act relating to emergency medical treatment; providing that no person shall be denied treatment at any licensed hospital having an emergency department; providing that a hospital, its employees or any physician, dentist, or podiatrist is not liable in any action arising from a refusal to provide such treatment if proper safeguards are taken; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Health and Rehabilitative Services.

By Senator Deeb—

SB 788—A bill to be entitled An act relating to a special election to be held October 2, 1973, pursuant to section 5, article XI of the state constitution for the approval or rejection by the electors of the state of a joint resolution providing for the financing and operation of a state bond fund; providing that the full faith and credit of the state may be pledged to provide financing for the state bond fund; providing that all borrowing by any governmental agency shall be from the state bond fund; providing for publication of notice and pro-

cedures; providing for state reimbursement of costs to the counties; requiring the comptroller to establish reimbursement procedures; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Deeb—

SJR 789—A joint resolution proposing an amendment to section 11 of article VII of the state constitution, providing for the financing and operation of a state bond fund; providing that the full faith and credit of the state may be pledged to provide financing for the state bond fund; providing that all borrowing by any governmental agency shall be from the state bond fund.

—was read the first time and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

By Senator Deeb—

SB 790—A bill to be entitled An act relating to financial matters; providing for the Florida state bond fund and its board, operation, powers and duties under and pursuant to section 11, article VII of the state constitution; providing for issuance of bonds by the board after making certain findings; providing for loans by the board to governmental agencies of the state or of any county, city, town, village, district or other political subdivision or public body corporate or public agency; providing that the board make certain findings before a governmental agency in the state may issue an evidence of indebtedness to a federal agency; providing bonds issued by the board under prescribed conditions shall not require validation by any court; providing for the purchase of outstanding evidence of indebtedness of governmental agencies; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

By Senators Saunders and Horne—

SB 791—A bill to be entitled An act relating to boxing and wrestling; creating §§548.011—548.62, Florida Statutes; providing definitions; establishing a state athletic commission within the department of business regulation and providing for its organization; establishing a medical advisory council; providing for regulation of boxing and wrestling contests and exhibitions, including safety regulations; providing for licensing; providing for regulation of contracts, advertising and sale of admission tickets; providing for imposition of fees, fines and taxes; providing penalties; repealing chapter 548, Florida Statutes, relating to pugilistic exhibitions; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

SB 792—A bill to be entitled An act relating to district school boards; creating §233.0625, Florida Statutes; providing for one minute of silent meditation or prayer per day for all students who desire it; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Senator Smathers—

SB 793—A bill to be entitled An act relating to school bus safety; amending §234.02, Florida Statutes, 1972 Supplement, by adding subsections (3) and (4) to said section; prohibiting students standing while a school bus is in motion; providing penalties; providing attorney's fees for successful plaintiff seeking enforcement; providing for severability; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Senator Peterson—

SB 794—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Florida retirement system; amending §121.091(6)(a), Florida Statutes, 1972 Supplement; to provide retirement benefits payable to the beneficiary if member retired under option one dies within two years following retirement; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

SM 795—A memorial to the United States Department of State seeking an international convention and agreement for the protection of the Green Sea Turtle.

SB 796—A bill to be entitled An act relating to law enforcement officers; providing standardization of pay grades; providing authority for appropriations; providing legislative intent; providing an effective date.

SB 797—A bill to be entitled An act relating to Monroe County; authorizing the payment of commissions to tax assessor and tax collector upon total amount of taxes assessed and collected; providing an effective date.

SB 798—A bill to be entitled An act relating to termination of pregnancies; amending section 458.22, Florida Statutes; providing definitions; providing conditions under which pregnancy can be terminated; requiring consent of pregnant woman and husband under certain circumstances; permitting right of refusal by hospitals or persons; providing penalties; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and placed on the calendar without reference.

SB 799—A bill to be entitled An act relating to state contribution to group insurance programs covering state officers and employees; authorizing state agencies to secure group insurance programs to be administered by the individual agency securing such program; providing for promulgation of agency administrative rules; requiring insurance be awarded on a competitive basis; designating head of agency as administrator of agency program; providing for salary deductions; providing for contribution to cost by the state; providing an appropriation; providing for coexistence at one agency of state and state agency group health insurance programs; providing an effective date; amending § 112.075, Florida Statutes, 1972 Supplement

SB 800—A bill to be entitled An act relating to intercompany transfers; amending section 212.08, Florida Statutes, by adding thereto a new subsection (7); providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

By Senator Plante—

SB 801—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the game and fresh water fish commission; creating §372.577, Florida Statutes; requiring a certificate of competency in handling firearms and bow and arrow; providing exceptions; directing the commission to provide for instruction and information regarding the safe handling of such weapons; providing for instructors and fees; providing responsibility of parents for minors; making fraudulent use of certificates a misdemeanor; providing for disposition of funds; providing penalties; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

SB 802—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Florida archives and history act, chapter 267, Florida Statutes creating Part II of said act to provide for designation of state archaeological landmarks, providing definitions, providing for designation, providing for permits, providing penalties, providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

By Senator Gordon—

SB 803—A bill to be entitled An act relating to community colleges; amending §230.767, Florida Statutes; providing for an allocation from state funds for community services; creating a new subsection (5); renumbering subsections (5) and (6); amending subsection (5) to include community services in determining the total allocation from state funds; providing an appropriation; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Education and Ways and Means.

By Senator Gordon—

SB 804—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public property; amending §274.01(1), Florida Statutes, 1971, to redefine the term governmental unit to include school boards for purposes of the chapter relating to acquisition, recording, inventory, and disposal of tangible personal property owned by certain political subdivisions of the state; amending §274.02, Florida Statutes, 1971, to increase to one hundred dollars (\$100) the value of property which need not be marked or inventoried, to provide for signed receipt of property by new custodians rather than inventory by the governmental unit, and to provide for physical inventory annually by the custodian and biennially by the governmental unit; amending §274.05, Florida Statutes, 1971, relating to surplus property, to provide alternative means for disposal of property owned by school districts; amending §274.06, Florida Statutes, 1971, relating to alternative methods of property disposal, to increase the value of property which may be disposed of under the provisions of the section; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Education and Ways and Means.

SB 805—An bill to be entitled An Act relating to education; amending section 230.03 (2), Florida Statutes; providing for a statement of powers of district school boards; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Senator Gordon—

SB 806—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public printing and stationery; amending section 287.102 and subsection (1) of section 283.10, Florida statutes; providing for competitive bids on all purchases in excess of five hundred dollars; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

By Senator Firestone—

SB 807—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the powers, duties and functions of the treasurer; amending sections 18.02, 18.06, 18.07, 18.08, 18.10(1), 18.11(1), Florida Statutes; repealing section 18.21, Florida Statutes; amending chapter 18, Florida Statutes, by adding new sections 18.22 and 18.23; authorizes the treasurer to provide a personal check cashing service for certain persons; removes the ten (10) day deadline for the treasurer to present to the governor the monthly financial statement of the treasurer, requires treasurer to keep a record of all state funds and securities; removes certain obsolete language; permits the treasurer to deposit state moneys into savings accounts in savings and loan associations; requires the treasurer to ensure compliance by banks with board of administration policy as to adequacy of collateral pledged; authorizes the department to promulgate rules and regulations to effectuate the provisions of chapter 18, Florida Statutes; permits the treasurer to prescribe forms for the deposit of state moneys; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

By Senator Johnson—

SB 808—A bill to be entitled An Act relating to community-based service programs for the elderly; providing legislative intent and definitions; providing for the division of family services to establish and operate community based service programs for the elderly on a trial basis; providing for the selection of participating counties; providing for authority for the department of health and rehabilitative services to contract for services as necessary to implement the program; providing guidelines for enrollment of clients to be served; providing for the director of the division of family services to submit a report to the legislature at the end of the trial period; providing for an appropriation; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Health and Rehabilitative Services and Ways and Means.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 809—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the department of health and rehabilitative services, authorizing the department of health and rehabilitative services to purchase, or provide as a self-insurer, or combination thereof, comprehensive medical malpractice or liability insurance for any of the employees, divisions, or institutions under its management, control, or supervision; amending chapter 402, Florida Statutes; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

SB 810—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the public health; creating a new paragraph (h) of subsection (1) of section 381.031, Florida Statutes; providing for authority to issue permits, licenses or approvals; providing for administrative fines for violation thereof; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Health and Rehabilitative Services.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 811—A bill to be entitled An act relating to mobile home, travel trailer and recreational parks; amending sections

513.01, 513.02, 513.03, 513.04, 513.05, 513.06, 513.07, 513.08, 513.09, and 513.12, Florida Statutes, redefining tourist camps and mobile home parks in order to conform with the present use of such facilities; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Consumer Affairs.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 812—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Florida nuclear code and southern interstate nuclear compact law, radiological surveillance; amending sections 290.10, 290.11, 290.12, 290.13, 290.15, 290.16, 290.17 and 290.18; amending section 290.19, Florida Statutes; providing for the department of health and rehabilitative services to charge annual fees for surveillance of licensed and registered sources of ionizing radiation; providing for the use of fee moneys; providing for inspection by the department; providing for the maintenance of records; providing for federal-state agreements; providing for administrative procedure and judicial review; providing for injunctive relief; providing for prohibited uses; providing for impounding of materials; providing penalties; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

The real estate may be held by legal or equitable

title, by the entireties, jointly, in common, as a condominium, or indirectly by stock ownership or membership representing the owner's or member's proprietary interest in a corporation owning a fee or a leasehold initially in excess of ninety-eight years.
