### REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

The Committee on Rules and Calendar advises that Senate Bill 2-B is within the purview of the amended Proclamation of the Governor. The Committee further advises that Senate Bill 4-B is not within the purview of the call of the Governor.

SB 2-B was referred to the Committee on Education.

The Committee on Rules and Calendar recommends that the following changes in Rule Twelve relating to suspensions and removals, be adopted:

Strike Rule 12.7(b) and 12.7(f) in their entirety and insert the following text:

12.7(b) An executive suspension of a public official who is under indictment or who has pending against him criminal charges filed by the appropriate prosecuting officer in a court of record, or an executive suspension of a public official which is in any manner challenged in a court shall be referred to a select committee or Special Master but shall be held in suspense by such committee or Special Master and shall not be considered by the Senate until the pending charges have been dismissed or until final determination of the criminal charges at the trial court level, or in the case of a court challenge, until the final determination of the challenge, including the exhaustion of appellate remedies.

In any suspension case in which the indictment or criminal charge is not for the alleged commission of a felony the select committee, the Master and the Senate may proceed if the written consent of counsel for the Governor and for the suspended official is obtained.

12.7(f) Subject to the limitations of Rule 12.7(b) the select committee or Special Master shall institute action by trans-

mitting a notice of hearing for a pre-hearing conference or a hearing on the merits within three (3) months after the effective date of the suspension order. In the event that a suspension order is referred to the select committee or Special Master but is held in suspense in accordance with Rule 12.7(b), then the committee or Special Master shall institute action within three (3) months after the termination of pending proceedings as described in Rule 12.7(b). The Senate shall act upon the recommendations of the select committee or Special Master within thirty (30) days after the report of such recommendations to the Senate; provided, however, if the Senate shall order further consideration and a supplemental recommendation, the Senate shall act within thirty (30) days after the receipt of such supplemental recommendation. All cases pending on the adoption of Rule 12.7(b) and Rule 12.7(f) as amended shall be governed by the time limits imposed by Rule 12.7(f) as amended.

SB 6-B—A bill to be entitled An act relating to district school systems; creating section 230.22 (6), Florida Statutes; directing district school boards to set opening and closing hours for public schools and to set corresponding bus schedules; providing an effective date.

—was determined by the President to be within the purview of the Governor's call, read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By the Committee on Commerce and Senator McClain—

SM 7-B—A memorial to the Congress of the United States urging the Congress to repeal the Emergency Daylight Saving Time Energy Conservation Act of 1973.

—was determined by the President to be within the purview of the Governor's call, read the first time and placed on the Calendar.

On motion by Senator Barron, by two-thirds vote SB 1-B, SCR 5-B and SM 7-B were established as a Special and Continuing Order of Business.

## SPECIAL AND CONTINUING ORDER

SB 1-B was taken up, together with:

By the Committee on Commerce—

CS for SB 1-B—A bill to be entitled An act relating to legal time; providing findings and intent; providing an exemption for a portion of the State of Florida from the Emergency Daylight Saving Time Energy Conservation Act of 1973; providing an effective date.

—which was read the first time by title and SB 1-B was laid on the table.

On motion by Senator Brantley, by two-thirds vote CS for SB 1-B was read the second time by title.

The Committee on Commerce offered the following amendment which was moved by Senator Childers:

**Amendment 1**—On page 1, line 19, after the word "state," insert: The legislature of the State of Florida further finds that the forced busing of school children has resulted in a waste of energy resources and has resulted in children traveling to and from school during morning and evening darkness.

Senator Scarborough moved that debate on the amendment be limited to one minute per side and the motion failed.

Senator Gordon moved that the Senate do now adjourn.

Senator Sykes moved as a substitute motion that the Senate adjourn upon final consideration of veto messages and the motion failed.

The question recurred on the motion by Senator Gordon which failed by the following vote:

By unanimous consent, Senator Glisson changed his vote from yea to nay.

Whereupon inquiry was made as to the exact status of the proposed amendment, in that some members of the committee were of the understanding that the proposed amendment was to have been engrossed into the committee substitute and become a part of same in contrast to its being an amendment thereto recommended by the committee for adoption by the body.

To which inquiry the President found that the committee report as filed treated the same as a recommended amendment to the committee substitute, and then ruled that the reactions of varying interpretations of members of a committee of the procedural maneuverings of that committee must yield to the written report; that the official committee report clearly indicates that the committee substitute was taken up for consideration, and thereafter the committee adopted a recommendation to this body concerning the 'Childers amendment'.

Senator Pettigrew raised a point of order that the committee amendment (hereafter referred to as the 'Childers amendment') was outside the purview of the Governor's call.

A further parliamentary inquiry was posed by Senator Childers as to whether the point of order raised, and the ruling of

the chair to that point, would be different if the content of the amendment itself had actually been incorporated into the committee substitute rather than as a proposed amendment to that committee substitute. The President's ruling was that a committee cannot so bind the Senate or evade the Constitution by such a device and that, in either event, the point would be available to Senator Pettigrew or any other Senator.

**President Horne:** There is no question but that an amendment to a measure has to respond to the purview of the call. However, a point that really bothers me here, as raised by several of you in the discussion on Senator Pettigrew's point of order, is this; there can be no doubt but that the 'Childers amendment' does not respond to the 'point call', that is, the actual convening and limiting words of the Governor's proclamation, but the Governor's recitals in the original and the amending proclamations used language which the Childers amendment contains, and upon which he relied in resisting the point of order and in further arguing that the amendment is germane. Senator Childers raises the question of simply comparing 'preface recitals' in a bill to similar 'recitals and whereases' in the proclamation, and this point does trouble me. Considering that such prefacing recitals in a bill preceding the enacting clause of the bill simply drop off the bill when it is incorporated into the statutes, I would consider comparable 'preface recitals' as within the purview. I want to distinguish the position that the chair would take if the Childers amendment had been a part of the body of the bill (after the enacting clause) as opposed to being a 'preface recital'. I would rule the language of the amendment out of order if it was in the 'body' of the bill (following the enacting clause) because it does not comport to the 'body' of the call. The Constitution, in granting to the Governor the right to proclaim and convene a special session, does not restrict his enunciation of recitals that he chooses . . . and I find no commitment anywhere that the legislature is restricted in enunciating similar recitals (prior to the enacting clause) for, as recited earlier, such recitals drop off as soon as the measure passes into law and are thus only a part of the history of that law. It is somewhat similar, in legal effect, to the process of your putting a statement in the journal explaining a vote.

The chair therefore rules the point of order raised by the Senator from the 39th not well taken.

Senator Gordon offered the following amendment to amendment 1:

**Amendment 1a**—On page 1, line 19 strike the period after "darkness" and insert: , but has provided all Floridians an opportunity to demonstrate their commitment to maintain law and order, and has resulted in the provision of greater equality of educational opportunity for Floridians of all races.

Whereupon Senator Pettigrew requested that the chair return to his previous point of order and the chair's ruling that the same was not well taken, on the basis of his understanding that the chair's ruling was founded on the assumption that the 'Childers amendment' proposed a "whereas clause", prior to the enacting clause, rather than an amendment to the body of the bill following the enacting clause - an erroneous assumption, in that the amendment was to Section 1 within the body of the bill.

**President Horne:** The Senator's arguments are well taken - while the language of the amendment sounds like findings of fact and mere 'recitals' it is, though, a part of the body of the bill and the chair therefore rules that Section 1 in its entirety must be deleted from the bill and the remaining sections renumbered, and this would carry with it the amendment.

(intervening discussion)

**President Horne:** I will return to an earlier ruling on the point of order by the Senator from the 39th to the bill with the 'Childers amendment' in its section 1. I found the content of that section 1 to be outside the purview of the Governor's call and then, without pausing to review the bill and its exact status, directed that section 1 be deleted, the remaining sections renumbered, and thus left the bill before the body. Upon review, I find this to be error . . . a bill is as one unit, a whole, and not as a series of lines, words, sections, etc., each independent of the other. The point of parliamentary law heretofore enunciated, viz that true recitals prefacing a bill may track true recitals prefacing the points of restriction in a governor's call. The fine distinction here, however, is that the in-

stant bill is structured so that the prefacing words (with the Childers amendment) are *not* recitals but part of the body of the bill itself.

The constitutional grant that permits the Governor to call us into special session mandates that we transact only that business as is within the purview of the proclamation, or is *introduced* by consent of two-thirds of the membership of this body . . . in either category, it is implicit that the constitution speaks to the whole of the matter, and not just a part. I therefore reverse that earlier ruling and rule that the point is well taken and the bill is outside the purview and thus is not before us.

**Senator Henderson:** Mr. President, assuming there was a bill before us that was within the purview of the call, could an amendment containing matter outside that purview (such as Senator Childers' amendment) be put into that bill?

**President Horne:** Yes - by a vote of two-thirds of the membership of this body such an amendment could be 'introduced' into the bill.

**Senator Henderson:** What vote, then, would be required on the final passage of that bill if so amended?

**President Horne:** A majority vote for final passage. The requirement of consent of two-thirds of the membership is at the introduction of the measure, and at that point only! Once so introduced, and embodied within the text of the bill, further votes are no different than they would be had the measure been within the purview.

**Senator Barron:** Mr. President, so that the entire scope of this rather sticky area might hopefully be explored and resolved, I pose the parliamentary inquiry as to whether, by amendment adopted by a majority vote, the offensive portion of the bill can be deleted and thus leave the rest of the bill within the purview and thus before the body? and would there be a distinction if that amendment be adopted by a two-thirds vote?

**President Horne:** I rule that since the bill itself is not properly before the body, it cannot be 'cured' by any such amendment, regardless of the vote on the amendment. The measure is here either because the Governor's call says so, or because you say so with a two-thirds vote, and I rule that the entirety of the CS for SB 1-B is beyond the purview of the call.

Senator Plante then posed a parliamentary inquiry concerning the subject of the constitutional grant to the Governor of the right to call the special session, and the mandate that the legislature consider only that business which falls within the purview of that call . . . "*or a communication from the Governor*". He related to a letter from the Governor of January 28, 1974, addressed to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives in which letter the Governor communicated with the legislature on a myriad of subjects, including content directly relating to the contents in the controverted Section 1 amendment. He further stated his contention that the amended bill falls within the purview of that communication and is thus properly before the body - reflecting that the inclusion in the Constitution of the words "*or a communication*" placed a burden on the Governor to be extremely careful of what he says and how he says it when he brings the legislature into special session.

Whereupon the President commented that the words of caution by Senator Plante were well taken, but ruled that the constitutional language spoke to a more formal communication, one relating directly to the special session and the scope of that session itself, and should be an august communication to the formal body of the Senate or the Legislature.

On motion by Senator Saunders, the rules were waived and the Senate reverted to—

## MESSAGES FROM THE GOVERNOR

### VETOED BILLS 1973 REGULAR SESSION

On motion by Senator Saunders, the following message from the Governor was read:

Dear Mr. Secretary:

By the authority vested in me as Governor of Florida, under the provisions of Article III, Section 8, of the Constitution of the State of Florida, I hereby transmit to you Senate Bill 1343, with objections to portions of Senate Bill 1343, enacted by the Third Legislature of Florida under the Florida Constitution, 1968 Revision, during the extended Regular Session of 1973, and entitled:

"An act making appropriations; providing moneys for the annual period beginning July 1, 1973 and ending June 30, 1974, to pay salaries, other expenses, capital outlay-buildings and improvements, and for other specified purposes of the various agencies of state government; suspending sections 216.262, 216.292, 216.301(2), 27.34(1) and 27.54(2), F.S.; providing an effective date."

Generally, the Legislature has developed a general appropriations bill of which it can be proud. There are, however, a few areas where changing circumstances or constitutional conflicts make it necessary for me to withhold my approval. The following provisions of the bill are vetoed for the reasons stated.

On Page 1, a proviso following Item 10 makes the \$150,000 appropriation to the Department of Administration contingent upon the passage of House Bill 1491, which is a proper restriction on the appropriation of funds. The proviso attempts to go further, however, and to make a delegation of spending authority which was not included in the substantive law. Therefore, the second proviso under Item 10 is not in keeping with Constitutional restrictions and the proviso, which reads as follows, is hereby vetoed:

"Provided, further, that the moneys allocated for the energy needs study to the Department of Administration shall only be expended at the direction of the co-chairman of the Florida Energy Committee created by HB 1491."

The proviso following Item 307 on Page 21 would violate the constitutional prohibition against writing substantive law in the appropriations bill. Section 272.121, Florida Statutes, enacted by the 1972 Legislature, provides that the development plan for the Capitol Center shall be presented to the Capitol Center Planning Commission for final approval. The proviso would amend this procedure by requiring that the approval of the Commission would be subject to the concurrence of the Legislature. Although the Legislature can require its concurrence in any plan approved by the Commission, it must do so within the limits of Sections 6 and 12 of Article III of the Constitution. Therefore, the proviso following Item 307 on Page 21, which reads as follows, is hereby vetoed:

"Provided, however, that the plan, and amendments thereto, shall be presented to the Capitol Center Planning Commission for final approval subject to the concurrence of the Legislature."

Item 726A on Page 42 was included in the general appropriations bill, assuming the implementation of Senate Bill 628, which was vetoed on June 15, 1973. While I objected to the method of establishing a Capitol Center Security Force, I stated that the Legislature has the power and responsibility to maintain security of its own chambers and buildings. I do not believe, however, that the funds provided for the proposed Capitol Center Security Commission are required in order for the Legislature to provide for its own security.

With the concurrence of the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House, we have provided for the continuation of security positions in other areas of the Capitol Center. If the Legislature does not have sufficient funds available and needs additional funds to assure the continuation of security positions in the legislative buildings, the necessary amount can be provided by supplemental appropriation. Therefore, Item 726A, which reads as follows, is hereby vetoed:

"Capitol Center Security Force

726A Lump Sum

From General Revenue Fund ..... 45 \$548,067

Provided, however, that the 18.5 people now on-board at the present time under the Department of General Services shall have first priority for positions under transfer to the Capitol Center Security Force."

In Item 758 on Page 44, the Legislature provides an appropriation for construction of a bridge from the Primary Road Trust Fund. Because of the uncertainty concerning the availability of federal highway funds in the coming fiscal year, this attempt to mandate the allocation of funds for one project could create a problem. If these federal funds are forthcoming, we will attempt to meet the legislative intent expressed in this item. The need for this project, however, must be considered along with other priorities within the funds available. Therefore, the following appropriation in Item 758 is hereby vetoed:

"From Primary Road Trust Fund ..... \$3,461,230."

Item 887 on Page 50 includes money to establish a financial planning analyst position in the Public Service Commission and the proviso following Item 887 states that this position may not be filled by any of the Commission's current employees. Instead of being a restriction on the spending of these funds, as provided by the Constitution, I believe this is an attempt to exclude a specific group of people for no apparent reason. While the Legislature may speak to the qualifications required, I do not think it proper to discriminate against a group of individuals by denying them the right to be considered based upon their own training, experience and abilities. Therefore, the proviso following Item 887, which reads as follows, is hereby vetoed:

"Provided, however, that the financial planning analyst position provided shall not be filled by any of the current staff of the Public Service Commission."

In Section II of the bill, which includes appropriations for Fixed Capital Outlay, Item 93B on Page 61 provides \$60,000 for the completion of a Sunland Recreation Park for the handicapped in Gulf County. While I agree with the purpose for which these funds were included, the appropriation duplicates the funds provided in House Bill 1645, which has been approved. Therefore, these funds are not needed to accomplish the purpose, and Item 93B, which reads as follows, is hereby vetoed:

"93B Lump Sum - Sunland Recreation Park for Handicapped - Gulf County  
From General Revenue Fund ..... \$60,000

Item 93B is appropriated to complete Phase I construction of the Bay Side Development and Phase II construction of the above Park."

For the reasons stated, I am withholding my approval of the quoted provisions of Senate Bill 1343 and do hereby veto these provisions. The remaining provisions of Senate Bill 1343, enacted by the Third Legislature of Florida under the Florida Constitution, 1968 Revision, during the Extended Session of 1973, are hereby approved.
