Monday, April 8, 1974

HCR 2-Orig., contained in the above message, was read the first time in full. On motion by Senator Firestone, by two-thirds vote HCR 2-Orig. was read the second time, unanimously adopted and certified to the House.

Senator Firestone moved that upon conclusion of the joint session this day, the Senate adjourn to reconvene April 9, 1974, at 8:30 a.m. for the purpose of introduction and reference of resolutions, memorials, bills and joint resolutions and thereafter to reconvene at 9:00 a.m. The motion was adopted.

The Journals of April 5 and 4 were corrected and approved.

On motion by Senator Firestone, pursuant to HCR 2-Orig., the Senate proceeded to the chamber of the House of Representatives for a joint meeting to receive a report of the Chief Justice on the state of the judiciary for the preceding year.

The Justices of the Florida Supreme Court and members of the Florida Cabinet were received and seated.

The Speaker invited the President of the Senate, Mallory E. Horne, and the President Pro Tempore, Louis de la Parte, to the rostrum and requested the President to preside over the joint meeting.

#### The President in the Chair.

The President declared a quorum present.

Prayer by Dr. Robert M. McMillan, Chaplain of the Senate:

We humble ourselves, our God, before your sovereignty. We open our minds for your illumination. We open our hearts for the feelings of human need. We open our ears to hear the people we represent. We open our eyes to behold the needs around us.

We examine our motives that we may truly know ourselves. We discipline our actions that they may truly reflect our better selves.

Grant to these who govern the people a perpetual sense of awe that they may never carelessly legislate from the posture of indifferent familiarity with the problems before them.

Grant to these who judge compassion for human frailty yet firmness for human responsibility. Give them wisdom as they tread the narrow path between the letter of the law and its spirit. May they ever judge as they themselves will be judged seeing that their powers of justice are not merely people given but God given.

On motion by Senator Firestone, a committee was appointed to escort the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Justice James C. Adkins, to the chamber and to the rostrum. The President appointed Senators Firestone, Winn and Ware and the Speaker appointed Representatives Gautier, Forbes and Johnson.

The President presented the Chief Justice who addressed the joint assembly as follows:

#### REPORT TO THE LEGISLATURE ON THE STATE OF THE JUDICIARY

SUPREME COURT OF FLORIDA

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Governor Askew, colleagues of the Supreme Court, members of the Cabinet, members of the Legislature, ladies and gentlemen:

The system of establishing and dispensing justice must be developed to a high point of efficiency and so maintained that the public will have absolute confidence in the integrity and impartiality of its administration. Our system of government is no stronger than our courts and our courts are no stronger than the strength of the public's confidence in them.

Because of my deep conviction that an informed public, as well as an informed Legislature, is essential to the maintenance of confidence in the rule of law as administered by our courts, I appreciate this opportunity to report on the state of the judiciary.

Through your cooperation and the dedicated efforts of all officers and employees of the judicial branch, the implementation of our new judicial constitutional amendment is being successfully completed. During 1973 more than 750,000 cases were determined by the trial judges of Florida. The time of disposition varied according to the nature of the case, but the average time from filing until conclusion was less than 160 days. No other state can boast of such speedy determinations. In addition, approximately 3,000,000 traffic cases were processed and determined.

The Supreme Court of Florida has a larger caseload than any other state Supreme Court in the nation, but our docket is current.

Believing that courts of lesser jurisdiction involving a great segment of the public are the picture windows of the judiciary, the Supreme Court embarked upon a program to upgrade these courts. Florida traffic courts were rated twenty-first in the nation two years ago. Through the close cooperation of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, the Legislature, and the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles we are now recognized as being among the top five of the nation. "Florida first" has been our goal, and we will reach it.

Defensive driving schools and D.W.I. schools are available for every traffic court in Florida.

We were the first state to adopt standards of criminal justice recommended by the American Bar Association. Our Criminal Rules of Procedure have been used as models by the National Trial Judges' College.

A stranger in any Florida community could not be subjected to confinement for more than 24 hours without being brought before a judge.

We have adopted a model code of judicial ethics, recommended by the American Bar Association and a select advisory committee.

The Florida courts have developed a modern management program, which is resulting in improved docket conditions and efficient administration.

Each Circuit Court is being administered by the Chief Judge. Most Chief Judges are utilizing the services of executive assistants, a position which was developed through national L.E.A.A. funding. We hope these positions will be funded by State general revenue within the next year.

#### COURT MANAGEMENT

Upon your statutory suggestion and authorization we established a Case Disposition Reporting System and embarked upon a program of court management. After fourteen months great progress has been made. The statistical data is essential to the proper management and administration of the judicial

system. We have been recognized nationally as a leader in the field of management information systems and will probably receive Federal grants for expansion of the system.

We are developing a weighted caseload system and conducting a pilot study in four circuits. When this system is developed we will be able to determine the workload involved in various types of litigation so that we will be able to make a more definitive determination as to the need for additional judges. The weighted caseload system will also be developed so that this information may be obtained in connection with the offices of the state attorneys and public defenders. Moreover, we would hope that Chief Judges and their administrators, clerks of court, state attorneys and public defenders will be able to use the information developed from the system for local management of calendars, courtrooms, use of personnel, including judges, state attorneys and public defenders, among divisions of court. The information will also be available for use in considering budget requests and planning functions. I hope that your cooperation in funding this system will continue.

#### COURT REPORTERS

At the present time committees of The Florida Bar, at our request, are revising the rules of appellate procedure for the purpose of speeding the disposition of cases and simplifying the procedure. But the real bottleneck in the appellate process is the preparation of transcripts. We need more court reporters, as suggested in a bill proposed by the Conference of Circuit Judges. In considering this problem I hope you will be objective and not let any isolated unpleasant incident influence you in your determination of the need and the solution of the problem.

Court reporting should be recognized as a profession within the judicial system. The reporters should be licensed by the judiciary in accordance with standards to be developed by the judiciary.

The method of reporting is not as important as the certification by an individual meeting certain standards. We are experimenting with various electronic devices in courts of lesser jurisdiction and find that the use of such devices will not eliminate the necessity for having responsible individuals, properly trained and qualified, to certify as to the correctness of the transcript.

#### DECRIMINALIZATION OF TRAFFIC OFFENSES

It is our recommendation that minor traffic offenses be decriminalized and handled by the judges of the County Court in an administrative manner, thus relieving the state attorneys and public defenders from any responsibility in these cases and avoiding the necessity of jury trials. Civil penalties should be imposed and the collection of the penalties enforced by suspending driving privileges until the penalty is paid. A committee composed of judges, lawyers, laymen, representatives of the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles and members of the Legislature has worked diligently in preparing a bill for your consideration. It has been endorsed by the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, the Traffic Court Review Committee, and the Conference of County Court Judges. We recommend its adoption.

#### JUVENILE COURTS

The Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services and the courts are attempting to establish a closer relationship between the judges of the Juvenile Division of the Circuit Court, the Division of Youth Services and the Division of

Family Services. There have been many problems concerning foster homes for children who are declared both dependent and delinquent. Other problems result when a differentiation is made between delinquent and dependent children at the time they are brought to a detention center. The proper administration of the Juvenile Courts will require a Juvenile Court Coordinator attached to the Office of the State Court Administrator. This individual will be charged with the responsibility of coordinating the efforts of the Division of Youth Services and the Division of Family Services with the Juvenile Courts.

We recommend that the Juvenile Division of the Circuit Court be given statutory authorization to commit retarded and mentally incompetent juveniles to the appropriate institutions.

Also, it is my recommendation that a study be made as to the advisability of including children in need of supervision within the Juvenile Court system, as I do not believe it appropriate to have a juvenile brought into the judicial system who is not charged with the commission of some offense, but is merely alleged to be in need of supervision.

#### STATE FUNDING

We welcomed the Joint Committee on Judicial Personnel and appreciate the cooperation and interest of the members of the committee. We hope that state funding of the judiciary will be accomplished in such a way that the clerks of the court may exercise some independence in the selection of their personnel in accordance with standards which may necessarily vary in different areas of the State. The assumption by the State of fiscal responsibility for the Courts must carry with it the establishment within the judicial system of the requisite statewide administrative capacity and control in such areas as personnel management and fiscal affairs. We have made use of the administrative mechanism in the Executive branch and have received cooperation. However, it is impossible to structure the Judicial branch of government in the same manner and under the same procedure as the Executive branch. This has caused some misunderstanding and confusion, resulting, at times, in an infringement upon the essential independence of the judiciary. This independence, of course, we are required to maintain under the Constitution.

#### NON-LAWYER JUDGES

Florida Statutes, Section 34.021, provides that a County Court judge in any county having a population of 40,000 or less shall not be required to be a member of the Bar of Florida. The Conference of Judges of County Courts has recommended that this statute be repealed with a proviso that those now holding office may continue as judge of a County Court with the privilege of running for re-election. At the present time there are 17 non-lawyer judges of the County Courts in small counties and 11 non-lawyer judges in the larger counties. If Florida Statutes, Section 34.021, is repealed the number of non-lawyer judges will never be increased. We recommend the repeal of this statute. This is with the blessing of the non-lawyer County Judges.

#### MYERS ACT

Upon the effective date of the Myers Act, public drunkenness will no longer be a criminal offense. The officer observing an intoxicated person will be required to place him in a detoxification center. However, unless these centers are established and properly funded by the Legislature the law enforcement officers will be in the position of having to make charges of disorderly conduct and confine these individuals in the jail. This, of course, will clutter the criminal dockets of the judicial system

and be contrary to your intent under the Myers Act. We recommend that the funding of the detoxification centers be treated as an emergency matter.

### SALARIES

We recommend an increase in the salaries of all judges. Under the current judicial code of conduct every judge has to rely solely upon his salary as his earnings. The amount of the salary has become inadequate in light of the decided increase in the cost of living. Recently a county attorney of a moderately sized county accepted an appointment as a Circuit Judge and was required to take a reduction of approximately \$7000 in his salary. Many county employees throughout the State are paid salaries in excess of that paid the Justices of the Supreme Court of Florida. Judges of the lowest Federal Court having general trial jurisdiction receive higher salaries than the Justices of the highest court of the State of Florida.

Two Chief Judges have resigned because of their inadequate salaries and prominent law firms are recruiting able trial judges.

### CERTIFICATION OF JUDGES

Case filings have expanded substantially in some parts of the State. Nevertheless, I would hope that through improvements in court management and increased rotation within the circuits and assignment between the circuits of judges, qualified to sit anywhere in any type of case, we can meet much of the need for additional judge power. I believe that we will be able to maintain our dockets in a current status with the addition of few, if any, judges. Certification of the exact number will be forthcoming soon.

### JUDICIAL QUALIFICATIONS COMMISSION

The Court was recently called upon to render an opinion concerning the power of the Judicial Qualifications Commission to investigate, charge, and suggest discipline of a Circuit Judge for conduct alleged to have occurred when he was holding a lesser office not under the jurisdiction of the Commission. He had been indicted, tried and acquitted of the offense complained of. The decision of our Court followed the overwhelming weight of authority from this Court and other Courts throughout the nation during the last one hundred years. However, the meaning and effect of the decision has been apparently either misunderstood or distorted by some members of the Judicial Qualifications Commission and a few members of the news media.

This has resulted in a request by the Qualifications Commission for a resolution and constitutional change giving them extreme autocratic powers which you will receive for consideration in due time. A clear majority of the Supreme Court of Florida is opposed to their recommended changes except for the minor deficiency referred to in the opinion.

If the total recommendation should be adopted, this Commission of thirteen members, not elected by the people, would become vested with power to make its own rules, to find its own offenses, to find its own course of action and to proceed as it would see fit against any of the judges of this State, thereby reducing judicial independence as it has heretofore been known to a mere myth.

A bandit, burglar, or common criminal cannot be indicted except by a concurrence of twelve members of a grand jury but the Commission can charge with a vote of seven out of thirteen. A common criminal cannot be convicted except

in a different tribunal by the unanimous verdict of at least a six-man jury, but under the plan contended for, a judge can be disciplined by the concurrence of nine out of thirteen members who had already determined probable cause. Certainly the several hundred elected judges of Florida are entitled to as much consideration as a common criminal.

Furthermore, to remove the Chief Executive, a member of the Cabinet, or a member of the Legislature requires charges supported by two-thirds of the members of the House and guilt determined in a separate trial by a two-thirds vote of the Senate. Perhaps, the present weakness in our Judicial Qualifications Commission is that the same tribunal or body investigates, charges, tries and determines guilt or innocence. If, however, the authority for the Commission is to be enlarged, then I respectfully suggest that you give consideration to dividing this vast authority between the Judicial Qualifications Commission who would investigate and prefer charges on the one hand, and a trial forum made up of a banc of appellate judges taken from a different level of the appellate system.

The idea of a Qualifications Commission generally is an excellent one and it can render a great service in policing the judiciary of this State if proper safeguards are maintained. On the other hand, the Constitution should never be amended so that such a group may embark upon a course of witch-hunting thereby destroying the confidence of the public and the capabilities of the judiciary to perform their function. Such a group must be responsible to somebody not awed by headlines, publicity or the public clamor, but guided only by the facts and the rule of law.

Incidentally, it is rather odd that the Commission would complain of the rules under which their work is done. The Judicial Qualifications Commission prepared the rules and submitted them to the Supreme Court of Florida where they were approved without change. Nor do I know of any rule requested by them since that has not been approved.

The Supreme Court of Florida has been confronted with many controversial subjects: for example, the right to reply law, the statute authorizing capital punishment, the applicability of the comparative negligence law, the government in the sunshine law, the tax ratio study controlling assessments by local tax assessors, the obscenity statutes, no-fault divorces, no-fault insurance, matters involving the Judicial Qualifications Commission, collective bargaining by public employees, and many others. All of these questions were of great public interest and no individual making a judgment in any of these matters could expect to receive accolades from the entire public. We did not determine these questions for the purpose of winning a popularity contest or receiving favorable press releases. We make no apologies or excuses.

I am proud of our Court. I am proud of my colleagues. We try hard in our efforts to uphold our Constitution and the laws of Florida, without fear of any pressure or retaliation which may result from our decisions. We have no public relations staff. We have no press releases. But we believe that our undaunted resistance to pressure and our sincere desire to do right is our strongest asset. We have withstood pressure; we have withstood newspaper attack. Through all of this we are still recognized as one of the outstanding Courts in the country.

During your Legislative Session any Justice of the Supreme Court will always be happy to appear before any committee and explain our programs. We, the Court and the Legislature, work for the same purpose—to satisfy the needs of the citizens of our State. It is appropriate that we disagree at

times, but not to the point of being disagreeable, for each of us must realize that constructive dissent is a sign of progress. Complete agreement on all subjects results in maintaining the status quo, but disagreement to the point of bitterness can destroy our progress. By maintaining our mutual independence, but working together, we can make a great contribution to the citizens of our State. Just as you are leaders in our nation, so shall we endeavor to maintain the national leadership of the Judicial branch.

The committee previously appointed escorted the Chief Justice from the rostrum and from the House chamber, followed by the Justices of the Supreme Court and the Cabinet.

On motion by Senator Firestone, the joint meeting dissolved at 12:02 p.m. and the Senate withdrew from the House chamber.

Pursuant to the motion by Senator Firestone, the Senate adjourned upon the dissolution of the joint meeting to convene at 8:30 a.m. for the purpose of introduction and reference of resolutions, memorials, bills and joint resolutions and thereafter to reconvene at 9:00 a.m., April 9, 1974.
