Monday, April 15, 1974

INTRODUCTION

SB 579—A bill to be entitled An act relating to disability insurance policies; creating §627.6145, Florida Statutes; prohibiting the use of any provision in a disability insurance policy whereby the insurer may reduce or refuse to pay benefits covered under the policy on the grounds that the insured is entitled to receive benefits under a policy of another insurer; adding subsection (5) to §627.662, Florida Statutes; providing that the provisions of §627.6145, Florida Statutes, shall apply as to group, blanket and franchise disability insurance; providing an effective date.

SB 580—A bill to be entitled An act relating to amounts retained on state contracts; amending §255.052(1)(d), Florida Statutes; authorizing the substitution of certificates of deposit from state or federal savings and loan associations for amounts retained on state contracts; providing an effective date.

SB 581—A bill to be entitled An act relating to license plates; amending §320.031(2), Florida Statutes, and §320.04(1), Florida Statutes, 1972 Supplement; increasing the mail service charge and the tax collector service charge for license plates; creating §320.0601, Florida Statutes; providing a mail service charge and tax collector service charge for revalidation stickers; providing an effective date.

SB 582—A bill to be entitled An act relating to veterans; creating §293.165, Florida Statutes, providing for the establishment of state nursing facilities for war veterans; authorizing the division of veterans' affairs of the department of community affairs to apply for federal grants for the construction of such facilities; requiring the department of general services to construct or renovate facilities for the establishment of state nursing homes; requiring the division of veterans' affairs to transfer to the department of general services an amount sufficient for construction or renovation purposes; requiring the department of health and rehabilitative services to operate and administer any state veterans' home; requiring the division of veterans' affairs to determine eligibility and to provide coordinating and consulting services; providing an appropriation; providing an effective date.

—to Health and Rehabilitative Services and Ways and Means.

By Senator Johnson—

SB 583—A bill to be entitled An act relating to veterans; creating §293.165, Florida Statutes, providing for the establishment of state nursing facilities for war veterans; authorizing the division of veterans' affairs of the department of community affairs to apply for federal grants for the construction of such facilities; requiring the department of general services to construct or renovate facilities for the establishment of state nursing homes; requiring the division of veterans' affairs to transfer to the department of general serv-

ices an amount sufficient for construction or renovation purposes; requiring the department of health and rehabilitative services to operate and administer any state veterans' home; requiring the division of veterans' affairs to determine eligibility and to provide coordinating and consulting services; providing an effective date.

SB 584—A bill to be entitled An act relating to veterans; amending §292.11, Florida Statutes, 1973, to require that county service officers meet minimum educational standards and that they be veterans who have been on active duty for a certain period of time or who have satisfied their military obligation in a certain manner and who have been honorably discharged; requiring the division of veterans' affairs of the department of community affairs to establish training programs for county service officers and requiring these officers to attend said programs; exempting persons currently employed as county service officers from certain requirements of the act; providing an effective date.

SB 585—A bill to be entitled An act relating to taking of marine corals and sea fans; amending §2 of chapter 73-145, Laws of Florida, appearing as §370.114(2), Florida Statutes, 1973; providing an effective date.

SB 586—A bill to be entitled An act relating to aquatic plant permits; amending §403.271(2) and (4), Florida Statutes, 1971, to clarify the need for and provide an alternative means of obtaining a permit to transport or transfer aquatic plants; providing an effective date.

By Senator Childers—

SB 587—A bill to be entitled An act relating to live bait shrimping; amending Section 370.15(2) and Section 370.15(6)(a)(2), Florida Statutes; exempting live bait shrimp from the size limitation; providing for live shrimp bait tanks; limiting the amount of dead shrimp aboard vessels engaged in live bait shrimping; providing an effective date.

—to Natural Resources and Conservation.

By Senator Henderson—

SB 588—A bill to be entitled An act relating to blind services; creating §413.0125, Florida Statutes, providing for the establishment and maintenance by the bureau of blind services of a central registry; requiring monthly reports of the name, age, and residence of certain visually handicapped persons by specified persons and agencies; providing an effective date.

—to Health and Rehabilitative Services.

By Senator Henderson—

SB 589—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the game and fresh water fish commission; making the importation, for sale or use, of certain subhuman primates without a permit illegal; providing for the issuance of permits; providing penalties; providing an effective date.

—to Natural Resources and Conservation.

By Senator Poston—

SCR 590—A concurrent resolution directing the Florida department of transportation to prepare and present to the 1975

Legislature a report on the progress toward implementation of a rapid transit system along the central Florida transportation corridor.

By Senators Johnston, Zinkil, Scarborough and Childers—

SB 591—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the public service commission; creating §§350.063, 350.064, 350.065, 350.066, and 350.067, Florida Statutes, and amending §350.58, Florida Statutes, 1973; providing for a public counsel to represent the public before the commission; providing for method of selection; providing for annual reconfirmation; providing for the qualifications, powers, and duties of the public counsel; providing for location of office, for employees and use of commission staff, and for compensation; requiring annual reports to the governor and commission by the public counsel; providing an effective date.

—to Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

By Senator Glisson—

SB 592—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the public service commission; creating §§350.061—350.065, Florida Statutes; establishing the office of public counsel; prescribing the qualifications and duties of same; providing for selection of public counsel by the cabinet; providing that compensation and expenses be allocated solely from legislative appropriations; amending §350.58, Florida Statutes; requiring an annual report by public counsel; adding subsection (3) to §364.14, Florida Statutes; adding subsection (4) to §366.06, Florida Statutes; adding subsection (5) to §367.081, Florida Statutes; providing that the commission may suspend the operation of or withhold approval of new rate schedules and defer the use of such rate schedules for a five-month period; providing that the new rate schedules shall become effective under bond at the close of the five-month period if the commission has not concluded the proceeding; requiring the utility to keep detailed records and make refunds under certain circumstances and requiring interest to be paid on such refunds; providing an effective date.

SB 593—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public school teachers; providing for teaching beyond the mandatory retirement age; amending Section 231.24, Florida Statutes, deleting the maximum age requirement for extension of teacher's certificate; providing an effective date.

SB 594—A bill to be entitled An act relating to aging; creating §§409.50—409.54, Florida Statutes; designating said sections as part II of chapter 409, Florida Statutes, entitled "Aging"; providing definitions; providing duties and responsibilities of the division of aging; providing for a director of the division; providing for administration of federal aging programs; providing for the acceptance of gifts and grants; transferring "The Community Care for the Elderly Program Development Act of 1973" to part II of chapter 409, Florida Statutes; repealing §§409.360 and 409.362, Florida Statutes, relating to the administration of federal aging programs and the division of aging; providing an effective date.

—to Health and Rehabilitative Services.

SB 595—A bill to be entitled An act relating to attorneys' fees; amending section 925.035, Florida Statutes, providing that court-appointed attorneys shall receive reasonable compensation as determined by the court; providing that such attorneys shall submit in writing a true and correct sworn statement of his expenses and fee; providing an effective date.

—to Judiciary.

By Senator McClain—

SB 596—A bill to be entitled An act relating to institutions of higher learning; amending section 241.731(1), Florida Statutes, providing that no full-time teaching faculty member shall be denied salary adjustments, promotions, reemployment, or tenure solely for failure to do research and to publish; providing an effective date.

—to Education.

By Senator Deeb—

SB 597—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the real estate license law; amending §475.01(2), Florida Statutes; providing that full time salaried employees of corporations who engage in real property transactions involving certain properties shall be exempt from the terms of the licensing law; providing definition; providing for limitation of exemption; providing an effective date.

—to Commerce.

By Senators Horne, de la Parte and Myers—

SB 598—A bill to be entitled An act relating to Florida's Hispanic heritage; providing a short title; providing for the collection of data by the department of state; providing other powers and duties of said department; providing for the appointment by the governor of a fifteen member Hispanic heritage preservation committee, its duties and compensation; providing an appropriation; providing an effective date.

—to Ways and Means.

By Senators Horne, de la Parte and Myers—

SB 599—A bill to be entitled An act relating to educational scholarship loans; creating §239.661, Florida Statutes; providing financial aid to Cuban lawyers who are students in a law program approved by the supreme court; creating a Cuban lawyer financial aid trust fund to be administered by the department of education; providing procedures; providing an appropriation; providing an effective date.

—to Ways and Means.

By the Committee on Transportation—

SB 600—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Florida turnpike law; amending §340.12(2), Florida Statutes; deleting the provision that one company may not have consecutive service stations along one side of the turnpike; providing that such company may not have more than one station if such station constitutes more than fifty percent of the service stations on the turnpike project; providing an effective date.

—to Transportation.

SB 601—A bill to be entitled An act relating to contracts, transportation code; amending §337.11(4)(a), (c) and (d), Florida Statutes, and adding a new paragraph to said subsection; providing for the use of written change orders to contracts; providing rules for issuance of same; providing an effective date.

By Senators Glisson, Deeb, Vogt, Trask, Lane (31st) and Gillespie—

SB 602—A bill to be entitled An act relating to adult congregate living facilities; creating the adult congregate living facilities act; stating a purpose; providing definitions; providing authority for the department of health and rehabilitative services to license such facilities; providing exemptions from this act; requiring facilities to obtain and display a license; providing for application for licenses; providing grounds for action by the department against facilities; providing for expiration and renewal of licenses; providing procedures for denial, suspension, or revocation of licenses; providing for injunctive procedures; providing for contracts; providing for handling of property and personal affairs of patients; providing

for the closing of a facility; providing the right of entry and inspection; providing for rules and regulations; providing minimum standards; providing penalties for violation of prohibitive acts; providing reasonable time for existing facilities to comply; providing that rules and regulations established or promulgated by the department pursuant to this act be in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 120; amending subsection 509.241-(1)(b), Florida Statutes, by exempting adult congregate living facilities from the provisions thereof; repealing subsections 400.021 (8), and 400.041 (2), Florida Statutes, 1973, relating to homes for the aged; providing an effective date.

SB 603—A bill to be entitled An act relating to sales and use tax; amending subsection (7) of section 212.08, Florida Statutes, 1972 supplement, by adding new paragraph exempting from sales tax articles of typography, art work, photo engravings, compositions, lithographs, or electrotypes sold to a printer to be used in producing certain materials for resale; providing an effective date.

—to Ways and Means.

By Senators Wilson, Sayler, Zinkil and Pettigrew—

SB 604—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the formation of local governments; repealing chapter 165, Florida Statutes, which is the present law relating to the organization and dissolution of municipalities; creating a new chapter 165, Florida Statutes, entitled "Formation of Local Governments", consisting of §165.011 through 165.093, Florida Statutes; providing legislative purpose; providing that the act shall preempt certain general and special laws; providing definitions; providing procedures and criteria for the formation, including creation, incorporation, merger and dissolution, of municipalities and special districts; providing for judicial review by certiorari of certain actions taken pursuant to this act; providing specified powers and duties of the department of community affairs with respect to counties, municipalities, and special districts; authorizing certain studies on local government service delivery by the department; requiring state and local agencies to cooperate with the department in the administration of the act; providing an effective date.

—to Governmental Operations.

By Senators Wilson, Sayler and Pettigrew—

SB 605—A bill to be entitled An act relating to county government; creating part III of chapter 125, Florida Statutes, consisting of §125.70 through §125.76, Florida Statutes, entitled "the county administration law of 1973"; providing legislative intent; providing for the appointment, qualification and compensation of county administrators to act as administrative heads of certain counties; providing for the administrator's powers and duties; providing that this act shall supercede any general or special law in conflict therewith; creating part IV of chapter 125, Florida Statutes, consisting of §125.80 through §125.88, Florida Statutes, entitled the "optional county charter law"; providing definitions; providing for a limitation on charter adoption by counties and prohibits certain special laws with respect to said charter; providing for general provisions of county charters; providing optional forms of government for counties desiring to adopt a county charter; providing for separation of executive and legislative powers and duties; providing for adoption and amendment of an administrative code; authorizing the adoption of a merit system under certain circumstances; providing an effective date.

SB 606—A bill to be entitled An act relating to channel and navigational improvement projects; providing for state participation in federally authorized projects relating to channel and harbor navigational improvements; providing for acceptance of federal moneys by the department of natural resources; establishing the channel and harbor navigational improvement trust fund; providing for the establishment of trust fund accounts within such trust fund; providing an effective date.

SB 607—A bill to be entitled An act making supplemental appropriations to the 1973 general appropriations act to provide monies for the community college program fund; providing an effective date.

SB 609—A bill to be entitled An act relating to education; amending §236.081(5), Florida Statutes, as created by §4 of Chapter 73-345, Laws of Florida; providing for adjustment in computation of district required local effort when the tax roll is under litigation; providing for re-computation and adjustment following adjudication; providing an effective date.

—to Ways and Means.

SB 610—A bill to be entitled An act relating to condominium associations; providing that condominium association contracts relating to maintenance, management or operation of common recreational areas are within the jurisdiction of the Florida public service commission; providing for regulation of quality of such maintenance, management or operation; providing for regulation of assessments; providing for powers of the public service commission, review of commission orders, fees, violations and penalties; providing an effective date.

—to Ways and Means.

SB 611—A bill to be entitled An act relating to probate; amending §734.29(3), (4) and (5), Florida Statutes; reducing the number of notice requirements and the statute of limitations for creditors of unadministered estates; providing an effective date.

—to Judiciary.

By Senators de la Parte and Glisson—

SB 612—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the solicitation of charitable funds; amending §§496.02(1) and (5), 496.03(1)(f) and (2), 496.031(1) and (2), 496.04, 496.041(2) and (4), 496.07 and 496.13(5) and (6) (a), Florida Statutes; adding subsection (6) to §496.02, subsection (3) to §496.03, subsection (4) to §496.031, subsections (6)—(11) to §496.11 and subsection (7) to §496.13, Florida Statutes; amending the definitions of "charitable organization" and "professional solicitor"; defining "gross contributions"; granting the department of state regulatory powers over licensing, authority to promulgate regulations, and standing to maintain legal actions; specifying registration fee; requiring identification for those soliciting; adding requirement for licensee not to have been convicted for violation of this chapter; providing for employee's certificate and fee therefor; increasing professional solicitor's license fee from fifty dollars to five hundred dollars; clarifying those exempted from registration fee; clarifying those claiming exemption from registration and requiring a ten dollar fee for original registration of exemption; requiring independent members of federated organizations to pay a filing fee when they receive funds from sources other than the federated organization or a government agency; providing for the filing of certain information by charitable organizations; prohibiting telephone solicitation by professional solicitors; limiting professional solicitors' fees to twenty-five percent of the gross contributions solicited by them, which include all fund raising costs; limiting to not more than twenty-five percent of its gross the amount a charity may expend for fund raising; restricting use of words "charity", "charitable" and "police"; redefining

criminal penalties; granting the department of state the right to seek arrest warrants; providing for conflict; providing for severability; providing an effective date.

SB 613—A bill to be entitled An act relating to greyhound dog racing; creating section 550.266, Florida Statutes; requiring every holder of a valid, outstanding permit for greyhound dog racing to distribute in purses, four per cent of the gross pari-mutuel handle, including that of all special wagering pools, such purse money to be paid directly to the owners or operators of the kennels contracted to race at each of the State's greyhound racing tracks; providing an effective date.

SB 614—A bill to be entitled An act relating to special districts; creating chapter 162, Florida Statutes, consisting of §162.01, 162.02, 162.10, 162.20, and 162.21, Florida Statutes, entitled Special Districts; providing definitions; providing for appropriations and audits of funds for special districts; transferring existing independent special districts located solely within the boundaries of a single county to the proper governing authority upon passage of the act; providing that existing special acts affecting certain special districts shall be treated as ordinances after the effective date of the act; providing an effective date.

WHEREAS, on February 9, 1974, the people of the State of Florida, particularly those of Dade County, suffered the untimely loss of Carl A. Singleton of Coral Gables, Dade County, Representative from the one hundred eleventh district, and

WHEREAS, Representative Singleton was born on December 16, 1903, in Indianapolis, Indiana, and moved to Florida in 1939, and

WHEREAS, Representative Singleton was elected to the Florida House of Representatives in 1966 and was subsequently reelected in 1968, 1970, and 1972, and

WHEREAS, Representative Singleton was former Vice-Chairman of the General Legislation Committee and, at the time of his death, was a distinguished member of three key legislative committees, Finance and Taxation, Business Regulation, and Governmental Operations, and

WHEREAS, Representative Singleton fought for such eminent legislative acts as alcoholic and drug rehabilitation, library funding, wetlands preservation, equal rights, a joint commission studying administrative rule-making, and other numerous acts, and

WHEREAS, Representative Singleton, businessman and community leader, has represented the views and desires of manifold groups of people with courteous attention and outstanding devotion, and

WHEREAS, Representative Singleton deeply cherished the ideals embodied in the American form of democratic government and was a lifelong member of the Democratic Party, and

WHEREAS, Representative Singleton, affectionately called "Pappy" by his colleagues, was the oldest member of the House of Representatives, and

WHEREAS, Representative Singleton is survived by his wife, Dorothy (Dot) Duffy; by two brothers, Theodore and Earl; by a sister, Mabel; all of Indianapolis, Indiana, and, by a son, Franklin Scott of Coral Gables, and

WHEREAS, Representative Singleton has served the cause of better government in a selfless dedicated manner for the sole and ultimate purpose of maintaining and preserving the people's rights as they are constitutionally guaranteed, and

WHEREAS, Representative Singleton's demise is marked by a sense of deep loss and sadness, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Florida, the Senate Concurring:

That this legislative body pause in its deliberations to pay its respects to Carl A. Singleton.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this concurrent resolution be spread upon the pages of the Journals of the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Florida.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution, signed by the Constitutional Officers of the House and the

Senate, be certified to the Secretary of State under the Great Seal of the State, together with the condolence of these bodies in session assembled, to be forwarded to the family of Carl A. Singleton, our distinguished and lamented friend and former colleague.

HCR 2529—A concurrent resolution deploring the passing of John J. (Jack) Savage, Minority Leader pro tempore.

WHEREAS, the House of Representatives learned with deep regret of the passing on July 2, 1973, of John J. (Jack) Savage, of Redington Beach, Pinellas County, Representative from the Fifty-seventh District and Minority Leader pro tempore, and

WHEREAS, Mr. Savage was serving his fifth term in the House at the time of his death and had earned the respect and esteem of his colleagues and all persons privileged to know him, and

WHEREAS, Mr. Savage was indeed a man for all seasons, mindful of the problems of the young and those of the aging; a man among whose hallmarks was a tremendous capacity for patient understanding and tolerance, and a man totally without pettiness, and

WHEREAS, Mr. Savage followed diligently the tenets of the Sermon on the Mount, and of Mr. Savage it well may be said, in the words of Jesus, "Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled," and "Blessed are the merciful: for they shall obtain mercy," and "Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall see God," and

WHEREAS, Mr. Savage's unique talents as a legislator were recognized by the voters of two states, Kentucky, where he served in the House of Representatives in 1940 and 1941, and Florida, where he was elected to the House of Representatives in 1964 and reelected subsequently for consecutive terms, and

WHEREAS, Mr. Savage was a man for whom learning was a process which never stopped and which derived in major part from his readiness to listen to all people: his constituents, his colleagues, newsmen, and all others who sought to give counsel, and

WHEREAS, Mr. Savage, for all his willingness to listen, was nevertheless a lawmaker who made up his own mind, being guided by the sage counsel of Edmund Burke, who taught legislators everywhere that "your representative owes you, not his industry only, but his judgment," and

WHEREAS, Mr. Savage knew government was not an abstract system but rather an interweaving of human beings, of individual men and women rather than boxes on organizational charts, of people of varying degrees of talents, industry and failings, and

WHEREAS, Mr. Savage was recognized by his colleagues for his conscientiousness, having been voted the "second-session Member showing the greatest development" in the House in a bipartisan poll; chosen Minority Leader pro tempore by his fellows of the Republican party, and appointed by a Democratic Speaker as Chairman of the Committee on Standards and Conduct, the second Republican ever to hold a Chairmanship in this century and the first Republican since the drastic reduction in the number of committees in 1969, and

WHEREAS, he demonstrated to his legislative colleagues a steadiness of purpose, a talent for reconciling differences, and an ability to command respect as a leader, in among other ways first as Chairman of the Pinellas delegation and later, as previously mentioned, as Minority Leader pro tempore of the House of Representatives, and

WHEREAS, Mr. Savage's passing was lamented by a St. Petersburg newspaper, *The Independent*, in these words: "Some legislative knowledge and fairness will be missing from the 1974 Florida Legislature because State Rep. John (Jack) Savage is

dead . . . Mr. Savage was one of the most respected members of the minority party in Tallahassee . . . Mr. Savage was a practical man who listened to the people and who listened to other legislators—no matter what their political affiliation . . . He served us well since his first election in 1964 and we join his friends and colleagues in lamenting his loss," and

WHEREAS, Mr. Savage is survived by his wife, Mary Frances, a person as well known and loved in the legislative realm as was Mr. Savage, and by three brothers, William of New Albany, Indiana; Thomas and Neil and a sister, Mrs. Clifford Ohlman, all of Louisville, Kentucky, and many nieces and nephews, and

WHEREAS, Mr. Savage was born December 6, 1910, at Louisville; received his LL.B. degree from the University of Louisville in 1931; served as a special agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation; moved to Florida in 1953; was a member of the Kentucky State Bar Association and of the Florida Bar; served as Chairman of the Pinellas County Board of Adjustment and Appeal, 1961-64, and was a devout member of the Roman Catholic Church, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Florida, the Senate Concurring:

That we, his colleagues, miss this good man; that the people everywhere in Florida shall miss a faithful servant, and that we extend our condolences to Mary Frances and to the other members of his family; and that

Amendment 1a—On page 1, strike lines 26 through 29, and on page 2, strike lines 1 through 4.

Amendment 1 as amended was adopted.

Amendment 2—On page 1, after line 25 insert a new subsection (a):

(a) Each member of the instructional staff employed on a full time basis shall earn one day of sick leave for each month of employment, which shall be credited to the member at the end of that month, and which shall not be used prior to the time it is earned and credited to the member; ~~to ten days of sick leave at the beginning date of employment or at any time during the school year; provided, that no more than one hundred twenty~~

~~days of sick leave may be accumulated including sick leave including sick leave for the current year. there shall be no limit on the number of days of sick leave a member of the instructional staff may accrue; and provided, further that at least one half of this cumulative leave must be established within the district granting such leave.~~

Senator Graham moved the following amendment to Amendment 2 which was adopted:

Amendment 2a—On page 1, strike on line 2 all after the word "basis"; all of lines 3 and 4; line 5 through the word "member;" and insert: shall be entitled to four days of sick leave as of the first day of employment, and shall thereafter earn one day of sick leave for each month of employment, which shall be credited to the member at the end of that month, and which shall not be used prior to the time it is earned and credited to the member; provided, that the member shall be entitled to no more than one day of sick leave times the number of months of employment during the year of employment.

Amendment 2 as amended was adopted.

The Committee on Education offered the following title amendments which were adopted on motions by Senator Graham:

Amendment 3—On page 1, line 5, after "(1)", insert: (a)

Amendment 4—On page 1, line 6, after "Florida Statutes" insert: entitling full time instructional personnel to accumulate one day of sick leave per month of employment; providing for unlimited accumulation of sick leave days;

Senator Graham moved the following amendments which were adopted:

Amendment 5—On page 2, after line 4 insert: (c) A school board may establish policies to provide terminal pay to a member of the instructional staff at normal retirement or to his beneficiary if service is terminated by death. "Normal retirement," as used in this subsection, shall mean retirement under plan A, B, C, D, or E of the teachers' retirement system or any other plan established by the legislature with either full or reduced benefits as provided by law or mandatory retirement due to the attainment of the age of seventy years. "Normal retirement" shall not be interpreted to include disability retirement.

Amendment 6—On page 2, line 16, insert the following and renumber subsequent sections:

Section 3. Subsection (2) of section 231.48, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

231.48 Absences of other personnel.—

(2) A school board may establish policies to provide terminal pay to a member of the noninstructional staff at normal retirement or to his beneficiary if service is terminated by death; provided, that such terminal pay shall not exceed an amount determined by the daily rate of pay of the member of the noninstructional staff at the time of retirement or death multiplied by one half the total number of accumulated sick leave days credited to the member of the noninstructional staff at the time of retirement or death. "Normal retirement," as used in this subsection, shall mean retirement with either full or reduced benefits as provided by law or mandatory retirement due to the attainment of the age of seventy years, but shall not mean disability retirement.

Amendment 7—On page 1, line 8, after "personal reasons" insert: providing a maximum number of unused sick leave days for which an employee may be compensated upon retirement

Amendment 8—On page 1, line 5, after "(b)" insert: (c)

Amendment 9—On page 1, line 4, strike "instructional" and insert the following on line 8 after "reasons;": amending Section 231.48(2), Florida Statutes, to authorize terminal pay to noninstructional personnel who retire with full or reduced benefits as provided by law;
