—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

By Representative Craig—

HCR 2-Org.—A concurrent resolution for a joint meeting of the Legislature to receive the annual report of the Chief Justice on the State of the Judiciary.

—was read the first time in full. On motion by Senator Brantley, by two-thirds vote HCR 2-Org. was read the second time by title, unanimously adopted and certified to the House.

On motion by Senator Brantley the rules were waived and SCR 286 was placed on the agenda for consideration by the Committee on Rules and Calendar on April 22.

On motion by Senator Brantley, pursuant to HCR 2-Org., the Senate proceeded to the chamber of the House of Representatives for a joint meeting to receive the annual report of the Chief Justice of the Florida Supreme Court on the state of the judiciary.

The Speaker invited the President of the Senate, Dempsey J. Barron, and the President Pro Tempore, Alan Trask, to the rostrum.

The joint meeting was called to order by the Speaker.

The Justices of the Florida Supreme Court were received and seated.

The Speaker turned the gavel over to the President of the Senate and requested him to preside over the joint meeting.

The President in the Chair.

The President declared a quorum present.

Prayer by Dr. Robert M. McMillan, Chaplain of the Senate:

We seek your presence our God who are judge of all the earth: who knowest the thoughts and intents of the human heart: who judgest no man from his outward appearances but the motivations of his heart. Before your presence all men are exposed in the reality of their lives.

We come confessing by the very necessity and multiplicity of our laws our need to protect ourselves from each other's vices and "man's inhumanity to man."

We come aware of our deficiencies. Forgive those of us who are unaware of human deficiency and for our insensitivity to right and wrong. Show us also that blindness and indifference to the human dilemma is the greatest sin of all or else we are but fools living in fantasy.

We would not allow, our God, the frustrations of our failures to blind us to your mercy upon all of us: that you, as judge of all the earth, dost forever extend mercy to repentant souls. Nor would we, our God, surrender our constant endeavor to raise the standards of justice and righteousness knowing that it is righteousness that exalts a nation.

You have directed us that if we would judge ourselves we would not indeed require to be judged by you or others.

Grant these legislators wisdom, therefore, in the making of laws and these justices, skill, scrupulousness, sensitivity and sincerity in administering the laws of our society.

So then shall we individually and collectively protect ourselves and our liberties. So, too, shall we love our neighbor as we love ourselves. So grant us your aid and favor most merciful God. Amen.

The joint assembly pledged allegiance to the flag of the United States of America.

On motion by Representative Craig, a committee was appointed to escort the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Justice James C. Adkins, to the chamber and to the rostrum. The President appointed Senators Saunders, P. Thomas and Ware, and the Speaker appointed Representatives D. Clark, Craig and James.

The President presented the Chief Justice who reported on the state of the Judiciary as follows:

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, colleagues of the Supreme Court, members of the Legislature, ladies and gentlemen:

It is a fundamental principal of law that judicial notice is taken of those matters which are commonly known. In the eyes of many the image of the Supreme Court has suffered during the past year under an unrelenting barrage from the news media fusing an almost hysterical hatred of this Court in the minds of some people. We take judicial notice of this fact.

During this period of time we were bound and gagged by principles of judicial ethics which prevented us from participating, as an institution, in the many controversies which have arisen. This is as it should be. While being pierced by barbs of inordinate criticism, we were unaided by many who should have protected the institution of the Supreme Court.

Though mangled and mauled, we maintained our serenity by accepting the things we could not change; having the courage to change the things we could change; and having the wisdom to know the difference. We will continue this course and, with dignity, honor and efficiency, meet the challenge of one of the busiest state supreme courts in the nation.

The powers of our state government under the Constitution are divided into the Legislative, Executive and Judicial branches. This principle of separation of powers maintains the checks and balances in government upon which our great nation and all of its political entities have existed through the years. Although no person belonging to one branch can exercise any powers appertaining to either of the other branches unless provided in the Constitution, each branch of government must necessarily be compatible with the others. Your judicial legislative program should not be geared toward punishment of the judiciary nor toward fear of judicial power, but directed toward bettering the system so as to meet the needs of the people. As the population and tourism increases, the financial needs of the judicial system grow. We do not control the amount of litigation.

When you examine the judicial system of Florida I suggest that you cut through the bitter crust of criticism and taste the dessert—that is, the success which we have experienced during the past year.

When you first proposed judicial reform, and the people demand it by constitutional amendment, we charted a new course. It is interesting to note from an article in the New York Times that the State of New York recently began their program of judicial reform to relieve the felony-case backlog. A New York authority stated it would take three or four years to get the calendars down to the point where the courts were equipped to give immediate trial. This official then said: ". . . and by immediate I mean certainly not more than six months from the indictment."

After two years of judicial reform in the State of Florida the average felony case is being disposed of within 80 days from the date the person is taken into custody. Under our procedure a person is denied his constitutional right to a speedy trial if he is not tried within 180 days after being taken into custody for the commission of a felony. All courts are operating within this time period.

This tremendous progress was gained by the use of the constitutional tool given to us by you and our constitutional authority to administer all of the courts by adopting rules of practice and procedure. Perhaps this rule making authority bothers some of you, but it is a necessary ingredient in the exercise of our constitutional mandate to administer the courts of Florida.

RULE MAKING AUTHORITY

Many times a question arises as to whether a matter covered by a Supreme Court rule is of substantive law or of procedure. If it is substantive law, it is a legislative matter; if it is procedural, it is a judicial matter. We are in constant communication with the staffs of your various committees in an effort to determine which matters should be considered by the Legislature and which matters should be considered by

the Court. We have always agreed that any legislation which seems to relate to procedure should also be adopted by the Court as a Court rule. This removes the constitutional question.

Except in emergency situations, all rules of practice and procedure are recommended to us by The Florida Bar. In an effort to gain further cooperation between the Legislative branch and the Judicial branch, we are recommending to The Florida Bar that members of the Legislature be placed on all rules committees of The Florida Bar. The public can best be served if the two branches of government enact laws and adopt rules in a compatible manner so that no litigation will ever arise as to which branch of government had authority to adopt a particular measure.

Rules of Court, just as statutes, do not please everyone, but dissatisfaction by a few should not result in a complete modification of the rule making authority. Amending one rule may create confusion in administering others, unless all of the rules pertaining to that particular subject are considered. Any particular complaint concerning any rule will always be considered by the Court and The Florida Bar. Modification, if advisable, is a simple procedure.

The Supreme Court of Florida strongly recommends that the present constitutional provision relating to its rule making authority remain without modification, change or amendment.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE

The Rules of Criminal Procedure were prepared by a select advisory committee and, since adoption by the Court, have been recognized throughout the nation as a model. During the past year a critical situation arose when the state prison system became so crowded with inmates that no others could be accepted. Rather than blame judges for sentencing too many to prison, the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services requested a joint conference, so that a remedy could be sought. The usual excuse of insufficient appropriations and lack of facilities was unacceptable. We had to seek a remedy or solution within the limitations of the available money and bed space. A series of meetings were held which were attended by judges, prosecutors, defenders, prison officials, parole and probation officers, law enforcement officers, former inmates of the prison system, members of the Legislature and various civic organizations such as the Jaycee's, League of Women Voters and Chambers of Commerce.

This method of communication among all branches of government, together with input from other organizations, has resulted in many changes. No branch of government has blamed the other and all have recognized the problem as being a joint one which must be solved for the benefit of the people of the State of Florida. These meetings will continue.

Our state needs additional prison facilities as well as additional parole and probation supervisors. A program in this area has been presented to you. The judges recognized a failure in sentencing procedure and immediately began a series of training programs in an effort to establish guidelines and standards.

We have appointed an advisory committee to make recommendations to us so that we may re-examine the rules relating to plea bargaining, sentencing, and bail after conviction.

With this cooperative effort by all branches of government, absent fault finding and absent power struggles, a solution will result.

TRAINING PROGRAMS

With your assistance we have been able to provide a broad range of educational opportunities for judges of all courts in the State of Florida. For the first time we have provided a program for the training of new judges so that the judge is given some training in the performance of his judicial duties shortly after being appointed or elected.

The Circuit Judges' Conference conducts several training programs each year in an effort to keep the judiciary aware of the recent changes and developments in the law.

County judges who have been members of The Florida Bar for five years are eligible for assignment to the circuit bench. We provide a training program for these county judges, so that they have the capacity to act as circuit judges.

During the last session of the Legislature you wisely appropriated a sufficient sum of money so that our 27 non-lawyer judges of county courts would be provided legal training. The first institute commenced August 19, 1974, and continued through September 13th. The judges received approximately one hundred instruction hours while in residence at the University of Florida. Between November 13, 1974, and June, 1975, these judges will receive another one hundred hours of instruction time. We wish to continue this program from the summer of 1975 through the summer of 1976. The participant judges do not receive law school course credit. Their participation is directed to bringing them to a parity with other members of the judiciary who have experienced a conventional law school exposure. At the conclusion of the program all participants who complete the courses will have had sufficient instruction to be considered as qualified to serve in any capacity at the county court level in any county of the state. We may then use all of the county judges in the State of Florida to the fullest extent and will avoid any constitutional attack upon a system which has non-lawyers acting as judges. This is the only program of its kind in the nation and has been received by the non-lawyer judges with enthusiasm. We recommend that this program be continued and that you require all other county judges in the future to be members of The Florida Bar.

Our budget contains an item for an omnibus training program. With the use of these funds we will develop a training program for all officers involved in the criminal justice system; that is, judges, prosecuting officials, public defenders and clerks.

Through the joint efforts of the Supreme Court, the Circuit Judges' Conference and the University of Florida College of Law we expect to receive a Federal grant to provide for the preparation and use of video tape training programs. These video tapes may be used at the state or local level. Their use at a local circuit seminar will eliminate the need for many state conferences and the resulting travel and per diem cost. Also, the training program could be limited to the needs of a particular circuit or county.

TRAFFIC OFFENSES

Complete cooperation among the Legislative, Executive and Judicial branches of government resulted in the decriminalization of minor traffic offenses. On January 1, 1975, Florida became the first state to adopt this program. We have received accolades from all corners of the nation. Fines for traffic infractions have been standardized. Drivers are no longer detained needlessly to comply with procedural requirements that accompany the traditional traffic citation. The courts have been freed from a substantial portion of the case loads that have led to crowded dockets and delayed trials. State attorneys

and public defenders are relieved of some duties. Juries are unnecessary. The failure to pay the required civil penalty results in the suspension of a driver's license so that every person assuming the responsibility of operating a vehicle is also charged with the responsibility of paying the penalty. This program should be continued.

The traffic courts are the picture windows of the judiciary. A few years ago our traffic courts were rated in the bottom half of the nation's courts. Today we are leaders. Through your efforts in the enactment of modern legislation, and our efforts in establishing uniform rules of procedure with proper supervision, the traffic courts of Florida will maintain their position as leaders in all fields of traffic safety.

We have established thirty-nine self-supporting schools for treatment of those convicted of driving while under the influence of alcohol or drugs. During the past year 42,977 drivers completed these courses. Through the use of a Federal grant we have established the position of School Coordinator for the purpose of maintaining high standards and working out a program, with the cooperation of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, by which those in need may be rehabilitated and given vocational guidance. The drunk driver can then become a concerned citizen.

COURT MANAGEMENT

Upon adoption of the judicial reform amendment to the Constitution, you mandated that the Supreme Court develop a uniform case reporting system, including a uniform means of reporting categories of cases, time required in the disposition of cases, and manner of disposition of cases. This system is referred to as the CDR system and has been in operation for two years. We are now able to maintain an accurate record of the number and category of cases filed and the number and category of cases disposed of during any year. The development of the program has been expensive but this annual cost should decrease in years to come. When completely developed each circuit will be furnished statistical information to aid in court management.

Without this program, it would be impossible to give an accurate estimate as to the needs of the judicial system, insofar as judges, state attorneys, public defenders and other personnel are concerned. It will be a valuable tool in the management of the individual circuits.

To further develop this system we have requested all of the judges of Florida to cooperate in the preparation of a weighted caseload system. The results of this study will show the time required in Florida for the disposition of various types of cases. We will then know the number of judges needed in each division of the court which handles a particular type of litigation. All of the judges in Florida, except six, volunteered their services in this project.

Each chief judge of the twenty judicial circuits is charged with the responsibility of managing all of the courts in his circuit. All of the local courts have displayed expertise in the field of management and it is in this manner that we have been able to keep the dockets of the trial courts current at all times.

No longer is each judge a court to himself. We are approaching a unified judicial system and, with the continuance of our management program, this goal should be reached in the near future.

STATE FUNDING

At the present time there is no method by which the individual employees in the various offices of the clerks of the circuit

court could be properly classified, so state funding of these offices at this time is impractical. With the cooperation of the clerks, the Supreme Court will prepare and adopt uniform rules of procedure for use in the office of the clerk of the circuit court. When these rules are adopted a study should be made to determine the classification of the needed employees. Even in the event of state funding, the clerks of the circuit court should maintain control over the employment of personnel in the office, with accountability to the Supreme Court and the Legislature.

At the present time we are making use of the administrative mechanism in the Executive branch and are receiving cooperation. Eventually you should provide that the Judicial branch of government have complete control over its personnel management as well as fiscal affairs with accountability to you as the Legislative branch. The Judicial branch of government is the only branch that is accountable in any way to the two other branches of government in the exercise of its constitutional authority.

SALARIES

Although you recently increased the salaries of all judges, for which we are grateful, additional federal deductions and the eight percent retirement deduction resulted in only a small net amount of take home pay. The inflation and the rising cost of living has made it difficult to entice able attorneys into the judiciary. During the past year four chief judges resigned for salary reasons. Although Florida ranks ninth in population in the United States, it ranks twelfth in the salaries paid the highest appellate courts and ranks sixteenth in the salaries paid the general trial courts. We recommend that the retirement deduction of eight percent be removed and that the state be responsible for the amount due the retirement fund.

CERTIFICATION OF JUDGES

Although we have accomplished the speedy disposition of cases at the trial level, a backlog is accumulating at the appellate level. This Court created an Appellate Review Committee for the purpose of examining the problem and developing a long-range plan for the speedy disposition of appellate cases. This Committee recommended that two additional appellate judges be created for the First District, the Second District and the Fourth District. The Committee also recommended that the filing fee in the Supreme Court be increased from \$25.00 to \$100.00. Under existing law the Supreme Court is authorized to set the filing fee in the District Court of Appeal and the Committee recommended that this filing fee be increased from \$25.00 to \$75.00. If these increases are made, the projected income would be sufficient to finance the creation of the additional District Court of Appeal judgeships.

This increase of judges at the appellate level was also recommended by the Judicial Council of Florida as well as the Florida Appellate Judges' Conference. The Supreme Court has certified the need for these judges and the reasons therefor are stated in the Court's certificate which has been filed with you.

In addition we have certified a need for fifteen additional circuit court judges and twelve additional county court judges. Nine of the circuit judges are needed in the metropolitan areas of Pinellas and Dade counties.

This certification was based upon an examination of the statistics furnished by the CDR system, an evaluation of the population and geographical areas involved, conferences with the chief judges of each circuit as to their needs, conferences with attorneys in the general practice, as well as state attorneys and public defenders, and also personal examination of the dockets in many of the circuits.

Since decriminalization of minor traffic offenses, there has been a decrease of approximately seventy percent thus far in those appearing in court for hearing. However, the Supreme Court of the United States recently imposed additional duties upon judges in requiring a judicial determination of probable cause when any person is taken into custody.

JUDICIAL QUALIFICATIONS COMMISSION

Justices of the Supreme Court should not be required to pass upon the removal or reprimand of fellow justices. As Chief Justice I recently was faced with the heavy responsibility of having to select judges to sit upon a special panel. It is impossible to describe the nature of this responsibility. The first panel was not selected until I had conferred with all of my fellow justices who were not involved. The panel was selected only after considering the particular qualification or particular position that each individual judge held in the judiciary. All of this was recited in the order creating the panel. Even though one justice not involved did not participate in the final order, we had the benefit of his advice and suggestions. In fact, several members of the panel finally selected were suggested by him.

The second panel was also selected on the basis of a particular position which each judge held in the judiciary.

From my personal experience I strongly recommend that the Constitution be amended so that if future panels should be called to judge members of the Supreme Court in cases involving reprimand or recommendation for removal, the panel should be selected by position as described in the Constitution. No chief justice should be placed in such position and be required to work out a procedure for selection of any future panel.

I am proud to say that we have accomplished much during adverse times. About ten percent of the cases contained in a national selected case series are from Florida courts. The eight opinions selected as the most outstanding in tort law by a national magazine included an opinion by the Supreme Court of Florida. The Supreme Court has kept its docket of 2000 cases per year current, regardless of these other problems.

The judiciary, in maintaining its judicial independence, has frequently been subjected to inordinate criticism. After the Supreme Court of the United States first asserted its independence by declaring an act of Congress unconstitutional, it was castigated to such a degree that it did not again pass upon the constitutionality of an act of Congress for fifty years. Upon another occasion all Federal courts except the Supreme Court of the United States were abolished so that the justices had to "ride the circuit" and participate in the trial of cases throughout the country. In recent years a nationwide attack was made on the Supreme Court of the United States, and particularly against Chief Justice Earl Warren. The courts have survived because the American people are committed in their hearts and minds to the concept of equal justice under law administered by a judicial system headed by judges and aided by lawyers.

The Supreme Court of Florida holds high esteem for you of the Legislature as a responsible branch of government and likewise for the Executive branch. We recognize your unfettered right to the performance of your responsibilities within the orbit of your constitutional authority. We ask no more than that you give us this same consideration.

As Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Florida I say, and with all confidence, that your Supreme Court is a strong Court and its justices can be neither bossed, bluffed nor bought. Though criticized by some at home, we continue to receive ac-

colades throughout the nation for our expertise in opinion writing, court management and judicial reform. We will continue to perform our constitutional responsibilities efficiently and effectively as we have done in the past, always striving for a more efficient operation at less cost.

From my remarks you will notice that our greatest success in the administration of the judicial system is attained only when we establish and maintain communication and cooperation among all branches of government. Our responsibilities and our authority overlap. Only through working together can we give the best service to the people of the State of Florida and I look forward to working with you.

May God grant that the time never comes when one branch of government may say to the other, "I have no need for thee".

The committee previously appointed escorted the Chief Justice from the rostrum and from the House chamber, followed by the Justices of the Supreme Court.

Point of Order

Senator Myers: Mr. President, I would like to raise a point of order on the referencing of SB 192 and suggest to the President that it be referred to the Committee on Ways and Means because of its fiscal impact. The bill requires that all persons who are convicted of a felony serve a minimum of one-third of their term in prison before they are eligible for parole.

Mr. President, you recall that there was a similar question before you last week with respect to the question of whether there was any fiscal impact with regard to the minimum sentencing bill and you ruled the point not well taken because the fiscal impact was not determinable. Mr. President, studies have been made by the Division of Corrections and the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services and there is really no such question here. There is no speculation. If this bill passes it will have a fiscal impact. During 1973-74, 561 persons with fixed length sentences were released from the custody of the Division of Corrections after having served less than one-third of their sentences. If those persons were required to serve 33 1/3 percent of their sentences as is proposed in this bill, before becoming eligible for parole, they would have had to serve 219,667 additional man days — person days — in prison. Calculated at the cost of \$12.50 per day, it would have cost the State of Florida an additional \$2,745,840. To accommodate those persons would have required 602 additional prison beds at the prevailing average cost of \$30,000 per bed for a medium-sized secure facility. It would have cost the State of Florida \$18,060,000 to build the additional prison beds required.

In other words, Mr. President, the total cost which we can definitely ascertain without speculation for implementing this changed policy as evidenced in SB 192 would have approximated \$20,805,840. I would respectfully submit that there is a definite fiscal impact here which the Ways and Means Committee should consider.

Mr. President: The chair would like to clarify a matter for the membership of the Senate relative to raising a point of order. Rule 4.8 is very broad as has been indicated earlier by some members of the Senate, but there are two good precedents, one by Senator Mathews, one by Senator Horne, which conclude that you cannot use that rule as a subterfuge for the delay of or the failure to pass legislation. If you permit a bill to remain on the calendar until too much time has elapsed, with knowledge, then you can't raise the point under that rule. It's almost like entrapment or estoppel.

Senator Myers came to me on Friday and talked with me about this bill, before it was on the calendar. It is the opinion of the chair, considering the broad interpretation of the rule and the broad application of this bill — it relates to all felonies —, that this bill falls within the meaning and purpose of the rule. I think also it would be in the best interest of having this legislation considered, to rule today that the point is well taken.

SB 192 was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

(2) The term “privately-owned building” shall mean any building not owned by a governmental agency.

255.249 (1) The division shall have responsibility and authority for the custodial and preventive maintenance, repair, security, and allocation of space of all state-owned office buildings and the grounds located adjacent thereto.

(2) The department shall promulgate rules and regulations pursuant to chapter 120, providing:

(a) Methods for accomplishing the duties outlined in subsection (1);

(b) Procedures for soliciting and accepting competitive proposals for leased space of 5,000 square feet or more in privately-owned buildings and for evaluating the proposals received;

(c) A standard method for determining square footage or any other measurement used as the basis for lease payments or other charges;

(d) Methods of allocating space in both state-owned office buildings and privately-owned buildings leased by the state based on use, personnel and office equipment;

(f) Maximum rental rates, by geographic areas or by county, for leasing privately-owned space;

(g) A standard method for the assessment of rent to state agencies and other authorized occupants of state-owned office space notwithstanding the source of funds;

(h) For full disclosure of the names and the extent of interest of the owners holding 10% or more interest in any privately-owned property leased to the state or in the entity holding title to the property; and

(i) For full disclosure of the names of all public officials, agents or employees holding any interest in any privately-owned property leased to the state or in the entity holding title to the property, and the nature and extent of their interest.

Section 5. Section 255.25, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

255.25 Approval of the Division of Building Construction and Property Management Maintenance prior to construction or lease of buildings.—

(1) No state agency shall construct a building for state use unless prior approval of the architectural design and preliminary construction plans is first obtained from the division of Building Construction and Maintenance of the Department of General Services.

(2) No state agency shall lease a building or any part thereof for state use unless prior approval of the lease conditions and of the need therefor is first obtained from the division of Building Construction and Maintenance. Any approved lease may include an option to purchase or an option to renew the lease, or both, upon such terms and conditions established by the division subject to final approval by the head of the Department of General Services.

(3) No state agency shall enter into a lease as lessee for the use of 5,000 square feet or more of space in a privately-owned building except upon advertisement for and receipt of competitive bids and award to the lowest and best bidder. The division shall have the authority to approve a lease for 5,000 square feet or more of space that covers more than one fiscal year if such lease is, in the judgment of the division, in the best interests of the state, subject to the provisions of s.216.311.

(4) The division shall not authorize any state agency to enter into a lease agreement for space in a privately-owned building when suitable space is available in a state-owned building located in the same geographic region, except upon presentation to the division of sufficient written justification, acceptable to the division, that a separate space is required in order to fulfill the statutory duties of the agency making such request.

Section 6. This act shall take effect July 1, 1975.
