

# JOURNAL OF THE FLORIDA SENATE

Monday, April 12, 1976

The Senate was called to order by the President Pro Tempore at 8:30 a.m. for the purpose of conducting the order of business of introduction and reference of resolutions, memorials, bills and joint resolutions pursuant to Rule 4.3.

## INTRODUCTION

By Senator Spicola (by request)—

**SB 553**—A bill to be entitled An act relating to regulation of oysters and shellfish; amending s. 370.16(17), Florida Statutes; authorizing the taking of oysters and clams for relaying under certain conditions; providing powers of the Division of Marine Resources; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Natural Resources and Conservation and Commerce.

By Senator MacKay—

**SB 554**—A bill to be entitled An act relating to gasoline dealer's license tax; amending s. 206.404, Florida Statutes; increasing the retail gasoline dealer's license and transfer fees from \$5 to \$15 annually; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Commerce and Ways and Means.

By Senator Scarborough—

**SB 555**—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Florida Retirement System; amending s. 121.091(4)(g), Florida Statutes, providing a monthly benefit for certain justices or judges who are retired for disability pursuant to Article V of the State Constitution; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

By Senators Peterson and Lewis—

**SB 556**—A bill to be entitled An act relating to citrus; creating s. 601.091, Florida Statutes; defining "Interior" and "Indian River" citrus production areas of the state; providing an exemption; protecting against improper area identification of citrus; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Agriculture and Commerce.

By Senator Holloway—

**SB 557**—A bill to be entitled An act relating to judicial salaries; providing salaries for Supreme Court Justices and District Court of Appeal, Circuit, and County Court Judges; providing annual cost-of-living adjustments; repealing ss. 26.031(2), 26.51, and 34.024, Florida Statutes, relating to salaries of Circuit and County Court Judges; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary-Civil, Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

By Senator Holloway—

**SB 558**—A bill to be entitled An act relating to assignment of earnings for child support; providing for court-ordered or voluntary assignment of earnings for child support obligations; providing such assignment is binding on an assignor's employer upon receipt of a certified copy of the court order or voluntary assignment; giving priority to such assignment as against any attachment, execution, or other assignment; prohibiting an employer from using such assignment as grounds for dismissal of an assignor; providing that the employer may deduct a sum from the assignor's earnings for clerical work or expense involved in complying with such assignment; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary-Civil and Commerce.

By Senator Peterson—

**SB 559**—A bill to be entitled An act relating to plant industry; creating s. 581.182, Florida Statutes; requiring a permit for introduction of citrus plants, citrus plant products, or propagations therefrom from other states, territories, or foreign countries; requiring confiscation and destruction of citrus plants, citrus plant products, or propagations therefrom introduced from other states, territories, or foreign countries without a permit, or any plants propagated thereafter from such materials; prohibiting propagation of citrus trees from a tree or certain material brought into the state without prior indexing; providing for the cost of such indexing; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Agriculture, Commerce and Ways and Means.

By Senators Winn and Gordon—

**SB 560**—A bill to be entitled An act relating to jai alai frontons; creating s. 551.032, Florida Statutes; authorizing summer season for jai alai; providing additional dates for a summer jai alai season; providing for the number of operation days for each licensee or permit holder; prohibiting certain hours of operation; providing the location of counties in which the summer season will be applicable; providing certain exemptions from other provisions of law; providing limitations of eligibility of persons for summer jai alai licenses; eliminating operation day conflicts with other provisions of law; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Commerce and Ways and Means.

By Senator Hair—

**SB 561**—A bill to be entitled An act relating to invention developers; providing definitions; requiring contracts to be in writing; providing a right of cancellation of a contract; requiring invention developers to disclose certain facts; limiting an invention developer's right to acquire an interest in an invention; preserving right of action or defense as to third parties; subjecting a developer's assignee to liability; requiring a quarterly statement; requiring certain terms to be included in a contract; providing that other laws are applicable; declaring certain contracts void and unenforceable; providing for civil action and awarding of damages; providing for attorney's fees; providing a penalty; providing for injunction against violations; requiring a bond or other security; requiring records to be kept; prohibiting certain advertising; providing prospective effect; providing severability; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Commerce, Judiciary-Criminal and Ways and Means.

By Senator Holloway—

**SM 562**—A memorial to the Congress of the United States urging the Congress to oppose the substantial reduction and possible closing of the Boca Chica Naval Air Base in Key West, Florida.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

By Senator Graham—

**SB 563**—A bill to be entitled An act relating to motor vehicle license taxes; adding section 320.10(1)(j), Florida Statutes; exempting from license taxes motor vehicles owned or leased by nonprofit health and social service organizations to transport persons who are elderly, handicapped, or disabled; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Health and Rehabilitative Services and Ways and Means.

By Senator Saylor—

SB 564—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the district school system; amending s. 230.03(2), Florida Statutes; specifying powers and duties of district school boards; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Senator Scarborough—

SB 565—A bill to be entitled An act relating to cosmetology; amending s. 477.02(1) and (4), Florida Statutes, and adding a new subsection; requiring licensure of any person who operates a cosmetology salon or specialty salon; providing that each cosmetology salon shall be supervised by a registered master cosmetologist; providing for supervision of specialty salons by registered cosmetologists or specialists; providing for inspection of salons; amending s. 477.03, Florida Statutes, providing definitions of the various practices of cosmetology; amending s. 477.04, Florida Statutes, to provide that a registered cosmetologist may be in charge of, own, or operate a specialty salon without the supervision of a registered master cosmetologist; amending s. 477.06(4), Florida Statutes, to provide for categories and qualifications of specialists; repealing s. 477.06(2), Florida Statutes, relating to discontinuation of issuance of certificates of registration to practice manicuring and pedicuring; adding subsection (9) to s. 477.08, Florida Statutes, providing for approval by the board of courses of training for certification; adding subsections (5) and (6) to s. 477.29, Florida Statutes, providing for issuance of certificates to persons already practicing as specialists; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Commerce.

SB 566—A bill to be entitled An act relating to areas of critical state concern; adding subsection (19) to s. 380.05, Florida Statutes, requiring the recordation of the boundaries of areas of critical state concern by the state land planning agency; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Natural Resources and Conservation.

By Senator Wilson—

SJR 567—A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Section 4, Article VII of the State Constitution, relating to assessments for purposes of taxation.

—was read the first time and referred to the Committees on Ways and Means and Rules and Calendar.

SB 568—A bill to be entitled An act relating to trespass; creating s. 810.12, Florida Statutes; specifying circumstances under which unauthorized entry upon land is prima facie evidence of intent to trespass or commit other acts pertaining thereto; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary-Criminal.

By Senator Saylor—

SB 569—A bill to be entitled An act relating to restoration of civil rights; amending s. 944.292, Florida Statutes; requiring application for restoration of civil rights; deleting limitation on civil rights suspended; amending s. 944.293, Florida Statutes; providing procedure for restoration; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary-Criminal.

By Senator Deeb—

SB 570—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public employees; amending s. 447.603, Florida Statutes; providing that a public employer adopting certain local provisions and pro-

cedures may give effect to such provisions and procedures upon filing same with the Public Employees Relations Commission; providing for a court injunction; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Governmental Operations and Commerce.

By Senator Wilson—

SB 571—A bill to be entitled An act relating to elections; amending ss. 27.01, 27.50, Florida Statutes; providing for nonpartisan elections of state attorneys and public defenders; creating ss. 28.055, 30.065, Florida Statutes; providing for nonpartisan elections of Clerks of the Circuit Courts and sheriffs; amending ss. 105.011-105.041, and 105.061-105.09, Florida Statutes, relating to nonpartisan elections for judicial officers, to conform to the provisions of this act; providing election procedures for nonpartisan officers; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary-Civil and Governmental Operations.

By Senator Ware—

SB 572—A bill to be entitled An act relating to resort taxes; providing for the levy of a resort tax of 1 percent on certain transient rentals and admissions in addition to all other taxes; providing for collection and distribution; providing prohibitions; providing for enforcement; providing penalties; providing exemptions; creating the Florida Tourist Commission; providing for membership and compensation of the Florida Tourist Commission; providing for disposition of revenues; providing for the adoption of rules and regulations; prohibiting the authorization of any credit or discount for collecting the tax; providing for severability; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Commerce, Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

SB 573—A bill to be entitled An act relating to funeral directing and embalming; amending s. 470.08, Florida Statutes; providing certain changes in qualifications of applicants; amending s. 470.09(2), (3), Florida Statutes; providing certain changes in examinations; amending s. 470.10(1)(b), (3), (5), (7), (9), Florida Statutes; providing certain changes in licensing requirements; providing registration and inspection fees for cinerators; amending s. 470.11(1), (3), Florida Statutes; providing certain changes in intern training; amending s. 470.112(1), (2), Florida Statutes; providing certain changes in number of interns permitted at a training agency; amending s. 470.113(3), Florida Statutes; providing certain changes in transfer of interns; amending s. 470.12(1)(c), (f)-(h), (2)(c), (d), (i), (l), (m), Florida Statutes; providing certain changes in grounds for license revocation; amending s. 470.13(2), (3), Florida Statutes; providing certain changes in license revocation or suspension procedure; amending ss. 470.14, 470.17, 470.19, Florida Statutes; providing certain changes in judicial review of administrative disciplinary action, records to be kept and fees received by the board; amending s. 470.30(1), (7), Florida Statutes; providing certain changes in registration of funeral directors and embalmers; repealing ss. 470.25, 470.33, Florida Statutes, relating to certain funeral director duties, and penalty for failure to register a funeral establishment; providing an effective date.

SB 574—A bill to be entitled An act relating to hunting; creating s. 372.5715, Florida Statutes; requiring a certificate of competency and safety in the handling of firearms for certain hunters; requiring the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission to prescribe a course of instruction; providing for issuance of such certificates; accepting certificates issued outside the state; providing a penalty; creating s. 372.5716, Florida Statutes; requiring hunters to wear daylight fluorescent orange garments; providing a penalty; creating s. 372.5717, Florida Statutes; providing for inspection and possession

of licenses; creating s. 372.5718, Florida Statutes; providing penalties for hunting under the influence of liquor or drugs; creating s. 372.5719, Florida Statutes; providing penalties for hunting in a careless or reckless manner; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Natural Resources and Conservation, Judiciary-Criminal and Ways and Means.

By Senators Peterson, MacKay, Graham and Lewis—

SB 575—A bill to be entitled An act relating to student conduct and discipline; adding s. 228.041(26)-(29), Florida Statutes; providing definitions; adding s. 229.512(14), Florida Statutes, requiring the Commissioner of Education to develop model rules of conduct and discipline; amending s. 230.22(2), Florida Statutes; requiring the school board to adopt specific rules of conduct and discipline; amending s. 230.23(6)(c), Florida Statutes, and adding paragraph (d) to said subsection; requiring the school board to develop a code of student conduct and requiring such code be made available to certain persons; providing for the procedure in expulsion hearings; amending s. 230.33(8)(c), Florida Statutes; requiring the superintendent to notify the pupil and his parent or guardian of recommendation for expulsion; amending ss. 232.26(1), 232.27, Florida Statutes; providing for the authority of principals and teachers in the control and discipline of students; creating s. 232.275, Florida Statutes; providing that certain persons are not liable for disciplinary actions; providing an exception; amending s. 230.234, Florida Statutes; authorizing the district school board to provide legal services to certain persons against whom a civil action is brought; providing an effective date.

By Senators MacKay, Graham, Gordon, Vogt, Glisson and J. Thomas—

SB 576—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public schools; providing for agreements between school districts and other public agencies for the use of school buses for the transportation of the elderly or mentally or physically handicapped; providing for the assumption of the proportionate share of the costs; providing for an indemnification of loss and a hold harmless from liability for the school board; providing for the nonuse of certain marking devices when school buses are used for nonschool purposes; amending s. 234.041(1), Florida Statutes; providing an exemption; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Health and Rehabilitative Services and Education.

By Senator Lewis—

SB 577—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the state career service system; amending s. 110.022(1)(e), Florida Statutes; authorizing the Department of Administration to establish a policy that permits an employee to transfer unused annual leave to his accumulated sick leave account; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

By Senators Graham, Barron, Gordon, Vogt, Glisson, MacKay, J. Thomas and J. Lane—

SB 578—A bill to be entitled An act relating to community care for the elderly; revising The Community Care for the Elderly Program Development Act of 1973 into The Community Care for the Elderly Act, by amending ss. 409.3621, 409.3622, 409.3623, 409.3624, Florida Statutes, repealing ss. 409.3625, 409.3626, 409.3627, Florida Statutes, and creating ss. 409.3628, 409.3629, 409.3630, Florida Statutes, in order to provide home-delivered service programs, multi-service senior center programs, and family placement programs for elderly persons; prescribing the powers and duties of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services; providing for the use of community resources and volunteers; requiring the purchase of insurance to protect volunteers from personal liability; authorizing the department to accept gifts; authorizing the department or

entity developing the program to prescribe a rate schedule for contribution of money or services in payment for certain services; providing an effective date.

SB 579—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the county road system; amending s. 336.59(2), Florida Statutes; providing the time that each county shall distribute road and bridge taxes to municipalities; providing an effective date.

By Senator Peterson—

SB 580—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the regulation of bail bondsmen and runners; amending s. 648.27(3), Florida Statutes; requiring a law enforcement agency to inform the Department of Insurance of any criminal charge and the disposition of such charge filed against any applicant seeking to be licensed or to continue to be licensed as a bail bondsman or runner; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

By Senator Wilson—

SB 581—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the manatee; requiring the Department of Natural Resources to conduct studies of the manatee; requiring the department to prescribe rules and regulations, including regulations on boating, to protect the manatee; authorizing the department to grant permits for the capture, possession, transportation, sale, or display of manatees; providing penalties for violation of rules of the department, for the capture, possession, transportation, or display of manatees without a permit, for the capture of manatees in excess of the number authorized, and for the willful killing, destroying, injuring, or torturing a manatee; repealing s. 370.12(2), Florida Statutes, which subsection relates to protection of the manatee and provides a penalty; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Natural Resources and Conservation, Judiciary-Criminal and Ways and Means.

By Senator Myers—

SB 582—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the State and County Officers and Employees' Retirement System; amending ss. 122.02(4)(a) and 122.04, Florida Statutes; authorizing the purchase of retirement credit under such system for military service between 1939 and 1946 if officer or employee has earned 10 years of creditable service; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

By Senators Johnston and Lewis—

SB 583—A bill to be entitled An act relating to civil and criminal actions against law enforcement officers; providing a definition; providing for payment of legal costs and attorney's fees in certain situations; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

By Senator Firestone—

SB 584—A bill to be entitled An act relating to cruelty to children and animals; amending s. 828.03, Florida Statutes; authorizing counties to appoint agents to prevent cruelty to children and animals; amending s. 828.073(2)-(4), (6)(b), Florida Statutes; authorizing the agent of a county to take custody of a neglected or mistreated animal; providing procedure; authorizing auction or destruction of such animal in certain cases; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

SB 585—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the City of Kissimmee, Osceola County; prescribing the boundaries of said city; providing an effective date.

SB 586—A bill to be entitled An act relating to civil medical malpractice actions; amending s. 768.134(1), Florida Statutes; providing conditions under which a claimant is responsible for the defendant's cost of defending against a claim in court; providing that the court may require the claimant to post a bond or make a deposit in the registry of the court; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Commerce.

By Senators W. D. Childers and Brantley—

SB 587—A bill to be entitled An act relating to verdicts and the payment of judgments in certain actions; requiring the itemization of damages in certain verdicts; providing alternative means for payment of certain judgments; providing for modifications or cessations of payments under certain conditions; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary-Civil and Commerce.

By Senator Sayler—

SB 588—A bill to be entitled An act relating to polling places; amending s. 104.36, Florida Statutes; prohibiting any type of solicitation within 100 yards of any polling place; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary-Civil and Judiciary-Criminal.

By Senators Dunn and Gordon—

SB 589—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the assistance of small businesses; providing legislative intent and definitions; requiring the Department of Commerce to assist small businesses; providing that a meaningful percentage of state purchasing be procured from such businesses and providing a waiver under certain circumstances; providing for interagency cooperation; requiring submission of an annual report; creating an advisory council; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Commerce, Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

SB 590—A bill to be entitled An act relating to nursing; amending ss. 464.071(3), 464.121(3), Florida Statutes; increasing the fees for the licensure of registered professional nurses and licensed practical nurses; amending s. 464.151(1)(a), (3), Florida Statutes; increasing the fee for renewal of licenses; providing a fee for classifying a licensed nurse as inactive; amending s. 464.152, Florida Statutes; increasing the fee for the issuance to another jurisdiction of a statement evidencing licensure; creating ss. 464.105, 464.153, Florida Statutes; providing for certification in advanced or specialized nursing practice; providing a fee for such certification and for renewal thereof; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Commerce and Ways and Means.

By Senator P. Thomas—

SB 591—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Florida Uniform Traffic Control Law; amending s. 316.288, Florida Statutes, providing certain requirements for school buses and

school bus drivers; providing legislative intent; requiring liability insurance; providing semiannual inspections; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Education and Transportation.

By Senator Myers—

SB 592—A bill to be entitled An act relating to offender rehabilitation; repealing s. 945.30, Florida Statutes, which requires, subject to exceptions, anyone on probation or parole to contribute \$10 per month toward the cost of his supervision; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary-Criminal, Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

By Senator Myers—

SB 593—A bill to be entitled An act relating to medical, surgical and hospital plan corporations; amending s. 641.02, Florida Statutes; providing for the composition of the boards of directors of such corporations; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Health and Rehabilitative Services.

By Senator Holloway—

SB 594—A bill to be entitled An act relating to social workers; providing definitions; prohibiting the practice of social work by certain unlicensed persons after July 1, 1978; providing for the licensing of certified social workers, social workers, and social work associates by the Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation; providing requirements; prohibiting certain unlicensed persons from independent practice of social work after July 1, 1978; providing exemptions; designating certain unlawful acts; providing duties for the Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation; providing for disciplinary proceedings; providing for license renewal; providing license and renewal fees; creating a Social Worker Licensing Board to be composed of seven members appointed by the Governor; providing duties; providing for privileged communications; providing penalties; amending s. 215.37, Florida Statutes; providing financing and budgeting for the Social Workers Licensing Board in the manner of other examining and licensing boards; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Commerce, Governmental Operations, Judiciary-Criminal and Ways and Means.

By Senator Wilson—

SB 595—A bill to be entitled An act relating to local occupational license taxes; adding s. 205.033(8), Florida Statutes; granting counties the option to limit the levy of an occupational license tax to unincorporated areas of the county; providing for maximum rate for such tax; providing that in such event all revenues shall go to the governing body of the county; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

By Senators Zinkil and J. Thomas—

SCR 596—A concurrent resolution in commendation of Carol B. Mears as Florida Teacher of the Year 1976.

By Senators Graham, Lewis, Gordon, Vogt and Glisson—

SB 597—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the "Fitting and Selling of Hearing Aids Act"; amending s. 468.122, Florida Statutes, and creating s. 468.1351, Florida Statutes; prohibiting the sale of a hearing aid without a prescription or written recommendation by an audiologist or physician; providing for waiver and exemption; providing for records; conforming terminology to reorganization of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services; amending s. 468.136, Florida Statutes;

prohibiting the sale of a hearing aid unless the receipt and packaging contain certain information; creating s. 468.1365, Florida Statutes, prohibiting the sale of a hearing aid without providing a money-back guarantee; limiting cancellation fees; amending s. 468.1281, Florida Statutes, and repealing ss. 468.123(11), 468.124, 468.125, Florida Statutes, to delete obsolete provisions relating to the advisory council on hearing aids which was abolished; providing penalties; providing an effective date.

Father, may our teachers teach wisely, our judges judge justly, our writers write truly, our legislators legislate honestly, our media focus on values and virtue. May our clergy speak the Word of God in fullness and truth, and all who name your name live what they believe.

Be gracious to this Senate, Father, and to all civil leaders—national, state, and local, endowing them with the wisdom to turn your will into the law of the land. Help each of us as private citizens to count for all things godly in our cities, and to bear Christ's standards in our homes and communities at work and at play. Help us to share with all people everywhere the joys of your saving grace.

In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

## BICENTENNIAL OBSERVANCE

The President recognized The Honorable Philip F. Ashler, narrator of the Bicentennial observances, who announced the activities for this day and the following were presented:

Fife and Drum Corps of North Florida Christian Schools.

Musical program by the Capital Chordsmen Barbershop Chapter:

*What a Country, Civil War Medley, and The Star Spangled Banner.*

Mr. Ashler: Much of Florida's history centers about the conflict between the English and Spanish cultures. The conflict was always acrimonious, but it was never more bitter and serious than when Andrew Jackson with 800 regulars, 900 Georgia militia and 300 Indians, crossed the boundary into West Florida in 1818. On March 16, he camped at and built Fort Gadsden on Prospect Bluff. On April 6 he reached St. Marks and took it over from the Spaniards, supposedly in hot pursuit of Indians who had fled across the international boundary from the United States to Florida. The Spanish Governor was incensed by Jackson's invasion. Indeed he knew of Jackson's reputation for bold action and it was undoubtedly with this reputation in mind that he wrote to the American General on 23 May, 1818;

"Having received information that you have passed the frontiers with the troops under your command, and are now within the territory of this province of West Florida, which is under my government, I must solemnly protest against this proceeding as an offence against my sovereign; and I do exhort you, and require of you, forthwith to withdraw from the same; in default of which, and in case of a continuance of your aggression, I shall repel force by force.

In this event, the consequences will doubtless be the effusion of blood, and the interruption of the good understanding which has hitherto subsisted between our two nations; but as the party repelling an insult is never deemed the aggressor, you will be responsible before God and men for all the fatal consequences which may ensue."

On the same day, General Jackson responded.

Portraying General Andrew Jackson, The Honorable Malory E. Horne, former President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives, read the following excerpts from General Jackson's response on May 23, 1818:

The southern frontier of the United States has, for more than twelve months, been exposed to all the horrors of a cruel and savage war. A party of outlaws and refugees from the Creek nation and Seminole Indians inhabiting the territory of Spain, all uniting, have raised the tomahawk, and, in the character of savage warfare, have neither regarded sex nor age. Helpless women have been massacred, and the cradle crimsoned with the blood of innocence. The United States, true to their own engagements, and confiding in the faith of Spain to enforce existing treaties, never entertained a doubt but that these atrocities would early attract the attention of the Spanish Government, and that speedy and effectual measures would have been adopted for their suppression. Under this persuasion, a cordon of military posts was established to give immediate protection to such of our frontier settlers as were peculiarly exposed, and strict injunctions issued to the American officers to respect the territory of Spain, and not to attempt operations within its limits. These instructions were most scrupulously observed; and, notwithstanding the inactivity of the American troops had encouraged the Indians to the more daring and outrageous acts of violence against our citizens, the Government of the United States was still disposed to respect the territory of Spain, and confide in the ability of the Spanish Government to execute existing treaties, until advised through you that, with every disposition, the Spanish authorities had not the power of controlling the Indians in Florida; that their acts of late were viewed as equally hostile to the interests of Spain as those of the United States; that Spanish subjects were not exempted from the evils of which we complained; and that the negro establishments on the Appalachicola and St. Juan Rivers were founded by British agents, contrary to the will of Spain. These representations determined the President of the United States to adopt effectual measures to restore tranquility to the southern frontier of the American republic; and, pursuant to

his orders, justifiable by the immutable laws of self defense, I have penetrated into Florida, reduced to ashes the Seminole villages, destroyed their magazines of provisions, beaten their warriors whenever they hazarded a contest, dispersed some, and expelled others across the river.

In the course of my operations, it became necessary to visit the Spanish fortress of St. Marks. Entering the territory of Spain to fight her battles, to relieve from bondage her subjects, and to chastise an Indian tribe whom she acknowledged, under existing treaties, she was bound to preserve at peace with the United States, I had every reason to expect that the American army would have been received as friends, and every facility afforded to insure success to operations so interesting to both Governments.

My expectations have not been realized. . . . On entering St. Marks, evidence of the duplicity and unfriendly feelings of the commandant evinced itself. . . .

American troops have (for the third time now) been compelled to enter Pensacola from the same causes. Twice had the enemy been expelled, and the place left in quiet possession of those who had permitted the irregular occupancy. This time it must be held until Spain has the power or the will to maintain her neutrality. This is justifiable on the immutable principles of self-defense. The Government of the United States is bound to protect her citizens; but weak would be all her efforts, and ineffectual the best advised measures, if the Floridas are to be free to every enemy, and, on the pretext of policy or necessity, Spanish fortresses are to be opened to their use, and every aid and comfort afforded. I have been explicit, to preclude the necessity of a tedious negotiation. My resolution is fixed, and I have the strength enough to enforce it. . . .

The President expressed appreciation of the Senate for the program.
