INTRODUCTION

SB 786—A bill to be entitled An act relating to governmental organization and management; amending the Governmental Organization Act of 1969; amending ss. 20.01, 20.02, Florida Statutes; renaming the Governmental Reorganization Act of 1969 to become the Governmental Management Act of 1976; providing legislative intent; creating ss. 20.025, 20.027, Florida Statutes; providing for the due process right of persons to the names and hierarchical relationships between units of government; providing methods for implementation; amend-

ing s. 20.03, Florida Statutes; providing definitions; creating s. 20.035, Florida Statutes; providing standards and a method for implementation; amending s. 20.04, Florida Statutes; providing structure and nomenclature for all entities within the executive branch; creating s. 20.042, Florida Statutes; providing for decentralization of state governmental functions; providing structure and nomenclature for entities in districts and regions; creating s. 20.045, Florida Statutes; providing limited exemptions from compliance with portions of this act; amending s. 20.05, Florida Statutes; providing for powers and duties of heads of departments; creating s. 20.052, Florida Statutes; providing for compliance with the Administrative Procedure Act; providing for exemptions from the career service law; creating s. 20.054, Florida Statutes; providing a schedule for compliance; providing severability; providing an effective date.
