The Senate was called to order by Senator Zinkl at 8:30 a.m. for the purpose of conducting the order of business of introduction and reference of resolutions, memorials, bills and joint resolutions pursuant to Rule 4.3.

INTRODUCTION

By Senators Gordon, Myers and MacKay—

SB 715—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Medical Practice Act; amending s. 458.01, Florida Statutes; changing the membership of the State Board of Medical Examiners; amending s. 458.02(1), Florida Statutes; providing for appointment to the board of citizens who are not physicians; amending s. 458.04, Florida Statutes; providing for increased reimbursement for board members; providing for not less than two regular meetings annually; repealing four successive weekly notice requirement; amending ss. 458.05(3)(a), 458.09, Florida Statutes; eliminating written examination requirement; amending s. 458.121(1), Florida Statutes; eliminating provision for complainant to deliver ten copies of charges to the board; amending s. 458.122(1), Florida Statutes; including the executive director among those who are authorized to require production of evidence for hearings; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Governmental Operations and Health and Rehabilitative Services.

By Senator Gordon—

SB 716—A bill to be entitled An act relating to physicians and dentists; providing that licensed physicians and dentists shall pay an additional annual fee of \$100; providing exemptions; providing that any person who refuses to pay the fee shall not be licensed; providing for placing of the fees in the Health Manpower Trust Fund and for the fund to be used to augment salaries of physicians and dentists serving in areas of critical medical need as defined by the State Health Planning Agency; providing a \$60,000 per year per person limit on aid; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Health and Rehabilitative Services, Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

By Senator Hair—

SB 717—A bill to be entitled An act relating to child support; amending s. 61.181(3), (6), Florida Statutes, and adding a new subsection to said section; amending s. 409.2501, Florida Statutes; provides that a central governmental enforcement system may be established for a circuit or a county within a circuit for the initiation of proceedings to establish child support in addition to presently authorized purposes; authorizing the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services and the central governmental enforcement system to contract with each other for the establishment and enforcement of child support; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Governmental Operations and Judiciary-Civil.

By Senator Gordon—

SB 718—A bill to be entitled An act relating to sex offenders; providing for certification of defendants for hearing and examination in Circuit Court to determine whether they are mentally disordered sex offenders; providing for appointment of experts; providing for written reports; providing procedures for hearings; providing for commitment to the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services; providing for retention of jurisdiction by the committing court; providing for periodic examinations and discharge proceedings; providing for recommencement of proceedings and duties of the trial court upon defendant's discharge from a mentally disordered sex offender treatment program; providing requirements for probation and for a training program for outpatient therapists; providing for work-release and community furlough programs; providing that

time spent in admission procedures and in the treatment program counts as good time on any sentence imposed; providing that proceedings are civil and do not alter the test of mental capacity applied in criminal prosecutions; providing that fees paid by the court for experts be paid by the county in which the hearing is held; providing that the county may recover the fees from the estate or property of the defendant; providing that the department may establish a fee schedule and collect fees based on cost of care and ability to pay; providing that the committing court adequately document the nature and extent of the defendant's mental disorder when committing to the department; providing for maintenance and confidentiality of clinical records; prohibiting the publication of the name of a person under age 16 who commits, is a victim of, or is a witness to, a sex offense; providing for clearance of courtroom in certain cases; providing exceptions; authorizing establishment of mental health research and treatment centers; providing for research and treatment programs; authorizing acceptance of grants and donations; providing the department the power to contract for necessary services and facilities; repealing chapter 801, Florida Statutes, the Child Molester Act, and chapter 917, Florida Statutes, relating to mentally disordered sex offenders; providing an effective date.

By Senator P. Thomas—

SB 719—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Division of Beverage of the Department of Business Regulation; amending ss. 20.16(2), (8); 210.01(10); 561.02, Florida Statutes; changing the name of the division to the Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Cigarettes; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations.

By Senator P. Thomas—

SB 720—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the tax on cigarettes; amending s. 210.18(6), Florida Statutes; prohibiting the possessing, removing, depositing, or concealing of more than ten cartons of non-tax-paid cigarettes with the intent to defraud; prohibiting the possessing, removing, depositing, or concealing of more than 50 cartons of non-tax-paid cigarettes with the intent to sell; providing penalties; providing an effective date.

SB 721—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the sales and use tax; amending s. 212.05(1), Florida Statutes, providing an exemption from the sales and use tax on the sale of certain boats used in commercial fishing when the boat is immediately removed from the state; providing for proof of removal; providing a penalty; providing an effective date.

SB 722—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public schools; amending s. 231.10(1), Florida Statutes; deleting from the provisions on appointment of Florida Council on Teacher Education members all references to nominations by teacher organizations and other nonpublic associations, councils, and corporations and to nominations by the director of inservice staff development; deleting provision for substitute nominations by the Governor; providing an effective date.

SB 723—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public health; amending s. 381.503(2), (5)(a), (6)(a), and (10), Florida Statutes, relating to the Community Hospital Education Act; clarifying legislative intent; increasing membership on the Community Hospital Education Council to provide consumer representation; clarifying appropriated funds; specifying minimum inclusions for the annual report to the Legislature; providing an effective date.

SB 724—A bill to be entitled An act relating to tax on sales, use and other transactions; creating s. 212.085, Florida Statutes; authorizing refund of such taxes paid on special fuels used for commercial fishing purposes; providing limitations on such refunds; authorizing agents of the Department of Revenue to enter premises of persons entitled to refunds or of distributors in the enforcement of the act; prescribing conditions for entitlement to such refunds; providing procedures for receiving such refunds; authorizing deduction of fee for processing claims for refunds; requiring the Department of Revenue, distributors, and persons entitled to refunds to maintain records; requiring such records to be open to inspection; authorizing suspension or revocation of right to such refunds upon violation of provisions of this act; providing an effective date.

SB 725—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the collection of delinquent personal property taxes; amending s. 197.072 (4), Florida Statutes; providing for the mailing of additional notices to taxpayers by the tax collector; amending s. 197.086 (1), Florida Statutes; providing for the issuance of warrants prior to a specified date; providing for notification to the taxpayer, by certified mail, from the clerk of the court in which the delinquency petition is filed; authorizing the Department of Revenue to provide reasonable rules and regulations relating to collection of delinquent taxes; amending s. 197.092, Florida Statutes; providing that the tax collector may issue warrants allowing the tax on tangible personal property which is removed from his county to be collected by the sheriff in the county in which the property is now situated; providing an effective date.

SB 735—A bill to be entitled An act relating to juveniles; creating s. 39.025, Florida Statutes; providing that a child charged with a felony be handled as an adult under certain circumstances, but that the age of such child be considered in sentencing; providing for transfer of certain cases to juvenile jurisdiction of court; amending s. 39.03(2), (3), (5), (6), Florida Statutes; requiring detention of such child and providing that such child may be detained in jail or other adult facility under certain conditions; requiring such child be taken before the court within 24 hours; providing for the use of fingerprints and photographs of a child taken into custody on probable cause he has committed a felony; amending ss. 39-

02(4), (5)(c), 39.11(2)(a), (c), (4), and 39.12(2), Florida Statutes; providing that jurisdiction of court over a delinquent child and term of probation and commitment of such child be until child is 18; conforming terminology to reorganization of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services; providing records of cases brought under chapter 39, Florida Statutes, be kept until a child is 18; amending s. 39.06(10), Florida Statutes, providing that a subpoena may be served by a person age 18 or older; amending s. 39.09(2)(a), Florida Statutes, to conform to the provisions of this act; providing an effective date.

SB 736—A bill to be entitled An act relating to sales and use taxation; adding paragraph (1) to s. 212.08(7), Florida Statutes, exempting from the tax the purchase of solar heating and cooling units, insulation materials, heat reducing and reflective materials, and certain other items which effect a decrease in the usage of electrical and other forms of generated energy; specifying certain duties for the Florida Public Service Commission; providing an effective date.

By Senator J. Thomas—

SB 750—A bill to be entitled An act relating to life care contracts; amending s. 651.02(3) and (4), Florida Statutes, and adding subsections (6) and (7) thereto, redefining the terms "care" and "person" with respect to life care contracts and defining the terms "records" and "term of years"; adding new subsections (5) and (6) to s. 651.05, Florida Statutes, requiring applications for a certificate of authority to provide care to contain certain additional information; prohibiting the issuance of certificates to persons who have committed certain crimes and providing for the denial of a certificate to any applicant whose spouse living at the same address as the applicant has been convicted of certain crimes; creating s. 651.085, Florida Statutes, providing bonding requirements for persons holding or applying for a certificate of authority who will handle certain amounts of money of persons for whom care is provided; providing procedures with respect to such bonding requirements and authorizing the Department of Insurance to waive such a requirement under certain circumstances; amending s. 651.10, Florida Statutes, authorizing officers, employees or agents of the Department of Insurance to inspect the records of certificate holders; providing for periodic financial inspections; requiring the department to notify certificate holders

of deficiencies with respect to compliance under the provisions of the chapter; providing penalties; creating s. 651.105, Florida Statutes, providing a procedure whereby persons may request the department to inspect a specific certificate holder; amending s. 651.12, Florida Statutes, authorizing the department to bring action to enjoin violation of the chapter; providing an effective date.

SB 751—A bill to be entitled An act relating to unclaimed property; creating s. 715.065, Florida Statutes, authorizing jewelry stores which accept jewelry or other articles for repair, cleaning, or adjustment to dispose of such jewelry or other articles after a period of 6 months elapses without any person claiming the property; requiring notice to the deliverer of the property; providing an effective date.

SB 752—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public employees; amending s. 447.507(3), (5), Florida Statutes; providing for automatic termination of the employment of any public employee found to be in contempt of court for violating a permanent injunction enjoining a strike against a public employer; removing the limitation on the amount that an employee organization may be fined if found to be in contempt of court for violating a permanent injunction enjoining a strike against a public employer; providing for mandatory termination of the employment of any public employee found by the Public Employees Relations Commission, after a hearing, to have violated the strike prohibition; providing a time limit for such hearings; providing an effective date.
