The Senate Chaplain introduced the Rev. Darrell F. Joachim, now retired, former pastor of the First Christian Church of Lakeland, who delivered the following prayer:

God of our fathers, we thank thee for great character, that has been woven into the fabric of this nation, for great leaders whom, in crucial times, thou has lifted up to direct our paths. Help us today with vivid vision to see the heroes of old who feared thy name. Steady our hands to grasp the torch of the nation's righteousness, which they have bequeathed to us and may thy benediction rest upon us as we seek the day of brotherhood and peace. Amen.

BICENTENNIAL OBSERVANCE

The Fife and Drum Corps entered with Colors.

The Senate pledged allegiance to the flag of the United States of America.

The President recognized The Honorable Philip F. Ashler, narrator of the Bicentennial observances, who announced the activities for this day and the following were presented:

Musical program: Bethel A. M. E. Church Choir—Processional, *Onward Christian Soldiers*; and a medley of traditional hymns

Mr. Ashler: Reconstruction was a process in which southern society was obliged to undergo significant changes, often at the hands of outsiders, to make it more acceptable to those from the North. As is the case with most involuntary social changes, the results were mixed. Certainly one area in which change was long overdue was race relations. The time had long since passed when slavery was acceptable to dominant world-wide social opinion and the war itself had made clear the abolition of slavery. But the war did not, and could not, harmonize relationships between the races in the South. It fell to the process of Reconstruction to try to work out an acceptable social pattern between the races.

In 1865 during the early days of the Reconstruction in Florida's capital, an African Methodist Episcopal Church was or-

ganized. In 1866 the congregation welcomed Charles Pearce a new minister who was destined to play an active role not only within his church, but also within the State's political arena and specifically within the Florida Senate. This same church, Bethel A.M.E., exists today as one of the largest churches in the Capital City.

And now may I introduce Dean Eva Wanton of Florida A. & M. University who will present Mrs. Peacock with the story of Bishop Charles Pearce.

Dr. Eva Wanton, director of summer sessions and assistant to the dean of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences at Florida A. and M. University, presented to the Senate Mrs. Alice Peacock, Leon High School teacher and former recipient of the "Teacher of the Year" award for Leon County.

Mrs. Peacock: Mr. President, Commissioner Ashler, Honorable Senators of the Florida Legislature, dignitaries, guests, ladies and gentlemen:

It is with meekness of spirit, humbleness of heart, and profound pleasure that I stand before you, this august body, to attempt to give you a few facts and figures concerning the founding of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, commonly known as the A.M.E. Church.

I feel that the State of Florida would be remiss in its bicentennial celebration if we did not mention the largest black Christian organization in the world, representing 7,800,000 plus members.

In this great organization, the black man has been able to enjoy the four freedoms pointed out in the Constitution of the United States.

They are: (1) Freedom of Speech (2) Freedom of Assembly (3) Freedom of the Press and last, but by no means least, (4) Freedom of Worship.

The African Methodist Episcopal Church was founded in the historic City of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. It is significant to note that Philadelphia is known as the Quaker State and the City of Brotherly Love.

Even more significant is the fact that Philadelphia was the first capital of the United States for it was in this historic city that the Constitution of the United States was written in 1787. It was the site of the first Continental Congress and the birthplace of the A.M.E. Church.

In 1816 Bishop Richard Allen and Absolem Jones, neither of whom were ministers at the time, worshipped in the white Methodist Episcopal Church, but were denied the privilege of kneeling at the altar. Because of this denial, they left the church and went to an old building which housed a blacksmith shop where they organized what is now known as the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

It was from this humble beginning that Charles H. Pearce accomplished so very much during his career. "Some men achieve greatness, while others have greatness thrust upon them."

Reverend Pearce was one of those persons who achieved greatness. He was born on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. To those who knew him and those who have read about him, his life might be considered a gem of many facets because of the many positions he filled during his span of life and the few years spent in Tallahassee and Leon County.

Having joined the A.M.E. Church at an early age in his native state of Maryland, he went to Canada as a missionary. After coming to Florida, his clerical appearance, together with his position of authority in the Florida Church, soon won for him the title of "Bishop", although he never attained to higher rank than elder in the Church.

Another facet of his life is that of a founder, for in many communities in Florida he founded the A.M.E. Church while in others he organized churches already holding services without any formal organization. Bethel A.M.E. Church here in Tallahassee already had 116 members when Reverend Pearce came and formally organized it in March, 1866. Bishop Pearce was

sent to Florida to become the Pastor of Florida, with churches in Jacksonville, Tallahassee, Quincy, Monticello, Aucilla and Lake City.

In June 1867 the Florida Conference was organized in Tallahassee and Reverend Pearce was made presiding elder of the Tallahassee District with seventeen ministers. Today Florida can boast of over 700 ministers and 29 Presiding Elders.

The political facts of Reverend Pearce's life were of interest to all, because he is said to have made "a political soapbox" of his pulpit. He reached the sympathy of the Freedman to such an extent that his colleagues felt that he desecrated the pulpit with his high party spirit.

He was appointed to lead the County's delegation to the Constitutional Convention of 1868, composed of delegates from Leon and Wakulla Counties. This delegation consisted of 5 men, only one of which was white.

As in all other gems, there are only a few that are flawless; even diamonds have flaws that can only be seen under a diamondscope. So it was in the life of "Bishop" Pearce as he, like other politicians and leaders, learned that it is human to err. He was at one time expelled because he was alleged to be a British citizen, and not registered, but in spite of this accusation he won the position of Senator of Leon County from T. W. Osborn.

Representatives from Leon County were Robert Cox, Robert Livingstone, Richard Wells and Noah Graham. Graham, like Pearce, was an A.M.E. minister.

Because a Negro was not appointed to the cabinet by Governor Reed, a faction arose between the Osborn ring and the Freedmen. Again Bishop Pearce was called upon to serve as a mediator with all expenses paid by the Governor. His duty was to bring the Negro preachers in line and through their efforts the Freedmen would become reconciled. This facet of his life was that of a mediator.

During his entire time in the Senate, Bishop Pearce served as chairman of the Committee on Education. From 1869-1871 he was Superintendent of Public Instruction of Leon County.

On February 4, 1870, a charge of bribery was filed against Bishop Pearce because of his support for Governor Reed, he was charged with offering \$500 to a representative to vote for Governor Reed who was about to be impeached for accepting a bribe of \$7,500 for approval of certain railroad legislation. However, because of discrepancies in the case he was quickly pardoned.

On January 3, 1871, he was again seated in the Senate, a position to which he was elected in November.

When the Republican State Convention met in Tallahassee on August 7, 1872, Leon County presented two factions. Reverend Pearce headed the Conover faction and John Stokes, a Baptist minister, led the Ring faction. Both delegations had 6½ votes. Reverend Pearce and the Conover faction refused to participate under those circumstances.

The Convention nominated O. B. Hart for Governor, Stearns for Lieutenant Governor and Purman for Congressman. Pearce was nominated a presidential elector, an offer which he declined. The honor was then bestowed upon W. G. Steward, another A.M.E. minister.

Bishop Pearce served quietly in the Legislatures of 1873-1874. It was not until 1876 that he again held public office, when the Governor appointed him assessor of taxes for Leon County. During that year he was nominated as one of the Republican candidates for presidential electors.

The final chapter in the life of this great A.M.E. minister was written when he transferred to the East Florida Conference in 1872 and moved to Jacksonville, Florida. He continued active in the church until his death, the exact date of which is not known.

The many facets of his life were a founder, an organizer, a politician, a Senator, a Representative, a tax collector, Superintendent of Public Instruction, a minister, a missionary.

Before he died he told his friends, "Heave not a stone, carve not a line but leave me alone with my glory." So ended the life of a man who served his church and state well.

The President expressed appreciation of the Senate for the program. Following the recessional, *Onward Christian Soldiers*, by the Choir, the Fife and Drum Corps departed from the chamber and the Senate recessed at 9:25 a.m.

Each such agreement shall provide for reimbursement of the school district in full, or in part, for the proportionate share of any and all fixed and operating costs incurred by the school district attributable to the use of such buses pursuant to such agreement. The governing body or state agency or any agencies established or identified pursuant to Public Law 89-73 shall indemnify and hold harmless the school district from any and all liability of the school district by virtue of the use of such buses pursuant to an agreement authorized by this section. When such buses are used for non-school purposes except for the transportation of the elderly and the mentally or physically handicapped, the flashing red lights shall not be used and the “School Bus” inscription on the front and rear of such buses shall be covered or concealed.

Section 3. Subsection (1) of section 234.041, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

234.041 School buses; unlawful to simulate color or use secondhand buses without effecting certain changes.—

(1) It shall be unlawful for any person, *other than a governmental unit or agency*, to use on the public highways of the state any bus of an orange or yellow color, known as school bus chrome, or any color purporting to resemble the color of a school bus when said vehicle has ceased to be so used, or is used for the transportation of passengers other than school pupils, unless and until said bus has been changed from said colors to some other color by repainting, and unless and until all signs and insignia which mark or designate it as a school bus have been removed therefrom. However, in school districts contracting for buses from an outside source or in school districts operating specially designed or equipped buses for the transporting of the handicapped, those buses may be used on a temporary or irregular basis to transport persons other than students within the county with the express consent of the school board.

Section 4. Subsection (9) of section 236.083, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

(Substantial rewording of subsection. See s. 236.083(9), F.S., for present text.)

236.083 Funds for student transportation.—The annual allocation to each district for transportation to the public schools of students in kindergarten through grade 12 and exceptional students shall be determined as follows:

(9) Pursuant to rules adopted by the State Board of Education, each district school board may submit to the Commissioner a proposed plan to use school buses on a pilot project basis for the conveyance of the elderly and the physically or mentally handicapped. Such pilot projects shall be developed in the following manner:

(a) The superintendent of any school district wishing to participate shall prepare an itemized statement of the estimated total cost of the program and a copy of the school board resolution indicating its intention to provide at least one-fourth of the total cost of the program, either directly or through the use of Federal funds or other public or private resources. The school board may impose fares for the transportation services provided through the pilot project. Any school district proposing to establish a pilot project shall plan cooperatively with other institutions, agencies or organizations in the district which provide or are in need of transportation services for the elderly and the physically or mentally handicapped.

(b) The Commissioner shall review and approve, disapprove, or resubmit to the school board for modification of all proposed plans. For the 1976-1977 fiscal year, the Commissioner shall approve pilot projects in up to five school districts and shall authorize distribution of funds in an amount not to exceed three-fourths of the total cost of the proposed pilot projects.

On motion by Senator Gallen the following remarks by the President were spread upon the Journal:

Mr. President: Senators, we've had considerable writings around the state about the appropriations bill and we have had some writings about this bill (CS for SJR's 49 and 81).

Since you can't get the truth out in the press, I want to give you some very real figures produced by the Ways and Means Committee staff of the Senate of Florida. These figures concern what we did in the appropriations bill. The people of Florida simply can't get the information through the press.

In 1975-76 the funding for D.C.L.E. was 16.2 million dollars. In 1976-77 the funding for D.C.L.E. is 17.3 million dollars, or an increase of 5.8 per cent.

The total number of local law enforcement officers in Florida—sheriffs and chiefs of police—is 15,638. The total number of state law enforcement officers is 3,170 for a total force of 18,808 people.

D.C.L.E. has 595, the highway patrol has 1,625; the Marine Patrol has 233; the Game and Fish Commission has 229; and there are 274 university police.

We cut 186 positions, leaving D.C.L.E. with 530 people because 127 of the positions we cut were unfilled.

Now, we have made an effort to find where the cuts can be made—keeping in mind that we have increased the funding by 5.8 per cent. We found D.C.L.E. would cut 39 law enforcement officers and that will be 2/1,000ths of 1 per cent of the law enforcement officers of Florida.

I just thought that that might be of some interest to you.

Senator Vogt: Mr. President, I hate to correct you, but unless my math is wrong that's an increase in funding of 6.7 per cent, and I thought you'd want the higher number to be reflected in the Journal.

Mr. President: You're an engineer, Senator, and I certainly would not quarrel with you.

By the Committee on Rules and Calendar and Senators Myers and McClain—

CS for SJR's 49 and 81—A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Sections 10 and 11, Article V of the State Constitution, to provide for the selection and retention and terms of justices of the supreme court and judges of district courts of appeal and for the filling of vacancies in such offices.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

That the following amendments to Sections 10 and 11 of Article V of the State Constitution are hereby agreed to and shall be submitted to the electors of this state for approval or rejection at the general election to be held in November 1976:

ARTICLE V

JUDICIARY

SECTION 10. Retention; Election and terms.—

(a) Any justice of the supreme court or any judge of a district court of appeal may qualify for retention by a vote of the electors in the general election next preceding the expiration of his term in the manner prescribed by law. If a justice or judge is ineligible or fails to qualify for retention, a vacancy shall exist in that office upon the expiration of the term being served by the justice or judge. When a justice of the supreme court or a judge of a district court of appeal so qualifies, the ballot shall read substantially as follows: "Shall Justice (or Judge) (name of justice or judge) of the (name of the court) be retained in office?" If a majority of the qualified electors voting within the territorial jurisdiction of the court vote to retain, the justice or judge shall be retained for a term of six years commencing on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January following the general election. If a majority of the qualified electors voting within the territorial jurisdiction of the court vote to not retain, a vacancy shall exist in that office upon the expiration of the term being served by the justice or judge.

(b) Circuit judges and judges of county courts shall be elected by vote of the qualified electors within the territorial jurisdiction of their respective courts. The terms of circuit judges shall be for six years. The terms of judges of county courts shall be for four years.

(a) ELECTION. All justices and judges shall be elected by vote of the qualified electors within the territorial jurisdiction of their respective courts.

(b) TERMS. The terms of all justices of the supreme court, judges of district courts of appeal and circuit judges shall be for six years. The terms of judges of county courts shall be for four years.

SECTION 11. Vacancies.—

(a) The governor shall fill each vacancy on the supreme court or on a district court of appeal by appointing for a term ending on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January of the year following the next general election occurring at least one year after the date of appointment, one of not fewer than three persons nominated by the appropriate judicial nominating commission.

(b)(a) The governor shall fill each vacancy on a circuit court or on a county court in judicial office by appointing for a term ending on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January of the year following the next primary and general election, one of not fewer than three persons nominated by the appropriate judicial nominating commission. An election shall be held to fill that judicial office for the term of the office beginning at the end of the appointed term.

(c) The nominations shall be made within thirty days from the occurrence of a vacancy unless the period is extended by the governor for a time not to exceed thirty days. The governor shall ~~must~~ make the appointment within sixty days after the nominations have been certified to him.

(d)(b) There shall be a separate judicial nominating commission as provided by general law for the supreme court, each district court of appeal, and each judicial circuit for all trial courts within the circuit.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following statement be placed on the ballot:

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

ARTICLE V, SECTIONS 10, 11

Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to provide that justices of the supreme court and judges of district courts of appeal submit themselves for retention or rejection by the electors in a general election every six years, and that failure to submit to a vote for retention or rejection, or a vote of rejection by the electors, will result in a vacancy in the office upon expiration of the current term; and to provide that the governor fill vacancies on the supreme court or on a district court of appeal by appointing a person nominated by the appropriate judicial nominating commission for a term ending on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January of the year following the next general election occurring at least one year after the date of appointment.

—which was read the first time and SB's 49 and 81 were laid on the table.
