Prayer by the Senate Chaplain who, at the request of Senators Gordon and Myers, read the following excerpts from Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's poem "The Jewish Cemetery at Newport":

How strange it seems! These Hebrews in their graves,
Close by the street of this fair seaport town,
Silent beside the never-silent waves,
At rest in all this moving up and down!

The trees are white with dust, that o'er their sleep,
Wave their broad curtains in the southwind's breath,
While underneath these leafy tents they keep
The long, mysterious exodus of death.

And these sepulchral stones, so old and brown,
That pave with level flags their burial-place,
Seem like the tablets of the law, thrown down
And broken by Moses at the mountain's base.

The very names recorded here are strange,
Of foreign accent, and of different climes;
Alvares and Rivera interchange
With Abraham and Jacob of old times.

"Blessed be God, for he created death!"
The mourners said, "And death is rest and peace;"
Then added, in the certainty of faith,

Closed are the portals of their synagogue,

In the grand dialect the prophets spake.

They lived in narrow streets and lanes obscure,

And all the great traditions of the past

BICENTENNIAL OBSERVANCE

The Fife and Drum Corps entered with Colors.

The Senate pledged allegiance to the flag of the United States of America.

Senator P. Thomas introduced to the Senate Heraldisne Rock of St. Lucia, West Indies, Minister of Housing, Community Development and Social Affairs, and first woman member of Parliament, who brought greetings from her country.

The President Pro Tempore recognized the Honorable Philip F. Ashler, narrator of the Bicentennial observances, who announced the activities for this day and the following were presented:

Musical program: Florida A & M University Concert Choir—*This Land is Your Land; Alleulia; Daniel, Daniel Servant of the Lord and John Saw De Numbah.*

Mr. Ashler: Richard Keith Call, third and fifth Territorial Governor, was as central to the history of early Florida as any other individual. Even before the United States acquired the Territory he had come here as an aide to Andrew Jackson to fight Indians. He was the new Territory's first delegate to the Congress of the United States and served twice as Territorial Governor. As a General in the U.S. Army, he was in the forefront of a major part of the Seminole Wars, and later he became a strong promoter of early State economic development. He built his home, The Grove, in Tallahassee in the late 1820's where he lived with his two daughters after the untimely death of his wife.

As much as Call was a Floridian he was true to Jacksonian nationalism and believed in the necessity for a strong Union. The pull between these two loyalties became greatly intensified as the nation drifted toward Civil War in the 1850's. Call openly and vigorously resisted Florida's secession. He did all he could to warn Floridians of the disastrous consequences he felt were sure to follow such action. But secession came and with it Call became a lonely, politically powerless, rejected man. In early 1861, after secession, still hoping that in some way war might be avoided, he wrote and published a pamphlet reiterating his views. However, the hope expressed in this pamphlet was not to last. His prophesy of war was, unhappily, fulfilled. One of the early Confederate casualties was Governor Call's favorite nephew, who also lived here in Tallahassee. The two were very close. It was not long after that Call himself died at The Grove.

Today former Governor LeRoy Collins will depict Governor Call with his daughter Mary Call as he finished writing this pamphlet. He is accompanied by Mary Call Proctor, his own granddaughter, who is the great, great, great granddaughter of Governor Call.

The Honorable LeRoy Collins, who was twice elected Governor of Florida and also served in both houses of the Florida Legislature, read the following excerpts from the pamphlet on secession by Governor Call:

To my fellow citizens of Florida:

We live in an age of miracles and wonders. Great events are in progress, and I look with amazement and mortification at the developments of every day and hour. We are in the midst of the most extraordinary revolution, and the most stupendous ruin is now in rapid progress, that the world has ever known.

A great nation has been dismembered. The bonds of the American Union, the work of Washington, of Franklin, of Madison and other great sages and statesmen of a glorious age, have been rent and snapped like cobwebs; and the greatest fabric of human government, without complaint of wrong or injustice, has been destroyed in a few months—madly and rashly destroyed, without reflection. . . .

Star after star from the once glorious, but now drooping, banner has fallen. . . and the whole heavens are covered with the gloomy portent of universal destruction. When shall this ruin end? . . .

Every enlightened statesman may see, even through the mist of prejudice, that there is not room between the lakes of Canada and the Gulf of Mexico for two great nations (of the same race and lineage, the same language and religion, the same pride, ambition, energy, and high courage), to live in peace and good fellowship together. . . .

Why should this beautiful land be divided? Why, I ask, should this one kindred people become two hostile nations, to exhaust in ruinous wars and battles between themselves the vast resources,

the great energies heretofore so successfully united for the unequalled progress of one country, one great and happy people? . . .

But, still may we not hope . . . that some propitiating power may interpose to save us, and avert this dire and fearful calamity? May we not hope that the doomsday of the great American Union has not yet dawned? I just cannot believe that our nation is yet so mad as to spurn, and impiously reject, the blessings which a beneficent Providence has sown broadcast over a whole land and given indiscriminately to a whole people . . .

I still trust . . . that there will be conservative men enough, both North and South, men who remember the past happiness and prosperity of the people, the past fame and glory of our country, to reconstruct our glorious Union, with great stability, and restore peace and tranquility to our now divided and unhappy nation. Oh! that I had the genius to lead, the power to reach, and win the hearts of my countrymen, in every latitude, in every place—how earnestly I would plead the cause of my unhappy country! In the name of the living and the dead, in the name of unborn millions of our posterity, how fervently I would invoke the union of all hearts and minds—to reconstruct and preserve for all time the union of our fathers! How gladly would I hail the returning sign of peace, the gallant flag—no missing star—no rent in the stripes of the banner, which has waved so proudly, over the destinies of our once united, great, and glorious country! And if the death of one man could atone for the improprieties of a whole nation, if the blood of one man could redeem the lost American glory, how freely mine would flow, how cheerfully would I hail the death that should bring regenerated life, peace, and safety to our once again united, happy country.

On motion by Senator Brantley, the rules were waived by unanimous consent and the Senate reverted to Introduction for the purpose of introducing the following resolution out of order:

Portrait Unveiling Ceremony

The President Pro Tempore requested Senator Vogt to present the history of William H. Gleason, Lieutenant Governor of Florida in 1868, who by virtue of his position presided over the Senate.

Senator Vogt: Mr. President, Senators, and guests, I would like to give you a brief history of a former presiding officer of this body, a man who added greatly to the progress of a developing America; a man who played a significant role in the politics of at least two states in our great country; a man who carved two fortunes out of the wilderness of America. The man was William H. Gleason, a former Lt. Governor of our State.

First, I would like to introduce to you the descendants of this man and family friends who have journeyed here today for this occasion. I would ask that they stand as I call their names, and remain standing for the Senate to recognize them as a group: Mr. W. Lansing Gleason, grandson, and Mrs. Gleason; Miss Isabell Gleason, granddaughter; Mr. William H. Gleason, great grandson, and Mrs. Gleason; Mrs. Ray Poynter, great granddaughter; Carol Evans Poynter, great great granddaughter; Mrs. John Madry, great granddaughter, and Dr. Madry; John Gray Madry, great great grandson; Joan Madry, great great granddaughter; Lansing Madry, great great grandson; and Lucille Kahn, family friend.

I would like to ask the Senate to recognize this distinguished Florida family.

William H. Gleason was born in Richford, Tioga County, New York, on June 8, 1829, descended from a family from the North of England, of Scandinavian and Scottish origin. His ancestors came to this country and settled in Massachusetts about 1640.

At the age of 18, in 1847, his family moved to Wisconsin, where William H. Gleason followed the profession of engineer and surveyor.

He became interested in politics, and in 1853 he was elected, by the Democratic Party, Sergeant at Arms of the State Assembly, and was re-elected to the same office in 1854. In 1855, Mr. Gleason was elected by the Democrats as Sergeant at Arms of the Senate.

In 1855 he founded the town Eau Claire, Wisconsin, and there established the banking house of Gleason and Seeley, afterward merged in the Bank of Eau Claire, of which he was President. Prior to that time Mr. Gleason had studied law, and in 1856 he was admitted to the bar, making a specialty of real estate and corporation law.

Speculation in land, and the re-routing of a railroad which rendered that speculation valueless, forced his bank to suspend operations in 1860, and brought Mr. Gleason to the brink of financial ruin.

He returned to his birth site in New York and married Miss Sarah Griffin. During the Civil War, Mr. Gleason established stores in Washington City and Baltimore.

After the Civil War, Mr. Gleason migrated to Florida and settled in Dade County in early 1866. He became active in the Reconstruction Movement and the Republican Party. He was the author of the suffrage article in the Constitution of 1868, and he was nominated for and elected as Florida's first Lieutenant Governor in 1868, a position which also made him the presiding officer of the Senate.

Mr. Gleason served with Governor Harrison Reed, another emigrant from Wisconsin whose differences with the Legislature resulted in several impeachment attempts.

During the first of these attempts, in 1868, Mr. Gleason proclaimed himself Governor of the State of Florida after the Senate had impeached Reed. He set up headquarters in a hotel near the Capitol and signed documents as the chief executive for a period of five weeks, with the assistance of Secretary of State Alden, who had removed the Great Seal of Florida from the Capitol.

Governor Reed appealed to the Supreme Court, and the Court sustained Reed, declaring that the Governor had not been impeached because the Senate, at the time charges were preferred, was without a quorum since Reed had previously declared some of the Senate seats vacant because those Senators occupied local government offices in addition to their Senate seats.

Governor Reed thereupon moved to have Lieutenant Governor Gleason removed from office because he did not meet the constitutional requirement of three years' residence at the time of his election. The case was duly tried before the Supreme Court, and the decision was that Gleason must vacate the office.

Governor Reed, upon being advised of the Court's decision, appointed a successor to Gleason's unexpired term but the State Senate refused to recognize the successor and would not allow him to preside. Instead, the State Senate recognized Gleason and he remained as presiding officer over Senate sessions in both 1868 and 1870 despite the Supreme Court ruling and the gubernatorial appointment of an alleged successor.

William H. Gleason then represented Dade County in the House of Representatives in 1871, 1872, 1873, and 1874, and at one time he was also clerk of the court and tax assessor of Dade County.

Gleason later moved to Brevard County, and platted the village of Eau Gallie. He practiced law, was a partner in a sawmill company, and developed extensive real estate holdings. His death occurred there in November, 1902.

His family and their friends here today can be proud of his contribution to Florida history and to American history.

At the request of Senator Vogt, Mr. W. Lansing Gleason, grandson of Lieutenant Governor William H. Gleason, unveiled the portrait of the Lieutenant Governor.
