The Senate was called to order by Senator Carlucci at 8:30 a.m. for the purpose of conducting the order of business of introduction and reference of resolutions, memorials, bills and joint resolutions pursuant to Rule 4.3. Senator Henderson represented the Committee on Rules and Calendar and the Minority Party.

INTRODUCTION

By Senator Steinberg—

SB 610—A bill to be entitled An act relating to school district personnel; amending s. 231.40(1), Florida Statutes; providing eligibility for sick leave on account of sickness personally, accident disability, or extended illness; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Education and Ways and Means.

By Senator Steinberg—

SCR 611—A concurrent resolution commending Dr. Henry King Stanford for his contributions to higher education.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

By Senator Steinberg—

SB 612—A bill to be entitled An act relating to criminal proceedings; requiring courts to advise persons pleading guilty or nolo contendere that such pleas may affect their immigration status; providing that defendants need not disclose their legal status; providing procedure for vacating judgments; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary-Criminal.

By Senator Trask—

SB 613—A bill to be entitled An act relating to health maintenance organizations; amending s. 641.19(3), Florida Statutes; providing that the term "minimum services" provided by a health maintenance organization shall include physician care by physicians licensed under chapters 458, 459, or 460, Florida Statutes; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Health and Rehabilitative Services and Commerce.

By Senator Myers—

SB 614—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the county motor fuels tax; amending s. 336.021, Florida Statutes; providing for return of such tax to counties on a monthly basis after deduction of administrative costs; requiring a county to pay refunds from taxes returned to it; authorizing adoption of forms; requiring adoption of rules; specifying applicability of provisions of chapter 206, Florida Statutes, to the section; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Economic, Community and Consumer Affairs; and Ways and Means.

By Senator Myers—

SB 615—A bill to be entitled An act relating to jurors; amending s. 40.24, Florida Statutes; increasing the pay of grand

jurors; amending s. 40.40(1), Florida Statutes; increasing the number of jurors which shall be drawn for service as grand jurors; amending s. 905.01(1), Florida Statutes; increasing the maximum number of grand jurors which shall compose the grand jury; amending s. 905.37(3), (4), Florida Statutes; increasing the number of members which shall compose a statewide grand jury; increasing the compensation of statewide grand jurors; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Judiciary-Civil and Ways and Means.

By Senator Gordon—

SB 616—A bill to be entitled An act relating to small businesses; amending s. 288.39(2), (4), Florida Statutes, renumbering subsections (5)-(8), and adding a new subsection (5) to said section; encouraging commercial relationships between the state and small businesses; requiring the Division of Economic Development of the Department of Commerce to conduct studies, workshops, and seminars dealing with and encouraging such relationships; declaring state policy that each state agency purchase commodities or services from small businesses; providing limitations; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Commerce and Governmental Operations.

By Senator Tobiassen—

SCR 617—A concurrent resolution approving the types, amounts, and use of registration fees, tuition fees, and course fees to be charged and collected from students enrolled in the institutions of higher learning under the Board of Regents for school terms commencing after September 1, 1980; authorizing a waiver of tuition for non-Florida students in a specified amount; providing certain provisos for the use of fees.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Education and Ways and Means.

By Senator Beard—

SB 618—A bill to be entitled An act relating to elections; amending s. 101.21, Florida Statutes; providing for the number of official ballots to be printed and provided for counties; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary-Civil.

By Senator Beard—

SB 619—A bill to be entitled An act relating to bail pending appeal; creating s. 903.133, Florida Statutes; prohibiting the granting of bail on appeal to a person adjudged guilty of a first degree felony for a violation of the Florida Comprehensive Drug Abuse Prevention and Control Act; repealing Rules 3.130(a) and 3.691(a), Florida Rules of Criminal Procedure, to the extent of their conflict with the act; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary-Criminal.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 620—A bill to be entitled An act relating to factory-built housing; adding subsection (10) to s. 553.37, Florida Statutes; providing for the bonding of factory-built housing inspection agencies; amending s. 553.38(2), Florida Statutes; authorizing local authorities to enforce on-site installation requirements for

factory-built housing; amending s. 553.39, Florida Statutes; authorizing injunctive or other relief from the circuit court to enforce laws and rules regulating factory-built housing; providing for conditional repeal; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Economic, Community and Consumer Affairs.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 621—A bill to be entitled An act relating to firefighters, providing definitions; providing qualifications whereby firefighters may be entitled to supplemental compensation; providing a schedule for supplemental compensation payments; providing for the creation of a special fund; providing for the issuance of warrants for the payment of supplemental compensation; providing that the Firefighters Standards and Training Council shall determine eligibility under the act under certain circumstances; providing legislative intent; providing an appropriation; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Governmental Operations, Ways and Means Subcommittee E and the Committee on Ways and Means.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 622—A bill to be entitled An act relating to energy; creating part IV of chapter 377, Florida Statutes; providing definitions; providing for grants to counties and municipalities to defray a specified percentage of the cost of technical assistance analyses and energy conservation measures; providing for grants to state agencies, counties, and municipalities for biomass research; providing for grants to state agencies and local governments for employee ridesharing programs; providing for mass transit subsidies for state employees; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Economic, Community and Consumer Affairs; Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 623—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the taking of fish; providing that the use of certain nets is legal so long as the nets are used for educational or scientific purposes in a specified manner; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Natural Resources and Conservation.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 624—A bill to be entitled An act relating to Seminole County; limiting the number of alcoholic beverage licenses for the sale of intoxicating beverages within Seminole County to one license for each 4,000 population or major fraction thereof; excepting from the operation thereof licenses good throughout the state and other nonquota licenses for clubs, hotels, motels and restaurants; providing that the number of licenses now authorized shall not be reduced hereby; providing an effective date.

Proof of publication of the required notice was attached.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

By Senators Anderson and McKnight—

SB 625—A bill to be entitled An act relating to energy; creating part III of chapter 377, Florida Statutes, the Florida Energy Assistance Act; providing a purpose and definitions; creating a Florida Energy Trust Fund and providing for its administration and use; requiring electric utilities to notify their customers of certain energy conservation information; providing energy audits and providing certain other energy conservation assistance; providing duties for the Executive Office of the Governor with respect to energy conservation grants and providing for rulemaking; providing procedures for the issuance of energy reimbursement grants to utility customers by the office and restricting the amount thereof; prohibiting false grant applications; providing a penalty; providing for civil remedies; specifying conditions for grant application

approvals; authorizing corporate income tax credits in lieu of grants; providing for rules; providing for the issuance of grants by the Department of Community Affairs to low-income persons under certain conditions; creating the Florida Energy Research and Development Program; providing criteria for the distribution of funds for energy research; creating the Highway Speed Reduction Program; providing for the issuance of grants to state and local entities by the Department of Community Affairs to assist in the enforcement of speed limits; amending s. 376.11(1), (2), (3), (4)(b), Florida Statutes, and adding a subsection, providing for the deposit of certain funds in the Florida Energy Trust Fund presently deposited in the Florida Coastal Protection Trust Fund after a specified date; providing for the levy of an excise tax upon terminal facilities for oil and other pollutants and for the deposit thereof in the Florida Energy Trust Fund; restricting the imposition of such tax; amending s. 211.02(1), Florida Statutes; providing for the redistribution of revenues derived from the excise tax levied upon the production or severance of oil or gas; amending s. 320.02(1)(a), Florida Statutes; requiring inclusion of certain energy efficiency information in certain applications for motor vehicle registrations; adding s. 377.703(3)(k), (l), Florida Statutes; authorizing the Executive Office of the Governor to conduct training programs for energy auditors and to adopt rules; creating s. 318.25, Florida Statutes; providing additional penalties for speeding; providing for collection and deposit of such additional penalties; amending s. 212.05(1), Florida Statutes, renumbering present subsections (7) and (8) and adding a new subsection (7) to said section; increasing the sales tax on certain vehicles; providing exceptions; prohibiting unauthorized practice of energy auditing; providing penalties; providing for certification of energy auditors; specifying duties of the Department of Professional Regulation; providing for examination, fees, and renewal; prohibiting unauthorized compensation of energy auditors; providing penalties; providing for civil action; providing for treble damages, costs, and attorneys' fees; providing a retroactive effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Economic, Community and Consumer Affairs; Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

By Senators Barron and Trask—

SB 626—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public schools; amending s. 233.062, Florida Statutes; providing for a voluntary daily school period for prayer; authorizing excusals; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Education.

By Senators Barron, W. D. Childers, Gordon, Lewis, Tobiasen, Peterson, Carlucci, Maxwell and Trask—

SB 627—A bill to be entitled An act relating to education; amending s. 240.235(1), Florida Statutes; providing that the student activity and service fund of each university may benefit student government association sponsored concerts; removing the power of the university president to reallocate funds; providing that the university president shall exercise his veto power over the student government association budget within 15 days after it is submitted or it shall be deemed approved; providing that the legislative body of the student government association shall make new recommendations for expenditure of the vetoed portion of the budget; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Education and Ways and Means.

By Senators Vogt and Gordon—

SB 628—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public health; amending ss. 400.601, 400.604, 400.608, 400.609, Florida Statutes; removing the requirements that a hospice provide inpatient care, employ a licensed physician as a medical director, and admit patients to the program only upon advice of a licensed physician; amending s. 400.602(1), Florida Statutes; extending the deadline for compliance with licensing requirements; repealing ss. 400.603, 400.606(4), to remove certificate-of-need requirements for licensing; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Health and Rehabilitative Services.

By Senator Vogt—

SB 629—A bill to be entitled An act relating to drug abuse prevention and control; creating s. 893.031, Florida Statutes; providing criteria for certain drugs and substances to be controlled as "public nuisance" drugs or substances; authorizing the Department of Professional Regulation to so classify drugs and substances and to adopt rules; providing a penalty for sale or possession of such drugs; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary-Criminal.

By Senator Carlucci (by request)—

SB 630—A bill to be entitled An act relating to balloon mortgages; amending s. 697.05(5), Florida Statutes, exempting mortgages securing an indebtedness in excess of \$100,000 from the balloon mortgage law; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Commerce.

By Senator Carlucci—

SB 631—A bill to be entitled An act relating to law enforcement; prohibiting any person from injuring or killing a police dog under certain conditions; providing a penalty; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary-Criminal.

By Senator Carlucci—

SB 632—A bill to be entitled An act relating to fishing and hunting licenses; adding a paragraph to s. 372.57(4), Florida Statutes, and adding a new subsection (10) to said section, providing for hunting and fishing license reciprocity between Florida and Georgia for persons who are more than 65 years of age; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Natural Resources and Conservation.

By Senator Steinberg—

SB 633—A bill to be entitled An act relating to public schools; requiring the Commissioner of Education to study the need for educational centers for emotionally disturbed students; providing for a report; providing an appropriation; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Education and Ways and Means.

By Senator Grizzle—

SB 634—A bill to be entitled An act relating to saltwater fisheries; adding subsection (7) to s. 370.11, Florida Statutes, prohibiting the taking of redfish, speckled trout or spotted weakfish by net; providing an exception; providing penalties; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Natural Resources and Conservation.

By Senator Grizzle—

SB 635—A bill to be entitled An act relating to saltwater fisheries; adding subsection (7) to s. 370.11, Florida Statutes, prohibiting the taking of mullet by net or seine except during open season; providing an exception; providing a season for the netting or seining of mullet; providing penalties; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Natural Resources and Conservation.

By Senator Grizzle—

SB 636—A bill to be entitled An act relating to condominiums; amending s. 718.402(2)(a) and (3)(a) and (b), Florida Statutes; extending the period of minimum notice of con-

version of existing improvements to a condominium which must be provided to existing tenants; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Economic, Community and Consumer Affairs.

By Senator Henderson—

SJR 637—A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Section 4, Article VII of the State Constitution, relating to assessment of property for purposes of ad valorem taxation.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committees on Ways and Means and Rules and Calendar.

By Senator Henderson—

SB 638—A bill to be entitled An act relating to ad valorem taxation; creating s. 193.6225, Florida Statutes; defining "renewable energy source property"; providing for a reduction in the assessed value of property on which renewable energy source properties are installed; providing procedures for claiming the right of such assessment; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

By Senator Henderson—

SB 639—A bill to be entitled An act relating to cruelty to animals; amending s. 828.122(2)(a), Florida Statutes, redefining the term "animal" for purposes of "The Animal Fighting Act of 1976" to include gamecocks and roosters; providing an effective date.

—was read the first time by title and referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

Appointments Subject to Confirmation by the Senate

The Secretary of State on April 8, 1980, certified that pursuant to the provisions of Section 114.05, Florida Statutes, a certificate subject to confirmation by the Senate had been prepared for the following:
