## Consideration of Resolutions

On motion by Senator Thomas, by unanimous consent—

By Senator Thomas—

**SR 1279**—A resolution urging the release of Cuban political prisoner Jose Pujals Mederos.

WHEREAS, Jose Pujals Mederos has been incarcerated in a Cuban prison as a political prisoner for over 25 years, and

WHEREAS, Jose Pujals Mederos is 62 years old and in declining health, and

WHEREAS, his son, Victor J. Pujals of Coral Springs, and his daughters, Gloria Pujals Pullen of Havana, Florida, and Beatriz Pujals Whitfield of Tallahassee, desire the release of their father and reunion of their family, and

WHEREAS, the Havana, Florida, Kiwanis Club has begun efforts to effect the release of Jose Pujals Mederos as part of the International Kiwanis Club Major Emphasis Theme, "Make Miracles Happen," NOW, THEREFORE,

*Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida:*

That the Senate of the State of Florida does hereby support the efforts of the Havana, Florida, Kiwanis Club to obtain the release of Jose Pujals Mederos and to reunite him with his family.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the President of the United States, the Secretary of State of the United States, and the Florida Congressional Delegation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution, with the seal of the Senate affixed, be presented to Victor J. Pujals, Gloria Pujals Pullen, and Beatriz Pujals Whitfield as a tangible token of the sentiments of the Florida Senate.

—was introduced out of order and read the first time by title. On motion by Senator Thomas, SR 1279 was read the second time in full and unanimously adopted.

On motion by Senator Lehtinen, the following remarks were printed in the journal:

**Senator Thomas:** I want to commend the Havana Kiwanis Club for the outstanding efforts they put forth to recognize the humanitarian rights of those who are improperly incarcerated and to advance their interests and the local families' interests in securing their loved ones' release. They have been before the Cabinet; they have been in the halls of the Congress; and they continue to pursue that effort with great diligence.

We have some very special guests I would like to present to the Senate: a daughter of Mr. Pujals, Gloria Pullen, her husband, John, and their two children from Havana, Florida, in my home county; Victor Pujals, who is a son from Ft. Lauderdale; a daughter, Beatriz Whitfield, and her two children from Tallahassee.

Accompanying this family is the very active young businessman of Havana, Florida, Wayne Poppel. He is the president of the Havana Kiwanis Club. Wayne is accompanied by his wife and family. And, the driving force, the Project Chairman, is Fred Phelps from the Havana Kiwanis Club.

Mr. President, we're pleased today to join so many throughout this country in recognizing this agricultural engineer, Jose Pujals Mederos, who since 1962 has been in prison, and we salute the works of this very dedicated civic club for what they are doing and the inspiration they extend to all of us. Thank you very much.

**Senator Ros-Lehtinen:** Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. Mr. Jose Pujals Mederos is not just another prisoner in just another jail. He is really a symbol for the many hundreds of political prisoners who remain in jail after many years. Mr. Pujals is a prisoner called "plantado". A plantado is a person who does not yield, who does not cooperate with his communist jailers and because of that attitude, he is treated differently than other prisoners. He is given different clothes, different food, different treatment. The jail in which Mr. Pujals finds himself in is called "bonato". It is worse than a nightmare, and this is where Mr. Pujals and many prisoners like him are kept. As I said, he is just a symbol of the hundreds who remain behind in Cuba. As we fight for Mr. Pujals' release—and one day it will be granted—let us not forget the hundreds who remain there. I know that in Mr. Pujals' mind and in his heart, when he leaves that hellhole, will be the memory of his brothers and sisters who remain there. Although the male political prisoners are talked about and discussed many times, it is the women political prisoners who remain in Cuba who are sometimes the forgotten ones.

So with the spirit of cooperation of the many congressmen and the many organizations who are trying to get Mr. Pujals released, let us not forget the brothers and sisters who remain there.

The President requested Senators Thomas and Ros-Lehtinen to escort Mrs. Pullen, Mr. Pujals and Mrs. Whitfield to the rostrum where they were presented copies of the resolution.

On motion by Senator Thomas, by two-thirds vote SR 513 was withdrawn from the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

WHEREAS, Professor Lloyd M. Beidler has served Florida State University, this nation, and the scientific world through a distinguished career as an educator and pioneering researcher in the field of physiology, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Beidler's research is internationally recognized for having provided the basis for the modern scientific understanding of how the sense of taste works among higher animals, and

WHEREAS, this fundamental research has stimulated -- and continues to stimulate -- worldwide biological and biomedical research dedicated to unraveling the mysteries of the senses of taste and smell, and

WHEREAS, in his 36 years of uncompromising service as a member of the biological science faculty at Florida State University, he has established a world-class research laboratory which continues to bring national and international credit to Florida State University and the State of Florida, and

WHEREAS, over the years this laboratory has attracted some of the most outstanding students of science in the world, dozens of whom are now making important contributions of their own in laboratories around the globe, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Beidler's singular contributions to the furtherance of scientific knowledge and education have brought him recognition from the National Academy of Sciences, numerous distinguished lecture posts around the world, and an unchallenged place of honor among the world's elite scientific societies, NOW, THEREFORE,

*Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida:*

That the Senate does hereby commend Dr. Lloyd M. Beidler for his truly outstanding accomplishments as a scientist and scholar, and extends its sincerest appreciation for his dedicated service as an educator to this state and this nation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution, with the Seal of the Senate affixed, be presented to Dr. Lloyd M. Beidler as a tangible token of the sentiments of the Florida Senate.

WHEREAS, students in the middle school and junior high school years are forming lifelong attitudes toward mathematics, science, and technology, and

WHEREAS, young people need early motivation and recognition from peers and the public in order to meet the challenge of excelling in mathematics and laying the foundation for careers that depend on expertise in mathematics, and

WHEREAS, MATHCOUNTS, a coaching and competitive project of the Florida Engineering Society and the National Society of Professional Engineers, provides an opportunity for seventh and eighth grade students to advance and exhibit their mathematical expertise, and

WHEREAS, the Florida MATHCOUNTS team fielded the top national winner in 1986 and the top team in 1985, and

WHEREAS, over a thousand seventh and eighth grade Florida students in 1987 became more involved in and enthusiastic about mathematics as a result of the MATHCOUNTS experience at the school, regional, and state levels of competition, NOW, THEREFORE,
