Consideration of Resolutions

On motion by Senator Ros-Lehtinen, by two-thirds vote SR 427 was withdrawn from the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

On motion by Senator Ros-Lehtinen—

SR 427—A resolution urging the United States Government to denounce human rights violations in Cuba; urging the President and the U.S. Department of State to take all possible measures to restrain those violations and to obtain the release of political prisoners from Cuba; and commending Cuban-American patriotic organizations.

WHEREAS, the need to honor human rights everywhere is of special concern to Americans, whose love for democracy and respect for individual liberties form the cornerstone of the Republic, and

WHEREAS, countless persons who came to America in search of liberty, and their descendants, feel directly affected when human rights are violated in their country of origin, and

WHEREAS, the present Cuban regime's totalitarian system of internal repression has reached degrees of inhumanity unparalleled in the modern historical annals of the Western Hemisphere, particularly in its mistreatment of political prisoners, and

WHEREAS, the free exercise of essential civil liberties such as the freedom to speak, write, and assemble are cruelly and swiftly punished by the present Cuban regime, which continues to systematically violate human rights by imprisoning, torturing, or executing Cuban nationals who dare express democratic sentiments, and

WHEREAS, in addition to the systematic violation of human rights, as has been documented by international institutions such as the Organization of American States and Amnesty International, the present Cuban regime disregards international law in other ways such as by refusing to compensate United States citizens, including many Floridians, after its forcible acquisition of their property in Cuba valued at over \$1.5 billion, and

WHEREAS, since the Castro-Communist takeover of Cuba over one million Cubans have left their homeland seeking freedom and democracy within our shores, and

WHEREAS, most Cuban exiles are Floridians who richly contribute to the state's economic and cultural life and who have suffered and continue to suffer because of the present Cuban regime's ruthless human rights violations, particularly its politically motivated imprisonment of thousands of their relatives in its archipelago of concentration camps, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary for freedom loving governments, with whom lies the defense of human rights, to condemn, denounce, and publicize such violations at every appropriate international forum, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida:

That the Florida Senate urges the United States Government to condemn, denounce, and publicize the systematic violation of human rights in Cuba and the plight of political prisoners in that island before the appropriate organs of the United Nations, the Organization of American States, and every other appropriate international forum; urges the President and the United States Department of State to take all possible measures to restrain the violation of human rights in Cuba and obtain the release of the political prisoners; and commends the patriotic organizations of the Cuban-American community in this state for their never ending defense of human rights and sense of solidarity with the political prisoners in Communist Cuba.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be dispatched to the President of the United States, to the President of the United States Senate, to the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, to each member of the Florida delegation to the United States Congress, and to the Secretary of State of the United States.

On motion by Senator Ros-Lehtinen, by two-thirds vote SCR 1277 was withdrawn from the Committee on Rules and Calendar.

SCR 1277—A concurrent resolution declaring the third week of May 1987, as Cuban Municipalities in Exile Week.

WHEREAS, 85 years ago, Cuba obtained its freedom and became an independent republic geographically divided into 126 municipalities or townships, with each one having its own characteristics and traditions but all being united by bonds common to the homeland, and

WHEREAS, at the time the communists took over Cuba, a gigantic exodus began, and today over 1 million Cubans, or 10 percent of the island's population, are exiled all over the free world, but chiefly in the United States and particularly in Dade County, Florida, and

WHEREAS, a new, vigorous generation of Cuban-Americans has arisen to intermingle the culture and traditions of their Cuban forefathers with those of the United States, to form an important and creative force in the Hispanic population of this country, and

WHEREAS, in 1961, the Cuban Municipalities in Exile organization was formed, which had as its goals the maintenance of the democratic spirit among the exiles, the enhancement of familial ties, and the provision of aid to help the flow of newly arrived refugees in adapting to American society, and

WHEREAS, the Cuban Municipalities in Exile unites the ethnic community of Dade County in a demonstration of community spirit in a celebration of the free and democratic ideals of the United States, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida, the House of Representatives Concurring:

That the Legislature of the State of Florida hereby declares the third week of May as Cuban Municipalities in Exile Week and calls upon the people of Florida to observe the week with appropriate ceremonies and activities.

HB 676—A bill to be entitled An act relating to Hillsborough County; repealing chapter 63-1396, Laws of Florida, which grants reciprocity between jurisdictions in Hillsborough County in licensing contractors, requires such tradesmen to post bond prior to obtaining license, and establishes a Unified Combined Examining Board; repealing chapter 65-1657, Laws of Florida, which changes the membership of the Hillsborough County Unified Combined Examining Board to run concurrently with membership held on certain other boards; repealing chapter 65-1675, Laws of Florida, which establishes requirements for licensing of corporations; repealing chapter 67-1477, Laws of Florida, which provides that mechanical contractors be included among those who must furnish bond before licensing; providing an effective date.

HB 809—A bill to be entitled An act relating to credit service organizations; creating part III of chapter 817, F.S.; providing definitions; prohibiting certain acts; providing an exemption to the requirement to obtain a surety bond under circumstances; requiring a written statement to buyers; providing for an information statement to buyers; specifying provisions of the contract between a buyer and a credit service organization; prohibiting waivers by a buyer; establishing the burden of proving an exemption or exception; providing for penalties; providing actions for damages; providing an effective date.

HB 889—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Central Broward Drainage District, Broward County; amending section 4(b), chapter 61-1439, Laws of Florida, as amended, providing that all commissioners are to be elected by the qualified electors residing within the district zone that the election is for and that no commissioner elected prior to the date that this act becomes law shall be affected in his or her term of office; amending section 4(d), chapter 61-1439, Laws of Florida, revising the legal descriptions of the six zones of the Central Broward Drainage District; amending section 4(f), chapter 61-1439, Laws of Florida, providing that for the 1988 district election of commissioner from zones 3, 4, and 5, the incumbent commissioner for zones 3, 4, and 5 shall be qualified for nomination to office for the same zones; amending section 5, chapter 61-1439, Laws of Florida, as amended, providing that the qualified electors of each zone can only vote for the qualified commission candidates for their zone; amending section 7, chapter 61-1439, Laws of Florida, as amended, changing the designation of chairman to chairperson; providing that the chairperson, and vice-chairperson in the chairperson's absence, can vote on all matters before the district board of commissioners by deleting provision that chairman and vice-chairman in chairman's absence, shall not cast a vote except to break a tie vote; providing that the affirmative votes of a majority, but not less than three of the members of the board that are present at district meetings shall be required to make any determination or effect any action; providing that this act shall take precedence over any conflicting law to the extent of such conflict; providing for severability; providing an effective date.

(b) *The provisions of paragraph (a) do not apply to any vendor who has been issued, pursuant to local law, a special alcoholic beverage license for an entertainment or lodging complex; nor do they apply to any vendor who operates an establishment which is part of an international tourist attraction, located within a special improvement district that is created by local law and that includes territory in more than one county.*

(3) The premises of all such vendors shall be subject to and meet all the applicable provisions of chapter 381 and the regulations promulgated thereunder.

This comprehensive study and report shall be completed and submitted to the Legislature by January 1, 1988.

Section 1. Lottery proceeds deposited into the Education Enhancement Trust Fund shall be expended for nonrecurring purposes only.

Senator Gordon moved the following amendment which failed:

Section 13. Notwithstanding the provisions of Chapter 341, Florida Statutes, no funds appropriated to the Department of Transportation for public transportation from state revenues shall be used to support any demonstration project in Dade County that directly supports a private vendor.

Section 13. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 332.007, Florida Statutes, the Department of Transportation is authorized to advance \$500,000 to Brevard County for road improvements on Valkaria Airport.

Amendment 4—On page 8, after line 24, insert:

Section 13. Pursuant to s. 216.351, Florida Statutes, and the provisions of Chapter 216, Florida Statutes, to the contrary notwithstanding, the district Deputy Assistant Secretaries in the Department of Transportation shall have the authority to reallocate, on a temporary or permanent basis, positions, salary dollars, and related Expenses between budget entities so long as the lesser budget entity is not increased nor decreased by more than 5 percent in positions and 10 percent in Salaries or Expenses in a fiscal year. This authority shall not be used to increase the budget entity for District Administration or to transfer Special Category or Aid to Local Government appropriations. Further, any reallocation under this authority shall promptly be reported to the Secretary of the Department, the Executive Office of the Governor, the Legislative

Appropriations Committees, and the Legislative Transportation Committees. This report shall be submitted by the district Deputy Assistant Secretary and shall clearly state the exact resources transferred, the purpose of the transfer, and the duration of the transfer. If the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate object in writing to any reallocation, it shall be reversed or approved by the Executive Office of the Governor within 14 days of such objection.

The provisions of sections 1(1)(c), Chapter 83-333; 1(1)(e), Chapter 84-542; 35(1)(h), Chapter 85-116, as reenacted by Chapter 86-2; and specific appropriation 1945C, Chapter 86-167, Laws of Florida, to the contrary notwithstanding, funds appropriated for the community education facility may be interchanged between phases to implement the intent of the project; and the provisions of s. 235.196(1)(f), Florida Statutes, to the contrary notwithstanding, the Broward County School Board is authorized to construct a media center on the site of the Pembroke Pines Resource Center.

Amendment 14—In title, on page 4, line 29, after "General Revenue;" insert: authorizing Lake City Community College to acquire property;
