WHEREAS, the Governor and Cabinet, sitting as the State Board of Education, have designated the week of April 9-15, 1989, as School Principals' Week, NOW, THEREFORE,

*Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida:*

That all school principals in the State of Florida be commended for their exemplary leadership and dedication to achieving a standard of excellence in education for the youth of Florida.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution, with the Seal of the Senate affixed, be presented to Betty Castor, Commissioner of Education, as a tangible token of the sentiments of the Florida Senate.

Secondary and elementary school principals and representatives of the Florida Association of School Administrators, who were seated in the gallery, were also recognized by Senator Johnson.

WHEREAS, the State of Florida has committed itself to be a leader in the field of public education for all of the residents of the State of Florida, and

WHEREAS, the most important components in attaining this goal are the teachers of the State of Florida, and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of both the Department of Education and the local county school boards to retain those skilled professionals who have dedicated themselves to teaching the youth of the State of Florida, and

WHEREAS, it has come to the attention of the Florida Senate that such a professional, Ethel Stratton, who has had in excess of 50 years of continuous classroom teaching with the Dade County School Board, is about to retire, NOW, THEREFORE,

*Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida:*

That the Senate hereby commends Ethel Stratton for her remarkable commitment and dedication to the teaching profession and to the Dade County Public Schools.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution, with the Seal of the Senate affixed, be presented to Ethel Stratton as a tangible token of the sentiments expressed herein.

**SR 290**—A resolution recognizing the Town of Eatonville as the oldest incorporated black municipality in the nation and commending the town for 101 years of freedom and self-government.

WHEREAS, the Town of Eatonville sits between Maitland and Winter Park, 8 miles north of Orlando, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Eatonville has been officially recognized as the nation's oldest incorporated black municipality, and

WHEREAS, on August 18, 1887, 27 black Eatonville landowners met in the public hall and voted to incorporate their community into a town, and

WHEREAS, it is impossible to talk of the town without mentioning two of its greatest landmarks: the Robert Hungerford Normal and Industrial School and the St. Lawrence A.M.E. Church, and

WHEREAS, the Hungerford School was for years the most important educational institution for Negroes in the State of Florida and the church was the backbone of the town, and

WHEREAS, today Eatonville is a town of almost 3,000 citizens and is still a dynamic community, rich in cultural heritage and pride, NOW, THEREFORE,

*Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida:*

That the Senate recognizes the Town of Eatonville as the oldest incorporated black municipality in the nation and hereby joins the citizens of the Town of Eatonville and the residents of the State of Florida in commemorating the 101st anniversary of the founding of the Town of Eatonville and salutes the citizens of the town for their accomplishments.

**SR 1404**—A resolution recognizing April 11, 1989, as Children's Day.

WHEREAS, there are more than 2.8 million children living in the State of Florida, and by the year 2000 there will be more than 3.3 million children, and

WHEREAS, Florida's children are the resource which provides the greatest hope for the future of family excellence, and

WHEREAS, children naturally possess the best of all human qualities, including insatiable curiosity, unbounded imagination, unlimited energy, unrelenting determination, and unconditional love for others, and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of our children and our state to encourage the productive capacity and informed citizenship of children by the further development of their qualities, strengths, and potential, and

WHEREAS, on this day, public officials, schools, private organizations, and the citizenry are encouraged to celebrate and pay tribute to Florida's children, and

WHEREAS, by dedicating a day of recognition for the children of Florida, the state acknowledges the importance of its children and its responsibility to the future, NOW, THEREFORE,

*Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida:*

That the Florida Senate recognizes April 11, 1989, as Children's Day.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be made available to the Department of Education for distribution to public schools for public viewing.
