## MESSAGES FROM THE GOVERNOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE COMMUNICATIONS

### VETOED BILL

Dear Madam President:

By the authority vested in me as Governor of Florida, under the provisions of Article III, Section 8, of the Constitution of the State of Florida, I do hereby withhold my approval and transmit to you with my objections, Senate Bill 272-H, enacted by the Twenty-Fourth Legislature of Florida under the Florida Constitution, 1968 Revision, during Special Session H of 1992, and entitled:

“An act making appropriations; providing moneys for the annual period beginning July 1, 1992, and ending June 30, 1993, to pay salaries, and other expenses, capital outlay - buildings, and other improvements, and for other specified purposes of the various agencies of State government; providing an effective date.”

I have reviewed Senate Bill 272-H, the General Appropriations Bill for Fiscal Year 1992-1993. It is similar in many respects to Committee Substitute for House Bill 2101, the General Appropriations Bill, enacted during the regular session earlier this year. I vetoed that earlier effort. Like that bill, Senate Bill 272-H fails the citizens of Florida.

For more than six months, the Legislature has wrestled with my proposals to set a new direction for state government. For six months, the Legislature has failed to acknowledge many of the state's most critical needs. For six months, it has refused to recognize that state government must change the way it does business if it is to continue to serve the best interests of all Floridians, now and in the future. Despite the best efforts of many members in each House, I still have not been presented with an General Appropriation Bill that, in good conscience and in keeping with my constitutional responsibilities, I can recommend to our fellow citizens.

Its failure must be judged alongside the facts of life in Florida. The state is still growing. The number of new students entering our public schools, community colleges and universities is now growing by more than 100,000 a year. Just 10 years ago, we had less than 5,000 new students per year seeking a place in our public educational system. Florida's prison population has almost doubled in the past decade, from 27,717 in 1982 to more than 53,000 this year. The demand for Medicaid, Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) and nursing homes expenditures has also exploded. Florida must now deal with the legacy of the “baby boom” generation, increasing numbers of children and a growing elder population. More than 343,000 of the 533,000 people receiving AFDC, or 64.4 percent, were children 17 years and younger as of December 1991. Almost 595,000 Medicaid recipients, or 51.9 percent of those receiving Medicaid, are children.

Growth makes compelling demands on state services—demands that cannot be ignored if we are to secure the future we all want. If we fail to invest now we will do damage that cannot easily be undone, and that will prove far more costly in future years. Key state policies dealing with our children will be established by the Federal Courts rather than by Florida's elected officials. Students needing classrooms and the attention of teachers cannot wait. Babies born to teenagers needing health care cannot wait. Violent criminals will not serve their time in prison. We will not be able to leave to our children the Florida that we love, unless we act now to clean up surface waters across the State.

Some members of the Legislature have maintained that this budget meets the needs of the State, without raising any taxes. Their claims are a cruel delusion. This budget neglects the pressing needs of today and seriously shortchanges Florida's future. The long-term economic health of our state and people is threatened by the lack of those investments that would build a better-skilled, better-trained, and better-paid work force. In education, health, public safety, and the environment, this budget is woefully deficient.

For example: this budget:

- \* Fails to provide sufficient funding to meet projected enrollment needs in public schools and provides insufficient funds on a per student basis for, to provide a quality classroom education.
- \* Closes the door to higher education for 8,499 new students in our community colleges and 10,294 new students in the State University System.
- \* Omits pre-kindergarten funding for 8,000 additional eligible 3-4 year olds. Currently more than 78,000 children are unserved in this program designed to give at-risk kids the opportunity to achieve the same level of readiness to learn as their classmates.
- \* Eliminates funding for more than 250 Full-Services Schools and breakfast funds for 135,000 elementary students, ignores the need for financial assistance for over 38,000 students, fails to provide funding to free up the Lottery that would distribute nearly \$50 per student to public schools, \$127 per student to community colleges and \$197 per student to universities.

\* Fails to provide additional funds to add prison beds to inventory. The Governor's Fair Share budget included \$47.6 million to build 2,990 prison beds. Without building these beds, we will reach prison gridlock in October 1993, at which time Control Release will cease to function and we will be awarding provisional credits across-the-board.

\* Fails to provide any additional judges or workload for the State Attorneys or Public Defenders. This would be the second consecutive year in which no additional judges, prosecutors, or public defenders have been funded. Moreover, this appropriation actually reduces the State Attorneys and Public Defenders below the appropriated level after the 1991-92 cuts.

\* Provides no funding for the last 6 months of FY 92-93 to continue at 90% of federal poverty level Medicaid eligibility for elderly and disabled persons eliminating coverage for 66,400 Floridians as of January 1, 1993. The Governor's Budget provides funding to restore the eligibility level to 100% of poverty on July 1, 1992, increasing coverage for approximately 42,855 persons.

\* Appears to continue the Medically Needy Program for only the period July 1, 1992 through December 31, 1992, failing to provide funding for the final six months of FY 1992-93, eliminating coverage for 41,192 individuals who would otherwise qualify for Medicaid services, but do not meet income or asset limits. The Governor's Budget provides funding for the Medically Needy Program for the period July 1, 1992 through June 30, 1993.

\* Eliminates funding for Healthy Start, including the increase in eligibility for pregnant women and children to 185% of the federal poverty level and the increase in fees for obstetrical services from Medicaid—which will limit access to prenatal care and primary care for approximately 9,300 pregnant women and 9,300 children. Governor's Budget restores extension of eligibility to 185% and the obstetrical fee increase effective July 1, 1992.

\* Fails to sufficiently address the critical needs related several HRS lawsuits. These include: improvements to the child welfare system (A-F lawsuit), therapeutic services for children in HRS care and custody (M.E. lawsuit), and improvements to the juvenile justice system (Bobby M. Consent Decree). Failure to address these issues places Florida in jeopardy of losing control of our child welfare and juvenile justice systems to the federal courts.

\* Fails to fund Surface Water Improvement and Management (SWIM) Program jeopardizing the protection and cleanup of our rivers, streams, lakes and estuaries in which \$75 million has been invested by the State and Water Management Districts. It fails to provide the necessary funding for the Sewage Treatment Revolving Loan Program, causing a loss of \$50 million to the state in federal matching funds.

A budget that ignores such problems must not become law.

We are now just days away from the beginning of a new fiscal year. The state faces a crisis from which it cannot shrink. There is no longer time for me to exercise, prudently, the full review period authorized by the Constitution. We must all act in the best interest of the people of Florida. We can no longer allow venal politics or strident special interests inimical to Florida's well-being to set our agenda. I believe a responsible budget can still be developed and enacted.

The State's budget must embrace a number of important principles, however. It must plant the seeds of reform. It must signal a fundamental change in state policy and acknowledge the priority of preventing problems through early investment. It must move programs closer to the people they serve and continue the reform of state programs in corrections, health and education. It must help regain the faith of Florida's citizens in their government and ensure that citizens have a say in using lottery revenues to enhance education. It must begin the process of tax reform. Specifically, every Floridian and business must pay their "Fair Share" of state taxes. No Floridian should be subject to burdensome property taxes. These are the standards to which I will hold any budget submitted to me by the Legislature.

Not all of the Legislature has failed to recognized the need to act on such principles, of course. Many members in each House have argued for their importance. The courage of these members, in a year dominated by politics, is admirable. I especially want to recognize and applaud the members of the Florida House of Representatives who have put themselves on record for the type of investments contained in my budget.

I know the last month has been a time of enormous frustration. The deadlock over the budget has been a source of anxiety and a cause for worry for thousands who need to receive state services. I pledge to work day and night to avoid prolonging the real concerns of our hardworking state employees and the many Floridians who depend on state government. I call upon all of those involved in the days ahead to put their past differences behind them and to work for a better Florida.

The promise of a better Florida will not be fulfilled by Senate Bill 272-H. It is in consideration of this view, I hereby veto Senate Bill 272-H. I urge the Legislature to sustain my judgment and to take up once again the issues I have placed before it.
