PRAYER

The following prayer was offered by Rabbi David B. Saltzman, Aventura Turnberry Jewish Center, Aventura:

WHEREAS, the Tampa Bay Estuary is the largest open water estuary in the state, and

WHEREAS, the Tampa Bay Estuary contains a variety of mangrove, salt marsh, tidal flat, and seagrass bed ecosystems, and

WHEREAS, important economic resources such as recreational and commercial fishing, marine industries, shipping, and tourism are dependent on the quality of the Tampa Bay Estuary, and

WHEREAS, the Tampa Bay Regional Planning Council and its Agency on Bay Management have been instrumental in initiating the Surface Water Improvement and Management (SWIM) program, seagrass research funding, the Grizzle-Figg Bill requiring advanced wastewater treatment, and the designation of Tampa Bay for the National Estuary Program, and

WHEREAS, the Tampa Bay Estuary is of national significance due to its size, ecological diversity, and economic value, and

WHEREAS, it is appropriate that this body recognize the significance of an important natural resource of the state, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida:

That the Senate recognizes the importance of the Tampa Bay Estuary and designates February 13, 1992, Tampa Bay Day.

INTRODUCTION AND REFERENCE OF BILL

By Senator Grant—

SB 2452—A bill to be entitled An act relating to sentencing; providing that sexual contact or penetration is a victim injury that must be scored under sentencing guidelines; providing an effective date.

—which was read by title and referred to the Committee on Criminal Justice.

On motions by Senator Grant, by two-thirds vote **SB 2452** was withdrawn from the Committee on Criminal Justice and by two-thirds vote placed on the Special Order Calendar to be considered following **SB 858**.

LOCAL BILLS

SB 526—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the City of Sebastian, Indian River County; authorizing the acquisition of an alcoholic beverage license by the City of Sebastian, to be used in connection with the city's municipal recreational complex, including the city's golf course, and improvements connected with the use of the same; providing for terms and privileges of renewal; providing that such license may be transferred to a lessee or permittee who is a qualified applicant therefor, for the operation of a business by said lessee or permittee under such license in or at any clubhouse, restaurant and cocktail lounge, and similar premises at said complex; providing that said license shall remain the exclusive property of the city, and upon termination of the contract with any such lessee or permittee said license shall revert to the city by operation of law; providing that said license shall not be subject to any quota or limitation but shall be an exception to such restrictions; providing a severability clause; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Kurth, by two-thirds vote **SB 526** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—39 Nays—None

SB 1362—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Charter of the City of Jacksonville, amending Article 16 of Chapter 67-1320, Laws of Florida, as amended, being the Charter of the City of Jacksonville, to provide that law enforcement officers who suffer certain conditions or impairments of health shall be treated in a manner similar to firefighters with respect to special provisions relative to disability; increasing the retirement contribution rate for funding; declaring an important state interest; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Girardeau, by two-thirds vote **SB 1362** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—39 Nays—None

SB 1398—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Children's Board of Hillsborough County; providing that the Children's Board of Hillsborough County shall be exempt from the payment of fees, taxes, or increment revenue to community redevelopment agencies created pursuant to part III of chapter 163, Florida Statutes, except to the extent that such fees, taxes, or increment revenues have previously been pledged to bonds, notes, or other forms of indebtedness of a municipality or a community redevelopment agency authorized and issued before the effective date of this act; providing for severability; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Davis, by two-thirds vote **SB 1398** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—39 Nays—None

SB 1400—A bill to be entitled An act relating to Escambia County; amending s. 4, ch. 61-2130, Laws of Florida, as amended; providing for members of the Escambia County Law Library to be appointed to staggered terms of office; specifying the length of the terms of office; providing for filling vacancies on the library board; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Childers, by two-thirds vote **SB 1400** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—39 Nays—None

SB 1404—A bill to be entitled An act relating to Okaloosa County and the municipalities of Cinco Bayou, Crestview, Destin, Fort Walton Beach, Laurel Hill, Mary Esther, and Shalimar within that county; specifying purposes of the act; providing for conduct of municipal elections in those municipalities by the Supervisor of Elections of Okaloosa County; providing for the manner of conduct of such elections; providing for reimbursement of the supervisor of elections for the costs of such elections; prescribing dates for conducting elections to elect municipal officers in those municipalities; providing for setting of dates for special elections; prescribing a uniform period for qualifying for municipal office in those municipalities; providing for terms of incumbents in such offices; providing for conformance of terms of municipal office to the prescribed dates by ordinance; providing for canvassing of results of such municipal elections; providing for which candidate for a municipal office is the winner and when he takes office; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Bruner, by two-thirds vote **SB 1404** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—39 Nays—None

SB 1654—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Water Control District of South Brevard, Brevard County; amending chapter 86-418, Laws of Florida, as amended; providing for a change of boundaries of the district; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Kurth, by two-thirds vote **SB 1654** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—39 Nays—None

SB 1700—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Children's Services Council of Palm Beach County created pursuant to chapter 125, Florida Statutes; providing for the exemption of said council from the provisions of part III of chapter 163, Florida Statutes, relating to the payment of fees, taxes, or increment revenue to community redevelopment agencies created pursuant to part III of chapter 163, Florida Statutes; providing for severability; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Wexler, by two-thirds vote **SB 1700** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—39 Nays—None

SB 1738—A bill to be entitled An act relating to Citrus County, Homosassa Special Water District; amending section 2 of chapter 59-

1177, Laws of Florida, as amended; increasing the membership of the board of commissioners of the district from three to five; providing for an election for the additional members; decreasing the maximum amount of compensation that may be provided to the members of the board; providing for an increase in such compensation upon approval by the electors of the district; providing for a referendum; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Thurman, by two-thirds vote **SB 1738** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—39 Nays—None

SB 1740—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Homosassa Special Water District, Citrus County; amending s. 11, ch. 59-1177, Laws of Florida; increasing the threshold cost of work for which the district must use the competitive bid process; making additional types of work subject to the requirement; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Thurman, by two-thirds vote **SB 1740** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—39 Nays—None

SB 1792—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Sarasota-Manatee Airport Authority; amending s. 4(3), chapter 91-358, Laws of Florida; increasing the salary of members of the authority; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Johnson, by two-thirds vote **SB 1792** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—39 Nays—None

SB 2420—A bill to be entitled An act relating to Hillsborough County; amending section 1 of chapter 91-377, Laws of Florida, which relates to the platting of land and conveying of real property in Hillsborough County; repealing chapter 61-2918, Laws of Florida, which authorized the City of Tampa to deny building permits for certain land requested to be platted; providing legislative intent; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Grant, by two-thirds vote **SB 2420** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—39 Nays—None

SB 2424—A bill to be entitled An act relating to the South Broward Drainage District, Broward County; amending chapter 67-904, Laws of Florida, as amended; providing for the annexation of certain lands into the boundaries of the South Broward Drainage District and subjecting all of said lands to the provisions of chapter 67-904, Laws of Florida, as amended; providing for the abolition and dissolution of the Bailey Drainage District which was created by chapter 67-950, Laws of Florida, on a specific date, and providing in its place and stead the lands encompassed therein to constitute a part of the South Broward Drainage District; providing for the disposition of the assets and property of the Bailey Drainage District; providing for the assumption of the indebtedness and liabilities of the Bailey Drainage District by the South Broward Drainage District; providing for contracts of the Bailey Drainage District to remain in effect; providing for approval of Bailey Drainage District contracts and agreements by South Broward Drainage District; providing for transfer and dedication of certain road rights-of-way to Broward County; amending section 8 of chapter 67-904, Laws of Florida, as amended, to add the property annexed into the South Broward Drainage District by this act to the legal description of property lying within the South Broward Drainage District; providing that all existing rules, resolutions, and regulations of Bailey Drainage District not in conflict with this act shall remain in full force and effect unless and until they are properly repealed or revised by South Broward Drainage District; amending section 10 of chapter 67-904, Laws of Florida, as amended, to provide for the addition of one supervisor to the board of supervisors who shall be a landowner of land lying within the land area added to the South Broward Drainage District by this act, to provide for qualifications and election procedures for the additional supervisor and to provide for a special election to elect the additional supervisor; providing that this act shall take precedence over any conflicting law to the extent of such conflict; providing severability; providing effective dates.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Jenne, by two-thirds vote **SB 2424** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

SB 2426—A bill to be entitled An act relating to North Springs Improvement District, Broward County; expanding the boundaries of the district; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Jenne, by two-thirds vote **SB 2426** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—39 Nays—None

SB 2430—A bill to be entitled An act relating to Lake County; amending sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 11, 12, 14, 17, and 18 of chapter 67-1608, Laws of Florida, as amended; redesignating the Lake County Pollution Control Board as the Lake County Environmental Protection Board; providing a short title; providing definitions; creating the Lake County Environmental Protection Board; providing membership of the board; providing duties and powers of the board; redesignating the pollution control officer as the environmental protection officer; providing duties and powers of the environmental protection officer; providing requirements for approval of air and water pollution prevention facilities; providing for issuing notices and citations; providing for emergency orders; providing for appealing decisions of the environmental protection officer; requiring other agencies to notify the board before performing any air or water pollution duties in the county; providing penalties; providing for construing chapter 67-1608, Laws of Florida, as amended; providing for severability; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Langley, by two-thirds vote **SB 2430** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

SB 2432—A bill to be entitled An act pertaining to the General Pension and Retirement Fund of the City of Pensacola, Escambia County; amending chapter 61-2655, Laws of Florida, as amended; providing for repayment of previously withdrawn contributions to the fund upon return to service of any employee previously laid off; providing limitation of benefits for participants who are also participants in one or more other defined benefit plans and/or one or more defined contribution plans maintained by the City of Pensacola as may be necessary to comply with the limitations of Section 415 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended; providing severability; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Childers, by two-thirds vote **SB 2432** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

SB 606—A bill to be entitled An act relating to adoptions; amending s. 63.032, F.S.; providing a definition; providing an effective date.

CS for SB 104—A bill to be entitled An act relating to physical therapy practice; amending s. 486.021, F.S.; revising definition of the term "physical therapy"; amending s. 486.125, F.S.; providing additional grounds for which disciplinary actions may be taken; providing an effective date.

—was read the second time by title. On motion by Senator Jenne, by two-thirds vote **CS for SB 104** was read the third time by title, passed and certified to the House. The vote on passage was:

Yeas—38 Nays—None

SB 282—A bill to be entitled An act relating to restitution; amending s. 775.089, F.S.; providing for binding nature of restitution orders entered as part of plea agreements; providing for continuation of unsatisfied res-

titution obligations; providing for interest on outstanding unpaid amounts of restitution orders, and for liens on real estate owned by the defendant; authorizing collection of restitution by the state attorney; precluding discharge of the obligation in bankruptcy or other relief proceeding; reenacting ss. 538.07(2), 538.23(4), 810.115, 921.187(2), 944.17(5)(f), 947.147, 948.03(1)(e), 948.032, and 960.001(1)(h), F.S., relating to second-hand dealers, secondary metals recyclers, breaking or injuring fences, disposition and sentencing, correctional commitments and classification, victim restitution as condition of control release, terms and conditions of probation and community control, and guidelines for fair treatment of victims, to incorporate said amendment in references thereto; providing an effective date.

Section 3. Section 215.425, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

215.425 Extra compensation claims prohibited.—No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, agent, employee, or contractor after the service has been rendered or the contract made; nor shall any money be appropriated or paid on any claim the subject matter of which has not been provided for by preexisting laws, unless such compensation or claim is allowed by bill passed by two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the Legislature. However, when adopting salary schedules for a fiscal year, a district school board or community college district board of trustees may apply the schedule for payment of all services rendered subsequent to July 1 of that fiscal year. The provisions of this section do not apply to extra compensation given to state employees who are included within the senior management group pursuant to rules adopted by the Department of Administration. *The provisions of this section also do not apply to extra compensation given to county or municipal employees pursuant to policies adopted by county or municipal ordinances.*

Section 4. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.

House Amendment 1 (with Title Amendment)—Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert:

Section 1. Notwithstanding the October 1, 1992, repeal specified in section 119.14(3)(a), Florida Statutes, subsection (2) of section 527.02, Florida Statutes, is reenacted and amended to read:

527.02 License; penalty; fees.—

(2) In addition to the requirements of subsection (1), any person applying for a license to engage in the activities of a category I liquefied petroleum gas dealer, category II liquefied petroleum gas dispenser, category III liquefied petroleum gas cylinder exchange operator, installer A, installer B, installer C, installer D, requalification of cylinders, or fabricator, repairer, and tester of vehicles and cargo tanks, must prove competency by taking a written examination and passing it with a grade of 75 percent or above. Each applicant for examination shall submit a \$20 non-refundable fee. The examination shall be based on information contained in this chapter, the National Fire Protection Association Standards relating to liquefied petroleum gas, and the rules adopted by the department. Application for examination for competency may be made by an individual or by an owner, a partner, or any person in a supervisory capacity of the license applicant. Every business organization shall possess such a full-time qualifier at all times who has successfully completed an examination in the corresponding category of the license held by the business organization. A vacancy in a qualifier position in a business organization which results from the departure of the qualifier shall be immediately reported to the department. In the event a business organization no longer possesses a duly designated qualifier, as required by this section, its liquefied petroleum gas licenses shall be suspended by order of the department after 20 working days and shall remain suspended until a competent qualifier has been retained. A vacancy in the qualifier position for a period of over 20 working days shall be deemed to constitute an immediate threat to the public health, safety, and welfare. Failure to obtain a replacement qualifier within 60 days of the vacancy shall be grounds for revocation of licensure or eligibility for licensure. Any individual's competency qualifications on file with the department may be transferred to any existing licenseholder, by written request to the department from the person so qualified. By request in writing to the department, any individual who has on file the competency examination requirement may use this evidence on file for a new license application. *This exemption is subject to the Open Government Sunset Review Act in accordance with s. 119.14.*

Section 2. Notwithstanding the October 1, 1992, repeal specified in section 119.14(3)(a), Florida Statutes, subsection (1) of section 527.062, Florida Statutes, is reenacted and amended to read:

527.062 Investigation and safety promotion; authority of department.—

(1) The department may investigate the cause and circumstances of any accident involving loss of life, personal injury, or property damage when there is reasonable cause to believe that liquefied petroleum gas or equipment was involved. The department shall have the authority to take samples or evidence on or about the site of an accident in conjunction with an investigation. *The department shall make a written report of each investigation it conducts. All information compiled by the department pursuant to an investigation is confidential and exempt from s. 119.07(1) until the investigation is completed or ceases to be active. For purposes of this section, an investigation shall be considered "active" so long as the department is proceeding with reasonable dispatch and has a reasonable good faith belief that additional information is necessary and likely to be discovered which will allow the department to make a final determination of the cause and circumstances of the accident. This exemption is subject to the Open Government Sunset Review Act in accordance with s. 119.14. Reports of all such investigations shall be made by the department. Any of the department's papers, documents, reports, or evidence relative to an investigation shall not be subject to public inspection until 20 days after receipt by the department. The department may obtain a court order to withhold such papers, documents, reports, or evidence from public inspection beyond the 20-day period. The grounds for any such order shall be that:*

~~(a) Public inspection during the period set forth in the order would subject the person under investigation to unwarranted injury; or~~

~~(b) Public inspection during the period set forth in the order would not be in the public interest.~~

~~Any such order shall specify the period during which such papers, documents, reports, or evidence may be withheld from public inspection.~~

Section 3. This act shall take effect October 1, 1992.

And the title is amended as follows:

Strike the entire title and insert: An act relating to confidentiality of information relating to regulation of the sale of liquefied petroleum gas; amending s. 527.02, F.S., which provides an exemption from public records requirements by requiring a written request for disclosure of certain competency information; amending s. 527.062, F.S., which provides an exemption from public records requirements for information compiled by the Department of Insurance in connection with investigations of accidents involving liquefied petroleum gas; revising the exemption; saving such exemptions from repeal; providing for future review and repeal; providing an effective date.
