I. Summary:

This legislation re-creates the Inmate Welfare Trust Fund without modification, effective upon becoming a law. The Inmate Welfare Trust Fund, FLAIR #70-2-523, is administered by the Department of Corrections. This fund was created by Chapter 98-385.

II. Present Situation:

Section 945.215, F.S. provides for an Inmate Welfare Trust Fund and specifies that net proceeds from inmate-related revenues such as telephone commissions and profit from canteen and vending machines are to be deposited into the trust fund. The section also provides that the trust fund be used for a variety of education, training, faith-based and other programs that benefit inmates.

This bill re-creates the trust fund without modification.
