**I. Summary:**

This legislation re-creates the Child Labor Law Trust Fund without modification, effective November 4, 2004. The Child Labor Law Trust Fund, FLAIR #79-2-106, is administered by the Department of Business and Professional Regulation. It was transferred from the Department of Labor and Employment Security by Chapter 2002-194, Laws of Florida. This fund was last re-created effective November 4, 2000, by Chapter 2000-66, Laws of Florida.

**II. Present Situation:**

The fund is used to provide education about child labor laws to employers, public school employees, and the general public in order to protect the working youth. According to Comptroller data, receipts to this fund for FY 2001-2002 were \$15,825.

This bill re-creates the trust fund without modification.
