

- That portion of W. 20th Avenue in the City of Hialeah between W. 44th Place and Okeechobee Road in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Jose Regueiro Avenue.”
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- That portion of Edgewood Avenue West in Duval County from New Kings Road (U.S. 1) to Lem Turner Road is designated the “Earl S. ‘Coach’ Kitchings Avenue.”
- That portion of I-95 from Baymeadows Road in Duval County to State Road 16 in St. Johns County is designated the “Coach Jermaine D. Hall Memorial Highway.”
- That portion of State Road 26 between the Levy County line and the Alachua County line in Gilchrist County is designated as “Veterans Memorial Highway.”
- That portion of State Road 26 between the Levy County line and County Road 313 in Gilchrist County is designated as “Sergeant Ricky Lord Road.”
- That portion of Biscayne Boulevard Way between S.E. 2nd Avenue and U.S. 1 (Biscayne Boulevard) in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Julia Tuttle Way.”
- That portion of Old U.S. Highway 441 in Mt. Dora from the intersection of State Road 19A to Alexander Street is designated the “Cpl. Christopher Lee Poole, Jr., Memorial Highway.”
- That portion of State Road 44 east of Eustis beginning at the intersection of County Road 44 and ending just west of County Road 439 is designated the “Sgt. Frederico G. Borjas Memorial Highway.”
- That portion of State Road 46 near Sorrento from Round Lake Road to County Road 437 is designated the “Johnny C. Treadwell Memorial Highway.”
- Northwest 77th Court in Miami Lakes is designated as “Orange Bowl Way.”
- That portion of U.S. Highway 27 between the Florida-Georgia border in Gadsden County and Biscayne Bay in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Purple Heart Highway.”
- That portion of U.S. Highway 27 in Polk County between Sand Mine Road and U.S. Highway 192 is designated as the “Heather Hurd Memorial Highway.”
- Upon its completion, that portion of SR 739 in Lee County known as the Metro Parkway Extension between Six Mile Cypress Parkway and U.S. 41/Alico Road is designated the “Michael G. Rippe Parkway.”
- That portion of County Road 251 in Lafayette County between U.S. 27 and S.W. CR 534 is designated as “Earl Roland Lewis and Eloise Allen Lewis Road.”
- That portion of State Road 79 in Bay County from U.S. Highway 98 to the B.V. Buchanan Bridge in West Bay is designated as “K. Earl Durden Highway.”
- That portion of State Road 397 from Government Avenue to the North gate of Eglin Air Force Base in Okaloosa County is designated as “Colonel Bud Day Boulevard.”
- That portion of N.W. 79th Street between N.W. 6th Avenue and E. 12th Avenue in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Miss Lillie Williams Boulevard.”
- That portion of U.S. Highway 90 between Avalon Boulevard and Pace Patriot Boulevard in the City of Pace in Santa Rosa County is designated as “Army Sergeant Daniel L. McCall Memorial Highway.”
- That portion of 40th Street/Bird Road between 102nd Avenue and 117th Avenue in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Anthony J. Perez Street.”

- That portion of State Road 997 between S.W. 288th Street and S.W. 344th Street in Miami-Dade County is designated as “John Torrese Family Road.”
- That portion of S.W. 88th Street between S.W. 137th Avenue and S.W. 142nd Avenue in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Manuel Capo Way.”
- That portion of S.W. 8th Street between S.W. 24th Avenue and S.W. 27th Avenue in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Manuel Capo Boulevard.”
- That portion of U.S. Highway 1, also known as State Road 5, between S.W. 104th Street and S.W. 112th Street in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Lt. Colonel Charles Brown Memorial Highway.”
- The bill amends s. 585.61(1), F.S., designating “The Bronson Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory” in Osceola County.
- This bill amends the designation of Jose A. Marques Boulevard in Miami-Dade County in s. 17 of ch. 2008-256, Laws of Florida.
- The bridge on S.W. 17th Street between S.W. 12th Avenue and S. Pine Avenue in the City of Ocala in Marion County is designated as “Kenneth H. ‘Buddy’ MacKay and Jim H. Williams Bridge.”
- That portion of State Road 417 between Interstate 4 and the Seminole County southern boundary in Seminole County is designated as “Seminole Way.”
- That portion of State Road 277 between State Road 79 and U.S. Highway 90/State Road 10/Jackson Avenue in Washington County is designated as “Judge Perry Wells Highway.”
- Upon completion of construction, Bridge #610147 and Bridge #610146 on State Road 79 north of the City of Vernon in Washington County are designated as “Vernon Bridge.”
- That portion of State Road 60 between 43rd Avenue in Vero Beach and Interstate 95 in Indian River County is designated as “Richard Raczkoski Memorial Highway.”
- That portion of County Road 435 between Kelly Park Road and Clarcona-Ocoee Road in Orange County is designated as “Doctor Thomas Eliot ‘Doc Tommy’ McBride Road.”
- That portion of S.W. 27th Avenue, State Road 9, between S.W. 22nd Street and U.S. Highway 1 in the City of Miami in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Herbert Lee Simon Avenue.”
- That portion of State Road 200 between the Marion/Citrus County line and County Road 484 in Marion County is designated as “Otis Beckford Memorial Highway.”
- That portion of State Road 674 between U.S. Highway 301/State Road 43 and Interstate 75/State Road 93A in Hillsborough County is designated as “Blue Star Memorial Highway.”
- That portion of U.S. 1 (Biscayne Boulevard) between N.E. 87th Avenue and S.E. 3rd Street in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Historic Biscayne Boulevard.”
- That portion of Northeast Sixth Avenue between Northeast 113th and 121st Street in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Biscayne Park Way.”

The bill designates S.W. 67th Avenue (Ludlam Road) in the City of South Miami and the Village of Pinecrest in Miami-Dade County from Bird Road to S.W. 136th Street as a state historic road. It prohibits the use of state funds to cut or remove certain trees and to alter the physical dimensions or location of S.W. 67th Avenue, subject to certain exceptions.

This bill amends s. 585.61(1), F.S., and s. 17 of ch. 2008-256, Laws of Florida. This bill creates undesignated sections of the Florida Statutes.

II. Present Situation:

Section 334.071, F.S., provides: (1) Legislative designations of transportation facilities are for honorary or memorial purposes, or to distinguish a particular facility, and may not be construed to require any action by local governments or private parties regarding the changing of any street signs, mailing addresses, or 911 emergency telephone number system listings, unless the legislation specifically provides for such changes; (2) When the Legislature establishes road or bridge designations, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is required to place markers only at the termini specified for each highway segment or bridge designated by the law creating the designation, and to erect any other markers it deems appropriate for the transportation facility; and (3) The FDOT may not erect the markers for honorary road or bridge designations unless the affected city or county commission enacts a resolution supporting the designation. When the designated road or bridge segment is located in more than one city or county, resolutions supporting the designations must be passed by each affected local government prior to the erection of the markers.

Sections 267.061 and 267.074, F.S., outline the policy and criteria for evaluating, designating, protecting, and marking historic highways, buildings, lands, and other properties in Florida. The Bureau of Historic Preservation, within the Department of State's Division of Historical Resources, manages this program. Typically, the Division reviews applications for recommended historic designations; however, historic state highways are designated by passage of legislation, pursuant to s. 267.074(2)(b), F.S.

Florida has at least 11 state historic highways, ranging from Calle Ocho in Miami to the Old Apopka Road. North Ocean Boulevard, which is a section of Highway A1A in Palm Beach County, is both a scenic highway and a historic highway.

Although each historic highway designation is unique, they share a common requirement of maintaining the existing character and landscaping along the road. The legislation designating these historic highways generally prohibits the use of state funds to remove the adjacent trees unless they are diseased or damaged so they pose a hazard.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The effects of the bill are as follows:

Section 1: The bill designates the portion of State Road 285 in Okaloosa and Walton Counties which is located north of College Boulevard in Niceville as the "Doolittle Raiders Highway."

The Doolittle Raid was the first attack on the Japanese after the attack on Pearl Harbor. The raid was organized by Lieutenant Colonel James "Jimmy" Doolittle and was carried out April 18, 1942.

Section 2: The bill designates the portion of U.S. 331 from the Alabama state line to U.S. 98 in Walton County as "The Beach Highway."

U.S. 331 runs north and south from the Alabama state line to Point Washington State Forest near the Gulf Coast.

Section 3: The bill designates the portion of State Road 682 (Pinellas Bayway) from State Road 699 (Gulf Boulevard) to U.S. 19 in Pinellas County as “Command Sergeant Major Gary Lee Littrell Medal of Honor Causeway and Bridge.”

Command Sergeant Major Littrel served in the Vietnam War. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions during the war. Command Sergeant Major Littrel led a defense against enemy forces for four days with seemingly superhuman strength. Command Sergeant Major Littrel encouraged his troops and allied Vietnamese soldiers in their own language. The sustained courage and selflessness displayed by Command Sergeant Major Littrel over an extended period of time were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit on him and the U.S. Army.

Section 4: The bill designates the portion of State Road 292 from Blue Angel Parkway to the beginning of Perdido Key Drive in Escambia County as “Perdido Key Parkway.”

Section 5: The bill designates the ramp, Department of Transportation project 87075-3402 (1982), that connects northbound Florida Turnpike to northbound Interstate Highway 75 in Miami-Dade County as “Andrew J. Capeletti Memorial Ramp.”

Andrew J. Capeletti was founder of Capeletti Bros., Inc., a construction engineering firm responsible for building many of the highways and bridges in Florida from Fort Pierce to the Florida Keys, including the Golden Glades Interchange, major sections of I-95, I-75, I-595, Florida’s Turnpike, the Miami Avenue Bridge and the Andrews Avenue Bridge. Andrew J. Capeletti served as President of the Metropolitan Dade County Engineering Contractors Examining Board, Florida Limerock Association, Engineering Contractors Association of South Florida, and the Associated Builders and Contractors of Florida. His other civic contributions are numerous, including serving as the President of the Hialeah-Miami Springs Chamber of Commerce. Andrew J. Capeletti passed away in 1991 in Miami, Florida.

Section 6: The bill designates the portion of W. 20th Avenue in the City of Hialeah between W. 44th Place and Okeechobee Road in Miami-Dade County as “Jose Regueiro Avenue.”

Jose Regueiro helped created the Florida National College (FNC) which was founded in 1985. FNC is now a senior college accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and the Commissions for Independent Education, through the Department of Education. Over 19,400 students have graduated from FNC.

Section 7: The bill designates SW 67th Avenue (Ludlam Road) in the City of South Miami and the Village of Pinecrest in Miami-Dade County from Bird Road to SW 136th Street as a state historic road.

This bill prohibits the use of state funds for cutting or removing any tree having a diameter at its thickest part in excess of 6 inches within 35 feet of either side of the paved surface of the road, or to engage in an activity that requires the removal without the replacement of such a tree. It further prevents the use of state funds to alter the physical dimensions or location of Southwest 67th Avenue, the median strip thereof, or the land adjacent to, except for:

- The routine or emergency utilities maintenance activities necessitated to maintain the road as a utility corridor;
- The modification or improvements made to provide for vehicular ingress and egress of governmental safety vehicles; and
- Alterations, modifications, or improvements made for the purpose of enhancing life safety vehicular use or pedestrian use of SW 67th Avenue, or both as long as such alterations, modifications, or improvements are heard in a public hearing and subsequently approved by the governing board of the local government in which it is located.

Committee substitute for SB 520 provides the designation as a state historic road shall not be construed to prevent the ordinary maintenance and repair of the road or structures, provided the physical dimensions and location of the road and appearance of any structures are preserved. It further specifies preservation of the road shall take precedence over considerations of traffic management, and public safety shall not be construed to mean removing the existing landscaping or altering the road when alternative means promoting safety, including more restrictive traffic regulations, are available.

Further, the bill directs the Division of Historical Resources to provide for the erection of suitable markers along the road, alerting the public of the designation.

Section 8: The bill designates the portion of State Road 45 in Sarasota County from Constitution Boulevard in Sarasota to River Road in Venice as “Trooper Claude Baker Memorial Highway.”

Trooper Claude Baker was shot and killed after stopping an escaped prisoner in a stolen car in Sarasota. He was found lying on the highway beside his patrol car by a passing motorist. The suspect was sentenced to three life terms plus twenty years in prison.

Section 9: The bill designates the bridge on U.S. 98 in Wakulla County at the Wakulla River as “Gretchen Evans Memorial Bridge.”

Gretchen Evans helped to pioneer eco-tourism in Wakulla County and showed others the opportunities for nature-based businesses. Gretchen Evans was a founding member of the Tourist Development Council and founded the nonprofit organization HuManatee to help protect the Wakulla River herd of manatees.

Section 10: The bill designates the portion of Edgewood Avenue West in Duval County from New Kings Road (U.S. 1) to Lem Turner Road as “Earl S. ‘Coach’ Kitchings Avenue.”

Earl S. Kitchings was a high school football coach at Matthew Gilbert High School. In 1958 he was the first black coach to win Florida’s first black state championship. Coach Kitchings was described as a father to many players over the years. Coach Kitchings died in 2009.

Section 11: The bill designates the portion of I-95 from Baymeadows Road in Duval County to State Road 16 in St. Johns County as “Coach Jermaine D. Hall Memorial Highway.”

Coach Jermaine D. Hall made a lifelong commitment to Duval County youth and Jacksonville citizens by serving as the head football coach and physical education teacher for Mandarin High

School. In three short seasons, Coach Hall revitalized the Mandarin High School football program by leading the Mandarin Mustangs football team to its best season in 2006, including a District Championship ultimately finishing the season with an impressive 8-3 overall team record. Coach Hall placed great emphasis on developing the character of Mandarin's football players. He implemented a scout character building program and worked tirelessly to ensure his players understood the importance of hard work in the classroom, as well as on the field, and stressed the value of personal integrity in their lives. Coach Hall passed away in 2007.

Section 12: The bill designates the portion of State Road 26 between the Levy County line and the Alachua County line in Gilchrist County as "Veterans Memorial Highway."

Section 13: The bill designates the portion of State Road 26 between the Levy County line and County Road 313 in Gilchrist County as "Sergeant Ricky Lord Road."

Sergeant Ricky Lord was a marine who grew up in Trenton in Gilchrist County. He was killed in Iraq on August 18, 2004, two days before his 25th birthday.

Section 14: The bill designates the portion of Biscayne Boulevard Way between S.E. 2nd Avenue and U.S. 1 (Biscayne Boulevard) in Miami-Dade County as "Julia Tuttle Way."

Julia Tuttle bought 640 acres of land in the late 1800s where the city of Miami is today. She wanted to spur the development of a new city on her land. She agreed to split half of her land with the railroad owner under the condition that he would extend the rail down to where Miami is today. Julia Tuttle is considered the Mother of Miami. She died in 1898 from meningitis.

Section 15: The bill designates the portion of Old U.S. Highway 441 in Mt. Dora from the intersection of State Road 19A to Alexander Street as "Cpl. Christopher Lee Poole, Jr., Memorial Highway."

Corporal Chirstopher Lee Poole, Jr. died while conducting combat operations in Operation Iraqi Freedom. The Corporal was from Mount Dora, Florida and was 22 years old when he passed.

Section 16: The bill designates the portion of State Road 44 east of Eustis Beginning at the intersection of County Road 44 and ending just west of County Road 439 as "Sgt. Frederico G. Borjas Memorial Highway."

Sgt. Frederico G. Borjas was an Army reserve Sergeant who was killed in Afghanistan on October 16, 2008.

Section 17: The bill designates the portion of State Road 46 near Sorrento from Round Lake Road to County Road 437 as "Johnny C. Treadwell Memorial Highway."

Johnny C. Treadwell owned a local grocery store and several other businesses in Sorrento, but was known for his warm smile, helping hand, and dedication to the community. He served on the Sorrento/Mt. Plymouth Volunteer Fire Department and was a Trustee on the Sorrento Cemetery Board. He was instrumental in forming the East Lake County Chamber, as well as serving on the Board and being involved in many community projects. He was a civic leader in the Sorrento community, from delivering toys and food to families in need at Christmas to encouraging voter

registration drives. Though it wasn't his official title, most people affectionately called Johnny C. Treadwell, the "Mayor of Sorrento." He passed away from Alzheimer's disease in 2004.

Section 18: The bill designates Northwest 77th Court in Miami Lakes as "Orange Bowl Way."

The Orange Bowl is a month-long festival offering a top-notch college football game, as well as other sports, entertainment, and community events. The Orange Bowl attracts more than 150,000 visitors to the South Florida community, annually. For more than 15 years, top Miami-Dade and Broward students have been awarded Orange-Bowl sponsored college scholarships.

Section 19: The bill designates the portion of U.S. Highway 27 between the Florida-Georgia border in Gadsden County and Biscayne Bay in Miami-Dade County as "Purple Heart Highway."

Section 20: The bill designates the portion of U.S. Highway 27 in Polk County between Sand Mine Road and U.S. Highway 192 as "Heather Hurd Memorial Highway."

Heather Hurd was a 26-year-old who worked at Disney. She was killed in a car crash on US Highway 27 in Davenport, Florida by a distracted driver exceeding the speed limit. She was on the way to visit a wedding planner with her fiancé, who survived the accident.

Section 21: The bill designates the portion of SR 739, upon its completion, in Lee County known as the Metro Parkway Extension between Six Mile Cypress Parkway and U.S. 41/Alico Road as "Michael G. Rippe Parkway."

Michael G. Rippe was DOT's Director of the Southwest Area Office and later the District Director of Transportation Development for District 1.

Section 22: The bill designates the portion of County Road 251 in Lafayette County between U.S. 27 and S.W. CR 534 as "Earl Roland Lewis and Eloise Allen Lewis Road."

Earl Lewis married his high school sweetheart, Eloise Allen in 1945. The two have played a large role in community activities. Earl Lewis managed many political campaigns beginning in the 1960s for Mayors, State Senators, and State Representatives.

Section 23: The bill designates the portion of State Road 79 in Bay County from U.S. Highway 98 to the B.V. Buchanan Bridge in West Bay as "K. Earl Durden Highway."

K. Earl Durden is Chairman, CEO and Director of Durden Enterprises II, Inc., and Chairman of Magic Broadcasting, LLC. He also served as Chairman of the Florida Transportation Commission.

Section 24: The bill designates the portion of State Road 397 from Government Avenue to the North gate of Eglin Air Force Base in Okaloosa County as "Colonel Bud Day Boulevard."

Bud Day is a retired Air Force Colonel and Command Pilot who served during the Vietnam War. He is often cited as being the most decorated U.S. service member since General Douglas

MacArthur, having received some seventy decorations, a majority for actions in combat. Colonel Day is a recipient of the Medal of Honor.

Section 25: The bill designates the portion of N.W. 79th Street between N.W. 6th Avenue and E. 12th Avenue in Miami-Dade County as “Miss Lillie Williams Boulevard.”

Miss Lillie Williams is a former Miami-Dade County Community Action Agency member and a chairwoman of the Dade Employment Economic Development Corporation. She received a B.S. from Florida A&M University in 1950, a B.S. in Behavioral Science from Shaw University in 1970, and a Masters degree in Behavioral Science from A&T State University in 1980.

Section 26: The bill designates the portion of U.S. Highway 90 between Avalon Boulevard and Pace Patriot Boulevard in the City of Pace in Santa Rosa County as “Army Sergeant Daniel L. McCall Memorial Highway.”

Army Sergeant Daniel L. McCall from Pace, Florida was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Benning, Georgia. He was killed in Salman Pak, Iraq when army forces engaged their unit with small arms fire and an improvised explosive device. He is described as a good athlete, involved in his community, and a great all-around person.

Section 27: The bill designates the portion of 40th Street/Bird Road between 102nd Avenue and 117th Avenue in Miami-Dade County as “Anthony J. Perez Street.”

Anthony J. Perez was a student at Florida International University who died of carbon monoxide poisoning on November 14, 2004.

Section 28: The bill designates the portion of State Road 997 between S.W. 288th Street and S.W. 344th Street in Miami-Dade County as “John Torrese Family Road.”

The John Torrese Family established TNT Farms, which cultivates approximately 2,000 acres of squash and beans in Miami-Dade County and in White Springs.

Section 29: The bill designates the portion of S.W. 88th Street between S.W. 137th Avenue and S.W. 142nd Avenue in Miami-Dade County as “Manuel Capo Way.”

Manuel Capo was the CEO of El Dorado furniture, which is the largest Hispanic-owned furniture store in the United States.

Section 30: The bill designates the portion of S.W. 8th Street between S.W. 24th Avenue and S.W. 27th Avenue in Miami-Dade County as “Manuel Capo Boulevard.”

Manuel Capo was the CEO of El Dorado furniture, which is the largest Hispanic-owned furniture store in the United States.

Section 31: The bill designates the portion of U.S. Highway 1, also known as State Road 5, between S.W. 104th Street and S.W. 112th Street in Miami-Dade County as “Lt. Colonel Charles Brown Memorial Highway.”

Lt. Colonel Charles Brown was a World War II veteran who received several United States and foreign decorations, awards, and citations during his diplomatic career. He later founded the Energy and Environmental Research Center and received recognition in the field of “smokeless diesel engines.”

Section 32: The bill amends s. 585.61(1), F.S., designating “The Bronson Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory” in Osceola County.

Charles H. Bronson is the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

Section 33: The bill amends s. 17, ch. 2008-256, Laws of Florida. The designation for Jose A. Marques, the portion of 8th Street between S.W. 107th Avenue and S.W. 117th Avenue in Miami-Dade County is amended to read Dr. Jose A. Marques, the portion of 8th Street between S.W. 107th Avenue and S.W. 127th Avenue in Miami-Dade County.

Dr. Jose A. Marques was a professor and founding member of the criminal justice program at Florida International University and mentor to countless police officers. He was remembered as responsible for helping many Miami-Dade Police Department officers get Bachelor’s and Master’s degrees, forging partnerships with police departments.

Section 34: The bridge on S.W. 17th Street between S.W. 12th Avenue and S. Pine Avenue in the City of Ocala in Marion County is designated as “Kenneth H. ‘Buddy’ MacKay and Jim H. Williams Bridge.”

Buddy MacKay is a former Governor and Lieutenant Governor of Florida

Jim Williams is a former Lieutenant Governor of Florida.

Section 35: That portion of State Road 417 between Interstate 4 and the Seminole County southern boundary in Seminole County is designated as “Seminole Way.”

Section 36: That portion of State Road 277 between State Road 79 and U.S. Highway 90/State Road 10/Jackson Avenue in Washington County is designated as “Judge Perry Wells Highway.”

Judge Perry Wells is a former Washington County judge and businessman.

Section 37: Upon completion of construction, Bridge #610147 and Bridge #610146 on State Road 79 north of the City of Vernon in Washington County are designated as “Vernon Bridge.”

Section 38: That portion of State Road 60 between 43rd Avenue in Vero Beach and Interstate 95 in Indian River County is designated as “Richard Raczkoski Memorial Highway.”

Indian River County Deputy Richard Raczkoski was murdered at a convenience store September, 1986.

Section 39: That portion of County Road 435 between Kelly Park Road and Clarcona-Ocoee Road in Orange County is designated as “Doctor Thomas Eliot ‘Doc Tommy’ McBride Road.”

Doctor Thomas E. “Doc Tommy” McBride was a long time physician in Apopka.

Section 40: That portion of S.W. 27th Avenue, State Road 9, between S.W. 22nd Street and U.S. Highway 1 in the City of Miami in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Herbert Lee Simon Avenue.”

Herbert Lee Simon was a realtor and three time president of the Miami Board of Realtors. He passed away in 2009.

Section 41: That portion of State Road 200 between the Marion/Citrus County line and County Road 484 in Marion County is designated as “Otis Beckford Memorial Highway.”

Otis Beckford was killed in a workplace shooting in Orlando on November 6, 2009.

Section 42: That portion of State Road 674 between U.S. Highway 301/State Road 43 and Interstate 75/State Road 93A in Hillsborough County is designated as “Blue Star Memorial Highway.”

Section 44: That portion of Northeast Sixth Avenue between Northeast 113th and 121st Street in Miami-Dade County is designated as “Biscayne Park Way.”

Section 45: This bill will take effect July 1, 2010.
